BAD REVERSE FOR THE BOERS.

The Enemy Struck the British Line at Its Weakest Point, But They Failed. London, Oct. 22 .- (N.Y. Tribune Cable).

The Intense if sober satisfaction expressed throughout Great Britain to-day has com-mon sense behind it. Military men say that Natal, by reason of the Boer superiorground, was the weak spot, and Natal, General Symons' small and separate

six captains and ten lieutenants were wounded. This heavy loss among the officers was due, as the latest despatches from the front showed, to their valiant but insensate conduct in sticking to the traditions of the British army and refusing to take the cover of which the men availed themselves in storming the Boer position on the summit of the kopje.

The War Office announces that 31 noncommissioned officers and men were killed and 151 wounded.

Among the rank and file the Hussars had 7 wounded; the artillery 1 killed and 3 wounded; the Leicestershire Regiment 1 wounded; the King's Riffes 11 killed and 30 wounded; the Dublin Fusiliers 4 killed and 41 wounded, and the Natal Police 2 wounded.

THE CASUALTIES.

It is now known that the small force and the weak point have turned formidable; that an admirably planned assault has not only been repulsed, but that the sasilants have been sharply smitten and the Boer plans of campaign have been completely baffed. Those plans are warmily commended in military circles here, where the Boer scheme was eminently sound and sclentifie. As the plan is explained by experts, General White's force at Ladysmith was to have been held by the demonstrations of the Free State Boers on the western side to prevent reinforcements being sent to Glencoe, All this was done. The railway was contained and 30 wounded; the Dublin Fusiliers 4 killed and 41 wounded, and the Natal Police 2 wounded.

Where the Boers miscalculated was over the superiority of the British artillerymen to the imported German gunners of the State artillery, and, more seriously, over the superior dash and grit of the English officers and men. That the British artillery justified the high praise of German military attaches does not admit of a doubt. In twenty minutes almost all the Transvanl's splendid Krupp guns were slienced. But the three hours scramble of the Irish Fusiliers and the Rifies up the precipitous mountain sides under a galling fire ,was a splendid achievement and decided the fortunes of the day. To this and General Symons' handling of his troops the upsetting of a well calculated stroke was due. The legnth of the tunnel will be 1500 feet, exclusive of the approaches, which will be 520 feet. The tunnel will be lined with a cylindrical steel casing, having an internal diameter of 13 feet 2 inches, the lowest part of the tube being 35 feet beneath the mean water level of the river, at which stage the water is 11 feet deep. The lining will be built up to plates two feet three inches in length, butt-jointed and spliced with angle bars. To protect the exterior of the lining tube from corrosion it will be covered with a thick layer of cement concrete. The track will be supported on a bed of concrete, below which there will be a longitudinal drain to carry off accumulated water, which will be pumped out by electric power. The tunnel has been bored by shield and compressed air, through mud and sand strata, the hydraulic pressure available being about 900 tons. The work has been in progress since 1805 and it is expected that the tunnel will be ready for service next year.



PLAN OF THE CAMPAIGN

Fixed Before Gen, Buller Started-Reinforcements to Reach Mafeking in a Day or Two.

London, Oct. 21 .- (N.Y. Sun Cable.)-The inevitable is happening in South Africa more speedily than the English themselves ted. The details arriving of yesterday's dearly bought victory show that the Boer defeat was crushing, and, for ordinary troops, would be almost decisive. It is ary troops, would be almost decisive. It is impossible, however, to estimate intelligently the effect of the severe reverse upon the Boers, for it is a new experience for them. The simultaneous checks at Mafeking and Glencoe by forces smaller than their own, cannot fail to modify seriously their plan of campaign. It is fully expected in this country that the Boers will now concentrate all their efforts against Kimberley, with the possible capture of Cecil Rhodes as the chief incentive. Will It Shorten the Campaign?

The Boers' misfortunes during this week, according to the general view, should much shorten the campaign, but this is a matter of doubt. It is generally recognized, especially by diplomatic observers, that Great Britain is making this war something more than a campaign against two little allied republics. She proposes to give the world a demonstration of hel military powers and resources on the same scale as she recently made a display of her naval supremacy. If it were otherwise the whole world would before now have been ridiculing her for mobilizing the whole military force of the Empire in order to crush a people fewer in nt mber than a fair-sized provincial town. England is providing an object lesson for envious Europe, and it remains to be seen if the Continent will be duly impressed.







On Oct. 19, the day before the attack on Glencoe Camp, the Boers cut the British line of communication at Elandslaagte, capturing a cattle train, on board of which were several British officers and men and two correspondents. The despatches at the time gave no idea of the strength of the Boers at Elandslaagte, or their subsequent proceedings at that point. It was taken for granted, however, that they cut the line there in order to prevent Gen. White sending reinforcements to Gen. Symons, whom the burghers doubtless expected to isolate and destroy or capture.
