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**SEPARATE SCHOOLS ALL ROUND.**  
 Ottawa, June 16.—(Special.)—In consequence of the erection of Saskatchewan and Alberta into provinces a large portion of what is known as the Northwest Territories Act will have to be repealed. The government are about to introduce bills providing for the government of the territories that remain, namely, for the government of the Yukon, Mackenzie, Keewatin and Ungava. These will be in the shape of single bills or one bill providing for all. The draft bill for the territory of Mackenzie, while it does not mention the school question directly, gives full power to the governor and his council to do everything and anything for "the peace, order and good government" to use the phrase of the British North American Act, for the territory, and it is pretty well understood that this means that the governors of the remaining territories will create a dual system of education, public schools and separate schools, and also provide for the use of the two languages.

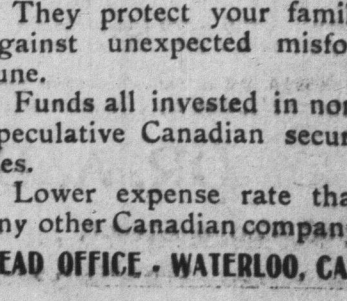
