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## REPORT

-OF THE-

## SESSION OF KNOX CHURCH, OTTAWA,

Presented at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation, held January 10th, 1884.

As a Congregation we have reached another landmark in our history, and have left another year of labour and pilgrimage behind us. The record of the year that is gone, with its varied trials and toils, its sorrows and disappointments, its fears and hopes, is now on high; and though we have not accomplished all, as a Congregation, that we might have done, or hoped to do, yet we are grateful for what the Lord has enabled us to accomplish, and for the goodness and abounding mercy with which He has visited us; thankfully we acknowledge, to the glory of His name, "Hitherto the Lord hath helpe I us." It is impossible, however, to tabulate all the results of spiritual work. This has to do with life, and the development of life is silent, and its process eludes the scrutiny of the most vigilant. This is true, with respect to life, in any of the multitudinous forms with which we are familiar, and much more true respecting the spiritual life of a congregation, whose subject is the spiritual nature of man, and whose source is the invisible The fact, therefore, that the Session should have nothing of a special character to report respecting our sptritual life as a congregation, during the year that has just closed, should neither be disappointing or surprising to any one. The sudden and startling things in the development of life are abnormal; they indicate, generally, that there is something wrong. While, therefore, there is an absence of that which is strange in our history during the past year, we have not been left without tokens of God's presence and favor, and evidences of the Spirit's working in us and among us. Sinners have been converted unto God, and led to confess

the name of Christ among men; and to the hearts of all God has given the spirit of peace and harmony, and of mutual co-operation in His work. No factions or dissensions have marred our peace, or broken the harmony that has marked our congregational life. A spirit of large-hearted liberality has also been granted to us, which has shown itself in the provision made for a large reduction of our indebtedness, which will relieve the financial pressure upon the congregation, and brighten our prospects for the future. "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad."

The health of the congregation has been generally good. Yet, there are homes and hearts among us that have been darkened by bereavements and saddened by sorrows and blighted hopes, and by their experiences we have all been reminded of our frailty, and taught that this is not our rest. To all to whom the year brought sorrow and bereavement, and left the memory of losses, the Session tender their heartfelt sympathy.

The number of communicants reported to the last annual meeting was 241. During the year 33 were added to the roll—20 by cartificate, and 13 on profession of their faith. Twenty-three names were removed from the roll, leaving the number now 251, or a gain of 10 during the year. There were 14 baptisms during the year.

To the ladies who have distributed *The Monthly Record* and gathered the contributions to the schemes of the Church, the thanks of the congregation are due.


According to the last Report, the balance on hand of the Session Fund for the relief of the poor was \$8.22. During the year \$5.00 has been paid out, leaving a balance of \$3.22. As this is quite insufficient to meet the need of the rigorous winter months, the Session will require to ask you for a contribution to this fund at an early day.

Another year has run its course, and, with it, another year of our work as a congregation. In reviewing that work in regard to its financial operation, your Committee do not find the result quite as favourable as they would desire. Unlike the preceding year our revenue failed to meet our requirements. At the close of the preceding year we had a balance of \$61.00 in our favour; at the close of the present year we have an adverse balance of \$3.65.

But that we may see wherein the deficiency in our revenue has taken place, let us compare the figures for the two years in question. During the preceding year we received, through weekly contributions, the sum of \$4,341.70; during the past year, the sum of \$3,670.82, or less by \$671.68. During the preceding year we received, through ordinary collections, the sum of \$619.94; during the past year, the sum of \$665,17, or \$45.23 more. During the preceding year, from all other sources, we received the sum of \$786.74; during the past year, the sum of \$1,037.77, or \$251.03 more.

Thus it is evident that the falling off in revenue during the past year has taken place in the amount received from weekly contributions, while ordinary collections, and all other sources together, maintained a good deal more than the previous years' standing. And that the falling off has taken place in this direction may be due, to some extent at least, to the fact that no canvass was made of the congregation for subscriptions, during the past year, as formerly. At any rate, the quarter whence the deficiency has arisen would seem to indicate as much. No doubt this consideration will engage the attention of the incoming Committee, and at the close of the current year, furnish a different result.

In addition to the above, we submit the following comparative statement of receipts for the last six years, from our two principal sources of revenve:—

From this comparative statement it will be seen that we received less from the two sources under consideration, during the past year, than during any of the others, except during 1879, when the depression which had been for a long time so severely felt had not yet passed away.

The Ladies' Association, as usual, handed over to the Treasurer a handsome sum of the close of the year. For this they have our hearty acknowledgements.

The matter of most importance, and of greatest interest, financially, to the congregation, which your Committee have had under consideration during the year, was the effort to reduce our debt by the amount of \$12,000. The congregation is aware that several of its members, when the existing financial arrangements were entered into with Mr. MacLaren, became personally responsible, under certain conditions, for the payment of \$12,000, as collateral security, in addition to the mortgage on the Church. Early in January last, a letter was received by Mr. Farries from Dr. Henderson, who voluntarily offered to pay the sum of \$1,000 whenever the others, whose names, like his own, were attached to the personal bond, were ready to pay their share of the amount. This offer, made to Mr. Farries in writing, was subsequently repeated through Mr. McKellar, who was authorized to make a similar offer to the congregation, at its annual meeting, held on the 11th of January last

Your Committee, soon after they were made aware of this voluntary offer, appointed a sub-Committee, consisting of those

whose name to canvass the purpose mised \$1,00 of which th

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whose names were attached to the bond, who earnestly proceeded to canvass the members and adherents of the congregation, for the purpose of raising the sum of \$11,000, so that, with the promised \$1,000, we could wipe off the total amount, for the payment of which the personal bond was entered into.

The result of this canvass has been most satisfactory, especially when we remember that the successful effort to pay off the Warnock loan of \$6,000, had been so recently put forth. With a promptness and liberality worthy of all commendation, the members and adherents of the congregation so heartily responded to the appeal made to them, that we now have on our subscription list the very large sum of \$11,625.

Had the promise to give \$1,000 towards the payment of this amount been fulfilled, your Committee, as will be seen by the statement made above, would now have had on their subscription list the sum of \$12,625; but we regret exceedingly that the whole enterprise was almost jeopardized by the hitherto unfulfilled promise of Dr. Henderson.

There are, however, some members and adherents of the congregation who have not yet contributed to the scheme, who (when called upon), will, we sincerely hope, make up the remaining \$400, so that the whole amount may be liquidated, and an annual saving to the congregation of \$720 may, in this way, be effected.

Confidently relying upon receiving from those yet uncanvassed the remaining \$400, your Committee have notified the Mortgagee of our intention to pay off the amount, for which some, in the interest of the congregation, became personally responsible.

In conclusion, let us to-night gratefully seek to realize the fact that the Lord has truly been with us, and has greatly prospered the works of our hands; and, cheered and encouraged, let us engage in the work of the new year, in a spirit of earnestness and faithfulness, born of the conviction that whatever we do we should do it "heartily as to the Lord and not unto men."

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## Habbath Hchool Report.

The work of another year, with its joys and sorrows, its failures and successes, its hesitating doubt and triumphant faith, its fitful and feeble energies, and its constant and patient perseverance in well doing, is registered on high, and God's estimate of that record is final and irrevocable. While we all acknowledge that in the Sabbath School we have been unworthy and unprofitable servants, let us remember for our encouragement that we serve Him who has said, "Whosoever shall give to drink unto one of these little ones a cup of cold water only, in the name of a disciple, verily I say unto you he shall in no wise lose his reward."

The work done during the past year has been, on the whole, earnest, painstaking, and effective. What the actual spiritual results may be we cannot be expected accurately to estimate; but as we know that it is God who giveth the increase, we can with confidence expect His blessing. We are not altogether left to faith and expectation, however, as to the spiritual results of the years' work, for nine from the Sabbath School have, during the year, declared their allegiance to their Saviour, and have, in uniting with the Church, made public profession of their faith in Christ.

Several changes have taken place in the composition of the staff and officers, during the year. Mr. Cunningham, who had charge of our oldest class of boys, resigned his position, not, we are glad to say, for the purpose of abandoning Sabbath School work, but to superintend the Presbyterian Sabbath School in Rochesterville, where, we doubt not, he will continue to do efficient and effective service. Mr. McKinnon takes Mr. Cunningham's class, and Mr. Savage of New Edinburgh succeeds Mr. McKinnon. The class formerly, taught by Mr. McLeod, who left the City in July last, has been, since that time, without a regular teacher, and that, too, in spite of repeated efforts on the part of the Superintendent to secure one. Mrs. Macmillan has taken charge of the small class of boys and girls promoted from the Infant Class. With these exceptions the staff of teachers is the same as that of last year.

We willingly pay a loving tribute to the memory of our late Librarian, Mr. P. D. McIntyre, whose characteristic faithfulness constancy and energy, were thoroughly appreciated by us, and whose life was, with such appalling suddenness, cut short by the hand of death.\* Mr. McJanet, who has been selected to succeed Mr. McIntyre, now efficiently discharges the duties of Librarian.

Last year we reported that, "Much remains still to be done in order to make the Library fulfil effectually its proper function in the work of the School, and, therefore, the Teachers have wisely determined to make, during the present year, further substantial additions to the books now in our possession." In accordance with the determination expressed above, a goodly supply of new books has been added to our present fairly-equipped Library.

The collection on the first Sabbath in each month is set apart for Missionary purposes, and in this way the sum of \$35.48 has been raised, and will be forwarded to further the work of French Evangelization. In answer to an appeal made by the Presbytery of Ottawa to the Sabbath Schools under its jurisdiction, \$15.00 of this amount was voted by the Teachers to aid in erecting a School and Church, for the French Protestant Congregation in the Township of Ripon. We have also decided to assist the Women's Foreign Missionary Society in sending contributions to our Missionaries in Eromanga.

By the accompaning statement of the Treasurer, it will be seen that we have to our credit at the present time the sum of \$35.11.

Victoria Strachan, Annie Masson, Bella Macmillan, Alex. Bell, Willie Cooper, and Willie Bremner, were present every Sabbath during the year, while Bertie Macmillan and Roderick Bremner missed one Sabbath only.

We are glad to be able to report that the attendance has risen from an average of 98 last year to 108 this year.

The Superintendent's prize to the class having the highest average attendance, will be given to Miss Kennedy's and also to Miss Masson's class, the two being so nearly equal that injustice would be done by limiting the prize to one class.

Seeking to realize to some extent the importance and value of our work, and fully believing that the growth, stability and vitality of the congregation very materially depends upon the Sabbath School, let us enter upon the work of 1884 imbued with the spirit of the good King Hezekiah, who, "in every work that he began in the service of the house of God, and in the law, and in the commandments, to seek his God, did it with all his heart, and prospered."
