

SMOOTH SILVER IS ACCEPTED

Telephone Company Refused Salvation Army Coin But Today Decided to Take it-What Banks Say

The question of the acceptance of smooth money came to a test today when the New Brunswick Telephone Company, after refusing to accept some coin among a quantity tendered by the Salvation Army in payment of their 'phone rental, finally accepted it. The affair had come to the stage where there was talk of removing the phone, but the instrument will remain and the company will send a collector to take the money they had refused.

On Saturday Adjutant Carter, of the Salvation Army Metropole went to the office to pay his telephone rental. Talking to the Times today the Adjutant told the following story: "I went to the counter and told a young lady I wanted to pay my telephone rental and placed some money down for the purpose. Looking over some silver, she picked out a ten cent piece and said that she could not accept it, as she had orders relative to worn money. She referred the matter to some one also in the office, with the same reit, as she had orders relative to worn money. 



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN WORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A Ny person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Easkatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3,00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.




