JOFFRE SENDS GREAT FORCE TO BLUNT ARROW THAT POINTS AT HEART OF FRANCE

Great Offensive Movement Under Way—Fighting Again Marks Operations at Neuve Chapelle Where British Won Glory

London, April 8.—The last three weeks have shown kaleidoscopic changes in the centre of war interest. The dial has revolved for glimpses of the Dardanelles, Neuve Chapelle, East Prussia, St. Eloi, Champagne, the Carpathians and yesterday brought the forest region between the Meuse and the Moselle into the focus. Here, for the second time since the first of the year, the French have launched a big offensive to capture St. Mihiel and lift the partial investment of Verdun.

Despatches last night indicated that General Joffre has ordered the most pretentious operations since the drive that began two months ago against the Germans at Ferme and Beaumont, on the western slope of the Argonne. Numerous numbers of field and heavy artillery have been sent to the heights of the Meuse and the wooded region between the river and Pont-A-Mousson, with the object of cutting off or blunting the "arrow pointed at the heart of France."

Paris, April 8.—A French army of 200,000 men has been concentrated around Verdun and in the Woerth district for the drive which the French are making against the Germans. This army is supported by artillery which the French have been moving to the front since January 1. Night and day attacks are being made against the German lines.

London, April 8.—A despatch from Amsterdam says that fighting is still proceeding in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle. The allies' artillery is bombarding the villages of Fomelle and Herlis. The Germans have delivered numerous counter-attacks especially at night, but have been consistently unsuccessful.

Paris, April 8.—The French War Office reports: "In Belgium the day was marked by artillery engagements. In the valley of the Aisne and the district to the east of Rheims our efforts, in spite of the abnormally bad weather, continued with great activity and we have maintained our gains between the Meuse and the Moselle in their entirety, while at the same time we are proceeding to make further progress."

Russians Only About Day's March From The Plains

Czar's Men Have Won Very Important Success in Carpathians and Now Are Driving Austrians Down the Slopes

London, April 8.—The Daily Telegraph correspondent at Petrograd telegraphs: Russia has won a very important success in the Carpathians. On Sunday her troops fought their way over the ridge at a point due south of Balgrade, and they are now driving the Austrians down the Hungarian slopes of the range. Although this achievement has been accompanied by no great captures of guns or prisoners, in other respects it is very noteworthy. In the more extent of ground won, it probably exceeds anything achieved since the great Carpathian battle began many weeks ago.

Comparatively slight progress in this direction will bring the Czar's troops to the rear of the Austrian operating base of Lutsk. It will also seriously menace the communication of the German army to the Kosiowka zone. The greatest gain of the Russians, however, is that they now have passed through the roughest, wildest, woodiest part of the soft spot in the Carpathian barrier, and little more than a day's march separates them from the great Hungarian plain. There nothing but open country lies between them and Budapest.

Paris, April 8.—The Russians are now fighting on unfavorable ground in the Carpathians, according to Budapest newspapers, and are experiencing the same difficulty in bringing munitions and supplies from the rear that previously beset the Austrians.

Petrograd, April 8.—Austrian guns captured by the Russians when Przemysl fell, are being turned against the Austro-German armies in the Carpathians. The Russian War Office states that the Germans are advancing slowly but surely. The Russians are now fortifying the principal heights of the Beskid range.

Paris, April 8.—The Vienna correspondent of the paper professes to have reliable information that the Austrian government has already ordered semi-official purloiners with two powers of the Triple Entente, and he believes a "dramatic surprise" is possible.

Paris, April 8.—What the Kaiser thinks about Italy is reflected in the following statement he recently made to officers attached to the Austrian Emperor's suite: "Even if we are crushed, we shall never live of telling our children in Austria, as well as in Germany, that our downfall was due to Italy. If it takes ten or even twenty years, we will win back whatever we give Italy now, and also seize Venice as interest."

Toronto, April 8.—A special cable to the Mail and Empire from Folkestone says: "The Canadian Field Artillery is doing consistently good work at the front. The division has had a comparatively quiet time lately; little is doing along the line, but they expect to be in some hot work soon. BELGIANS DRIVE ENEMY FROM WEST SIDE OF THE CANAL

London, April 8.—The Belgian legion here has a telegram from the Belgian command in the west, dated yesterday, as follows: "The western side of the Ypres canal, in the direction of the Dred Grachten, has been completely freed of the enemy by Belgian troops. The Germans fled in disorder, leaving machine guns and ammunition."

BRITISH MINING MEN IN MEXICO MAKE A PROTEST TO AMBASSADOR

El Paso, Texas, April 8.—British mining men of the Durango district today sent to Sir Cecil Spring Rice, British ambassador, a protest against an amendment to the Mexican mining law recently adopted by the Villa government. The mining men asserted that it would be impossible to comply with the law, which requires that all properties shall be worked continually with government concession as a penalty if such work is not performed. The American mine owners already have protested.

Most important of all, the effort is made to develop in him those qualities of mind and heart which make for worthy, honorable and useful citizenship. There is no longer any fear that boy scout training leads to militarism. It leads simply to a sturdier manhood, develops self-reliance, and stimulates the mind as well as the body to more healthful activity.

THE SHAME OF IT

The following paragraph from the Ottawa correspondent of today's Standard is commended to the thoughtful attention of the people of New Brunswick: "The public accounts committee yesterday was a scene of the largest room in the building, the railway committee room, was used for the session and standing room only was the sign which had to be hung out at times. Nova Scotia horse dealers, most of whom would be able to give the original Dugal-Haram pointers on horse trading, kept the committee in roars of laughter as they told with considerable gusto, and not the slightest tinge of conscience, how they put it over the government buyers."

OUR BOY SCOUTS

When Col. Baden-Powell visited St. John several years ago it was hoped that the boy scout movement would receive such an impetus as would cause it to be thoroughly established in this city and province. Whether because of difficulty in getting competent scout-masters, or because of a lack of properly organized effort, the movement did not succeed. During the last year, however, it has been taken up in earnest by influential men, and although very little has been said about it the work of organization has of late been proceeding in a very satisfactory manner. As was pointed out in the Times yesterday, half a dozen troops have been formed in St. John, and it is hoped to double the number this year, while troops have also been organized in quite a number of places in other parts of the province. The strength of this movement lies in the fact that the various local councils can affiliate with a provincial council which, with other provincial councils, is affiliated with the general council for Canada, at the head of which is H. H. H. the Governor-General.

HOMES FOR WORKINGMEN

Ten thousand homes for working people are to be built in Buenos Aires within the next five years, according to a news item in the Bulletin of the Pan-American Union, Washington, D. C. At first such an announcement would not seem to be of very much interest to the people in the United States, but when a contractor from Buenos Aires, recently appeared in New Orleans, La., and let it be known that he was there for the purpose of buying about 20,000,000 feet of yellow pine and some 15,000,000 feet of cypress lumber, the producers of those commodities in the state of Louisiana and neighboring sections of the Gulf coast at once became alive to the situation and inquired for particulars.

They found that the Argentine government had evolved a scheme for the betterment of the living conditions of the laboring classes in the larger cities of the country by placing the possibility of owning their homes within their reach. To accomplish this the government has entered into a contract with a large New York company for the erection of 10,000 two-story houses in an outlying district of the Argentine capital.

TURKISH FORTS BEYOND REPAIR

Allies Are Preparing For Final Onslaught

NO IMMEDIATE ATTACK

Weeks May Intervene Before the Smashing Re-commencement—Meanwhile, Discord Between Germans and Turks is Growing

Since the battle on March 18 there has been no activity, with the exception of that reported on Sunday week, and the work of mine-sweeping. A close watch, however, is being kept on the further course of the Gallipoli Peninsula and on the Hellespont up to the Narrows and that the Sunday bombardment was probably to prevent enemy re-organizing any of the damage already done by the allied fleets.

There can be no question of the results already received being rendered nugatory by delay. It is said on good authority that the destruction wrought was so very severe that it is practically impossible for the Turks to repair effectively any of the forts and works already destroyed.

The heavy guns of the fleet have reduced them into a condition of chaos. When the attack is resumed it is believed that the Turks will feel the severity of the loss they have sustained in guns.

Meanwhile, during the cessation, active preparations for a final attack are being pushed forward. For obvious reasons it is impossible to say what these consist of, but it is clear that nothing is being left to chance, and that the dimensions, both naval and military, of the problem involved are thoroughly recognized.

It is reported that the Turks are now in strong force in the Gallipoli Peninsula. The best Anatolian troops and part of the Smyrna division were concentrated and it may be taken as certain that, fighting with their backs to the wall, they will put up a fairly formidable opposition. The interval is likely to last some weeks.

TO SEND AUSTRIANS TO VALCARTIER CAMP

Montreal, April 8.—Valcartier is likely to be a busy military centre again soon. Major Berce, assistant director of engineering at Ottawa, left for Valcartier a short time ago. There is every indication that cleaning up the camp will be commenced soon.

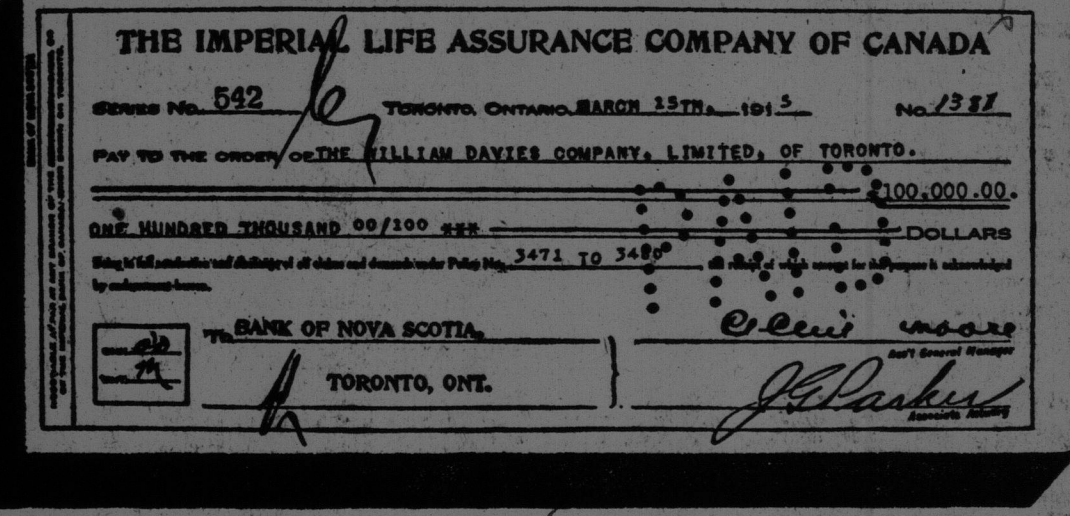
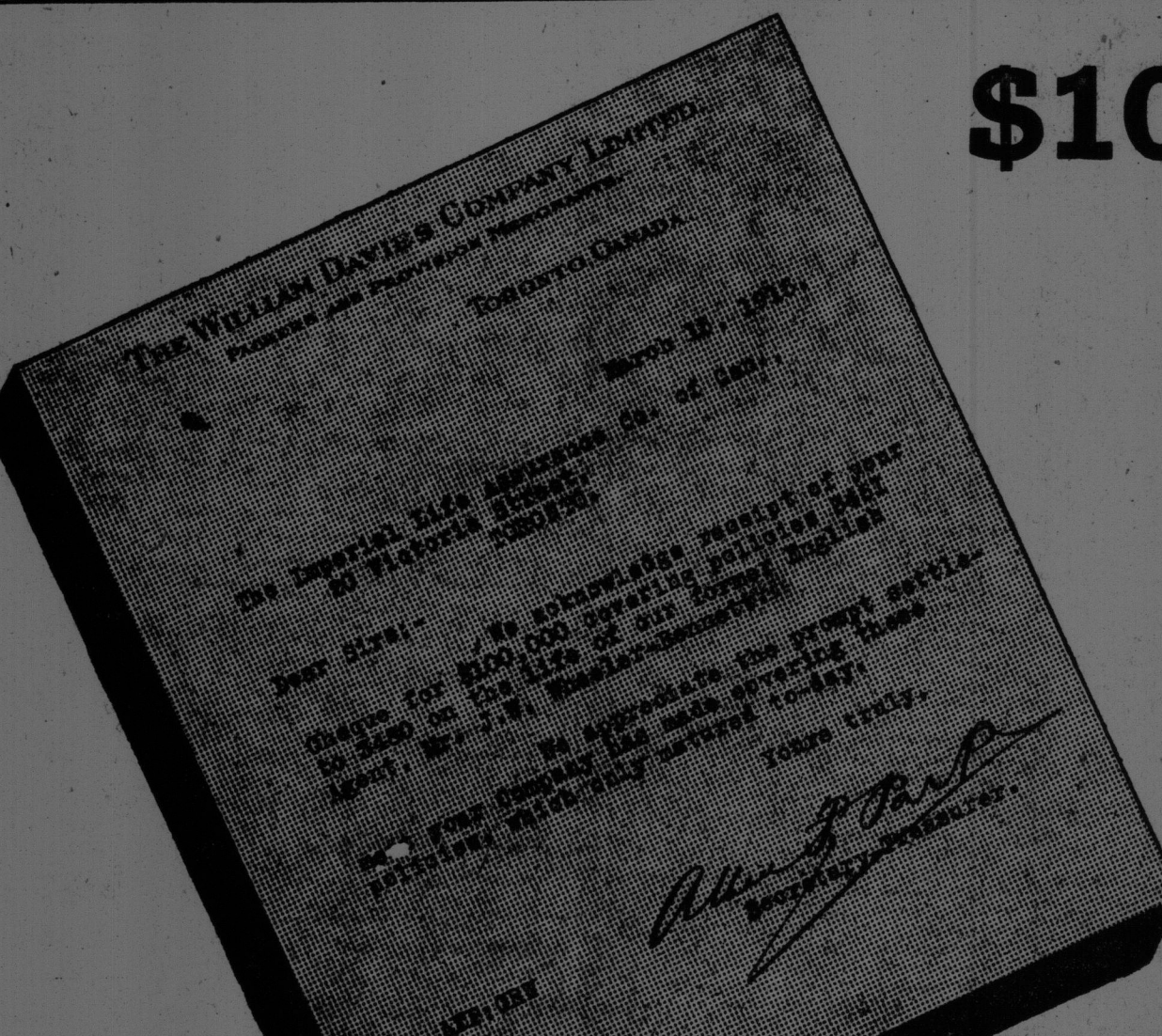

In The British Lines

Keeping The Men Fit For The Great Advance Movement Against The Hordes of Huns

(London Times Weekly.)
With the British in the trenches I described in my previous article are no stronger than any other portion of the great ditch which stretches with but a very occasional break right across southern Belgium and eastern France. A trench map such as those prepared by the army map makers in the field gives one some idea of the extraordinary complexity and strength of these defences upon both sides. Communication trenches, saps, dug-outs, fighting trenches, snipers' pits, sunk wire entanglements, machine gun emplacements, earth or sand-bag breast works cover the map as closely as the veins upon a leaf. An enormous amount of labor has been expended in the endeavor to improve trenches from the comfort point of view. To the casual visitor the result does not seem to be commensurate with the effort. To the men who stood night after night in freezing mud up to their thighs the change effected is enormous. Some of them established the

body of the river des Leys, which overflowed its banks to a distance of eighty or ninety yards, were absolutely uninhabitable, and during the night they had to be evacuated, and the men lay down upon the mud of the road in the rear until any activity of the enemy forced them back to the water-logged trenches. I saw some of this old trench line where the men were at work repairing with pick and shovel the ravage of the rain. The splinter-protecting narrowness of the cut, in some places almost too narrow for passage, had given way to a dangerous open width; instead of the clean cut clay wall faced with hurdles or wire netting there was just a confused mound of tumbled mud. The trench looked almost as though it had been blown to pieces by a land mine. Night after night the men are at work building up what the elements have un-built during the day, consolidating, improving and extending the hold they have upon France. They do not pretend to like it, but they nevertheless have a cheery philosophy that has carried them through what they are undergoing at present, and will support them and give them stout hearts when the word comes down that they are to go for a decision. This philosophy I heard expressed in an undertone in a trench east of Arras, where, when one dim khaki figure, gazing over the parapet, said to his neighbor who was feeling after his third day "it's a trifle despondent," "It will be all right; I've always 'erd as 'ow it's the first seven years of war is the worst!"

The physical strength of the trench life found its crude moral expression in that remark. Our line by now has grown from the thin line of mud thrown up feverishly with trenching tools by men in the heat of a general engagement to a vast system of permanent fortifications. That line, if necessary, and the men who fill it, will last through the seven lean years of war until the time comes when infantry will be marching and shooting at ranges over eighty yards, when cavalry will have come back to its own and will be jingling along the high road, having at least a "dash at the enemy," when artillery teams will stream along the causeway galloping to new positions, when the maps of the British Army will move forward from Section Y to Section Z, when generals will again become strategists and war once more war.

Everyday Activity
This picture of permanence must not be taken to mean that our troops stand quietly behind their defence works keeping their house as clean and as strong as they can, watching the German flares over the landscape at night and listening to the choruses of artillery, machine-guns, musketry and bomb from straw-lined stails in dug-outs, waiting to be attacked. They have a cold and almost callous activity. Night firing is encouraged; it serves the double purpose of keeping our sentries awake and of disturbing the slumbers of the enemy. The patrols go out every night in the "No Man's Land" between the two trench lines, and they never know when they may not come across one of the trench listening patrols of the enemy, and have a smart piece of bayonet work to do. Every now and again, in order to worry the Germans, and in order to keep the men from becoming too trench-tired, they have more definite "shows," as the army calls those local attacks which keep the casualty list going from day to day.

A great many of these unimportant fights exceed, in the amount of effort they require and the amount of injury they inflict, engagements which, during the South African War, were trumpeted across the world as great and sanguinary battles. I was up at Ypres last week and the ruins of the town were shaking with the vibration of the constant artillery fire to the southeast. The short, quick inclusive bark of the French "75" mingled with the duller booming of our own artillery. We were attacking with all the old and all the new methods of warfare, which are constantly practiced in this war; occasionally the wind brought a noisy gust of rapid machine-gun firing, but after a while settling away in the distance. Up there to the southeast men were putting into practice the education in the old and almost forgotten traditions of the army which have been revived and relearned during the last few months. The grenadiers and the bombardiers have again acquired an actual instead of a purely historical significance, for while the army is constantly active along the trench line, it is by no means idle when it gets to battle. They are, of course, given a thoroughly adequate rest when they have been through a strenuous time. The methods of relief and the time-tables of duty in the trenches vary from brigade to brigade, according to the view of the

trench. There is a noise as though a gigantic Chinese cracker were jumping zig-zag along the zig-zag trench, and clouds of greenish smoke rise up, through which hurstle humps of earth and stone and fragments of the outer iron ring upon the bomb, which constitute its shrapnel.

Keeping a Won Trench.
Then when they get into the trench the picture is one of the men beyonding and firing of little crouching khaki figures scurrying along from traverse to traverse, halting a moment while the bombardier from the cover of the jutting earthwork pitches bomb after bomb over it into the next section of the trench. It is thus a trench is gained,

and when it has been won the work of keeping it begins. Here again the bombardier comes into play, bomb after bomb, sent after sent, grenade upon grenade is hurled out to the back of the trench with much of the activity of a rapidly sinking aeronaught throwing out ballast. A rush is made to the communication trench, and while one party is busy tearing it to pieces and shutting it up with a clay and sandbag parapet the bombers behind are preventing the enemy from swarming along the tortuous channel to the reconquest of their trench.

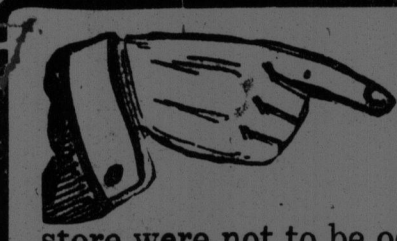

playing of golf with the left-hand method seems a distinct handicap. But there are players who have triumphed over much more real and more serious disabilities. One-armed players are not uncommon. Yves Beccaton, a Frenchman, who in recent days has been doing Red Cross work in his own country, played in the open championship last year in the United States and did very well considering that he has only one arm.

The most extraordinary instance of golfing skill under hopeless-looking disabilities is that of Thomas P. McAuliffe, who lost his arms through a road accident when he was a cadette. He grips the club firmly between his right shoulder and chest, and with the combined swing and jerk of the body and shoulder he produces a remarkably good stroke. He hits the ball 100 yards straight down the course with a driver, brassie, or mid-iron, and with his maulie he gets a distance of seventy-five yards. From anywhere within fifty yards of the hole he is astonishingly accurate with the maulie. He has done the round of the Buffalo County Club course in 108, and the course, which has a holey of 78, is said to be one of the best-bunkered in the states. At the present time he is taking in the Central High School of Buffalo the preparatory course for Cornell University. His skill in games is not confined to golf, for he plays pool and billiards well.

Major Towse is also notable among those who golf under great physical difficulties. The gallant officer had his eyes shot out in the South African war, yet he goes the round of the links with much skill. His only stipulations in a game are that he shall be allowed to touch the ball with his hands to ascertain its position, and that his caddie may ring a small bell to indicate the position of the hole.

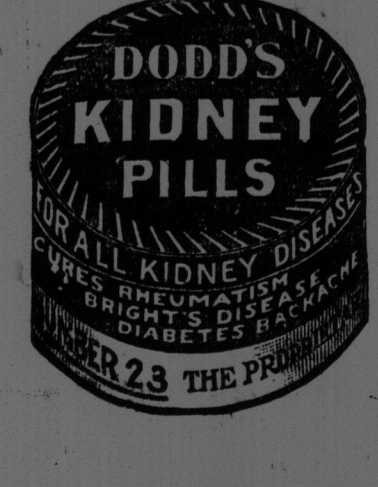

CITY WATER WORK

Culvert Under I. C. R. Tracks at Gilbert Lane Expected to Be Money Saver

The construction of a six foot culvert under the I. C. R. tracks at Gilbert Lane has been commenced by the water and sewerage department. It will contain the ten inch water main which supplies that district, the plans calling for the suspension of the pipe in the middle of the culvert. Manholes at each end will give access to it and this will enable the men to enter and make repairs to the pipe at any time they are needed. In the past there has been constant trouble with this main owing to the weight of trains passing over it and the vibrations and repairs were required frequently and under difficulties. The new arrangement is expected to do away with the need of much of this expenditure and will make the work easier if any is required.

Steam drills are being used now in the rock cutting in Canton avenue and the work is progressing steadily.

The water and sewerage extensions in Ardmore street have progressed so far that connections have been made from the new section to several houses and the occupants are now enjoying modern facilities for the first time. The work on the Spar Cove road section is getting along rapidly and pipes are now being laid in the thirteen foot rock cut at the head of the hill.

NO LIQUOR OVER THE BAR TO SOLDIERS

The doors of the liquor saloons are now closed against soldiers in uniform. No soldier is to be supplied with liquor on license premises whether he is off duty or not. The edict is the result of a visit made yesterday by J. B. Jones, liquor license inspector, and his leaving in each place an interdiction sheet instructing the proprietors that they were not to sell liquor to any soldier in uniform. The inspector said today that the order was met with willingness on the part of the liquor sellers.

While some of the barrooms have been keeping open shop for soldiers, others have not sold to men in uniform at all. The instructions issued yesterday were taken to include the officers as "soldiers."

CATHOLIC FEDERATION

STEAMER NOW IN PORT WAS NEARLY SUNK BY MINE

The Galier Hit and Abandoned But Did Not go Down—Crew Returned and Worked Her to England

The steamer Galier, Captain Goodwin, arrived in port this morning from St. Nazaire, France, and docked at No. 15 berth, Sand Point. Last December, when the steamer was in the service of the British Admiralty as a transport ship sailing between England and France, she struck a mine in the English Channel and was abandoned. She was sailing along at moderate speed, when suddenly a muffled sound of an explosion was heard and almost immediately the ship began to lurch over. The life-boats were lowered and the crew made hasty preparations for departure. By the time they had gathered together a few articles of apparel and some food the ship had settled in the water, and it was thought that she would soon founder. They managed the boats and pulled away for several hundred yards, and then lay to to watch the sinking of the ship.

Although the steamer settled low in the water, she did not sink, and the captain decided to return to the ship and make an inspection. This was done and they discovered that the ship had struck about mid-ship and more than 1,500 tons of coal had fallen through the aperture into the water. As only one large bunker was flooded, the officers set the men at work at the pumps, and the steamer slowly sailed for an English port, and was repaired.

The steamer is engaged to Wm. Thomson & Co., and is to load hay and oats at this port.

POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning, Mrs. M. Joyce was remanded on a charge of creating a disturbance in her home in Erin street and doing damage to the house, which is the property of William Sharkey.

One man arrested on a drunkenness charge was also remanded. Policeman Elliott said that the man was bumping against people in Charlotte street. The magistrate warned him that he was liable to nine months in jail.


