GOVERNMENT PLAN FOR UNEMPLOYED

Matter Taken Up Today at City Hall

Communication Received by City—Mayor to Go Into It Again With Government—Proposed Draft of Harbor Commission Bill—Newman Brook.

The government plan of aid for the unemployed was presented to a committee meeting of the common council this morning by Mayor Schofield, who read a letter from the minister of labor in answer to a letter which the mayor sent a few days ago.

The circular was enclosed, had been sent to all towns and cities of more than 10,000 population. The mayor expressed surprise that it had not been received here before.

The circular was dated December 24 and stated that the federal government was willing to co-operate with the municipalities in looking after the unemployed, by paying one-third of the amount paid out in unemployment relief. The burden of investigation lay with the municipality, and relief was to be paid on presentation of a certificate issued through the federal employment bureau.

The federal government is prepared to stand one-third of the cost of the plan, the balance to be paid either by the municipality or shared by the municipality and the provincial government.

The mayor said that he had recently written the department asking if the employment bureau at city hall would meet the requirements. Otherwise the establishment of a federal bureau would be necessary.

The mayor suggested that in order to provide work, the rock between Goodrich street and Mount Pleasant might be cut away and used for building.

Commissioner Bullock suggested the removal of rock at the head of Rodney street for the purpose of filling in part of the old mill pond.

The mayor was of the opinion that this was due to the relief being given by the D. S. C. R.

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Why St. John Ought To Continue Evening Vocational Classes

A Table of School Attendance Which Tells the Story—An Illuminating Article on the Whole Subject by Director Fletcher Peacock.

(By Fletcher Peacock.)

1.—The scope and intention of Vocational education is (a) to extend our educational system so that the large numbers of adolescents now leaving school at 14 will get a thorough training in the essentials of a general education as a basis for citizenship and vocational efficiency; and special skill and knowledge in the vocation they select.

2.—The need for Vocational Education in New Brunswick is apparent when one examines school attendance records on the one hand, and the undeveloped state of our industries (including agriculture) on the other.

There are 16,000 New Brunswick adolescents now out of school. These need to be trained for efficient citizenship and production. Book education will not suffice.

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LLOYD GEORGE SPENDS MORE THAN HE EARNS

Asquith Thinks Premier's Salary Should be Advanced—Comparison With Other Salaries.

(Associated Press Correspondence.) London, Jan. 22.—The premier of Great Britain has a hard time of it trying to pay his bills on a salary of £24,000 a year and his pay ought to be raised, says the former prime minister, Herbert H. Asquith, who ought to know, for he occupied that position for eleven years.

As far as known, David Lloyd George has not asked for a raise in pay, but his remuneration has been the subject of an inquiry conducted by a committee of parliament, which is examining into the salaries of all the British cabinet ministers.

Mr. Asquith told the committee that the office of the premier of Great Britain is a very expensive one and his duties cannot be properly discharged on an expenditure limited to that amount. The former prime minister added that he himself was a much poorer man when he left office than when he entered it.

Mr. Asquith explained that the premier had to do a great deal of entertaining and afford hospitality to all sorts of conditions of people both at home and abroad, but under the existing arrangements he had to defray this expense entirely at his own cost.

Even if a government hospitality fund should be provided for entertaining distinguished foreigners, Mr. Asquith was of the opinion that the premier's salary ought to be advanced.

Mr. Asquith had few kind words to say about the privilege which the premier has of occupying the official residence at 10 Downing Street.

"It is quite true," he said, "that you live in the house free from rent, rates and taxes, but it is a very expensive house to keep up. It is a very inconvenient house in many ways; it requires a large staff, and I suspect myself that any prime minister who had experience of it as I had would, if he were offered the choice, rather not live in it at all."

The salary of the prime minister of Great Britain at present rate of Canada is equivalent to £22,000. This compares with a salary of \$50,000 for the governor-general of Canada, and \$100,000 for the prime minister of Canada.

The president of France receives 600,000 francs a year and a similar amount for expenses, and the president of Germany receives 100,000 marks salary and 600,000 marks expenses.

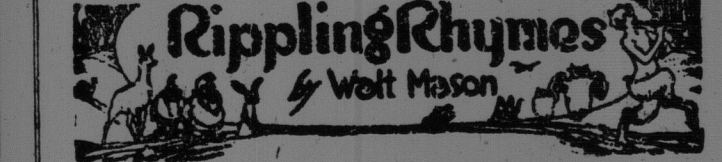

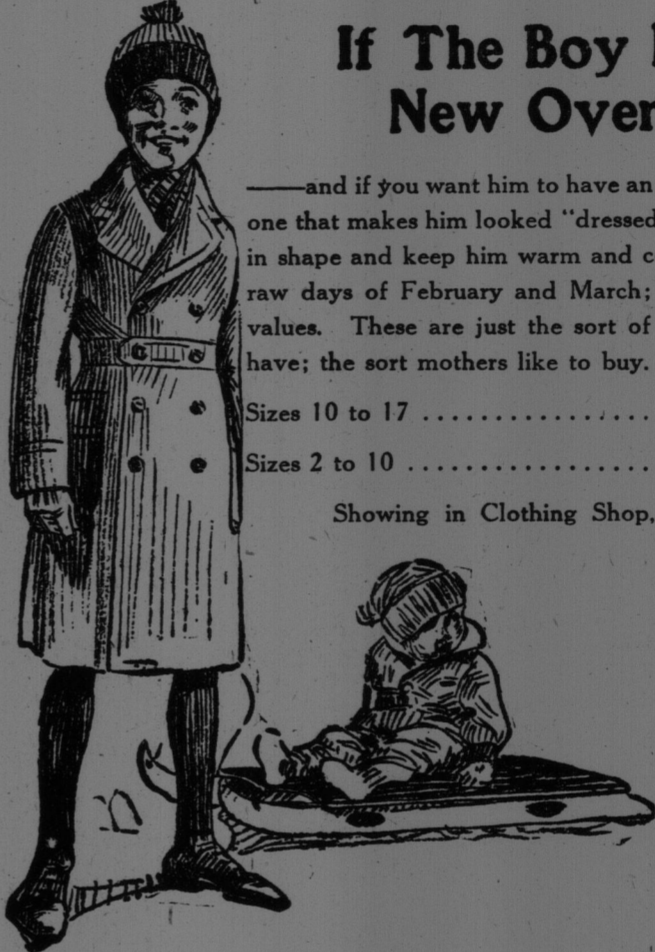

**YESTERDAY IN THE CHURCHES**

Rev. J. H. Ritson, D. D., general secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society of London, England, was the speaker at the morning service in Centenary Methodist church yesterday. In a strong address he dealt with conditions as he had found them in Europe during his recent trip and spoke of the crying need which existed there. Turning to the work of the Bible Society, he said that the Bible at present was printed in 225 languages, nine of which were added last year. He said it was to the glory of the English-speaking race that all through the war the British government had permitted the Bible Society to send \$225 a month to maintain the supply of Bibles for the enemy as well as seeking the destruction of the British race.

The fifth anniversary of the merger of the Brussels street and Leinster street Baptist congregations was celebrated yesterday in the Central church. In the morning Rev. D. J. MacPherson of Sussex took as his text "The Love That Saved the World," and delivered a scholarly address.

Exmouth street Methodist church yesterday celebrated its sixty-fourth anniversary and re-entered an altered and re-decorated auditorium. Rev. W. C. Lane of Yarmouth, a former pastor, was the speaker at both services. At the evening service Dr. P. L. Bonnell sang the solo, "The Lord is My Light."

**Memorial Window.**

A memorial window and tablet in honor of the fifteen young men of St. James' church who gave their lives in the recent war were dedicated at the morning service yesterday. The service was conducted by the rector, Rev. H. A. Cody, and the window was unveiled by Captain Robert Murray and John C. Kee, both of whom lost sons in the war. The window was erected by relatives and the work of art is the product of the N. T. Lyon Glass Company of Toronto, installed in the church by two of the vestrymen, W. J. Nagie and Robert J. Dibble.

For perfect attendance at the morning services in St. David's church during the year, the pastor, Rev. J. A. MacKeigan, presented Bibles to seven children, who also received certificates from the superintendent of the Sunday school, for eighty per cent. perfect attendance at church. Other scholars received certificates and prizes for attendance at Sunday school.

The evening service at the Germain street Baptist church last night was largely choral and an exceptionally fine programme of classical and favorite numbers was given. T. C. Cochran was at the organ and directed the choir. He played as an opening voluntary, St. Quentin's "Ride on in Majesty," during the taking of the offertory, the intermezzo from "Cavalleria Rusticana" and as a postlude, Mahelberg's "March Magnific." The anthems sung were Hopkins' "Lift up Your Heads," Bowles' "One Sincerely Solemn Thought," which was sung unaccompanied, and Stainer's "Hallelujah." Palmer's "Wayside Cross" was sung as a quartet by J. S. Smith, T. C. Cochran, E. A. Titus and E. C. Field. Stainer's "Love Divine" was sung as a duet by Mrs. Blake Ferris and J. S. Smith and Mr. Smith sang as a solo Hamblen's "The Still Small Voice."

Rev. W. D. Wilson, of Fredericton, general secretary of the New Brunswick branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance, was in the city yesterday and preached in two churches here, the Germain street Baptist in the morning and the Charlotte street Baptist in the evening.

Rev. C. E. Pineo of Tanook (N. S.), was the preacher in the Fairville Baptist church at both services yesterday and special music was a feature of the evening service. Mrs. F. Louise Tufts was the soloist. Rev. Mr. Clark is expected to take over his duties as pastor in a fortnight's time.

**MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES**

Yesterday's edition of the London Sunday Telegram, owned by Horatio Balfour, asserted that the existence of a third party in Ireland had been discovered. This third party is claimed to consist of those who are in favour of the Government's own views on any persons who commit alleged crimes and escape punishment.

The Lenten pastoral letter of Cardinal Logue, primate of all Ireland, delivered yesterday, dealt at length with the Irish situation. Among other things he protested vigorously against reprisals and the raiding of churches and convents, and continued: "It must not be inferred that I overlook or condone extremist crimes. The lying in wait and shooting of police and soldiers is not an act of warfare, but plain murder. No reason adduced nor any end, however noble, could justify it."

Arthur Jacques, 25 years old, of Montreal, was arrested and held as a material witness on Saturday in connection with the murder on Friday night of Miss Adeline Malherbe, aged 27. He was identified by several persons who were in the vicinity of the place where the killing took place, but denied all allegations and claimed he could prove an alibi.

The Newfoundland department of justice is investigating a case at Avondale in which a man named Nolan is reported to have caused the death of his nine-year-old daughter by cruelty. The little girl died on the road to the graveyard to visit the grave of her mother.

Why St. John Ought To Continue The Evening Vocational Classes

NOTE—High School students from Fairville and other points throughout the county attend St. John High. The above table therefore shows a larger high school enrollment than the St. John grades really produce.

As pointed out above, the national government and the provincial government have taken practical steps to aid workers who do not have training which vocational training.

As to money value, data collected by the Washington Government shows that a boy who attends school from 14 to 18, taking courses suited to his ability and aims, has, as an advantage of \$600 in yearly income as compared with the boy who left school and went to work at 14.

Perhaps the greatest value of vocational education is its citizenship value. It gives the student a sufficient knowledge of English, public speaking, history, economics, etc., to take a leading position as a citizen of our democracy.

The cost of vocational education will be about double that of our classical high school courses because of the equipment, etc., required for the practical work.

But whatever be the money cost it is small compared with the values produced that no state or community can afford to deny vocational training opportunities to its citizens.

The war has given vocational education a great impetus. It demonstrated the need for greater efficiency in the rank and file of our citizenship.

In 1917 the United States passed a Federal Vocational Act, which has brought about the organization of vocational education service in every state in the Union.

In 1919 Canada passed the Technical Education Act giving aid to the Provinces in this branch of education avowedly as a reconstruction measure.

Under the New Brunswick act this vocational committee is composed of four members of the school board and three representative persons as above.

The budget of this committee must always be approved by the school board before a cent is spent. In this respect we are following the best of examples.

In the development of the work also following the same paths traversed by others. Everywhere the evening school has proved itself a vocational school and prepared the way for the latter. This is because the evening

PREPARES FOR  
ARCTIC DASH

MacMillan's Ship Under Construction in Maine—Baffin Land is the Objective.

East Boothbay, Me., Feb. 7.—Work is almost completed on the hull of the Bowdoin, in which Dr. Donald B. MacMillan, explorer, will make his next dash into the Arctic regions. The launching of the schooner will take place in the early spring, and the vessel will be in shape to depart from this port by May 1.

Dr. MacMillan is perfecting plans for an expedition to begin next summer, which will include an attempt to circumnavigate Baffin Land and penetrate its western coast, 1,000 miles in length, said to be the longest stretch of unknown coastline in the world. He is a frequent visitor here and keeps careful watch over the construction of his ship. The Bowdoin, which is being built on the sturdy lines needed in an expedition vessel to withstand the ice-grind, is 70 feet in length, over all, 20 feet wide and equipped with 45 horsepower oil-burning engines. Three-inch oak-plank material is being used for the hull.

Before his departure for the far north, Dr. MacMillan will make an exhibition cruise along the coast during May and June. About July 1, with a party of six men, the explorer will sail from Boston for the polar regions. Under favorable weather conditions the Bowdoin should reach Fury and Hecla Strait early in September. There the ship will be frozen in. Leaving their ship under a lone guard, the party will push forward on a 900-mile trip on sleds drawn by dogs. Five Eskimo dog-drivers will accompany the MacMillan outfit across the rugged, ice-bound country which abounds in perils. Establishing a camp 700 miles south of Etah, in the northwestern part of Greenland is one of the main objectives. Within the last twelve years, Dr. MacMillan has made six trips into the land

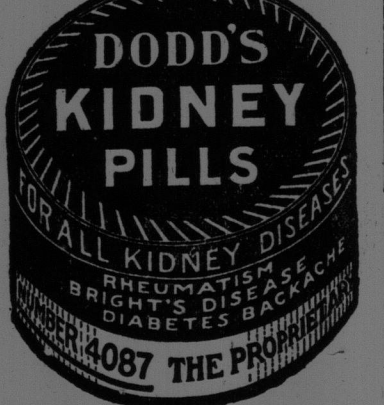

On his visits here, Dr. MacMillan chats freely about his plans, and several hardy mariners have begged to be allowed to accompany him. The townspeople are preparing to present a flag to fly from the forepeak of the Bowdoin.

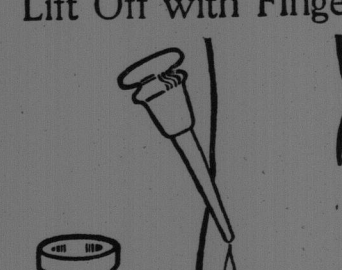

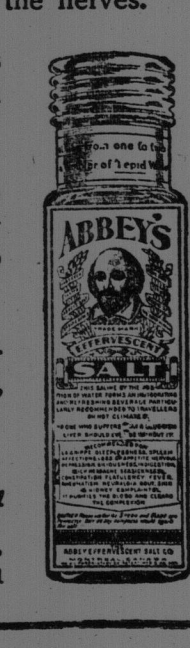

**REV. G. W. TITUS DECLINES CALL**  
 Former St. John Clergyman to Remain With South Bend Church.  
 A South Bend, Indiana, paper prints the following article in its issue of Feb. 6 in khaki of Rev. Geo. W. Titus, formerly of St. John, where he visited his old home at Christmas—  
 "G. W. Titus, pastor of the First Christian church, has informed the official board of that body that he has declined the call extended to him by the First Christian church of Kendallville, this state, which has been wanting him for the last three months. A unanimous call was sent him a few weeks ago carrying with it a substantial increase in salary and they romie of one of the largest fields in the northern part of the state from a church standpoint.  
 "In making his statement to the board on Sunday, Mr. Titus thanked the members for their loyalty and co-operation, and suggested that with the execution of his duties as pastor of the local church, having taken up the work in the early part of January, 1917, coming here from Indianapolis. Under his pastorate the church has grown steadily until it has now the second largest congregation in the city, and is one of the strongest Christian churches in this section. His membership is almost 600 while the Sunday congregations are invariably large, the evening services usually so. Wonderful growth has also been noticed in missionary work undertaken by the church, the congregation now supporting a missionary in the Congo district South Africa.  
 "The church building, recently damaged by fire, will be finished in three weeks and it is said the auditorium will be one of the most attractive in the city. Plans are now under way to make the opening an impressive one and of spiritual uplift to the congregation."

**JOHN W. McADAM OF DEVON IS DEAD**

 Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 7.—John W. McAdam, aged 32, died early this morning at his home in Devon after a week's illness with pneumonia and complications. His surviving relatives are one brother, Barry, and one sister, Miss Georgia McAdam, both of Devon. He was a son of the late Harry McAdam, of Douglas, and lived in that place the greater part of his life, retiring from farming a few years ago when he removed to Devon.

**GENERAL SIR HENRY BURSTALL IN CITY TODAY**  
 St. John an Excellent Military Centre, Says Inspector-General.  
 Lieut.-General Sir Henry Burstall, K. C. B., K. C. M. G., A. D. C. to the King, Inspector general of the Canadian forces, arrived in the city this morning from Halifax and was at local military headquarters. He was accompanied by Major W. Neilson, D. S. O., of the R. C. R. The annual inspection of the militia forces in this district will be made this week and this evening the inspection of the St. John Fusiliers and the headquarters and No. 1 machine gun brigade will take place at the armory.  
 General Burstall has many friends in the city and throughout the province, and during his stay here will renew acquaintances made during the war among the St. John Fusiliers, which unit was in the brigade he commanded in France, and the record and memory of which is preserved in the Fusiliers, under re-organization.  
 In addition to the general inspection General Burstall is here to assist in the solution of military problems and also to receive suggestions from this district which may be of value to the militia generally.  
 In conversation with a Times reporter this morning the general said that St. John was a splendid military centre in view of the fact that there was an excellent harbor here, the worth of which was proved during the war, when so many troops and so much war material were transported to the field of battle from this port. The general continued by saying that the militia was not only of importance in case of war, but in time of peace was of civic importance, not only to the city but to the entire province, for in it men were trained morally and physically.  
 General Burstall will be entertained at dinner at the Union Club this evening by the members of the district staff and commanding officers of the various units in the city and vicinity. In company with Brigadier General A. H. Macdonald, C. M. G., D. S. O., an officer commanding this district the general will inspect the units located at Fredericton tomorrow.
