WAR VESSEL LAUNCHED

Barrow-in-Furness, Eng., April 29—(Canadian Press)—The Princess Royal, the largest cruiser battleship ever built for the British navy, was launched today and christened by Princess Louise, after whom the vessel was named.

The cruiser has a displacement of 28,360 tons and turbine engines affording 70,300 horse power. Her contract calls for a speed of 28 knots. She will carry eight 13,5 inch guns besides smaller weapons.
