the United States on favorable terms, but which is unalterably opposed to political union with that country, or to the dismemberment of the empire.

ANTI-RECIPROCITY

A Halifax correspondent of the Montreal Herald says there is a persistent rumor that the Anti-Reciprocity League, or the Manufacturers' Association and their allied interests, will send a large sum of money into Nova Scotia to help the Conservatives in the provincial elections, making the fight as far as possible on the reciprocity question.

The writer says it is reported that the province has been divided into districts, for which certain active anti-reciprocity advocates, including some Conservative members at Ottawa, will be held responsible.

The Herald very properly points out that as this is a provincial election Nova Scotia people should be left to themselves, and it adds that any attempt on the part of politicians of any province to interfere should receive prompt punishment.

It would be an extraordinary thing if Nova Scotia in a provincial election campaign should be flooded with men and money representing Montreal, Toronto, and the English Tariff Reform League.

The people of Nova Scotia will know how to deal with any such meddling in their provincial affairs.

A PRISON FARM

The present inquiry in connection with what is called the chain-gang has the effect of directing public attention to the question of providing a prison farm.

The Hon. Mr. Hanna told the Canadian Club recently of the splendid results following the establishment of a well-conducted prison farm in the province of Ontario.

The city of Toronto itself proposes to establish such a farm, and may enlarge it to include petty criminals as well as inebriates and worthless members of the community.

It would not be difficult in the city of St. John to provide a fairly large colony for such an institution. Those sent there would have comfortable quarters, with plenty of fresh air and healthy food, and such healthy exercise as would improve their physical condition.

There would be an improvement in both health and morals, and in very many cases persons regarded as almost hopeless inebriates would be restored to sober manhood.

Among the reforms which have been needed in this city at the present time is the establishment of a prison farm, whether by the city or by the province as a whole.

A SUGGESTION

The state of Massachusetts has adopted a plan for disposing of abandoned farms which appears to have produced excellent results.

The state department of agriculture last year issued an illustrated bulletin giving full information about farms for sale.

Some 3,500 copies were circulated, and as a result properties were disposed of to an aggregate value of nearly \$600,000.

One hundred and fifty farms were sold, at an average price of \$4,000. Enquiries are still being received from the south and west, indicating a return movement to the eastward.

The department will issue a second edition of the bulletin this year, and give it a wider circulation, and it is said that other eastern states are considering the adoption of the Massachusetts plan.

Many of Jeffries' admirers, however, believe the negro beat the former boiler maker at a time when Jeffries was the victim of a mental collapse, and nothing will change their views on the question but a second meeting of the men. The matter of supremacy will remain an open question, many for a return match is out of the question.

Unhappily Jeffries arrived in Chicago several days ago on his way to New York, from which port he is scheduled to sail for Europe on May 4 on the George Washington. A local ring promoter who was in Chicago when Jeffries arrived from Los Angeles with his wife had an audience with the former champion. Jeffries made known his plans for the future.

Jeff made it clear that he will never again enter the ring. He is through with the game for good. When it was learned that Jeffries contemplated a trip abroad some knowing fans thought Jeff was going abroad simply to get into trim for another fight. Such a notion is not the case.

His trip abroad will be only to satisfy his wife's desire to visit her native country once more. The vaudeville stage will also hold no attraction for him. The big Californian says he wants to get out of the limelight and live the rest of his life in peace and happiness. He does not want fighting or theatrical engagements to interfere with his pleasure.

Baseball is full of queer contradictions. A player who does not sink to the water wagon is a phlegmatic fellow, but a game which looks on the face of it as a water wagon is a gem.

Fire and water, the destroying elements, as the old philosophers taught, have had fuller sway this spring than clear skies and crisp baseball weather, writes John B. Foster, in the N. Y. Evening Telegram. Yet little by little the major leagues are swinging into a stride which promises to be fast and powerful before the season is completed.

For once the city of Philadelphia has been the scene of a surprise. The "Phillies," of the National League, have started a season which was hardly anticipated. The Athletics have failed to start, which was also unanticipated.

It is a question whether the club will continue to be so successful and the other so lacking in success. Good pitching and good batting have had their share in aiding one team, while indifferent pitching and poor fielding have tended to hold the other back. That the present leaders in the National League race will maintain their present speed through the middle of May is to be doubted, and that the Athletics will continue to lose games through their own lack of team work is not to be expected.

Enough variety has been in evidence in the games of both leagues to date to warrant the belief that the contests for the championships are not to be without their upsets and their heartburnings. It is better for baseball that the struggle be a close one than that the Athletics should be a long way ahead of the rest of the league.

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



INDUSTRIES FOR NEW CITY, TERMINAL OF CANADIAN NORTHERN

Port Mann To Be Given a Start in Life Better Than Prince Rupert Had. Vancouver, B. C., April 23—According to reports the new city of Port Mann, the western mainland terminal of the Canadian Northern railway, the site of which is now being cleared, will start on a much more auspicious footing than did the Grand Trunk Pacific terminal city, Prince Rupert.
