AN EVENTFUL YEAR.

The year 1889 promises to be one of the most eventful in the history of St. John. It is a year in which the people of this city have been able to feel that they have a hopeful future, and that whatever difficulties they may have had to contend against in the past have been likely to be forgotten in the prosperity of the years to come. For the first time since the fire the far reaching effects of that stupendous calamity seem to have lost their force, and a period of growth has come which is likely to continue for many years. First in the list of events for which the year will be memorable is the union of the two cities, a measure well calculated to stimulate our energies and to increase our prestige abroad. No one can doubt that it will vastly increase the influence of St. John with the government of Canada, and tend to improve our position throughout the name of St. John is known. The completion of the Short Line to Montreal is another great event which will distinguish the year on the importance of which it is not necessary to enlarge. It gives us what we have waited twenty years for, rapid communication with the west, and its results, when they come to be measured, will be found to be revolutionary in their character. The exhibition which will be held here this year will also be a matter of great importance, for with the transit facilities we now possess, we may reasonably expect a much larger attendance and a much greater number of exhibits than at any former provincial show.

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A SPORTSMAN'S TROPHIES.

Mr. Von Wetters' collection of deer horns, Canada, etc.

Mr. Von Wetters, Sr., who resides at No. 413 West Sunnyside street in one of the best posted sportsmen in Baltimore. He was originally a hunter in Germany. The rifle he chose gun, and while he is fond of small game shooting, large game has been his favorite sport. That he is a master hand at rifle shooting is a case of twenty gold medals.

Like all ardent sportsmen Mr. Von Wetters has preserved many trophies of his chase, his collection of deer and other horns being one of the finest. It is not the finest, in this country. The horns number over 300 pairs, and are valued at \$10,000. They were all carefully mounted by Mr. Von Wetters, and he has kept them for his own use. On reaching the fourth floor of the Victoria Hotel, the visitor finds himself confronted by a passage of the walls of which are studded with mounted trophies, under which are cages filled with song birds.
