#### SEMINARY DIOCESAN FOR YOUNG

----- Fast OUR SYNODS.—Intelligent and practical churchmen in all parts of the world have come to the same general conclusions respecting the necessity for Synodical action, as the best substitute for the old forms of an Established Church, which are not now considered practicable out of England. Whether we look to North America, Australia or New Zealand, the same general feeling prevails, and the same necessity is felt, wholly irrespective of party considerations. The exceptions appear to belong to such countries as India, where the church is in a very peculiar and anomalous condition and to the small scattered communities of Europeans in the East, which present insuperable obstacles to combined action. But wherever the church is free numerous and intelligent, this appears to be the form of self-government universally chosen. It combines the following advantages: First, it is not wholly dissimular to the primitive assemblies which are recorded in the new Testament, and to the subsequent Councils to which we owe the formation of our creeds. Practically, no doubt, a modern synod differs in some important respects from an ancient Council. In the original assembly at Jerusalem the lay element was certainly admitted, but with what powers and under what limitations the sacred writer does not inform us, for the whole condition of the Church was unlike anything before or after it, but that the consent of the laity was given to the apostolis decree, is beyond doubt. In subsequent Councils the hierarchical and priestly element predominated, and the laity, though present by their representatives, occupied an unim. portant part. Modern Synods recognize in its fullest extent the "royal priesthood" of the whole body

of believers, and are in this respect, more in agreement with apostolical rule; but there is much reason to apprehend, that as in ancient times, the undue preponderance of the sacerdotal element led to many and deep-rooted evils, so it will require all our wisdom to steer clear of those dangers into which an undue preponderance of laymen, many of them ignorant of theological controversies, and very moderately versed in Church History and biblical learning may lead us.

A Synod is supposed to be, by its very name, a body of Christian believers, travelling on the same road, and governed by the same general principles of action. It is not a political body, consisting of citizens owning no special form of faith, drawn together by the exigencies of the time, and liable to be parted asunder by sudden political storms. Our position as clergymen and communicants in the Church of England supposes a wider and firmer basis, and should lead us to more reverent handling of subjects which concern the welfare of the Church of God, a more careful acquaintance with its history and its laws, and a more tolerant and charitable conduct towards each other. \* If, in legislative assemblies, the laws of the past govern the present till they are repealed, and the wise foundations laid by our ancestors and considered to be the pillars of our legislation, so in a Syned, we neither meet to found a Church nor to settle the Canon of Holy Scripture, nor to frame an Ecclesiastical Constitution, nor to separate ourselves from the Catholic believers before us, nor to begin to form a Liturgy. On the one foundation, Jesus Christ and on the Church of His foundation, we are to lay our superstructure. But woe be to us if what we lay be that "wood, hay, and stubble," which those who build with loose materials, in ignorance of their art, will be sure to

Whilst therefore a Synod will do well and wisely not to reject those changes which the general progress of mankind, and the Providential course of the world, have rendered necessary—changes in the form not in the essence of truth—it must, if its work is intended to last, retain a strong conservative element in its constitution, requiring that essential changes should never be made without careful deliberation and the concurrence of all orders concerned in the change; and that when made, they should not be made in the interests of a party, nor for the purpose of crushing an adversary; nor should they place us in an antagonistic position to the decisions of the Catholic Church in all ages. In proportion to the largeness of the powers entrusted to us, should be our reverent care to use them with moderation. And we may expect that these powers will increase rather than diminish. Hithert we have been either guided by the laws of England, or by the tadditions which hang round an old established church.

These ties are fast lessening every year. Changes are made in the Prayer Book, and more may be made; but no official notice is ever given to us. We receive no advice, and our connection with England is severed, apparently without regret. At my death, no successor will be appointed by the Crown, and no oath of obedience will be taken to the Archbishop. It is not too much to assume, that, as time goes on, English Courts of Law will be heard of rather than felt amongst us, and that we shall be driven (of necessity) to adopt a speedier, more economical, and more church-like solution of difficulties. If it should come to pass that we thus become an independent branch of the Church, in full communion with the Church of England, as we did not seek such a position, we must accept it when it comes, as part of the Providential ordering of Him who knows what is best for us. We have within us all the elements of a New Testament Church; a faith built on Christ our corner-stone and in fundamentals derived from primitive christianity; a Bible which is in the main faithfully translated; a Liturgy agreeing in many respects with the ancient forms; Sacraments duly administered; an Episcopate, apolitolically descended; Presbyters and Deacons rightly ordained; and a body of faithful Laity. To this it must be our care to add a code of discipline, such as is insisted on in the New Testament, and is required by our condition; and if we are faithful to our trust, and to the faith, we have no cause for fear. The promises of Christ are stronger than the wealth of England, and as they were Divinely given before her greatness, they will outlast (which God forbid) her fall.

But we may well fear even the suspicion of unfaithfulness; we may well hesitate to cut the moorings which bind us to the great mysteries of Christianity; we may well distrust the leaders who would

long standing, to such sects as those of Darby and Cummins? I can give but one answer, ignorance of what the Church really teaches. Many a Churchman stumbles on some phrase in the Prayer Book which is quite new to him, absolution, confession, regeneration, and not having been taught the true Catholic interpretation of these words, confounds them with Romish or Puritanical views, and becomes lost to the Church. It cannot be too much insisted on, that popular theology is seldom or never identical with standard theology. It was the great object of our blessed Lord to teach, that the popular beliefs of his day were not in harmony with the Law and the Prophets. Even in the Primitive Church we find the same phenomenon, as we may gather from Dean Stanley's Lecture on the Catacombs. Speaking of the evidences they furnish, the Dean says, "they differed widely from the representations of contemporaneous authors, and gave a striking example of the divergence that existed between the actual living popular belief, and that which was to be found in books." It has ever been so; the popular living belief of an average Romanist can scarcely be made consistent with the decrees of the Council of Treat. The common run of Presbyterians and Methodists neither know nor regard a great deal to be found in the Westminister Confession and Wesley's Sermons. It is no wonder then, if we find that an average

Churchman's theology does not harmonize with the Book of Common Prayer. I may go further and say, that the average Protestant's faith has neither been derived from, nor moulded by, the New Testament. Although this is an age of extraordinary activity in printing and circulating the Scriptures, yet I believe that the religious views of the masses are derived, so far as any system is concerned, not from an intelligent study of the New Testament, but from such sources as the Pligrim's Progress, Paradise Lost, Sectarian Tracts, and the "Times" newspaper; and this fatal error is fostered by the pupils. To be a popular preacher, you must go with popular theology, and keep standard theology in the background. Sermons closely reasoned out of Scripture and the Fathers, are not popular. Conthey listen to be excited, or amused, rather than to be instructed, for instruction requires a mental effort. Popularity seeking Preachers are, however, not the only ones who foster this disease; men of a clotter type forget that most of what they knew themselves, on account of their special training, is quite a novelty to their hearers. St. Paul told the Hebrews that they needed that some one would instruct them in the first principles of Christianity, and there are multitudes who resemble them in the

Testament nor the Prayer Book is applied to Baptized Christians. Or it may be that offence is given through the refusal of churchmen to be classed with the common crowd of manyhued Protestants. The taunting challenge is often given, "Let them tell us whether they are Protestants or Romanists," implying that the whole Christian world must be one or the other. But the Churchman refuses positively to accept either as his appropriate designation. He certainly is not a Romanist, but then Protestant does not distinguish him from any given heretic. He thinks and justly, that he might as fairly be challenged to say whether he was a fool or a philosopher, as whether he is a Protestant or a Romanist. He hopes that he is not a fool, he knows that he is not a philosopher, but he thinks that he is a man of common sense. He declines therefore to be placed on the horns of a dilemma which no one moderately versed in Church history would have proposed. But he has stronger reasons for his position than because the challenge is illogical. The name of Protestant is associated in the popular mind with the sixteenth century. It is not older than the Diet of Spires, A. D. 1559: consequently the vulgar error that the Church of England arose at or about that time, will be fostered, if we accept Protestant as sufficiently descriptive of the Church. And it is most providential that our Formalaries have avoided the world. It is not to be found in the Book of Common Prayer. In all the Acts of Parliament

from the date of Magna Charta till now, the Church has had but one title—the Church of England, or the Anglican Church. Once the word Protestant slipped into an Act of Parliament touching the Canadian Church, and the result of using such an ambiguous term was the loss of the Clergy Reserves. Do we not then protest against the errors of the Church of Rome? In reply, we refer the questioner, if he be-serious, to the 39 Articles and to Church History, and are quite willing that others should have the name of Protestant, while we have the thing. Protesting is about as idle a business as we can be engaged in. Therefore the Church, true to her own dignity, does not enter protests, but she reaffirms old truths, and saserts that some Romish errors are "biasphemous fables and dangerous deceits," and that others are "plainly repugnant to the Word of God." A faint echo to the soundness of our position in refusing a merely negative appellation, is found in the fact that the Protestant sects themselves do not adopt the name as their legal title. We do not hear of the Protestant Methodist Church, or the Protestant Presbyterian Church. It is true that our sister Church in the United States assumed as her legal title, the name of Protestant Episcopal, and therein made, in my opinion, a mistake; as the Protestantism of an Episcopal Church must be rather dubious, when we cannot assure ourse'ves of it without the name advertising it. attempted schism from that Church in Kentucky, no sconer left her for not being Protestant enough, than itself dropped the name in favor of Reformed Episcopal. Popular errors then, being greatly fostered by language which is constantly shifting in meaning, should be watched carefully, and in the instance I am considering, should be guarded against by inculcating on the minds of those committed to our care, that they are members of the Church of England, a name than which there is none more honorable, implying Communion with that Branch of God's Church which has a legal and historical descent from the Apostolic and Primitive Church. The drift of popular religion is always toward error, making both the Word of God and Church History void through its traditions. What then is the remedy for this evil? I know of none, but that of the Clergy making their semmes more didactic in this particular, and using Bible Classes and their Sunday Schools for the same purpose. Revision will never mend the evil, and even if it could, the Provincial Synod has made such an operation

as that now being attempted by the General Convention of the Irish Church, practically impossible. There would have been no demand for revision in the Irish Church, had the means I recommend to you, my Brethren, been judiciously employed; for the Prayer Book does not require to be revised, but to be explained and illustrated from the Word of God. I know that there is a class of Revisionists whose only aim is to eliminate from the Prayer Book the supernatural and mysterious, and so we find cries for Revision to be coincident with a decided growth of scepticism. Take away, say they, all allusions to holy mysteries in the Lord's Supper, because there is no mystery about it. To them the Sacraments and Confirmation and Ordination are mere forms, and nothing more. Revisionists who are mere Formalists can never be got rid of so long as Infidelity exists. But Revisionists whom pure ignorance has blinded,

may be largely reduced in number by the faithful ministrations of the Clergy in the Pulpit, the Sunday School, and the Bible Class.

In conclusion, let me express my belief that the times are bopeful for a Christian. There is immense activity for the sause of Christ and the Church, though there be mighty powers exerted against both. Philosophy falsely so called, is pre-disposing many to unbelief; but judging from the past, our belief is firm that there will be no variance found in the end, between Scripture and science. The novel dogmas propounded in our day by the Church of Rome, will drive many to total unbelief, but on the other hand there has arisen in consequence a gleam of light in Europe—the old Catholic movement—the first attempt at a Reformation of the Latin Church, on the basis of the Anglican Reformation, a Reformation from within, grounded on appeal to the Primitive Church and the undisputed General Councils. There is, too, in America, a groping after unity. Men are feeling after, if haply they may find it. Newspapers and itinerent Evangelists, Preachers and Conferences keep for ever insisting that there is no Sectarianism nor Denominationalism in the New Testamens but they do not tell us, why then there are Secta and Denominations. The reason is, that while the mental vision is clear enough, the moral vision is blinded. Pride, love of singularity, self-secking, are the feeby lusts that war against

Philology. As a man who knows but one language knows nothing of language as a science, so he who knows nothing but the Bible knows nothing of the Bible. This, of course, is not public opinion. Theology is a Science which is thought to come by nature. It used to be called the Queen of Sciences, but now-a-days people are born Theologians, and study and training are not necessary to qualify them for giving an infallible judgment. No wonder, therefore, that the free right of private judgment has come to mean the right to draw conclusions without premises, and so, private judgment, without knowledge, is but another name for free thinking. We must know a good deal more than the Bible if we would understand the Bible. I need scarcely say that the Bible does not give us its own history. In ancient times one of the names of the Bible was the "Biblothecs," or the Library. The sixty-six books which compose this library were written at intervals during a period of nearly fifteen hundred years, but eventually became one Book. How? In other words, the history of the Canon of Scripture should form a part of the general literature which it is one of the objects of your Guild to promote. I fear that there are many religionists who are very dogmatic, and yet could not tell why they believe Ecclesiastes.

to be part of God's Word, and Ecclesiasticus not so; why they accept the "Song of Solomon," but do not feel bound by his "Wisdom." Natural good taste might prefer the proverbial philosophy of Ecclesiasticus to the seeming Epicurean fatalism of Ecclesiastes, but such a serious question as which of the two is the word of God, cannot be answered by our inner consciousness, but by outer evidence. Again, general literature must embrace Church History and the Principles of the Church of England. Of those principles, multitudes, within and without her pale, are sadly ignorant. One reason for this is that standard theology invariably differs from popular theology. The majority are content to get their information second-hand from lectures and newspaper articles. This is both a lasy and a dangerous method. No Church on earth is more interested in the diffusion of knowledge, derivable from Scripture and primitive Antiquity, than the Church of England. Indeed all Christians would be benefitted by the diffusion of such knowledge. The odium-theologicum would be much modified if men would open their eyes to the fact that half the time they are fighting theories of their own building, and that the vague,

popular notions of doctrine are not the doctrines of the Church, but distortions of them. The average Churchman's belief is very often out of harmony with his Prayer Book, the Presbyterian's with his Confession of Faith, and the Methodist's with his Book of Discipline or with Wesley's Sermons. If all understood their own principles better, there would be less acrimony. If Ecclesiastical history were studied a little more, new schisms would be received more philosophically, as showing how history is ever repeating itself, and how new sects are only old ones revived. If the text of Holy Scripture were more carefully studied, particularly in its native tongues, how much would Bibliolatry be lessened and fanaticism be calmed. We shall soon have a revised edition of the Scriptures, under the auspices of the Convocation of Canterbury, and there is a suitability in the arrangement whereby the Church that first gave the Bible to the people in the vulgar tongue should continue to employ the greater scholarship

and the very first clause in it secured the liberties of the Church. Parliaments, in their representative character and order of proceedings, are copies of the Church's Synods, and for a very long period the prevailing element in them was clerical. A great historian says that "the unit and true aernel of all our political life must be looked for in the Parish Vestry." Theodore, Archbishop of Canterbury, a fellow townsman of St. Paul, created our Parochial system twelve hundred years ago, and by his ecclesiastical organization led the way toward our national unity. Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, almost forgotten, can still be traced territorially in the limits of diocesse now existing like Rochester and Liefifield. English law, as a system, was suggested by the canons passed by our Church Synods. Greek literature was introduced into England by Archbishop Theedore, himself a Greek monk, I throw out these suggestions to show how impossible it is to know the history of the State without a knowledge of the history of the Church, and how naturally a Guild of English Churchmen may foster a taste for English literature, while they are at the same time encouraging the study of the principles of the Church of English.

It would be a most interesting study to trace the parallellum which exists between the development of the English Constitution and that of the English Church. Time will, however, only suffer me to

need never shrink from tracing up the *Beclesiastical* institutions of England to their earliest shape. The wisdom of our forefathers was ever shown, not in a dull and senseless clinging to things as they were at any given moment, but in that spirit, the spirit alike of the true reformer and the true conservative, which keeps the whole fabric standing, by repairing and improving from time to time whatever portions of it stand in need of repair and improvement. "Let ancient customs prevail"; let us ever stand fast in the "old paths." But the old paths have in England ever been the paths of progress. The ancient custom has ever been to shrink from mere change for the sake of change, but fearlessly to change whenever change was really needed. And many of the best changes of later times, many of the most wholesome improvements in our Church, have been only the casting aside of introvations which crept in modern and evil times. We have advanced by falling back on a mere ancient state of things; we have reformed by calling to life again the institutions of earlier times, by setting ourselves free from the slavish subtleties of Roman Priests, by casting aside as an accuraced thing—the innovations of Italian tyranny and Papai usurpation."

Out of the 67 Minor Festivals in the English Calendar, 16 are of Eastern origin, 17 are British, 15 French, 2 African 1 Spanish, 16 Italian or Sicilian. Of these, 31 commemorate persons or events before the first General Council in 325; 19 belong to the interval between the first and sixth Council in 630; 7 between that date and the schism between East and West in the 9th century; and 10 belong to the period subsequent to that division. Those of S. George, Lammas Day, S. Laurence and S. Clement were restored to the Calendar in Queen Elizabeth's reign. These Festivals may well be commemorated by the use of special Hymns in the service.

The Fast of a Vigil may fairly be considered to end with the Evensong of the Festival—i. e., about 6 p. m.

On the Coincidence of Holy Days — When two Holy Days (this word includes Sundays, Feasts and Fasts) fall together, the question arises, which is to have the precedence, and how a Feast and a Fast can be observed together. The Mediaval Church divided holy days into classes, and ordered that the superior should be observed at its own time, and the inferior transferred to some unoccupied day. This rule has not the sanction of our Prayer Book, and therefore cannot be followed by us. The best plan for us will be to act on an analogous principle; and observe the superior Hely Days commemorating the inferior by the use of its Collect. The following seem to be the Holy Days to which all others should give way: Advent Sunday, Christmas Day and the Sunday in the Octave, Circumcision, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, and the latter days of the Holy Week, Easter Day, with Monday and Tuesday, Low Sunday, Ascension Day, Pentecost, with Monday and Tuesday, Trinity Sunday. In all other cases the Festival should have precedence of the Sunday. It is quite wrong to mingle the services, by using, e. g. the Lessons for one and the Epistle and Gospel for the other.

The day preceding a Festival, if not fasted, is called its Eve. If a Festival which has a Vigil fall on Monday, Saturday is the Vigil, Sunday the Eve, as the Church never fasts on the Lord's day,

#### BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

The Anglican Church in this country, as in other Colonial possessions of Great Britain, traces her descent from the Apostles of our Blessed Lord through that branch of the Holy Catholic Church, which, in the earlier ages of Christianity, was planted in the British Isles. To the Church of England, then, are we indebted, under God, for our first foundation and "for a long continuance of nursing care and protection." For many years the work of the Church in America was carried on under most unfavorable circumstances, in consequence of there being no resident Episcopal authority. A carefully compiled outline of the History of the Church, in this country, from 1673 to 1848, appeared in the second edition of the GUIDE. Material is now being collected for the completion of the History to present time, and so soon as ready the whole will be cast into a new form and published in the next edition of the GUIDE; or should the matter be found too voluminous it will be issued in a separate volume.

## LEGISLATURE OF THE PROVINCE OF CANADA.

19-20 Vict., Chap 141.

An Act to enable members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada to meet in Synod.

Proclaimed May 28th, 1857.

WHEREAS doubts exist whether the members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province have the power of regulating the affairs of their Church, in matters relating to discipline, and necessary to order and good government, and it is just that such doubts should be removed, in order that they may be permitted to exercise the same rights of self-government that are enjoyed by other religious communities; therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:

I. The Bishops, Clergy and Laity, Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province, may meet in their several Dioceses, which are now, or may be hereafter constituted in this Province, and in such manner and by such proceedings as they shall adopt, frame constitutions and make regulations for enforcing discipline in the Church, for the appointment, deposition, deprivation, or removal, of any person bearing office therein, of whatever order or degree, any rights of the Crown to the contrary notwithstanding, and for the convenient and orderly management of the property, affairs, and interests of the Church in matters relating to and affecting only the said Church, and the officers and members thereof, and not in any manner interfering with the rights, privileges, or interests of other religious communities, or of any person or persons not being a member or members of the United Church of England and Ireland; provided always, that such constitutions and regulations shall apply only to the Diocese or Dioceses adopting the same.

II. The Bishops, Clergy, and Laity, members of the United Church of England and Ireland in this Province, may meet in General Assembly within this Province, by such representatives as shall be determined and declared by them in their several Dioceses; and in such General Assembly frame a constitution and regulations for the general management and good government of the said Church in this Province; provided always, that

An Act to explain and amend the Act intituled: "An Act to enable the Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada to meet in Synod."

Assented to August 16th, 1858.

WHEREAS doubts exist whether in the Act passed in the Session held in the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled; "An Act to enable the Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada to meet in Synod," sufficient provision is made for the representation of the Laity of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Synods by the said Act authorized to be held, and it is expedient that such doubts should be removed: Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:

I. For all the purposes of the aforesaid Act, the Laity shall meet by representation; and until it shall be otherwise determined by the Synod in each Diocese, one or more delegates (not exceeding three in any case) may be elected at the annual Easter meetings in each parish, mission or cure within the Diocese, or in cases where there may be more than one congregation in any parish, mission or sure, then in each such congregation, or at meetings to be specially called for the purpose by each Clergyman having a separate cure of souls; and all laymen within such parish, mission, or cure, or belonging to such congregation, of the full age of twenty-one years, who shall declare themselves, in writing, at such meetings to be members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and to belong to no other religious denomination, shall have the right of voting at such election. Each delegate shall receive from the Chairman of the meeting a certificate of his election, which he shall produce when called upon so to do at the Synod; and the first meeting of such Synod shall be called by the Bishop of the Diocese at such time and place as he shall think fit: Provided always, that ne business shall be transacted by the Synod of any Diocese unless at least one-fourth of the Clergy of such Diocese shall be present, and at least one-fourth of the congregations within the same be represented by at least one delegate.

#### DECLARATION.

We, the Bishops of the United Church of England art Ireland within the Province of Canada, together with the Delegates from the Clergy and Laity of the Diocesan Synods, now assembled in the first Provincial Synod under Royal and constitutional authority, and intending, under God's blessing and guidance, to consider and determine upon such matters as shall appear necessary for the welfare of the Church in this Province, desire to express our most humble and hearty thanks to Almighty God, that it has pleased him in his Providence to set over us a Metropolitan, and thus to enable us, as in the ancient days, to assemble as one body, under the direction of His Holy Spirit, whose aid we now invoke, in the name of His only begotten Son, for the consolidation and advancement of His kingdom in this Province.

Before entering on the business for which we are at present assembled, we desire publicly to declare the principles upon which we propose to proceed.

We desire the Church in this Province to continue, as it has been, an integral portion of the United Church of England and Ireland.

As members of that Church, we recognize the true Canon of Holy Scripture as set forth by that Church, on the testimony of the Primitive Catholic Church, to be the rule and standard of Faith: we acknowledge the Book of Common Prayer and Sacraments, together with the Thirtynine Articles of Religion, to be a true and faithful declaration of the doctrines contained in Holy Scripture; we maintain the form of Church government by Bishops, Priests and Deacons, as Scriptural and Apostolical; and we declare our firm and unanimous resolution, in dependence on Divine aid, to preserve those doctrines and that form of government, and to transmit them to our posterity.

In particular, we maintain the ancient doctrine of our Church, that the Queen is rightfully possessed of the chief government and supremacy over all persons within her dominions, whether ecclesiastical or civil, as set forth in the 37th of the Articles of Religion; and we desire that such supremacy should continue unimpared.

It is our earnest desire and determination to confine our deliberations to matters of discipline, to the temporalities of the Church, and to such regulations of order or modes of operation as may tend to her efficiency and extension; and we desire no control or authority over any but those who are or shall be members of the same Church.

We conceive that the following, or such like objects, may fitly come under our consideration, and lead to action on our part:—

- 1. To form a Constitution for this Synod, and to regulate the time and place of the meetings, and the order and manner of its proceedings.
- 2. To provide for the proper exercise of Ecclesiastical Discipline, in regard to both Clergy and Laity, by modifying and enacting Canons, and by establishing and ordering a Court of Appeal.
- 3. To provide, with consent of the Crown, (when needed) fit regulations for the appointment of Bishops, Priests and Deacons, in accordance with Canons of the Universal Church.
- 4. To provide, with the consent of the Crown, for the division of the Province into New Dioceses, as occasion may require.
- 5. To procure from the Colonial Legislature any laws or modifications of laws which the circumstances of the Church may require.
- 6. To promote the future consolidation and united action of the whole of the Diocese of British North America.

Proceeding upon these principles, which, as we humbly thank God, were, under his good guidance, first among the Colonial Churches, publicly set forth amongst ourselves, and have been sustained by the acceptance of our brethren through a large part of the Colonial Dominions of our beloved Queen, we firmly rely and depend upon His continued blessing and guidance; and we humbly pray that He, who is the God of unity and peace, may ever be with us, and so chasten our affections, purify our motives, and guide our judgment, that we may be enabled to contribute to the efficiency, concord and stability of the Church in this land.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

- 1. The Provincial Synod shall consist of the Bishops of the United Church of England and Ireland, having Sees within the Province of Canada, or executing by due authority the Episcopate as assistant or Missionary Bishops therein, and of Delegates chosen from the Clergy and from the Laity.
- The Bishops shall deliberate in one House, and the Delegates from the Clergy and the Laity in another; and each House shall hold its sittings, either in public or in private, at its own discretion.
- 3. The Clerical and Lay Delegates shall consist of twelve of each Order from each Diocese.
- 4. The Synod shall meet on the second Wednesday of September in every third year, or oftener, at the discretion of the Metropolitan; or on

- 5. In a Vacancy of the Metropolitan See, a meeting may be called at the appointed period, or on either of the above requisitions, by the Senior Bishop of the Church in Canada.
- 6. A Quorum of the Synod shall consist of not less than a majority of the Bishops, and not less than one-fourth of the members of each Order of the Lower House.
- 7. The Metropolitan, or some Bishop appointed by him, shall be the President of the Upper House; and in the vacancy of the See, or in the event of the inability, from any cause, of the Metropolitan, to appoint a Rishop as President, the House of Bishops shall elect one of their own number to preside. (As amended 1877.)
- 8. The Lower House shall be presided over by their Prolocutor, to be chosen viva vocs on motion of any member of that House.
- 9. Each House shall appoint a Secretary or Secretaries, who shall keep regular accounts of all proceedings in their own House, shall preserve memorials and other documents under the direction of the President and Prolocutor, shall attest all public acts of the Synod, and deliver over all records and documents to their successors. The printed journal of each session, certified by the signatures of the Prolocutor and the two Secretaries of the Lower House, to a statement attached to one or more copies declaring the number of pages in the said journal, and the number of words corrected, with the words so corrected, shall be held to be the true and authentic record of the proceedings of each session. (As amended 1877.)
- 10. The expenses of the Synod shall be provided for, and its financial concerns managed by a Committee of the Lower House, after a manner to be approved by both Houses.
- 11. Each House shall establish its own order of proceeding and rules of order, and may publish such of its proceedings as may appear advisable.
- 12. The Upper Houseshall propose to the Lower any business they may desire to have treated of or decided; and it shall be incumbent on the Lower House to take up and dispose of such business immediately after the subject under consideration shall have been disposed of for the time being, provided, always, that it shall be the duty of the Prolocutor to read to this House the message immediately on its receipt, and the House may, by its vote, without discussion, decide in proceeding to its consideration at once. (As amended 1877.)
- 13. The Upper House may direct the Lower to appoint a Committee to report to the Upper on any subject on which they may desire the judgment of the Lower, or to appoint their portion of a joint committee; or may summon the Lower to a conference.

- 14. Messages from the Upper House shall be delivered by an officer of the Upper to the Secretary of the Lower, by whom they shall be communicated to the Prolocutor, who shall communicate them to the House.
- 15. The Lower House may present to the Upper any matter which they conceive to be a grievance or to require amendment, even when they have no proposition to make on the same; and the Upper shall thereupon place it in order for consideration, with a view of providing a remedy; and shall, before the conclusion of the session, declare to the Lower House the result.
- 16. The Prolocutor shall have the right of admission, personally or by committee, to the Upper House, to communicate the desire or decisions of his House; and in such case he shall ascertain, by message, when he or the committee can conveniently be received in the Upper House, and act accordingly.
- 17. It shall be competent to the Lower House to request a Joint Committee or Conference on any special object, beyond those submitted to it by the Upper House, or to propose for discussion any specific measure; to which request an answer shall be given; but it shall be at the option of the Upper House to accede to their request or not.
- 18. When either House shall desire a conference with the other, or a Joint Committee, the reason for either shall be agreed to by the House desiring it, and communicated in writing to the other; the Prolocutor, personally or by committee, in either case proceeding to the Upper House either to deliver or to receive such reasons.
- 19. When either House shall have come to a decision upon any subject in which the other House is concerned, it shall communicate its decision to the other.
- 20. If the Lower House should not concur in a decision of the Upper they shall, in stating their non-concurrence, state their reason; and may either propose an amendment, or request the Upper House to suggest an amendment to meet their reason, or request a conference.
- 21. If the Upper House should not concur in a resolution or decision of the Lower House, they may, in stating their non-concurrence, either state their reasons or not; and may either propose an amendment or request the Lower House to prepare the amendment or appoint a conference, to whom the Lower House shall always give attention.
- 22. The conference may be either by deputation from both Houses, or by deputation from the Lower House, or by open conference, as the Upper House may think fit; and the place shall be appointed by the President.

- 24. Committees, whether of either House, or of the two Houses, may hold their meetings either during recesses in the session, or during the prorogation of the Synod.
- 25. No alteration of the Constitutions or Canons shall come into operation until it has been confirmed at a second session of the Provincial Synod.
- 26. Each meeting of the Synod shall be preceded or commenced by Morning Prayer and a Sermon, if so ordered by the Metropolitan, and on the first day of such meeting the Holy Communion shall be administered.
- 27. The business of each day shall be commenced by prayer for the Divine guidance and blessing, according to a form authorized by the House of Bishops,
- 28. The election of the Clerical and Lay Delegates shall be certified under the hand and seal of the Bishop of the Diocese which they represent, or, in the absence of the Bishop, the Chairman of the Synod; and such certificate shall be final and conclusive; which certificate shall be forwarded by the Secretaries of Diocesan Synod to the Secretaries of the Lower House of the Provincial Synod within fourteen days after said election.

## PERMANENT ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS, AS ADOPTED BY BOTH HOUSES.

- 1. The Provincial Synod shall meet at the place of deliberation (notice being previously given by the Metropolitan or his deputy, of the time and place of meeting), the Bishops attired in their proper robes, and the Clergy in their gowns, cassocks, bands, and hoods, and shall proceed in procession to the Cathedral for Divine service; on which occasion the Holy Communion shall always be administered. The Litany shall be said by the junior Bishop; the Preacher shall be appointed by the Metropolitan, and special prayer shall be made for the Synod. The collection shall be applied to the current expenses of the Synod, unless otherwise ordered by the Metropolitan.
- 2. At an appointed hour after Divine service the Members of the Synod shall re-assemble at the place of deliberation, where, after the President has taken his seat, he shall inform the Lower House with regard to their place of meeting, and direct them to elect their Prolocutor.
- 3. When the Prolocutor has been elected, he shall be conducted to the Upper House by the Chairman, accompanied at discretion by any members of the Lower House, and his election announced to the President.
- 4. The President shall then state to him the business which the Upper House desire to engage the attention of the Lower House, specifying, when necessary, the order in which they desire it to be taken up.

- 5. On his return, the Prolocutor shall first nominate his own deputy, (in case of his absence), and then introduce to the House the business on which the Upper House desire them to engage themselves.
- 6. On every day of meeting after the first, the Synod shall meet at 9 a.m., and shall proceed at once, before any business is announced, to Morning Prayers at the Cathedral, or the place appointed, and, after Prayers,
- 7. Before the conclusion of the session, the President, with the consent of the House of Bishops, shall issue a schedule, declaring the state in which each matter of business now stands which has been brought before the Upper House, and promulgate it to the Lower House; reserving all unfinished business to the next session, and preroguing the Synod.
- 8. The Prolocutor, on receiving the schedule of prorogation, shall, at the first opportunity, communicate it to his House, which shall not prolong its sittings beyond that day.

## ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE LOWER HOUSE.

- 1. After Prayer, the Clerical and Lay Secretaries shall call the roll of their respective orders.
- 2. The election of the new Secretaries shall be made by the Clergy and Laity respectively. A Treasurer and two Auditors shall also be appointed, all of whom shall hold their offices until their successors shall be appointed.
  - 3. After this the Order of business shall be as follows:-
  - (1) Reading, correcting, and approving minutes of previous meeting. Appointing Committees.
  - (3) Presenting, reading and referring Memorials or Petitions.
  - (4) Presenting Reports of Committees, of Tressurer, or Auditors. (5) Giving Notices of Motion.
  - (6) Taking up Unfinished Business.
  - (7) Consideration of Motions.
  - 8) Orders of the Day.
  - (9) Before the final adjournment of the Synod, reading, correcting and approving the minutes of the last day's proceedings.

- 2. The Prolocutor shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the House, to be decided without debate; and when called upon to decide a point of order, he shall state the rule applicable to the case, without argument or comment.
- 3. When any member wishes to speak, he shall rise and address the Chair.
- 4. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Prolocutor shall name the party first to speak.
- 5. A member called to order, while speaking, shall sit down, unless permitted to explain.
- 6. No motion or amendment shall be considered as before the House, unless seconded and reduced to writing.
- 7. No member, save the mover of a resolution, who, as mover, is entitled to reply, shall speak more than once, except by permission of the House.
  - 8. A member may rise to explain, if permitted by the Chair.
- No original motion, except motions of course, shall be received without notice, except by permission of the House.
- 10. When a resolution has been moved and seconded, any member may require the previous question to be put, whether the motion so made shall be put or not,, and that question shall be decided without debate.
- 11. When a motion has been read to the House by the Prolocutor, it cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the House.
- 12. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received by the Chair, unless to amend it or postpone it, or to lay it on the table, or for adjournment, or for the previous question, and no more than one amendment to a proposed amendment of a question shall be in order.
  - 13. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order.
- 14. Motions to adjourn or to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.
- 15. A motion to suspend a Rule of Order shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without debate; and no Rule of Order shall be suspended, except upon the vote of two-thirds of the members present.
- 16. A member, if not interrupting a speaker, may require any motion in discussion to be read for his information, at any time during the debate.

- 17. When amendments are made to any motion, the amendments and the original motion shall be put in order the reverse of that in which they were brought forward.
- 18. When a question is finally put by the Prolocutor, either an original motion or an amendment, no further debate shall be allowed; the Prolocutor first declaring that the question is finally put.
- 19. When the Prolocutor is putting a question, no member shall rise from his seat; and every member present, when a question is put, shall be required to vote on the same, unless excused by the House.
- 20. In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall first rise, and then those who vote in the negative; and in case of an equality of votes, the question shall be decided by the casting vote of the Prolocutor, who may also vote on the motion.
- 21. When required by two Clerical and two Lay Delegates, the vote of the House upon any question may be taken by orders voting separately; and in that case a majority of both orders shall be necessary to an affirmative vote,
- 22. On a division, the names of those who vote for or against a question shall be recorded in the minutes, if required by three members.
- 23. A question being once determined shall not again be drawn into discussion in the same session, without the unanimous consent of the House.
- 24. Committees shall not be appointed without notice, excepting Standing Committees, Committees of the Prolocutor to the Upper House, and Committees of Course, such as those which follow upon the adoption of a resolution which requires a committee.
- 25. When a separate Committee of this House has been named, whose function is deliberative, the Prolocutor shall direct what number of its members do form a quorum, unless the quorum be fixed by the resolution under which the committee is appointed.
- 26. When a committee is appointed, the mover of the resolution asking for the committee shall be the Chairman of the Committee, or when a resolution is referred to a committee, the mover of the resolution shall be Chairman, unless the committee has already been organized:

- 30. It shall be the duties of the Secretaries to arrange a list of all unfinished business, and all notices of motion sent to them by members to be brought before the Provincial Synod, according to the order in which they are received; and under the direction of the Metropolitan, to cause a printed copy of the same to be sent to every member of the Synod twenty one days before its meeting; which business and notices shall stand first on the order of the day.
- 31. A Standing Committee of one Clerical and one Lay Delegate from each Diocese shall be appointed on the first day of the meeting of the Synod, and such committee shall arrange for each day the order of precedence of the several motions, of which notice has been given, and have them printed.
- 82. In any unprovided case, resort shall be had to the Rules of Order of the House of Commons in Canada for guidance.
- 93. No Canon shall be enacted unless the same has been transmitted by the Secretaries of the Lower House to the members of the Provincial Synod at least one month before the meeting of the Synod, or unless the same has been left over as unfinished business, and printed in the journal of the previous session.

## Canous of the Provincial Synod.

All the Canons as passed or amended up to last Session of Provincial Synod are here given. They are taken VERBATIM from Synod Journal.

### CANON I.

## CANON OF THE ELECTION OF THE METROPOLITAN BISHOP.

- 1. From and after the day on which the See of Montreal shall next become vacant, the Bishop of Montreal shall not, by virtue merely of his office as such be the Metropolitan of this Ecclesiastical Province.
- 2. After the expiration of three months, and not later than the expiration of six months after the next and every subsequent avoidance of the Metropolitical See, the Bishops of the said Province shall meet under the presidency of the senior Bishop, or, in case of his inability to act, under the pre-

sidency of Bishop next in order of seniority, and it shall be his duty to summon them to that end, at some place within the Ecclesiastical Province, by giving at least six week's notice of the time and place of meeting, and elect one of their number to be President of the House of Bishops, and the Bishop so elected shall thereupon ipso facto be the Metropolitan Bishop, and shall have, possess and exercise all the rights, powers, privileges and prerogatives which the Metropolitan Bishop in the said Province now has, possesses and exercises, or may or can have, possess and exercise, any law, usage or custom of the said Province to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding.

- 3. The See of the said Bishop so elected as aforesaid shall be the Metropolitical See of the said Province, but the city of Montreal shall be as it presently is, the place of the meeting of the Provincial Synod of the said Province.
- 4. Until the election of the said Metropolitan Bishop, the said senior Bishop shall, after each such avoidance aforesaid of the Metropolitan See, be vested with all the rights, powers, privileges and prerogatives of Metropolitan Bishop aforesaid.
- 5. All rules, regulations, canons or other previsions of law of the said Province inconsistent with the foregoing provisions, shall be and the same are hereby repealed.
- 6. In such election of the Metropolitan Bishop, it shall be necessary that a majority of all the Bishops of the Dioceses in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada concur either by actual vote at the meeting called for such election, or else in writing under their hand and seal.

#### CANON II.

## OF SUBMISSION OF CLERGY TO THE CANONS OF THE PROVINCIAL AND DIOCESAN SYNODS.

No Bishop within this Province shall hereafter grant his license to any clergyman to the cure of souls until such clergyman has first subscribed and declared his submission to the Canons of the Provincial Synod, and of the Synod of the Dicesse of such Bishop, in the following form:

8. Upon a memorial signed by two-thirds of the Clerical and Lay members of any Diocesan Synod, certified to be such by the Clerical and Lay Secretaries of such Diocesan Synod, requesting the Metropolitan Bishop to exercise visitorial power in such Diocese, the said Metropolitan Bishop shall have full power and authority to visit such Diocese, and the Bishop thereof, and during such visitation to inhibit the exercise of all or of such part or parts of the ordinary jurisdiction of such Bishop as to him the Metropolitan Bishop shall seem expedient, and during the time of such visitation to exercise by himself, or his commissaries, such powers, functions, and jurisdiction in and over the said Diocese as the Bishop thereof might have exercised, if he had not been inhibited from exercising the same.

#### CANON IV.

As Amended 1877.

## OF THE TRIAL OF A BISHOP.

Offences for which a Bishop may be Tried.

- I. Any Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province may be tried if charged with any of the following offences:
  - (1.) Crime or immorality.
- (2.) Advisedly holding and teaching, whether publicly or privately, any doctrine contrary to that held by the Canadian Branch of the Church of England.
- (3.) Wilful violation of the constitution or canons of the Provincial Synod.
  - (4.) Wilful violation of the constitution or canons of his Synod.
- II. No charge against a Bishop shall be made except in writing, and it shall be signed either by a Bishop of this Church, or of one in communion therewith not under suspension, deprivation or degradation; or by seven male communicants of this Church in good standing of whom at least three shall be priests.

### Action on Rumors.

III. Whenever a Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province shall have reason to believe that there are in circulation rumers, reports or charges affecting his moral or religious character, he may if he please acting in conformity with the written advice and consent of any two of his brother Bishops demand of the Metropolitan or if the Metropolitan be the Bishop affected by such rumor, then of the Bishop Senior by consecration to convene a Board of Inquiry in the mode hereinafter set forth.

IV. Accusers may choose a lay advocate in preparing proofs and charges, etc., or they may prepare such charges themselves and in either case the grounds of accusations must be set forth with reasonable certainty of time, place and circumstance.

## Charges, to whom to be delivered.

V. Charges prepared in either of the modes mentioned shall be delivered to the Metropolitan, if he be not the accused; if he be the accused, the charges shall be delivered to the Bishop Senior by consecration.

VI. Accusers must give security to the accused in a bond with sufficient sureties to be approved by the Registrar of the Court of Appeal of the Metropolitan in the penal sum of one thousand dollars, conditioned to secure the accused for his costs in case he be acquitted on the charge, or the charges be not proceeded with.

## Board of Inquiry, how constituted.

VII. The House of Bishops, at each meeting of the Provincial Synod, shall appoint a Board of preliminary enquiry, not exceeding nine persons, all being communicants of this Church, the majority of whom shall form a quorum, who shall act as such until the next meeting of the Synod, provided always, that no person who has joined in making the charge, shall act upon the Board.

#### Notice to Members.

VIII. The Metropolitan, or Senior Bishop, as the case may be, shall on receipt of such charges, give notice thereof to said Board, and direct them severally to attend at the time and place designated by him and to organize the Board, and it shall be the duty of each member so notified to attend. The place of meeting must be within the Diocese of the accused.

The Metropolitan or Senior Bishop shall send at the same time a copy of the charges to each member of the Board, also to the accused.

IX. The sittings of the Board shall be private.

X. All evidence shall be taken down in writing and signed by the witnesses. Two witnesses shall be necessary to the proof of any charge, and the Bishop charged, and the person making the charge may respectively give evidence before the Board.

#### Presentment.

XI. If the majority of the Board present shall be of opinion that there are sufficient grounds to put the accused Bishop upon his trial they shall direct the Chairman to prepare a presentment to be signed by such of the Board as agree theroto.

XII. The Chairman shall transmit to the Metropolitan or senior Bishop from whom their charges were received, the presentment thus signed together with the evidence on which it is based; and the said Bishop shall send to the accused Bishop a copy of the same.

XIII. If a majority of the Board present shall be of opinion that there is not sufficient ground to put the accused Bishop on his trial, they shall report thereon in writing to the Metropolitan or Bishop Senior, and in such case the charges, tegether with the certificate of the Metropolitan or Bishop Senior, by consecration of the refusal of the Board to make a presentment shall be prepared in duplicate; one to be sent to the Secretary of the Provincial Synod to be deposited amongst the Archives of the Synod, and the other to the Secretary or Secretaries of the Diocesan Synod of the Diocese where the Bishop has been so charged: no proceedings shall be had thereafter by way of presentment on such charges.

### Limitations of Time.

XIV. No presentment shall be made in any case unless the alleged offence shall have been committed within two years next before the day on which the charges were delivered to the Metropolitan or Bishop Senior by consecration, except the charge be of such a nature that it would subject the accused to indictment before the criminal courts.

#### Trial.

XV. When a presentment shall have been made by the Beard of Inquiry, or the majority thereof, it shall be the duty of the Bishops receiving it to make arrangements for the trial of the accused.

XVI. The Court shall be formed of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province, the majority of whom, excluding the acsuser, if he be a Bishop and the accused, must be present. And the rules of evidence to be followed on the trial shall be those of the Civil Courts of the Province within which the trial takes place; provided always, that the accusers and the accused may respectively give evidence.

XVII. The Bishop to whom the presentment is made shall, within two weeks, summon all the Bishops of the Province, other than the accuser and accused, to attend at an appointed time and place, and it shall be the duty of every Bishop so summoned to attend unless he be excused for reasonable causes to be approved by the Metropolitan or by the Bishop Senior by consecration.

He shall also summon the accused Bishop by written notice to be sent by mail, within two weeks from the receipt of the presentment, addressed to his usual or last place of residence in his Diocese to appear and answer at the time and place so appointed, and shall also give the like notice to the complainants, requiring them to attend at the said time and place to substantiate their charges.

XVIII. The time appointed for trial shall be within three calendar months, and not less than one month, from the day on which the summons

was mailed, and the place shall be within the Diocese of the accused Bishop.

XIX. The Bishops shall appoint a legal assessor at the time of trial, but such assessor shall not vote in any case whatever.

XX. If the accused refuse or neglect to appear then the court shall proceed caparts to pronounce him in contumacy, and after hearing the evidence adduced pronounce judgment in the case.

XXI. The accused and the accusers may appear by counsel.

XXII. The decision of the court on all the charges shall be reduced to writing, and signed by a majority of those members of the Court by whom the case has been heard.

XXIII. The sentence of the Court, if the accused be found guilty, shall be either admonition, suspension for a definite period, deposition, or removal from office in the said Church, and in the case of deposition or removal from office, with a cessation of all rights to the temporalities of the Sec.

XXIV. The judgment of the Court shall be communicated to every Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province, to the Provincial Synod and to the Synod of the Diocese of the accused Bishop, and the said Synods shall forthwith proceed to enter and record such judgment.

A full record of the proceedings of every such trial shall be kept by the House of Bishops.

#### CANON V:

#### COURT OF APPEAL OF THE METROPOLITAN.

#### HOW CONSTITUTED.

The House of Bishops presided over by the Metropolitan, or President of the Upper House, or Senior Bishop in their absence, with two or more assessors to be from time to time nominated by the said House of Bishops, shall be the Court of Appeal from the judgment of any Diocesan Court.

Three Bishops shall constitute a quorum of the Court of Appeal, and the decision of the majority of the Bishops sitting in appeal shall bind, and in the event of an equality of votes the decision of the Court appealed from shall stand affirmed.

The Bishop of any Diocese, who has given any judgment, either alone or in any Diocesan Court, or as a party to, any case, shall not sit in appeal in such case.

#### OFFICERS OF THE COURT.

There shall be a Registrar of the Court of Appeal, and such other officers as the Court may deem necessary, to be appointed from time to time by the Metropolitan.

## WHEN APPEALS SHALL LIE.

An Appeal shall lie in the Court of Appeal, in all cases adjudged by any Diocesan Court, on behalf of any party to the case or proceeding in the Diocesan Court.

There shall be no appeal for any error or defect in form in any proceeding or judgment in a Diocesan Court.

An Appeal shall lie to the Court of Appeal from the judgment or decision of the Bishop of any Diocese.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE COURT.

The Court of Appeal may sit in any Diocese, at such times and places as the Court shall, from time to time, order and direct.

The Appellant shall give notice of Appeal to the Respondent and the Bishop of the Diocese in the Court of which the judgment appealed from is given, within one calendar month after such judgment.

The Appellant shall give to the Respondent, within two calendar months after such judgment is given, a bond with sufficient securities, to be approved by the Registrar of the Court of Appeal, in the sum of \$400, to secure the Respondent for the costs of appeal in case the appeal is dismissed.

Every Appeal shall be prosecuted to a hearing by the Appellant within one year after such judgment is given, if the Court of Appeal shall not so sit, then at the first sitting of the Court of Appeal after such year shall have expired.

The Appellant shall, within three calendar months's after such judgment, bring into the Court of Appeal and file with the Registrar there of, a transcript of all the proceedings and judgments appealed from, certified to be correct by the Registrar of the Diocesan Court, or the Bishop of the Diocese whose judgment is appealed against.

If any of the proceedings in the next preceding four sections are not taken within the times respectively limited therefor, the Appeal shall be considered dismissed, and the judgment appealed from shall stand.

The Appellant shall give the Respondent one calendar month's notice in writing of the hearing of the Appeal.

The Court of Appeal shall make such rules and orders as to the forms of procedure and practice, fees and costs, as such Court shall from time to time deem necessary.

#### CANON VI.

## ON MINISTERING IN PARISHES.

1. No Clergyman shall absent himself from his charge, for more than four weeks at a time, without the written consent of the Bishop, or in his absence, of his Commissary.

2. No person shall be permitted to celebrate Divine Service or perform any office of the Church, permanently or occasionally, except he shall have been Episcopally and Canonically ordained, and it shall be the duty of the Incumbent, or, in his abzence, of the Churchwardens, to demand proof of such ordination and of the good standing of the Clergyman before permitting him to officiate.

No person shall perform the office of Lay Reader except he shall hold the Bishop's license.

This Canon shall not apply to the students of any Theological College, so as to prevent them from reading the Lessons in the College Chapel, or to Laymen occasionally officiating, when there is a necessity for it.

- 3. No Clergyman shall officiate in any Mission or Parish, either as substitute for the Incumbent or his assistant, for more than one month, without the written license of the Bishop, and no person who has availed himself of this implied permission shall be allowed to officiate again in the same Mission or Parish within a period of three months, unless he obtain the license of the Bishop or the Bishop's commissary.
- 4. No Bishop of one Diocese shall perferm any Episcopal functions in another without the sanction of the Bishop thereof, save in the case provided for by the Canon relating to the powers of the Metropolitan, nor shall any Bishop perform any such functions in any vacant Diocese except by instruction of the Metropolitan; or, in case of the voidance of his Diocese, from the Senior Bishop of the Province.

#### CANON VII.

#### OF LETTERS TESTIMONIAL.

When a Priest or Deacon in good standing is desirous of leaving a Diocese, it shall be the duty of the Bishop to give him, on his request, the usual "Letters Testimonial," but the Clergyman receiving the same shall continue subject to the Episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop till the Letters Testimonial shall have been presented according to their address, and accepted by the Bishop to whose Diocese the Clergyman wishes to be transferred; provided always that if they be not presented within three months after their date, they may be considered as void by the authority whence they proceeded, and shall be void unless they be presented within six months.

#### CANON VIII.

#### OF EPISCOPAL RESIGNATIONS.

If a Bishop shall desire to resign his Diocese, he shall give in his resignation to the Metropolitan, in writing, or (if he be himself Metropolitan) to the Bishop senior by consecration; but such resignation shall not be accepted unless a majority of the House of Bishops consent.

#### CANON IX.

## OF THE SUBDIVISION OF DIOCESES.

The House of Bishops shall have the power of subdividing existing Dioceses, or of forming a new Diocese out of portions of existing Dioceses which may be contiguous, with the concurrence, or upon the application, of the Synod or Synods of the Dioceses affected; and it shall be the duty of such Synod or Synods to consider, without delay, any proposal for the subdivision of a Diocese which may emanate from the House of Bishops.

#### CANON X.

# OF THE OFFICIATING OF STRANGE CLERGYMAN IN A DIOCESE.

When a Bishop is a ware that a Clergyman not of his Diocese is officiating or about to officiate in his Diocese, and when the said Bishop shall have good reason to believe that doubts exist regarding the clergyman's orthodoxy, canonical ordination, or good morals, then the Bishop may inhibit him from officiating within his Diocese, by a writing addressed to him, and to the Clergy; and any Clergyman, after the receipt of the Bishop's inhibition, permitting such inhibited person to perform any olerical function in his Church, or Mission Chapel, shall be proceeded against by the Bishop for breach of canonical obedience.

### CANON XI.

## OF MISSIONARY BISHOPS.

- 1. The Provincial Synod may elect a suitable Priest to be a Missionary Bishop over a district not within any organized Diocese or over a District which includes within the new Territory a part or parts of one or more existing Dioceses; and when the House of Bishops shall be satisfied that adequate provision has been made for the support of a Missionary Bishop, the Metropolitan or presiding Bishop may convene the Provincial Synod for the purpose of electing such Missionary Bishop, by the joint action of the Upper and Lower House, which election shall be conducted in the following manner:—The House of Bishops shall present to the Lower House one or more names for election by ballot, and if none of these names shall be accepted by the Lower House, further names shall be presented by the Upper House until it shall signify that it has no other name to present. All names presented to the Lower House shall be before it for election until an election shall have been made. A majority of votes, Clerical and Lay, shall be necessary to an election.
- 2. In case a Missionary Bishop shall be appointed in the manner hereinbefore mentioned, over a District which includes or consists of a part or parts of one or more existing Diocese, the Missionary Bishop shall exercise no jurisdiction over any such part or parts of any such other Diocese or Dioceses, until the Synod or Synods of the Diocese or Dioceses affected

shall have consented to his so doing; and it shall be the duty of such Synod or Synods to consider without delay any such proposal.

- 3. The Bishop elected as aforesaid shall exercise his Episcopal functions in such Missionary District in conformity with the Constitution and Canons of this Province, so far as they can be made applicable to the condition of his District.
- 4. Every Missionary Bishop shall be entitled to a seat in the House of Bishops, and shall report to the Metropolitan, for the information of the Provincial Synod, at every meeting of the Synod, concerning the state and condition of the Church in his Missionary District.
- 5. In the event of a vacancy occurring in any Missionary Diocese, the Provincial Synod shall be summoned within six months to elect another Missionary Bishop; provided the regular meeting of the Provincial Synod shall not take place within twelve months after such vacancy, in which case the election shall be postponed until such regular meeting; and in the meantime the duties of the late Bishop shall devolve, so far as they can be discharged by him, on a Commissary, whom it shall be the duty of every Missionary Bishop to appoint at his consecration, and from time to time as the office shall become vacant.
- 6. Nothing contained in the first clause of this Canon shall prevent the election of a Missionary Bishop at this session of the Synod, or at any adjourned session of the same.
- 7. Any Diocese of the Province may, if it desires so to do, separate and set apart any portion of its Territory as a District suitable for the establishment therein of a Missionary Bishopric; and such Territory to set apart may become a Missionary Diocese, and a Bishop appointed thereto in accordance with the foregoing Canon.

#### CANON XII.

## FOR ALTERING THE ORDER OF THE PUBLIC SERVICE OF THE CHURCH IN CERTAIN CASES.

Whereas the Convocations of Canterbury and York did introduce certain modifications into the order of the Public Service of the Church; and whereas the Imperial Parliament did by Act 35 and 36 Vic., Cap. 35, sanction and authorize the same as amendments to the Act of Uniformity; and whereas it is expedient to extend such modifications to this Ecclesiastical Province;

Be it, therefore, enacted as follows:

Use of Shortened Form of Morning and Evening Prayer.

The shortened Order for Morning Prayer, or for Evening Prayer, specified in the schedule of this Canon, may on any day except Sunday, Christmas Day, Circumcision, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and Ascension Day, be used in lieu of the Order for Morning or for Even-

Evening Prayer, except Sunday, ay, Good Friday ing or for Evening Prayer respectively prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer. Amended as follows, 1877:—Inasmuch as liberty is given by Canon XII, for any clergyman in this Province to use a shortened form of Morning and Evening Prayer on ordinary days. Resolved,—That similar permissive modifications in the Order of the Public Service of the Church shall be considered to extend also to Sundays and Holy Days, when the clergyman shall deem it desirable, either from the peculiar condition of his congregation or from the labourious nature of his ministrations. Such liberty, however, shall not be used without the written saction and approval of the Bishop in every several case.

## Special Service for Special Occasions.

Upon any special occasion approved by the Ordinary there may be used in any Cathedral or Church a special form of service approved by the Ordinary, so that there be not introduced into such service anything, except anthems or hymns, which does not form part of the Holy Scriptures or Book of Common Prayer.

## Additional Service on Sundays or Holidays.

An additional form of service, varied from any form prescribed by the Book of Common Prayer, may be used at any hour, on any Sunday or Holy-day, in any Cathedral or Church in which there are duly read, said, or sung as required by law, on such Sunday or Holiday, at some other hour or hours, the Order for Morning Prayer, the Litany, such part of the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion as is required to be read on Sundays or Holy Days if there be no Communion, and the Order for Evening Prayer, so that there be not introduced into such additional service any portion of the Order for Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, or any thing except anthems or hymns, which does not form part of the Holy Scriptures or Book of Common Prayer, and so that such form of service and the mode in which it is used, is, for the time being, approved by the Ordinary.

### Separation of Services.

Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether the followings forms of service, that is to say: The Order for Morning Prayer, the Litany and the Order for the Administration of the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion, may be used as separate services, and it is expedient to remove such doubts: Be it, therefore, enacted and declared that any of such forms of service may be used together, or in varying order as separate services, or that the Litany may be said atter the third Collect in the Order for Evening prayer, either in lieu of or in addition to the use of the Litany in the Order for Morning Prayer, and any of the said forms of service may be used with or without the preaching of a sermon or lecture, or the reading of a homily.

## Preaching a Sermon without Previous Service.

Whereas doubts have arisen as to whether a sermon or lecture may be preached without the common prayers and services appointed by the Book

of Common Prayer for the time of day being previously read, and it is expedient to remove such doubts: Be it, therefore, enacted and declared that a sermon or lecture may be preached without the common prayers or services appointed by the Book of Common Prayers being read before it is preached, so that such sermon or lecture be preceded by any service authorized by this Canon, or by the Bidding Prayer, or a collect taken from the Book of Common Prayer, with or without the Lord's Prayer.

#### Schedule

NOTE.—The Minister using the Shortened Order for Morning Prayer or for Evening Prayer in the Schedule may, in his discretion add in its proper place any exhortation, prayer, canticle, hymn, psalm, or lesson contained in the Order for Morning Prayer or for Evening Prayer in the Book of Common Prayer, and omitted, or authorized to be omitted, from such shortened order.

Nevertheless, any alteration in or addition made to the Prayer Book or Articles by the Church of England in her convocations, and authorized by Parliament, may be accepted for use in this Ecclesiastical Province by the Provincial Synod at one session only, without the necessity for further confirmation.

#### CANON XIV

## OF THE OATHS AND SUBSCRIPTION OF THE CLERGY.

Every person about to be ordained Priest or Deacon shall, before ordination, in the presence of the Bishop by whom he is to be ordained, and every person about to be licensed to any Curacy, or to be instituted to any benefice, shall, before obtaining such license or being so instituted, make and subscribe the following declarations and take the following oaths:

- 1. The "Declaration of Assent" so called:
- "I, (A. B.,) do solemnly make the following declaration:

I assent to the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion and to the Book of Common Prayer, and of the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons, I believe the doctrine of the Church of England as therein set forth to be agreeable to the Word of God, and in Public Prayers and administration of the Sacraments I will use the form in the said Book prescribed, and none other, except so far as shall be ordered by lawful authority."

- 2. The declaration of Submission to the Canons of the Provincial and Diocesan Synods as required by Canon II of the Canons of this Ecclesiastical Province in the following terms:
- "I, (A. B.,) do willingly subscribe to and declare that I assent to and abide by the Canons which have been, or shall be, from time to time, passed by the Provincial Synod, or the Synod of the Diocese of....."
  - 3. The Oath of Allegiance :
- "I, (A. B.,) do swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Victoria, her heirs and successors, according to law.
  - 4. The Oath of Canonical obedience:
- "I, (A. B.,) do swear that I will pay true and Canonical obedience to the Lord Bishop of . . . . . and his successors in all legal and honest commands. So help me God . . . . . . "

Before institution to any Benefice, the persons to be instituted shall also subscribe the following "Declaration against Simony":

"I, (A. B.) solemnly declare that I have not made by myself or by any other person any payment, contract, or promise of any kind whatsoever, which, to the best of my knowledge or belief, is simonical touching or concerning the obtaining the preferment of (......), nor will I at any time hereafter perform or satisfy, in whole or in part, any such kind of payment, contract or promise made by any other without my knowledge or consent."

#### CANON XV.

## OF THE CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.

- 1. Whenever an election is made by any Diocesan Synod within the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada of a person to fill the office of Bishop, the chairman, or in the case of his death, incapacity, absence, or refusal, clerical secretary of the said Synod shall transmit a certificate of such election to the Metropolitan within seven days after the election.
  - 2. Such certificate shall be in the following form :-

Signed, on behalf of the Synod,

- 3. On receipt of this Certificate, the Metropolitan shall, within seven days, send formal notice of such election to all the Bishops within his Ecclesiastical Province.
- 4. Should any of the said Bishops desire to object to the consecration of the person so elected, on the ground of canonical disability, as hereinafter defined, he shall make the objection in writing, delivered to the Metropolitan within fourteen days from the date of said notification to him of such election, setting forth the special grounds of his objection.
- 5. On the receipt of such objection in writing by the Metropolitan, or in case the Metropolitan himself object to such consecration, he shall summon the House of Bishops to meet within one month, to consider such objection, giving not less than fourteen days' notice of the time and place of meeting; it shall be the duty of every Bishop so summoned to attend unless be be

excused for reasonable cause to be approved by the Metropolitan; and the Metropolitan shall send by post a true copy of such objections to the person so elected, at least twenty-one days previous to the meeting referred to in-this section, and shall also notify him of the time and place of meeting.

- 6. The House of Bishops, having heard the person so elected, or having given him every reasonable facility for appearing before them in person, or by counsel, or by proxy, if he be so minded, as well as the Diocesan Synod by its representative duly appointed, if the said Diocesan Synod shall express its desire to be so heard; and, having heard the reasons in support of the said objection, shall decide as to its validity or otherwise, and their decision, with the reasons therefor, shall be communicated in writing without delay to the person so elected, and to the Secretary of the Synod which elected him.
- 7. Thereupon if the majority of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province determine that the objection is canonical and has been sustained, the Synod of the Diocese aforesaid shall proceed to the election of another person to fill the office of Bishop.
- 8. Should no such objection be made within the period specified, or after objection made, should the same not be sustained by the majority of the Bishops as aforesaid, the Metropolitan shall, with all convenient speed, proceed to the consecration of the said person so elected, and to that end shall summon two or more of the Bishops of this Ecclesiastical Province to assist him in such consecration; and it shall be the duty of such Bishops to attend at such time and place as he, the Metropolitan shall appoint, and to assist in the consecration of the said person elected.
- 9. Before proceeding to consecrate, the Meteopolitan shall cause to be read publicly in the church, where the consecration is held, a duly attested certificate of the election of said person to the office of Bishop, and that no Canonical impediment to his consecration exists, which shall thereupon be given in for record.
- 10. No Bishop who shall have made any Canonical objection as aforesaid, or who shall have voted in favor of such objection, shall be required to take part in such consecration, and if the Metropolitan shall have made such objection, the Senior Bishop of the Ecclesiastical Province not having so objected or so voted, shall perform the duties of the Metropolitan referred to in section 8 of this Canon.
- 11. The following objections shall be considered canonical and none others:—
  - 1. That the person elected is not fully thirty years of age.
- 2. That he is not a Priest in Holy Orders of the Church of England, or of some Branch of the Church in full communion therewith.
  - 3. That he is deficient in fearning.

- 12. The Bishop elect, shall, previous to his consecration, or if already a Bishop previous to his installation subscribe a declaration of submission to the canons of the Provincial Synod in the form prescribed by Canon II.
- 13. If a person shall be elected Bishop of a vacant Diocese, who has been previously consecrated Bishop of the Church of England, or of any Branch of the Church in full communion therewith, the said election shall be notified to the Metropolitan as hereinbefore provided, and the Metropolitan shall proceed, as in the case of the election of a person in Priests' Orders, except that when no canonical objection has been received within the period limited for entering such objections, or when such objections shall have been heard and rejected by the House of Bishops, the Metropolitan, instead of proceeding to the consecration, shall issue a certificate to the Bishop so elected, and to the Secretaries of the electing Synod, that there is no canonical impediment to the installation of the said Bishop.
- 14. In all cases when the Bishop elected has been duly consecrated, or a certificate has been furnished by the Metropolitan, as before provided, the said Metropolitan shall, either by himself or by some person duly commissioned to act on his behalf, formally instal the said Bishop elect, inducting him into the actual possession of his See.
- 15. In case there shall be no Metropolitan, or in case he shall be incapable of performing the duty in this Canon assigned to the Metropolitan, this duty shall be performed by the Senior Bishop of the Province, and in case of his absence or incapacity, by the next in seniority and so forth.
- 16. A majority of the Bishops of this Ecclesiastical Province shall constitute a quorum for the hearing of objections to the consecration of a person elected to the office of Bishop.

The House of Bishops, at the last session of the Synod, in 1877, adopted the following Forms for the consecration of Churches, etc., etc., but by resolution of the Lower House their consideration was deferred until next session.

## FORMS OF CONSECRATION, &c.

The Bishop shall be received at the door of the church by the Clergy (wearing surplices) the Church Wardens, and others. The following petition, signed by the Incumbent, Church Wardens and others, shall be read and presented to the Bishop;

To the Right Reverend——Bishop of—

We, the Incumbent, Church Wardens, and other inhabitants of—having acquired a piece of land, more particularly described in a deed

between—and—duly registered according to law—on the day of—in the year of—and having built thereon a new church; which we certify to be free from any legal incumbrance, do humbly pray your Lordship, by your ordinary and Episcopal authority, to separate the same from all profane and common uses, and to consecrate the said church, and set it apart forever for the worship of God, according to the Rites and Discipline of the Church of England in Canada.

## CONSECRATION OF A CHURCH OR CHAPEL.

The Bishop, accepting the Petition, shall answer and consent, saying,

Brethren, if this be your desire, and the desire of the Parishioners, we will now proceed to the act of consecration.

## ORDER FOR THE CONSECRATION OF CHURCHYARDS OR CEMETERIES.

## 1.—CONSECRATION OF A CHURCHYARD, TOGETHER WITH A CHURCH.

Before or after Service in the Church, the Bishop, Clergy, and the people, shall walk round the portion of ground which is to be consecrated; and the Bishop standing in some convenient place, shall say the following Prayers:

O God, who hast taught us in thy holy Word that there is a difference between the spirit of a beast, that goeth downward to the earth, and the spirit of a man, which ascendeth up to God who gave it: And likewise by the example of thy holy servants in all egs, hast taught us to assign peculiar places, where the bodies of thy saints may rest in peace, and be preserved from all indignities, whilst their souls are safely kept in the hands of their faithful Redeemer; Accept, we beseech thee, this charitable work of ours in separating this portion of ground to that purpose; and give us grace, that by the frequent instances of mortality which we behold, we may seriously consider how frail and uncertain our own condition is, and may so number our days as to apply our hearts unto wisdom; That in the midst of life, thinking upon death, and daily preparing ourselves for the judgment that is to follow, we may have our part in the resurrection to eternal life, with him who died for our sins and rose again for our justification, and now liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

## FORM OF SERVICE WHICH MAY BE USED AT THE INDUCTION OF MINISTERS TO THEIR CURES.

The Congregation being assembled in the Church, the Bishop or some Priest authorized by him shall say:

"Brathern, we are here assembled together to induct the Reverend [A. B.] as Rector (or Incumbent or Missionary) of this Parish; he having been already instituted by the Bishop to the cure of souls."

The Minister to be inducted shall here read aloud the declaration of assent enjoined by Canon Second of this Province, signed by himself.

The Mandate of induction shall then be read, and one of the persons to whom it has been addressed shall say:—

"In the name and on behalf of this Parish, and in obedience to the Mandate of the Lord Bishop of this Diocese, we do now induct you into the real, actual and corporal possession of the Incumbency of the said Parish, and of all the rights, privileges and emoluments thereto pertaining.

And in token thereof, we give into you hands the keys of this Church."

(N. B. The above is intended to apply to Rectories; but in the case of Missions or Parishes not legally constituted, it shall suffice to produce Letters of Institution or a License from the Bishop, which shall be read; and one of the Church-Wardens shall then present the keys to the Minister.)

Minister.—I receive these keys of this House of God at your hands, as the pledges of my Induction and of your reception of me as your appointed Minister. And I on my part do promise by God's help to be a faithful shepherd over you in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

## The Metropolitan's Opening Address.

RIGHT REVEREND AND REVEREND BRETHREN, AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY:

When I look around me at this imposing and influential Assembly, and compare it with that which met here in solemn conclave sixteen years ago, I feel very thankful for the marvellous progress which our Church has made in these past years. The Provincial Synod was as yet in its infancy; and it then met to organize, to frame rules for self government, and to form a constitution in accordance with Apostolic precedent, but adapted to the existing age and to local circumstances. We were like men at the ocean brink, surveying the future with deep interest, but cautious as to each step we were taking, whilst confident in the unerring chart by which our course was steered. To-day, however, the Synod meets in its completeness, full of hope and expectation, having learnt experience by the trials which it has passed through: the goodness of God by the generous support which He has vouchsafed; and mutual confidence by the exercise of brotherly feelings towards one another.

Thanks to him who then filled this chair so wisely, so patiently, and with such consummate tact, there is little left for me to do but to follow in his track, and to endeavor, however imperfectly, to carry out the broad principles which he laid down; and little for you to do but to put in action that machinery which was then constructed. But let us not suppose that we meet to-day with all our perils past, or with one whit the less need of Divine guidance than we had in those earlier times. We need it as much as ever, and God is as ready to bestow it.

Since we last met, another Diocese has been added to our Body, and there has been a consequent increase in our numbers. Indeed during my own short experience of eight years the numerical dimensions of our Province have nearly doubled, having increased from five to nine Dioceses.

The work on which we are now about to enter is a most important one. May the Holy Spirit of God be vouchsafed to each and all of us, giving us that sobriety of judgment, and that wisdom and gentleness of speech, which we need in considering the many important questions which will be brought before us.

As to the subjects which will come under view in the present session, there is one, and that of some importance, which occupied much of our attention three years ago. In treating this subject I carnestly trust that

resent session, much of our tly trust that not only learning and skill may be shone as before, but also a spirit of moderation, and a desire to meet the objections of those who are conscientiously opposed to an unconditional Canon. It will be well to consider calmly and dispassionately what are the historic precedents, as also the practice of our Mether Church in England, so far as that practice shall accord with our entire independence of state intervention. It claims your gravest consideration as affecting the liberty of action both of the Bishops and Members of our Communion,—we on our part, desiring nothing more than legitimate protection from the possibility of having an unfit person forced upon us for Consecration; and you on your part, guarding your respective Synods against any undue interference with their acknowledged right of election.

As to the future of our Church, and of the special branch of it comprised within this Province, I believe that God is with her, blessing her, prospering her, and enlarging her influence. I am very thankful that we are spared those painful scenes which have of late disfigured the fair peace of the Church in other lands. We have our ecclesiastical laws; and those laws are respected. There are, and ever will be, differences of epinion among us; but God grant that love and harmony, zeal and earnestness, may be the stability of our times; and whilst we are valiant for the truth may we be ever closing our ranks, and be found fighting side by side, as those who have one common aim and object in view!

The last meeting of this Synod was marked by the welcome presence of one of our most eminent English Bishops; at our present meeting we shall have the no less welcome presence of several honored and beloved Brethren deputed by our Sister Church in the United States. This will add both dignity and interest to our present gathering. May I not bid them a hearty welcome among us in your name? And as President of this Synod I may perhaps be allowed to express the feelings of the Lower House, as well as of my Right Reverend Brethren of the Upper House, if I now in your name invite the distinguished members of the Delegation from the General Convention to take their seats with us on this platform.

It only remains for me to commend your Deliberations, and your several Synodical acts, to the over-ruling guidance of God, in the earnest hope that they may greatly conduce to the increase and prosperity of the Kingdom of His dear Son.

The Metropolitan's Closing Address.

## Report

"REVEREND BRETHERN, AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY :---

"In closing this Session of our Provincial Synod, I have great pleasure in congratulating you on the singularly peaceful and harmonieus spirit which has prevailed during the past daysof our meeting together. This Session will be especially marked by the introduction of a very important Canon which has been submitted to our deliberation; and, although the subject was one of considerable delicacy, and beset with some difficulties, I rejoice to think that it has called out such an amount of good will and unanimity, as rarely characterize so large an assembly.

- 10. The Adoption of an Amendment of Canon XII.
- 11. The Adoption of an Amendment of Article 28 of the Constitution
- 12. The concurrence of both Houses in the appointment of St. Andrew's Day, or any following day as a Day of Intercession for Missions.
- "I earnestly pray that, as you go back to your respective Dioceses, you may be animated by the same spirit of Brotherly love, and also by a desire to throw yourselves with increased heartiness into the blessed work of Christ, and of His Church.
  - "Brethern, may God's presence and blessing be with you!

## Report of the Missionary Bishop of Algoma.

To the Most Reverend the Lord Bishop of Montreal, Metropolitan, and the House of Bishops in Synod Assembled:

My Lord,—In presenting my Report, as required by Canon XI. of the Provincial Synod, I would first acknowledge with heartfelt gratitude the protection which a merciful Providence has exercised over me during the period that has elapsed since my last report was presented.

In my continuous journeyings by land and water, I have not only been most wonderfully preserved from any serious accident, such as travellers, in a new country like that in which my lot has been cast, usually meet with; but I have also enjoyed such a measure of health, as to be able to attend to my duties, and in almost every instance to keep my appointments. This great mercy vouchsafed, during a period of three years, surely calls for grateful acknowledgment.

As to the object of a report such as this is, that information may be given to the Provincial Synod concerning the state and condition of the Church in my Missionary District, this object will, it seems to me, be best secured by drawing a comparative statement between its present position and that in which I found it, on first taking charge in September, 1873.

### AS REGARDS THE NUMBER OF CLERGYMEN.

I.—On taking charge of the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, I fould seven Clergymen laboring within its limits, of whom four were in priest's orders, and three deacons. There are now nine, seven priests and two deacons. Of these, five are ministering in the Muskoka and Parry Sound Free Grant Districts, one at the Sault Ste. Marie and one at Prince Arthur's Landing, whilst the other two, aided by paid school teachers and cathecists, are laboring amongst the Indians on the Great Manitoulin, and at Garden River.

### LAY READERS.

II.—In addition to this little staff, I have no less than sixteen Lay Helpers, who, without any renumeration from the Diocesan Fund, are holding service every Lord's Day for congregations averaging from twenty to forty souls, thus fostering the Church where she must otherwise die out, and forming the nuclei of what will, I trust, at no very distant day, prove to be her strongholds.

### CHURCHES AND CHURCH BUILDINGS.

III.—Whereas, at the time of my appointment, there were only nine Churches, of which four were in a very unfinished state, and more or less encumbered with debt, I am able now to report eleven churches, complete

an. esident. and entirely free of debt; and no less than six church buildings finished and paid for, with four more in course of erection, on sites which have been secured to the Church,—which, when the several congregations worshipping therein are in a position to put up buildings more deserving the name of churches, will answer for Sunday School, lecturing and other purposes connected with the Church's work and interests.

In a new country like Algoma, it is, in my opinion, very important to have places wherein to conduct Divine service, even by Lay Agency; and I have, therefore, encouraged our members to put up buildings, though ever so lowly, which shall be kept separate from all common and profane uses, where they may meet together for the express purpose of worshipping their God and Saviour, and so doing, teach, as well as practice a lesson in reverence and sacred awe, which cannot well be taught in any other way. this work, which, I trust, under the Divine blessing, may prove an effectual preparing of the fallow ground for earnest workers, who shall come to help, or follow after me, I have been greatly aided by the noble Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, with grants of £10 stg. and upwards, towards such buildings, on the condition that the expenditure of the same shall complete or, at least, make them fit for holding service in. These conditional grants have stimulated and encouraged our members to give their time and labor (money they have not), to put up their Church buildings, which, to use the words of a brother Missionary Bishop of the Sister Church in the United States, "bear silent, but most eloquent testimony against the religious communism of the age.'

### SEE-HOUSE AND PARSONAGES.

IV.—The commodious and substantially built See House, for which a lady in England has so liberally provided the whole funds, is so far complete as to be fit for occupation; and its use has added very materially to my comfort during that portion of each year, when not being engaged in raising the funds necessary for the support of my clergy and the carrying on of my work, I am able to reside within the limits of my Diocese. The See House, which is built of red and white sandstone, is beautifully situated near the St. Marie River, on a site of three and a half acres, donated to the Diocese by Wemyss Simpson, Esq. And whereas there was not at the time of my appointment a single parsonage in the Diocese, there are now four, of which three have been built on sites deeded to the Church, whilst the fourth is in the hands of Trustees.

### INDIAN MISSIONS.

V.—As regards the interests of the red man, these have been attended to, as they were, previous to the setting off of this missionary diocese, but owing to want of funds and proper persons to engage in the work, no increase of missions among them can be reported.

I am thankful, however, to be able to bear my testimony to the successful development of the Shingwauk and Wawanosh Industrial Homes for Indian boys and girls, under the able management of the Rev. E. F. Wilson.

WilThe Shingwauk Home is now in thorough working order, with an attendance of forty boys, which might be largely increased, as there is accommodation for seventy, and there are boys waiting to be received, if only the funds necessary for their maintenance, clothing, &c., were forthcoming.

The Wawanosh Home for girls, which is to be under the charge and direction of a committee of ladies, is growing into existence under very favorable auspices, and it is hoped that a portion of the new building will be ready to receive the Lady Superintendent, who is in readiness to begin her work with ten girls early in October next. I look upon these institutions as most important and valuable instrumentalities for amelioration the condition of the Indians in these parts; since, if it be for the advantage of the red men that they should give up the roaming habits of their forefathers and acquire the habits of industry which are peculiar to civilized life, this can only be affected by training up the children and forming their habits of life,—by teaching them and instructing them, ere other habits are formed, in useful trades and agricultural pursuits, and gradually weaning them from their wild and idle ways.

Amongst other objects contemplated in the Shingwauk Home is the training and educating promising Indian youths as missionaries and teachers, as it is thought that they, when properly prepared, will be able to live with their red brethren, and work more effectually amongst them, both for evangelization and civilization, than white men can be expected to do At the present time there is one very interesting and intelligent young Indian, 21 years of age, who is being prepared for this work, whilst two others have expressed a wish to devote themselves to the work of teaching.

These are the objects which the Rev. E. F. Wilson has in view, and is, under the Divine blessing, accomplishing; and I rejoice to know that it is in the missionary diocese of Algoma that this truly missionary work, which is so eminently a work of faith, is being carried on with very encouraging prospects of success.

With reference to the evangelization of the Indians in the Lake Superior District, many of whom, to our shame as a Missionary Church, be it said, are still in pagan darkness, without any settled homes, but roaming continually from place to place, as the means of obtaining food present themselves, it seems to me that the only effectual method of reaching them must be through a native pastorate, who may be sent to live with them, and among them, following them as they move from one camping ground to another, and gradually instilling those religious truths and principles of civilized Christian life, which will, it is to be hoped, after a time, exercise a wholesome influence over them, and gradually affect their whole manner of living.

It is, however, to the two institutions already referred to, that I look, under the Divine blesing, for the effectual carrying on of the great work that still remains to be done for the Master in this portion of His vine-yard; and I would earnestly appeal to the members, the Church, and, indeed, to all Canadians, irrespective of creed or opinion, to help

on the same with alms and prayers, seeing that all owe a heavy debt to the red man, of whose fine country we have taken possession; and should feel bound to put him in the way of obtaining an honest living in a land which no longer affords him his natural means of support.

### FINANCES.

Whilst it may, I think, be said that something has, under God's blessing been done towards supplying the spiritual necessities of our members. and also that some material progress has been attained, I would remind your Lordship and the Provincial Synod, and the Church at large through you, that much, very much more still remains to be done for the Missionary Diocese of Algoma. It must be borne in mind that it will be an increasing work, and will require continually increasing aid and support from those who have been instrumental in setting it off as a missionary district, since the members of the Church residing within its limits are, for the most part, struggling under the difficulties which invariably attend the early settlement of a new country, and but little able to support the ministrations of religion amongst themselves. Whilst thankfully acknowledging the measure of support given to my diocese by the members of the Church throughout this Ecclesiastical Province, and the kindly welcome extended to myself, both by Clergy and Laity, as I have gone from place to place to obtain it, I must, at the same time, refer to the very unsatisfactory, because so very precarious, position of our means of support, and most respectfully request that steps may be taken to improve it, so that I may be relieved from the anxiety consequent upon the painful uncertainty which, at present, exists with reference to the support of my little staff of co-workers, who look to me for the punctual payment of their stipends.

It certainly surprised me to learn, as I did shortly after being called. by the Provincial Synod, to my new sphere of duty, that not only had no provision been made for carrying on mission work in the Missionary Diocese, which had so lately been set apart, but that it was to be my business to collect whatever funds might be required for that purpose. I would now ask whether this is still to continue; and whether the collecting of funds from without for carrying on work within his Diocese is still to be the chief business of the Missionary Bishop of Algoma. For myself, I am ready, as in the past, so for the future, if needs be, "to spend and be spent" in this or any other work that may conduce to the interests of the Church in my Diocese; but I would suggest that if some definite amount could be guaranteed, either by the Provincial Synod or by the Synods of each of the eight organized Dioceses which constitute the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, for mission work in Algema, the position of your Missionary Diocese would be better assured; and its Bishop would be relieved of a load of anxious care, which would leave him proportionately free to attend more entirely to the weightier and daily increasing duties of his office.

Whether this can be best effected by the formation of a Board of Foreign Missions in connection with this Ecclesiastical Province, acting through and under control of the Provincial Synod; or by a specific grant from each ot to the ould feel ad which

Diocese, or in some other way, such, for instance, as by appointing a paid collector, whose duty it shall be periodically to canvass the whole Ecclesiastical Province, I leave it with your Lordship and the Provincial Synod to decide.

Appended is a statement of all moneys received for missionary purposes in Algoma since my last report was rendered in September, 1877.

### ENGLISH SOCIETIES.

VIII.—I desire here, whilst upon the subject of finance, gratefully to acknowledge the liberal aid given by the Colonial and Continental Church Society; it having granted the sum of £270 sterling per annum since the formation of the Diocese, towards the support of three missionaries, and a catechist to the Indians.

Also the kind and liberal response made by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, to all my applications both for money grants to aid in building churches, and also for grants of books.

I would also state that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts has, in answer to an application made in April last, kindly made a grant of £100 sterling for the year ending December 21st, 1878, to "help to pay the salaries of two missionaries."

Before concluding this somewhat lengthy report, I must beg respectfully to repeat the request made in my last report, in behalf of Clergymen coming to us from other Dioceses, that some arrangement may be made to secure to them, on certain conditions, the privilege of retaining their claim upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and also the Surplus Commutation Fund of the Diocese in which they may have been laboring previous to entering the Missionary Diocese of Algoma.

It must, doubtless, prove a great hindrance to any Clergyman who may feel inclined to enter this mission field to find that, in addition to "enduring hardness" such as he might escape whilst remaining in more settled and civilized parts, he must at the very outset forego privileges which are secured to him so long as he remains in an organized diocese.

If the Church in Canada, as represented by the Provincial Synod, was in earnest to do the Master's work when setting off the Missionary Diocese of Algoma, it ought to provide against penalties such as now exist, since they tend materially to check and discourage the very first promptings in the hearts of clergymen who may be willing to enter and labour in this her tegitimate mission field.

Surely it is not too much to ask that the Synods of several dioceses, which took part in setting off the Diocese of Algoma, should allow those of their Clergy who may be ready and willing to labor, therein for the good of souls, to retain their claim upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, in behalf of which they may have labored for many years, by paying the annual subscription, which would have been required of them if they had remained within

its limits, foregoing all other conditions in favor of the infant diocese, which they have been instrumental in bringing into existence.

Then as regards the Surplus Commutation Fund, it cannot, taking a vathotic view of the question, be thought too much to ask that a clergy-man leaving any other diocese for that of Algoma should be recognized as still laboring for the diocese to which he formerly belonged, and be held entitled to the same privilege and claim upon the surplus commutation as if he were still living within its limits.

MEDLEY, THE MOST REVEREND JOHN D.D., BISHOP OF FREDERICTON, AND. METROPOLITAN OF CANADA, born in London, E., 1804. In 1826, graduated B.A., in honors, at Wadham College, Oxford. He was admitted to Deacon's Orders in 1828, and Priest's the following year, by the Right Reverend the Bishop of Exeter, in Exeter Cathedral. Was for several years Vicar of St. Thomas's, Exeter, and Prebendary of Exeter Cathedral. On New Brunswick being erected into an independent Diocese, Dr. Medley was nominated by the Crown as first Bishop, under the title of Bishop of Fredericton, and in 1845 was Consecrated in Lambeth Chapel by the Most Reverend Archbishop Howley, assisted by the Bishops of Oxford, Lincoln, Winchester and London. Bishop Medley exercised his Episcopal authority for the first time in advancing two Deacons to the Priesthood. He has published "The Episcopal form of Church Government, its Antiquity, &c."; "The Reformation, its Nature, its Necessity, its Benefit": "Sermon Preached before H. R. H. the Prince of Wales on His Visit to Fredericton, 1860, Christ Church Cathedral"; and several other volumes of sermons. The Metropolitical See has hitherto been attached to the See of Montreal, letters patent having been issued in 1860 promoting Dr. Fulford to that office; but, by resolution of the Provincial Synod, (Canon I.), it is provided that the Bishop of Montreal shall not, henceforth, by virtue of his Office as such be Metropolitan of Canada. In consequence, therefore, of the resignation of the late Metropolitan, Bishop of Montreal, 1st July, 1878, two elections became necessary, a Bishop of Montreal, by the Diocese, and a Metropolitan, by the House of Bishops. By the unanimous voice of the latter, Dr. Medley was chosen for this important and responsible office, and is the first Metropolitan of Canada that has been appointed by the Canadian Church, independent of any reference to the Church in England or the Crown. Dr. Medley is one of the most energetic and hard-working Bishops that the Mother Church has ever sent to her Colonial Dioceses, and the See over which he presides is one of the most important and extensive in our Ecclesiastical Province, comprising, as it does, the whole of the Province of New Brunswick. Dr. Medley has been engaged in the active work of his Diocese for a continuous period of thirty-four years.

BINNEY, THE RIGHT REVEREND HIBBERT, D. D., BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA, Son of the Reverend Dr. Binney, Rectory of Newbury, Berks. Born in Nova Scotia, 1819. Educated in England; studied for some time at King's College, London. Subsequently he became Scholar and Fellow of Worcester College, Oxford, where he graduated in 1842 in Classical and Mathematical honours. Ordained Deacon in 1842; Priest, 1843. Was

appointed Tutor of his College in 1846 and Bursar 1848. In 1851 was nominated to the vacant See of Nova Scotia, and on the 25th of March of the same year was Consecrated in Lambeth Chapel by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Oxford and Chichester. Bishop Binney's first exercise of the Episcopal office was an Ordination, in which six candidates were admitted to the Diaconate, and one to the Priesthood. Married in 1855, Mary, daughter of the Honoroble W. B. Bliss, first Puisne Judge of Nova Scotia.

HILLS, THE RIGHT REVEREND GEORGE, D.D., BISHOP OF BRITISH COLUMBIA, eldest son of the late Rear-Admiral Hills, born at Egthorne, Kent, England, 1816. Was educated at the University of Durham, where he graduated B.A. and M.A., subsequently taking the Degree of B.D., and in due course that of D.D. Was ordained Deacon in 1839, at S. James' Church, Piccadilly, by the Right Reverend Dr. Bowstead, Bishop of Lichfield, and Priest by the Right Reverend Dr. Maltby, Bishop of Durham, at Auckland, Durham. Was successively Curate of North Shields, Northumberland; Lecturer and Curate of Leeds Parish Church; Incumbent of S. Mary's, Leeds; Incumbent of Great Yarmouth, Norfolk; and in 1850 appointed Honorary Canon of Norwich Cathedral. On British Columbia being created a Bishopric in 1859, Dr. Hills was nominated by the Crown as first Bishop; and on St. Mathias day of the same year was Consecrated in Westminister Abbey by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Oxford, Norwich, Newfoundland and Western New York. His first ordination was held in S. John's Church, Victoria, when the Rev. John Chittenden was advanced to the Priesthoood. Dr. Hills married in 1865, Maria Philadelphia Louisa, eldest danghter of Admiral Sir Richard King, Bart, K. C. B.

LEWIS, THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN TRAVERS, M.A., D.D., LL.D., BISHOP OF ONTARIO, son of the Rev. John Lewis, M.A., Curate of S. Anne's, Shandon, Cork. Born at Garrycloyne Castle, County Cork, 1825. Educated at Hamblin and Porter's School, Cork, and at Trinity College, Dublin, where, after a very distinguished career, he graduated in 1846, as Senior Moderator in Ethics and Logic, and with honors in Classics and Mathematics; was also Gold Medalist. Was admitted to Holy Orders in 1849, and appointed to the Curacy of Newton-Butler, Diocese of Clogher. Came to Canada in 1850, and received from the Bishop of Toronto the Parochial charge of Hawkesbury, which he subsequently exchanged for the Rectory of Brockville. In 1856 he received the degree of LL.D. (causâ honoris) from the University of Dublin, and later that of B.D. and D.D. It having become necessary to divide the Diocese of Toronto, Dr. Lewis was chosen, in 1862, as first Bishop of the new See, with the title of Bishop of Ontario, and the same year received Consecration. Married in 1851, Anne Henrietta Margaret, daughter of the Honorable Henry Sherwood, At. torney-General of Upper Canada. Has written "The Church of the New Testament," "Does the Bible need Re-translating?" published in the American Quarterly Church Review ; "The Primitive mode of Electing Bishops," published in the Journal of Sacred Literature, London, and several other articles.

The following year was admitted to Deacon's Orders by the Lord Bishop of Oxford, and in 1856 to Priest's Orders by the Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells. After filling various Curacies in England, came to Canada, and in 1857 was appointed Rector of the Grammar School in connection with Bishop's College, Lennoxville, holding at the same time the Classical Professorship of that College. On the death of the Right Reverend G. J. Mountain, D.D., Dr. Williams was appointed by Synod to the vacant See, and on S. Barnabas Day, 1863, was Consecrated at Quebec by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Toronto, Ontario, Huron and Vermont. The new Bishop's first Episcopal act was the advancing three Deacons to the Priesthood.

MACHRAY, THE MOST REVEREND ROBERT, D.D., LL.D., BISHOP OF RUPERT'S LAND, AND METROPOLITAN, SON of Robert Machray, Esq., M.A., Advocate. Born at Aberdeen, Scotland, 1832. Educated first at King's College, University of Aberdeen, where he graduated M. A. in 1851, and afterwards at Sydney College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A. 1855, with Mathematical honors, proceeding in due course to M.A. and D.D. Elected Foundation Fellow of Sydney College, 1855, and the same year was advanced to Deacon's Orders by the Lord Bishop of Ely, and by the same Prelate to Priest's Orders the year following. Elected Dean of his College in 1858, University Examiner in 1860-61, and Ramsden University Preacher in 1865. Was Vicar of Modingley, near Cambridge, for several years previous to his elevation to the Episcopate. In 1865, having been nominated by the Crown to the Bishopric of Rupert's Land, he was Consecrated at Lambeth by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London Ely, and Aberdeen, and by the Right Reverend David Anderson, D.D., formerly Bishop of Rupert's Land. new Bishop's first exercise of his Episcopal office was in holding an Ordination for the Bishop of London, ordaining as Priest the Reverend W. C. Bompas, now Bishop of Athabasca, in the North-West. In 1874, on the sub-division of the Diocese, Dr. Machray was chosen Metropolitan, under the Primacy of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

HELLMUTH, The RIGHT REVEREND ISAAC, D.D., LL.D., BISHOP OF HURON, was born in Poland, 1817, and is of Jewish extraction. Educated at the University of Breslau. In 1841 he made a public profession of Christianity, and three years later came to Canada, bearing the highest commendations from many eminent men, including the late Most Reverend Dr. Summer, Archbishop of Canterbury. In 1846 was ordained Deacon, and same year Priest, by the Bishop of Quebec. For eight years he was one of the Professors of the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and Incumbent of St. Peter's, Sherbrooke. Was afterwards General Superintendent for the Colonial and Continental Church Society in British North America. Was successively Archdeacon and Dean of Huron, Rector of S. Paul's Cathedral.

London. In 1871 was elected, by Synod, as Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese of Huron, with the title of Bishop of Norfolk, and was Consecrated in London, Ont., by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Toronto, Ontario, Ohio and Michigan. On the decease, in the same year, of the Right Reverend Dr. Cronyn, he became Bishop of Huron. Dr. Hellmuth's name will ever be remembered in the Diocese of Huron, associated as it is with such substantial proofs of his zeal and untiring industry, He is the founder of the Hellmuth Colleges (Boys' College and Ladies' College), over both of which institutions he presides. He has written, among several other publications, "The Divine Dispensations," a course of sermons delivered in Huron College Chapel, 1865, on the genuineness and authenticity of the Pentateuch.

FAUQUIER, THE RIGHT REVEREND, F. D., D.C.L., MISSIONARY BISH-CP OF ALGOMA. Born 1817: Educated in England. Came to Canada, and prepared for the Holy Ministry under Dr. Bethune, late Lord Bishop of Toronto. Is a D.C.L. of Trinity College, Toronto. Was admitted to Deacon's Orders in 1845, by the Right Rev. John Strachan, D. D., First Bishop of Toronto, and the following year to Priest's Orders by the same Bishop. First and only Parochial charge was the Mission of East Zorra, in the Diocese of Huron, which he held for twenty-eight years. Was also Rural Dean and Archdeacon of Brant. It having been decided to send a Missionary Bishop to that more distant portion of the Diocese of Toronto in which the great bulk of the population is composed of Indians, the Venerable Archdeacon Fauquier was elected to fill the Episcopal office for the new Diocese. He was Consecrated on the Feast of SS. Simon and Jude, 1873, in St. James' Cathedral, Toronto, by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Quebec, Toronto, Ontario, Huron and Western New York, U.S. The new Bishop's first exercise of the Episcopal office was in advancing three Deacons to the Priesthood and admitting one Candidate to the Diaconate.

HORDEN, The Right Reverend J., D.D., Bishop of Moosonee, North-West Territories. Born at Exeter, England, 1828. Received the Degree of Doctor of Divinity from the Archbishop of Canterbury. In 1852 ordained Deacon and Priest by the Right Reverend David Anderson, Bishop of Rupert's Land, at Moose Factory. Appointed Missionary at Moose Factory, and adjacent Territory. In 1872 was nominated by the Church Missionary Society to the new Diocese of Moosonee, and the same year Consecrated at Westminster Abbey, together with the Bishops elect of Mauritius, Dr. Rayston, and Ningpo, Dr. Russell, by the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Rochester, Sierra Leone, and by Bishop Anderson.

BOMPAS, THE RIGHT REVEREND WILLIAM CARPENTER D.D., BISHOP OF ATHABASCA, North-West Territories. Born in London, England, 1835; ordained Deacon 1859, by Bishop of Lincoln; Priest, 1865, by the Bishop of Rupert's Land, acting for the Bishop of London, at S. Paul's Cathedral. Was Curate of Sutton; Trinity Church, Louth; and of New Radford, Nottingham. In 1865, sent out to the North-West Territories by the Church Missionary Society. Was in 1874 appointed first Bishop of the

L., and that of D.D., by the Theological Faculty of Kenyon College, Ohio. Ordained Deacon and Priest in 1858 by the Bishop of Huron. Appointed (1) assistant Curate S. James' Cathedral, Toronto; (2) Curate S. Paul's Cathedral, London, Ont., 1858-66; (3) Rector of S. John's Cathedral, Warden and Divinity Professor S. John's College, and Archdeacon of Assinboia, Manitoba, 1866-74. Nominated 1874 to the new See of Saskatchewan, and the same year Consecrated at Lambeth by the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, S. Asaph, Algoma, Can., and by Bishop Anderson.

FULLER, The RIGHT REVEREND THOMAS BROCK, D.D., D.C.L., BISHOP OF NIAGARA. Born at Kingston, Ont., 1810. Educated at the Grammar School, Hamilton, and at the Theological Seminary, Chambly, Que. Was ordained Deacon in 1833 by the Bishop of Quebec, and Priest in 1835 by the same Bishop. Appointed Curate to Adolphustown, 1833; Missionary at Chatham, Ont., 1836; Rector of Thorold, 184(; Rector of S. George's, Toronto, 1861 to 1875. In 1867 was appointed Archdeacon of Toronto. On the division of the Dioceseof Toronto in 1875, and the erection of the new Diocese of Niagra, the Venerable Archdeacon Fuller was elected First Bishop, and on the Feast of SS. Philip and James, of the same year, was Consecrated in S. Thomas' Church, Hamilton, by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, assisted by the Bishops of Toronto, Huron, Michigan, U. S., and Western New York, U. S.

JONES, THE RIGHT REVEREND LLEWELYN, D.D., BISHOP OF NEW-FOUNDLAND. Consecrated in England, 1878.

BOND, THE RIGHT REVEREND WILLIAMM BENNETT, LL.D., BISHOP OF MONTREAL. Born at Truro, Cornwall, England, 1815. Educated in London. Is M.A. of Lennoxville, and LL.D. of McGill College, Montreal. Came to Canada and Studied for Holy Oaders. Ordained Deacon in 1840 at Quebec, and Priest in 1841 at Montreal, by the Right Reverend C. J. Mountain. Was then appointed a Travelling Missionary, residing at Lachine. In 1848, was appointed to the large and important Parish of S. George's, Montreal, which he retained up to 1878, a period of 30 years, when he was elected, 16th of October, to the See of Montreal, vacant by the resignation of Dr. Oxendon. Was, for several years previous to his Consecration, Archdeacon of Hochelaga and Dean of Montreal. Was Consecrated in St. George's Church, Montreal, on 25th January, 1879, by the Bishops of Fredericton, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Niagara and Algoma. Installed in the Episcopal Throne, in the

Cathedral Church, Montreal, 26th January, 1879. The first Episcopal act of the new Bishop was in administering the Rite of Confirmation in his old Parish Church, St. George's, Montreal, on the day after his Consecration.

SWEATMAN, THE RIGHT REVEREND ARTHUR, M. A., BISHOP OF TORONTO. Born in London, England, 1834, son of the late John Sweatman, Esq., M.D., of Middlesex Hospital. In 1855, entered Christ's College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A., with Mathematical honors (senior optime) 1859, M.A. 1862. At the Christmas Ordination 1859 he was ordained Deacon in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, and Priest the following year, in the Chapel Royal, Whitehall, by the Right Rev. Dr. Tait, Bishop of London. Was appointed Curate of Holy Trinity, Islington, 1859, and the following year founded the Islington Youths' Institute. In 1863 was appointed to the Curacy of St. Stephens, Canonbury, and to the Mastership of Islington Proprietary Gollege. On the invitation of Archdeacon, now Bishop, Hellmuth he came out to Canada to be the first Head Master of the London College, in 1865, and in 1871 he became Assistant Mathematical and Scientific Master in Upper Canada College, Toronto. In 1872 he was appointed to the Rectory of Grace Church Brantforfl, and Examining Chaplain to the Bishop of Huron, which latter post he has occupied up to the present time. From 1873 to 1876 has been Clerical Secretary for the Huron Diocesan Synod, and has also been Secretary to the House of Bishops. In 1874 appointed Head Master Hellmuth College; 1875, Canon of the Cathedral, London, Ont.; 1876, Assistant Rector of St. Paul's, Woodstock, and Archdeacon of Brant; and on the Bishop of Huron's visit to England, 1878-9, he was appointed his Lordship's Commissary. On the death of the Rt. Rev. Dr. Bethune, Bishop of Toronto, Archdeacon Sweatman was by the almost unanimous vote of the Synod, after several days deliberarion and consultation amongst representative, Churchmen, Clerical and Lay, rendered necessary from the divided sentiments existing amongst members of the Synod, chosen to fill the vacant See. KELLY, THE RIGHT REVEREND JAMES B., D.D., D.C.L., BISHOP OF NEWFOUNDLAND. Born in England, 1832. In 1854 graduated B.A. at Clare College, Cambridge, proceeding in due course to M.A. and D.D. Was ordained Deacon in 1855, and Priest the following year, by the Bishop of Peterborongh. Was Curate of Abington, Northants, 1855; Domestic Chaplain to the Bishop of Sodor and Man, 1856; Vicar of Kirk Michael, Isle of Man, 1860, and Episcopal Registrar of the Diocese. In 1864 was appointed to the Incumbency of S. Johns, Newfoundland, and the following year was nominated by the Bishop as Archdeacon of Newfoundland and Labrador. In 1867 he was nominated by the Crown as Coadjutor Bishop of Newfoundland; and in 1872 the Synod of that Diocese extended to him the right of succession. Consecrated at Croydon, 1867, by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of Rochester and Gibraltar. On the death of Bishop Field, in 1876, Dr. Kelly succeeded to the full charge of this important See, but, in consequence of failing health, was compelled to resign in 1877.

OXENDEN, THE RIGHT REVEREND ASHTON, D.D., BISHOP OF MONT-REAL AND METROPOLITAN OF CANADA, fifth surviving son of the late Sir Henry Oxenden, Bt., was born at Broome Park, Kent, 1808. In 1831 graduated B.A. at University College, Oxford, and two years later was ordained Deacon by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, and by the same prelate advanced in the following year to the Priesthood. He began his ministerial duties in the Parish of Barham, near Canterbury, while in Deacon's orders. In 1848 was removed to the Rectory of Pluckleywith-Pevington, in Kent, which charge he retained until 1869. Was also in 1864 appointed an Honorary Canon of Canterbury Cathedral. In 1869 he was nominated by the Provincial Synod of Canada to Metropolitical See of Montreal, and in August of the same year was Consecrated at Westminster Abbey by the Right Honorable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Tait, D. C. L., Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London, Rochester and Ely. His first Episcopal act was the holding an Ordination in Christ Church Cathedral, Montreal, when the Reverends P. DeGruchy, B. B. Smith, and R. D. Mills were admitted to the Diaconate. Dr. Oxenden has written "Decision" (second edition); "Prayers for Private Use" (thirty-second

thousand); "Sermons on the Christian Life" (twelfth thousand); "God's Message to the Poor"; "Baptism Simply Explained"; "The Pastoral Office": "The Pathway of Saftey"; "A Plain History of the Christian Church"; and various other works. Bishops Oxenden finding that his health was failing, and fearing that it would interfere in the discharge of his Episcopal duties, decided to resign, which he did in the spring of 1878, and returned to England, representing the Metropolitical See of Canada at the Pan Anglican Synod of that year, after which his resignation took effect.

# Becrology,

### 1816 TO 1879

INGLIS, THE RIGHT REVEREND CHARLES, D.D., FIRST BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA; Consecrated in 1787; formerly Rector of Trinity Church, New York; died 1816.

MOUNTAIN, THE RIGHT REVERFND JACOB, D.D., FIRST BISHOP OF QUEBEC; educated at Caius College, Cambridge; admitted to Holy Orders, and was appointed to the living of S. Andrew's, Norwich. Was subsequently chosen by Dr. Tomline, then Bishop of Lincoln, as his Lordship's Examining Chaplain, and also nominated to the living of Buckden, in Huntingdonshire, near by his Lordship's Palace. On the 7th July, 1793, Dr. Mountain was Consecrated as the first Bishop of Quebec. It was during his Episcopate that the University of McGill College, Montreal, was established, and his son, the future Bishop of Quebec (Dr. G. J. Mountain), was nominated Honorary Professor of Divinity and Principal of the College. Bishop Mountain died on the 18th June 1825, having labored for thirty-two years in the Episcopate.

STANSER, THE RIGHT REVEREND ROBERT, D. D., BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA; nominated as Successor to Bishop Inglis; Consecaated in 1816; was formerly Rector of St. Paul's, Halifax. died 1824.

INGLIS, THE RIGHT REVEREND JOHN, D.D., BISHOP OF NOVA SCOTIA; was, during the Episcopate of his Predecessor, Ecclesiastical Commissary of Nova Scotia, and succeeded to the Bishopric in 1825. Died, 1850.

STEWART, The Honorable and Right Reverend Charles James, D.D., Bishop of Quebec, fifth son of John, Seventh Earl of Golloway; born 1775. He was privately educated at home till he entered Oxford. Was elected a Fellow of All Souls' College, and, on being admitted to Holy Orders, was presented by the late Countess of Aboyne, to the Vicarage of Orton Langneville, Northamptonshire. In 1807 he commenced his Missionary career in Canada, settling first at St. Armand, where, by his untiring zeal and industry, he soon formed the first congregation in that part of Lower Canada. Was Consecrated to the See of Quebec in 1826, it having become vacant by the death of Bishop Mountain the previous year. After ten years of unwearying labor, fraught with many and great difficulties and anxieties, Bishop Stewart returned to England to lay his bones in the land of his fathers. He died on the 13th of July, 1837. The following excellent sketch is from the "Colonial Churchman," of February 25th, 1836, a paper edited by a Society of Gentlemen, and published at Lunenburg, Nova

Scotia. It is here given, verbatim, as a slight tribute to the memory of one whose Apostolic labors will ever be gratefully and affectionately remembered by Canadian Churchmen:—

"A saint unspotted of the world, full of alms-deeds, full of humanity, and all the examples of a virtuous life."—Isaac Walton.

Though the name of Bishop Stewart be not so widely known as that of Middleton, James, Heber, or Turner, bright lights of the Indian Hierarchy, though it be not conspicuous in the annals of Theological Controversy, or rendered memorable by literary labor and scholastic achievements, yet, wherever it is known, it is held in the highest veneration and respect, and adds equally to the lustre of the Colonial Bench. The Bishop of Quebec is emphatically a good man. He stands forth to the world a primitive Apostolic Bishop, deriving no false fictitious reputation from qualities more dazzling than useful; and whose Mitre, as unsullied as that of Hough, is ever surrounded by a bright and steady halo. Many men have revelled during their youthful days in the gratification of sensual pleasure, till wearied and nauseated with a surfeit of enjoyment, and having exhausted every refinement of vice, they have become suddenly metemorphosed into harsh and ascetic bigots, denving to others a healthful draught of those pleasures which themselves have quaffed to a hurtful excess. But the piety of our Bishop was not put on after he had flung off the garments of unrighteousness. It was a clothing he had assumed from his earliest youth, and the whiteness of his Christian vest has never been sullied by the hot passions of youth, the ambitious schemes of manhood, or the grasping avarice of old age. Of noble birth, and connected with the first families of our Aristocracy, Bishop Stuart has ever been distinguished for unostentations humility, priding himself more on the Christian badge than on his long line of ancestry and royal descent. Hannah More, writing of him to Daniel Wilson in 1831, says, "I have had a visit from my valued friend Dr. S., from Canada. It was pleasant to hear a man of his birth speak of it as a great advancement, that now he was appointed a travelling missionary, instead of a local one. I find him much improved in spirituality. He has been the honored instrument, since we last met, of causing twenty-four churches to be built."

Though our Bishop forbears to embroil himself in the political heats that inflame this Province, he strenously upholds the interests, and the establishment by law, of the Church committed to his care. Every society tending to relieve the distressed, to reform the wicked, to propogate the Gospel, or to benefit mankind, receives his steady and benevolent aid, and, like Bernard Gilpin, he has raised from a lowly state more than one young person, in whom he has perceived the germ of a spiritual nature, and the promis of a fitness for the ministerial office, defraying the expenses of their education, and sending them forth to labor in the sacred vineyard. His private charities flow in a wide and never-failing current. No vain pomp, no superfluous luxuries, no costly furniture, no extravagant banquets exhaust his income, but on the widow, and the orphan, and the fatherless, and the wretched, his bounty silently and unceasingly descends. His luxuries are alms-deeds—his walks are to the houses of mourning, and his

banquets are those exquisite and incorruptible viands, which a poor and Nathaniel-like (John i. 46) life administers to him who leads it, and to those who come within the sphere of its action.

In the pulpit, Dr. Stuart delivers plain and practical discourses, strongly embued with Evangelical Doctrines. He is more remarkable for earnestness than eloquence, and cares far more to render himself intelligible than admired. He seeks to win souls in preference to courting human applause by well rounded periods and flowery declarations.

Bishop Stewart sustained many severe privations and fatigues in traveling through the almost impervious woods during the earlier part of his ministry (which commenced in 1807); at which time, we ought also to add, he devoted the whole of his private income to acts of charity, and the wants of the Canadian Infant Church.

These journeys, and the labors and hardships encountered in the course of them (added to the distressing anxiety the wants of the Church have occasioned him since his accession to the See, with an increasing population and declining means), have rendered his Lordship prematurely aged. Though born only in 1775, and consequently only 60 years of age, he bears the appearance of being at least fifteen years older.

If the hoary head, when found in the ways of righteousness, be a crown of glory, how much more honored must be that head which old age has not silvered over, but which has been rendered white by the extreme of missionary toil, by many a weary travel through the tangled wilderness, and by a constant, unflinching endurance of personal labor and hazard in the faithful discharge of the mest sacred duties. Though venerable and dignified in his aspect, he is plain and simple in his manners, serving God and man with singleness of heart, and devoting every thought to the glory of the first, and to the temporal and eternal advantage of the latter.

The Church of England may boast of prelates more learned, more elequent, more celebrated than Bishop Stuart, but she cannot exhibit one who better merits the title of "good." Such is his absense of guile, his single-hearted benevolence, his undying faith ripened into works, his practice of Apostolical Christianity, that in after years, when the subject and the writer of this article shall alike be gathered to their fathers, he who contemplated the excellencies of this amiable Bishop will be led involuntarily to exclaim, in the words of the Romish Priest over the grave of Bishop Bedell, "O! sit anima mea cum Bedello."

MOUNTAIN, THE RIGHT REVEREND GEORGE JEHOSPHAT, D. D., D. C. L., BISHOP OF QUEBEC, second son of the late Right Reverend Jacob Mountain, D.D. Born at Norwich on the 27th of July, 1789. Was educated by private tuition until he entered Trinity College Cambridge, where he took his degree in 1810. Studied for the Holy Ministry under the guidance of his father, by whom, on the 2nd of August, 1812, he was admitted to Deacons' Orders, and on the 16th of January, 1814, was advanced to the Priesthood. In August of the same year was appointed by

the Bishop of Nova Scotia to the Rectory of Fredericton, N.B., at the same time receiving the appointments of Chaplain to the troops there stationed, and Chaplain to the Legislative Council. Two years later returned to Quebec, and was appointed "Bishop's Official," and also "Officiating Clergyman of Quebec" In 1821, became Archdeacon of Lower Canada. His father dying in 1825, Dr. Stewart succeeded to the Sec. In 1836, Bishop Stewart prevailed on Archdeacon Mountain to assist him in the Episcopate, and on the 14th of January he received Consecration under the title of Bishop of Montreal, succeeding, on the death of Bishop Stewart the following year, to the undivided Diocese, thus becoming third Bishop of Quebec. It was during Dr. Mountain's Episcopate that Canada was erected into an Ecclesiastical Province, and it was in accordance with his wishes that the Metropolitical See was located at Montreal. Also during this Episcopate the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, was established. In May, 1843, the Bishop undertook the arduous task of visiting the territories of the Hudson's Bay Company, travelling nearly one thousand miles in bark canoes. After a brief illness, Bishop Mountain breathed his last on the morning of the Feast af the Epiphany, 1863, having zealously labored among those over whom he was placed, for twenty-seven years. In the words of his biographer, "His family and the Diocese were fatherless."

STRACHAN, THE HONOURABLE AND RIGHT REVEREND JOHN, D.D., LL.D., First Bishop of Toronto. Born at Aberdeen, Scotland, on the 12th of April, 1778. Entered the University of Aberdeen in 1794, taking his M. A. degree three years later. Came to Canada in 1799. On the 22nd of May, 1803, he was Ordained Deacon by Bishop Mountain, and appointed to the Mission of Cornwall; the following year being advanced to Priest's Order by the same Bishop. In addition to his parochial duties he continued his work of teaching, in which he had been engaged for several years. His school was very popular, numbering among its scholars names which have since become celebrated, and which have been intimately associated with the progress of our young country. In 1811, the Degree of D.D. was conferred upon him by his Alma Mater. In 1812, at the urgent solicitations of the inhabitants of York, Dr. Strachen was prevailed upon to resign his charge at Cornwall and to remove to that Parish, receiving at the same time the appointment of Chaplain to the Troops. In 1827 was appointed Archdeacon of York. It having been decided in 1839, to form Upper Canada into a separate Diocese, Archdeacon Strachan was nominated first Bishop, under the title of Bishop of Toronto, and the same year received Consecration. Bishop Strachan ended a laborious and eventful life on the Festival of All Saints, 1867, after a ministry of sixty-four years. The closing words of the aged Bishop, in his last sermon, were those of the Apostle, "I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

FULFORD, THE MOST REVEREND FRANCIS, D.D., BISHOP OF MONT-REAL AND METROPOLITAN OF CANADA, second son of Baldwin Fulford, Esq., of Great Fulford. Born at Sidmouth on the 3rd of June. 1803. Graduated

B. A. at Exeter College, Oxford, 1824, and the following year was elected a Fellow of his College. In 1826 he was ordained Deacon at Norwich Cathedral, and Priest in 1828, in the Cathedral of Exeter. In 1882 he was presented by the Duke of Rutland to the Rectory of Trowbridge, in Wiltshire, which he occupied ten years. In 1838 he was appointed Chaplain to Her Royal Highness the late Duchess of Gloucester, and in 1842, having resigned the Rectory of Trowbridge, he was appointed to that of Croyden, in Cambridshire, which he retained until 1845, when he was nominated by Earl Howe and licensed by the Bishop of London as Minister of Curzon Chapel, Mayfair. On the erection of Montreal into a separate Diocese, Dr. Fulford was nominated by the Crown as First Bishop, and on the Festival of S. James the Apostle, 1850, he was Consecrated at Westminster Abbey. In September of the same year His Lordship arrived at Montreal, and at once entered upon his new duties; his enthronement taking place on Sunday, the 15th of that month. In 1859 the Canadian Dioceses petitioned Her Majesty to appoint one of the Canadian Bishops to "preside over the General Assemblies of the Church in the Province." In the year following, letters patent were issued, promoting the Right Reverend Francis Fulford, D.D., Bishop of Montreal, to the office of Metropolitan of Canada. Bishop Fulford died on the 9th of September, 1868, after a ministry of forty-two years, eighteen of which were spent in the Episcopate.

CRONYN, THE RIGHT REVEREND BENJAMIN, D.D., BISHOP OF HURON son of Thomas Cronyn, Esq., of Kilkenny. Born, 1802. Educated at Trinity College, Dublin. Admitted to Holy Orders and came to Canada. Was for some time Rector of S. Paul's, London, Ont., and on the division of the Diocese of Toronto and the erection of that of Huron was nominated Consecrated in 1857. Died in 1871.

FEILD, THE RIGHT REVEREND EDWARD, D.D., BISHOP OF NEW-FOUNDLAND. Born in 1801. Educated at Rugby, and at Queen's College, Oxford, where, for many years, he was Michel Fellow. 1826; Priest 1827. Was Rector of English Bicknor, Gloucestershire, and Government Inspector of Schools. In 1843, the See of Newfoundland becoming vacant by the translation of Bishop Spencer to Jamaica, Dr. Feild was nominated by the Crown as his successor. He was consecrated at Lambeth Chapel, on Sunday the 28th of April, 1844, by the Most Reverend the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the Bishops of London and Worcester. The Bishop of Newfoundland also exercises Episcopal jurisdiction in the Bermudas. Bishop Feild died on the 8th of June, 1876, after thirtythree years of unremitting labor in his extensive and difficult Diocese. The following brief sketch of the life of this devoted Father in God is taken

"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."—2 Tim. 4th chap. 7 verse

The Bishop's death, although not sudden or unexpected, is yet felt by his flock and friends to be a sad bereavement, and an event of very serious moment to the Church in this Colony. To himself it was not unlooked for nor undesired. Though very patient under the afflictive Hand of Gon, and perfectly willing to wait the Master's time, enduring without murmuring so long as He saw fit to extend the period of his suffering, yet the summons was a welcome one to the faithful servant, worn out in the Lord's cause, as is the bugle call to the fatigue I soldier at the close of the victory, or as are the lengthening shadows and the approaching darkness to the weary laborer.

For the Bishop it was, we doubt not, a very happy change; from the bed of much sharp suffering to that blessed state where there is no more pain, from many a needful conflict and much hard toil to that "rest which r maineth for the people of Goo."

To us the event is a call to study his noble example and act upon his faithful preaching, and to prepare ourselves by prayer for wise united action in the change to which his removal introduces the Church of England in these Islands.

The Bishop's character was of the true English type, manly, honest and courageous, fearless of consequences when doing what he felt to be right, and never shrinking from duty at whatever cost to his personal feeling or convenience.

To those not very intimate with him his manner might have seemed at times to be austere, but to those who knew him well there was evident a kindness, almost a playfulness of disposition which was very attractive. For he was not one who thought religion must evince itself in gloominess of manner. Though grave and serious at proper times, there was a brightness and cheerfulness in his demeanor which testified to the peace and hope and Christian joy within.

What was very conspicuous in him was thoroughness, which evinced itself in the entire surrender of himself to the work to which he had been called, and in a minute attention to detail, especially in what related to the conduct of Divine Service; that there might be perfect obedience to the Church's rules, and that all things might "be done decently and in order." There were in him too a sincerity, a warmth of affection, a tenderness towards children, a gentle courtesy to the weak, which, to those who were much with him, unfolded themselves more and more, and were especially observable in his more advanced years. Simplicity of manner and plainness in speech testified to his guilelessness, and there was manifest in him a shrinking from everything like pretence or hypocracy in those with whom he was brought into intercourse.

Soon after his Consecration in 1844, Bishop Feild paid his first visit to these Islands, when all who saw him were struck with his robust and powerful frame of body, his apparent strength of constitution, and his capability of endurance, which fitted him in a remarkable degree for the arduous sphere in which his labor lay. Yet, so trying and heavy did he find his work in Newfoundland, so apparently beyond the possibility of being adequately discharged by one man, that even his courage almost gave way under it, and he consulted the Reclesiastical authorities in England as to whether they did not think it his duty to resign, and allow the office to be entrusted to some one even stronger than himself. severe, and with what wisdom and foresight, let the grand results of his faithful and prolonged episcopate testify. We in this favored spot and climate can have but lit'le knowledge of the greatness of the task imposed upon him in Newfoundland, of the toil and exposure he underwent in his yearly visitations along those rock-bound coasts—nor are many of us cognizant of the great and important fruits of his labors, but they are stated by those who know them well to have been very remarkable.

Among Churchmen at home but few names stand higher and are more honored than that of Bishop Feild, of Newfoundland. He is frequently brought forward as one who has proved himself willing to endure hardness as a good soldier of Jesus Christ—as one who, like the great Apostle Paul, has been in labors abundant, in journeyings often, and in many perils; as one who, though advancing years and health broken in the good cause might have entitled him to seek retirement, and rest for scholarly pursuits so congenial to him in some sheltered nook, some quiet country parish in England, was yet willing to forget his own country and his father's house to be found in the close of life at his post of duty, to die amid the scene of his labors.

And what an example did he set of faithfulness and earnestness and diligence in the discharge of his high office. It seemed as if he never thought of himself, certainly he never thought of shrinking back when hard work was to be done. Not only did he seek to fulfil the especial duties of his Episcopal office as thoroughly as possible, but he was always ready to fill a vacancy which might occur in any parish in his vast Diocese, when, through the illness or death or absence of the Pastor there was need of his help.

It has been said, and, we believe, truly, that the severe and painfil illness which has proved fatal to the Bishop was contracted winter before last while voluntaily discharging, in an outharbor of Newfoundland, the duties of a clergyman obliged through ill-health to visit England. The work was difficult, the exposure great, and the want of comforts and conveniences such that we can hardly believe one at his advanced age could have endured them.

Those who saw the Bishop much in the earlier days of his Episcopate know how he schooled himself to bear hardships and privations, how, in the midst of plenty and of luxury he chose for himself the simplest food, and even at times barcst necessaries of life. And this, in order that he might be in a measure prepared to undergo the fatigue and inconvenience, and perhaps actual want, which were to be expected in his long absences from home, and on his perilous voyages in which several months in each year must be spent; and, further, that he might "have to give to them that needed." It used to be said of him "that he was one who hived like a beggar and gave like a prince," and it is true that only those who knew much of his private life were aware how unbounded was his charity.

He had learnt by his own experience the truth of that saying of our Lord, "It is more blessed to give than receive." There was never a good work to be carried on for which money was wanted, but there was an offer

from him to help it, oftentimes in the form of a request that he might be permitted to assist in it; there was never a Church or School-house to be built but his contribution headed the list, to an amount beyond what could have been expected of him, beyond most of those more immediately interested in the work. And, though he felt it to be his first and highest duty and pleasure to aid those of his own flock or communion, yet his charity was not confined to them.

Perseverance and resoluteness in any work he undertook were marked features in the character of Bishop Feild. A memorable instance of this is presented in the noble structure, Trinity Church, in this town. This holy and beautiful House of God would never have stood as it does now stand, the glory of our land, but for the steadfastness and determination of the Bishop. The work was commenced on its present magnificent and costly plan amid the expressed disapproval of some, and the gloomy vaticinations of failure from many others. The Bishop gave largely from his own purse to the work, and as this went on there were not wanting generous contributions from individuals, and valuable grants from the Public Treasury; and so, though disappointment after disappointment presented itself in the earlier stages of the undertaking, so great for this small Colony, the Bishop yet persevered, and the building now stands a model of ecclesiastical beauty, and a monument with which Bishop Feild's name will be for ever associated.

Like all men occupying high and responsible offices, the Bishop was sometimes called to take a step or peform an act which, it was not difficult to foresee, would lay him open to criticism and call forth from some anima version and censure, but when it became apparent that it was his duty to act, conscious that to his own Master he must stand or fall, at all hazard he did that which he believed would be most to the interests of the cause entrusted to him, and the Church in which he was a Chief Pastor. He was not deterred by the feeling that it was difficult to himself, or that it was opposed to the opinions and wishes of those whom, under other circumstances, he would have liked to gratify.

He was called at last to undergo great and prolonged suffering. But he was wonderfully patient, and endured all that was laid on him with meek submission to the Father's will. All that could be done to mitigate his pain, and support and comfort him, was done by the willing hands, and tender love and ready ministry of those who were privileged to attend him. It was very remarkable how in the midst of his great suffering his thoughtfulness for others shone out, how, oftentimes, though it cost him an efforthe would see visitors, lest they should think him indifferent to their kind, ness; and then he would rally his strength, and exert himself to ask personally after other members of the family, and to send hislove and fatherly blessing to absent ones.

We have not said all this for the purpose of sounding the praises of the departed Bishop, which would be quite unnecessary, and would have been highly distasteful to himself; but as a tribute well deserved, though small and insufficiently rendered, to his memory as a public man.

BETHUNE, THE RIGHT REVEREND A.N., D. D., D. C. L., BISHOP OF TORONTO. Educated at the Cornwall Grammar School. Studied divinity under Dr. Strachan. Ordained Deacon 1823, and Priest the following year, by the Right Reverend Jacob Mountain, D.D., Bishop of Quebec. Entered upon his Ministerial duties in the Parish of Grimsby. Removed in 1827 to Cobourg, which Parish he retained in conjunction with the Archdeaconship of Toronto, until 1867, when he was elected Coadjutor Bishop of the Diocese of Toronto, with the title of the Bishop of Niagara. He was Consecrated in S. James' Cathedral, Toronto, on the Feast of the Conversion of S. Paul, 1867, the consecrating Bishops being the Right Reverend John Strachan, D.D., Bishop of Toronto, assisted by the Bishops of Huron, Ontario, Michigan, U. S., and Western New York, U. S. new Bishop held his first Ordination in S. John's Church, Port Hope, ordaining as Deacon Charles Garrett Jones, and as Priests Reverends Finlow Alexander and William R. Foster. Dr. Bethune has written "Memoir of the Right Reverend John Strachan, D.D., LL.D., First Bishop of Toronto;" "Six Sermons on the Liturgy of the Church of England;" "Thoughts upon the Clergy Reserve Question;" "Four Sermons on the Holy Sacrament of the Lord's Supper;" "Thirteen Lectures, Expository and Practical, on the Liturgy of the Church of England;" "Thirteen Lectures on Historical Portions of the Old Testament;" "The Church of the Living God, a Sermon;" and various other published pamphlets and sermons. Dr. Bethune attended the Pan-Anglican Synod in England during the summer of 1878, and on his return his health, which had been failing for some time, was found not to have improved, but his death on the morning of Monday, the 3rd of February, 1879, was quite unexpected. It was a heavy blow to the Diocese, and, indeed, to the Church at large. Possessed of a kind and gentle disposition, he drew towards him the full respect and love of the people committed to his care. During the latter years of his Episcopate he had much to harrass and worry him. Controversy had arisen within the Church in his Diocese, and, he in the high and responsible position which he occupied, was frequently called to take some share therein. His actions, of course, laid him open to criticism, and sometimes, whether rightly or wrongly, to censure. But, conscious that he was only the servant of his Master, he endeavored conscientiously to discharge all the important duties devolving upon him in such a way as he believed would further the interests of the Church in which he was a Chief Pastor. It is not within the province of this brief sketch to discuss the merits of the questions the late Bishop was called upon to decide, nor to consider the wisdom of the course he saw fit to pursue, but simply to bear record of his life and labors for the Church he served so faithfully, and in which he labored so zealously for fifty six years, twelve of which were spent in the discharge of the responsible duties of the Episcopate, in probably the most important of our Canadian Dioceses. This is not the place to speak of the personal holiness of the departed Bishop, of his consistent walk with God, of the time spent by him in private devotion, of his exemplary employment of the public means of grace, of his humble trust in the alone merits of the Saviour. But we cannot doubt that he is of those whose "works do follow them;" first in the

# The state of the s Diocese of Algoma.

The Missionary Diocese of Algoma was constituted in 1873. It embraces the Muskoka Territory to the east of the Georgian Bay, and then extends north-west about forty miles beyond Fort William on Lake Superior to Pigeon River, which is the boundary between the United States and Canada. The entire length of the Diocese is eight hundred miles, and the width from one hundred and fifty to two hundred miles. The population is at present about 55,000, being an increase of upward of 40,000 in the past five years. A large portion are Indians, very many of them still in a heathen state.

# SUPPORT OF THE MISSION WORK.

The funds are to be raised mainly through the medium of collecting books, each collector undertaking to raise the sum of \$20 per annum. In each Diocese a Secretary-Treasurer has, with the approval of the Bishop, been appointed to act on behalf of the Algoma Missions.
