

1, 1901, according to the city auditor's veport, was \$204,974.54 This has been entirely paid. The commissioners set cured the services of a board of three eminent engineers, which resulted in obtaining plans for the seawall and grade raising, rebuilt the city hall, rebuilt the waterworks' pumping station, built a fine engine house on 29th and Market streets, repaired the liferent engine houses damaged by the storm, repayed with brick the streets throughout the entire business section of the city at a cost of about \$150,000, built rock and shell filled roads at a cost of \$40,000, retired a large part of the bonded debt, and also provided a large amount, of permanent drainage and paid off and settled numerous damage at the city. These claims were inherited from former city administrations. All this has been ac complished without a bond issue or a dollar of increased taxation. The city employes have been regularly paid in cash, and the summer season was pased ef for public improvements \$200,000;
