The awful tragedy occurred this morning in the public school of North Collingwood, ten miles east of this city. At ten o'clock tonight one hundred and sixty-five corpess were in the morgue at Collingwood, six children were still unaccounted for, and all the hospitals and houses for two miles around contained numbers of children, some fatally and many less seriously injured. All the victims were between the ages of six and fourteen years.




