The death of Field Marshal Earl Roberts, which occurred last evening at the headquarters of the British ex-peditionary force in France, was ex-tuemely sudden. He was in his usual good health when he left England on Wedneeday with his daughter, Lady Alleen Roberts, and his son-in-law, Major Lewin. The party had a rough trip crossing the channel, but the aged General feit no ill effects and went through with his programme on the Continent. The fact is apparent that neither side has been able to make any sensible advance, both being so well entrenched that neither artillery nor infantry can move them. The Germans are turning Belgium into a fortress, which means that if they do not succeed in advancing, they intend to be prepared for a winter in Belgium. The whole coast from Ostend to the Dutch border has been placed in a state of defence, and civilians are rigorously ex-oluded from that coast.

Elsewhere in the Near East there has been no engagement of importance.
