The School was first opened in September, 1891, for the purpose of offering to parents, for their sons, a good mental and moral education founded upon sound religious principles.

The School premises are situated on high ground just within the limits of Saint John. The buildings consist of a central house of residence, containing everything needful for a school, such as large and airy rooms, baths, water closets and lavatories. On the right are the dining-hall, playrooms, and gymnasium; on the left the main school and class rooms, fitted up with modern appliances.

The systems of water supply and sewerage are excellent, and entirely distinct from those of the city. All the buildings are lighted with incandescent lamps.

There is ample room in front of the house for a playground, while in addition to this the grounds of the St. John Amateur Athletic Club are used for cricket, foot-ball, lawn-tennis, lacrosse and athletic sports. In the winter the use of the City Rinks is secured for skating and hockey matches. The boys are regularly drilled by a competent instructor.

Course of Instruction.

The course of instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound Christian education, namely, Scripture History, Prayer Book and Catechism, Classics, Mathematics and Book keeping, English, French, German, Music and Drawing.

Pupils are prepared for Matriculation at the Universities, and the Entrance Examinations of the Law and Medical Schools, the Royal Military College, and the British Navy. In the Modern Department pupils are prepared for Commercial pursuits, and instruction is given in Shorthand and Type-writing.

The Religious Teaching and daily worship are in conformity with the doctrines and services of the Church of England, and

under the immediate control of the Head-Master.

The fees for board and tuition are \$200 per annum for Houseboys, and \$45 for Day-boys, and are payable in advance at the beginning of each term, as follows:

Washing, not exceeding one dozen pieces, 35 cents per week.

Each house-boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay a fee of \$10 in lieu of bedding, etc, and each new boy \$5 for Gymnastics and Drill.

Books, stationery, etc., are supplied in the School at ordinary prices. Every boy must bring with him a Bible, Prayer Book, and Hymn Book (Ancient and Modern).

Boys over twelve years of age will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence as shall satisfy the Head-Master.

To secure admission a deposit of \$10 should be made on application, which will be accounted for when the first term's payment is made.

Forms of application can be obtained from the Head-Master.

A half term's notice must be given in writing before the removal of a pupil.

Boarding.

Boys received into the School-house are at all times under the personal supervision of the Head-Master, assisted by Resident Masters, who direct their studies.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter vacations at a charge of \$5 per week for board.

It is recommended that pocket money should be supplied to the boys only through the Head-Master, instead of directly from home.

r. Boys should bring a complete list of clothing, which should be pasted on the inside of the trunk, and renewed on each return to school after the holidays. When additional articles are sent during the term, a written memorandum addressed to the "Linen Department," should accompany them. If, during the term, the purchase of additional clothing is necessary, parents must send a written authorization for such expenditure to the Head-Master.

2. Every article of clothing should be distinctly marked with name in full and numbered

- 3. It is not possible to mend *properly*, unless pieces of cloth and wool of the proper colour, and extra coat buttons, are sent. Clothing should be sent to the school in good wearing condition, and not in need of repairs.
- 4. Any direction about clothing should always be in writing, and addressed *Linen Department*, it will always be attended to. Verbal messages are unsatisfactory.
- 5. It is suggested that each boy should bring with him three full suits of clothes, one of which should be dark for Sundays, two sets of underclothing, six pairs of socks or stockings, a dozen hand-kerchiefs, six collars, two white shirts, two flannel (or flannelette) shirts with collar attached, two flannel (or flannelette) shirts without collar, three pairs of heavy boots, one pair of dress shoes, one pair of long rubber boots (desirable), one pair of rubbers, one pair of overshoes for winter, one pair of slippers, one pair of sneakers, one overcoat, one waterproof coat, one school jersey (see note), clothes bag, napkin ring, and an extra brush and comb (small) for lavatory use.

Nore.—Jerseys, neckties and belts of the Davenport colours can only be obtained at the School.

School Hours.

SCHOOL: 9 to 12; 2 to 4.

Terms.

The School Year is divided into three terms:

MICHAELMAS TERM—From first Tuesday in September to December 16.

LENT TERM-From January 10 to the Friday before Palm Sunday.

TRINITY TERM—From the second Tuesday after Easter to the last Wednesday in June.

Vacations.

Two weeks at Easter; two months at Midsummer; three weeks at Christmas. Return tickets are issued for the shorter holidays by the Intercolonial and Canadian Pacific Railway at greatly reduced rates.

→®SSS→ Examinations and Prizes.

Written examinations are held at the end of Michaelmas and Trinity Terms, and oral at the end of Lent Term. A report of the progress and general conduct of each pupil is sent by the Head Master to parents and guardians at the end of each term. Prizes are awarded at Midsummer to the boys who obtain the highest number of marks in the two written examinations above mentioned.
