

this city, was visiting Mrs. Bland at the time and assisted in removing some things from the house without receiving serious burns. Mr. Bland and Mrs. Bland's son Silas Alden, came in from the barn on hearing the alarm, and after extinguishing hearing the alarm, and after extinguishing the fire, carried Mrs. Bland to the residence of W. H. Hill, where she was attended by Dr. Smith, of Hampton.

The trail of burning oil had set the whole house in flames, and by the time the men got out of the barn, the flames were bursting from the windows. Their first efforts were deviated to saving Mrs. first efforts were devoted to saving Mrs. Bland's life, but, even if there had been Bland's life, but, even if there had been time they would not have been able to save the house. In a few minutes it was a mass of flames, and there was no chance of saving even any of the contents. Everything in the house, including \$180 in cash, was lost. The house was completely destroyed, nothing but the chimneys remaining this morning.

ing this morning.

Mr. Hill's house and general store are only about 200 feet away, and sparks from the fire set his place ablaze several times. He was prepared for the emergency, however, and had ladders leading to the root and 100 feet of hose ready to attach to

a pump in the kitchen. By hard work they were able to save his building, and the damage done there was slight. They were also able to save the barns and other

out-buildings.

The house which was destroyed was a substantially built wooden structure, two stories in height and 30 by 60 feet in size. It was worth something more than \$3,000 and was insured for \$1,500. The furni ture, which was also valuable, was not insured. Ernest E. Thomas, of this city. who rents part of the house for use during the summer, had some furniture stored there, and his loss will be about \$100.
