#### General Intelligence.

Our Washington Letter.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, June 30, 1884.

If Congress shall adjourn by the 6th of July most of the democratic members will go direct to Chicago to attend the convention. Unless Congress adjourns many who want to go will be forced to remain here.

The feeling at the Capitol is that Congress should adjourn to Chicago to prevent a new vote on the tariff, and to an extension of the tariff agitation. The plan is to restrict the entire discussion of that whole question to the committee on resolutions, and that committee will sit with closed doors. Strong opposition is manifest, even among the tariff reformers, to any movement looking to extreme tariff declaration in the Chicago platform, but both wings agree to a very positive declaration in favor of tariff revision and reduction, and to an extension of the doctrine that taxes should be laid for revenue.

This has been a week of new booms and booms. There has been even a resuscitation of the tidal talk, but it is hard to discern any fire in the smoke. The talk was not very epidemic, only those who are particularly susceptible to maladies a second time. ## HARD TIMES.

That the times are hard is so evident to everybody that it would be useless to attempt to prove the reverse. And yet when we take a survey of other countries we find that Canada is no worse off than her neighbours, if we are to judge from the business reports circulated for general information. In reviewing the business situation, Dun, Wiman & Co.'s mercantile agency state that the number of failures for the past six months in the Dominion are 752, as against 587 for the first six months of 1883, an increase of 65 failures. The liabilities in the past six months are \$10,742,600, as against \$8,249,000 for the corresponding period of 1883; an increase of nearly \$2,500,000. This showing for the first six months in the Dominion of Canada is much more favourable than in the United States, where the failures in number have increased over 18 per cent, while the liabilities have increased 88 per cent. Considering the extreme depression throughout Canada, and the unfavourable results of speculation, the figures are not unfavourable. In New Brunswick the depression is perhaps as marked as in any other portion of Canada, the result of the very unsatisfactory condition of the lumber market which still shows a decided demand and unremunerative prices. If there is to be a turn for the better in the staple industry of the Province it can certainly be sooner accomplished by a greatly reduced supply than by recklessly flooding the market on the other side. While the depression in the leading industries of Great Britain has doubtless had much to do with the tumble in the prices of lumber, yet we have reason to fear that over-production has had not a little to do with the decline in the prices offered for our staple export. And even now, in the face of a most unsatisfactory market, we find that the shipments of deals from St. John for the first six months of 1884 amount to 86,813,118, an increase of about 5,000,000 in superficial feet as compared with the corresponding period for 1883. Of this large amount Alex. Gibson Esq., the lumber king, has shipped 56,665,870. Whatever may be Mr. Gibson's object in shipping so largely at this critical period in the lumber trade, it is best known to himself, but his course is unfavourably criticized by many who would like to see the supply curtailed in order to effect a change for the better. Fortunately the crop prospects abroad and at home are good, and if the depression relative to the operations of the farmer are realized, the times will not be as hard during the coming winter as they would otherwise be. The excellent salmon fishing on the Miramichi this season is a pleasing feature to contemplate, which will have a tendency to improve the times, considerable money being paid out for those engaged in this industry.

In view of the situation every individual in the various communities should be on the alert to endeavor to effect an improvement. We venture the assertion that there are few sections where the credit system prevails to so great an extent as in the Northern part of New Brunswick—a system which has done much to hinder the progress of the country in the days that are gone, and which still obtains, although not to as great an extent as formerly. This system has not only found favor with many who have done business in the past, but it still maintains its hold on the minds of the business community. If business were conducted strictly on a cash basis an improvement would soon set in—cash would be more plentiful, credit books could be dispensed with in the retail establishments, and transactions in general would be by far more satisfactory. The early history of the credit system has had its influence in moulding the public mind—in making business buyers seek to perpetuate the system by having accounts charged against them on the books of the retail store, and other business establishments, when by a little effort the cash might often be paid, thus saving the business man the trouble incident to "dunning," enabling them to meet their bills with ease, and placing them in a position to sell at smaller profits. In this way all would be benefited. On our own books we have the names of a number of subscribers who are in arrears, who have allowed themselves to drift along without thinking the payment of even a portion of their indebtedness would materially assist us in the successful prosecution of our business, and who have done so more from thoughtlessness than from a desire to withhold payment. The same remarks apply to those who are willing to pay for the privilege of "Princes of Wales," and the happy congratulations of many friends.—*New Brunswick Journal.*

COUNCIL ROOM, JULY 2, 1884.

The Municipal Council of the County of Northumberland met in the Council Chamber to-day at noon. The Warden being absent, Councillor Bamford was appointed to the Chair, pro tem.

On the roll being called, eight Council-

lors were absent, four of whom arrived

shortly after the only absentees from

the Council being J. L. Scofield, Daniel

Baldwin, Peter Loggie, A. J. W. Mc-

Kenzie.

Minutes of last session read, and find-

ing found that the resolution relative to

the appointment of an official reporter at

\$4.00 per day had been omitted, the error

was rectified, and the minutes, thus

being correct, were approved.

Sec. Treasurer brought up the Bond

matter. He said that having failed to

obtain any trace of the missing document,

he had prepared a new Bond for pre-

sentation to the Council, which differed

from the first in the amount being in-

creased from \$500 to \$800, which

would cover the amount generally in his

hands. Asked that should the missing

Bond be found, that Council order it to

be cancelled.

Warden Robinson having arrived was

asked to take the chair, which he did

amid applause from his brother Council-

lors.

On motion John Cassidy and Angus

Campbell were appointed Constables to

attend the Council this session at \$1.00

per day.

On motion J. J. Anslow was appointed

Official Reporter.

Adjourned till 2 o'clock.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Councillors Camp-

bell, Rainsborough, Cormier and Thibe-

deau reported themselves.

Coun. Whelan drew the attention of

Council to the need of a new County

Valuation, giving as reason therefor that

in Blackville parish, which here represent-

ed the bulk of the population, had been

gradually shifted from the shoulders of the

wealthy to the poorer ratepayers, and

that while in some cases the property of

the wealthy had increased in value, their

taxation had not correspondingly in-

creased, as it should have done. The

assessors did not always accept the value-

ation of the assessors, in fact they were

too often guided by their own feelings

in making their assessments, which

ought not to be the case. He pro-

posed that the assessors who had no

property should be compelled to pay tax

on \$200 income, while rich property hold-

ers and merchants did not pay on income

which of course was the fault of the

assessors. In the case of widows hold-

ing property, the assessors were also

astray as regards their duty. He quoted

other reasons in proof of his assertion

that the assessors were not doing their

duty, and that the value of the prop-

erty of some half dozen individuals, four

of whom had left the parish, had de-

creased upwards of 50 per cent, and

that the value of the property of some

others had increased to the same extent.

Coun. Campbell said that three good

and trustworthy men could not be found

in the County of Valparaiso, and that

the assessors had done in Blackville, but

as he alleged they had allowed personal

some years ago, and quoted a case in

town which needed the prompt attention

of the health officers. The Sec. Treas-

urer said the law relating to the ap-

pointment of a Board of Health was

amended, and that it was now the duty

of the Board to appoint a committee to

Morrissey moved the Council on peti-

tions, reported, recommending that

Whelan's taxes be reduced one half, and

that Green's case be referred back to the

assessors.

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## Masonic Centennial.
