THE SECOND ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRE WHICH DESTROYED CAMPBELLTON JULY 11

HOW THE TOWN HAS PROGRESSED IN TWO YEARS SINCE THAT GREAT DESASTER
OVERTOOK IT. A FEW OF ITS PUBLIC AND PRIVATE BUILDINGS



Grammar and High School

On the night of July 11th 1910 Campbellton was a heap of smoking ruins, and the whole of Canada stood aghast at the holocaust. Two years have passed and on this the second anniversary of the great fire, a new Campbellton has been built, which is a credit to the province and an example worth following by any Canadian town. In two short years the town has been practically rebuilt, the undaunted energy of the citizens surmounting stupendous difficulties which would have caused many people from endeavoring to re-establish their shattered businesses. But in this new and brighter Campbellton we have a better town and a cleaner community than before the fire and the labour and expense which was not spared has brought us a fitting reward. Since the fire a better class of building has been erected, many handsome brick and concrete buildings taking the place of the old business premises of frame, and a great improvement made in the class of residences erected both as regards architectural design and value. The citizens have vied with each other in erecting permanent and substantial homes, the equal of any to be found in any city in Canada. In connection with this it would be well to remember that contrary to the general impression there is less money loaned on mortgages than there was previous to the fire, which is a healthy sign in a town's life.

The Town Council were not behind in the good work. Receiving handsome grants from the Federal and Provincial governments their hands were freed to allow them to re-establish civic property. Recognising all the difficulties in the way and honestly endeavouring to keep down the burdea of taxation they applied themselves to the task of rebuilding the streets, sewerage and water, and electric light. Even with all the civic improvements being required the taxes have been kept moderately low last year being 1.65 per cent., while this year it is expected to run about 1.60 per cent. The chief improvement undertaken by the corporation was the new electric lighting plant, to take the place of the old steam plant burned in the fire and patched up to give temporary service immediately after the fire.

The new equipment consists of two sets of gas producers, two engines one 175 H. P. the other 350 H. P., generators, exciters and all the necessary parts. This plant is located in a new building erected on the south bank of the river on land purchased from the Shives Lumber Co., for \$10,000. The building lands and equipment cost over \$60,000, but it is a paying proposition, for in addition to lighting the streets and supplying the town with electric current, an all day service has been established. Sufficient power is available for small industries which being supplied at a reasonable rate is being largely taken advantage of, numerous establishments installing electric



motors for various purposes. The second improvement of importance is that of the new Grammar and High School. The building which will formally be opened today was erected at the cost \$50,000, from the design of Leslie R. Fair architect. It is considered by experts to be the finest school building in the province. It is a handsome two storey building built of brick containing twelve class rooms, a large assembly hall, additional rooms for manual training and domestic science, besides numerous retiring rooms and cloak rooms. The sanitary arrangements, heating and ventilating systems are the latest products of scientific skill, and no expense has been spared by the school authorities to make the environment of the students healthy and wholesome.

The latest improvement is the new Fire Alarm system which has been lately installed. This is of the famous Gamewell type, the same as used in all large cities. The system is not yet complete, only a beginning having been with nine alarm boxes with alarm tappers in the homes of the firemen. The large bell required for a general alarm will likely be purchased during this present year.

Campbellton has one of the finest water systems to be found in Can-

ada. The water is taken from lakes in the virgin forest by gravitation, and is at all times perfectly pure and wholesome. This, with a splendid sewerage system, gives the people every advantage of the modern town.

The growth in population has been retarded very little by the fire. Nearly all those who temporarily removed from the town have returned and built homes for them-

& D. A. Harquail, McLennan Foundry, A. C. Roy, A. C. Belleisle, H. Sanson, and many others.

The Intercolonial Railway management has made provision for handling the increasing business at Campbellton by re-building their entire works on a much better and larger scale. The new station is a fine brick and stone structure facing on Gerrard Street. Its interior finish is done in excellent taste and it has all the modern conveniences of a well appointed city station. The roundhouse is situated to the western end of the railway property and is a solid piece of workmanship, built of brick and concrete. It has accommodation for thirty-eight of the larger type of engines. Upwards of 300 men are employed in the railway services who make their residence at Campbellton.

The International Railway's head offices and shops are located at the southwest of the town. This line operates from Campbellton to St. Leonards and is the most direct route to the great Boston and Maine markets. The traffic on this line is increasing enormously month by month and is a pioneer in opening up a large territory which lay long idle. The great progress made by the new settlements, Hazen and Grimmer settlements has been largely due to the operations of this railway. The machine and repair shops of the road are located here and compare favorably with any branch road in the Dominion.

The equipment of the road is in first class condition, and travellers speak highly of the comfort and convenience of the express train which leaves Campbellton every morning arriving at St. Leonards at





THE "BLUENOSE"

The Nova Scotia gives the impression of belonging to a province whose people are perhaps the most homogeneous to be found in Eastern Canada.

His people are distinctive as a whole, conforming more generally their provincial type. They are neither English or American, but are thoroughly fused into Nova Scotia Canadians.

But why give descriptions, for who has not met the genial, wide-awake Bluenose. He is a combination of the New Englander and the old countryman transplanted to Canadian soil, and Nova Scotia soil at that. He, too, is first a Nova Scotian, but none the less a Briton and an ardent Canadian.

The earlier resentment of the modus operandi by which his Province was brought into the Union has practically disappeared. For some years, however, to quote the familiar saying, "While he did not object to the marriage, he had a strong dislike to the way the ban was published." Industrially, by virtue of natural resources combined with native ability, he leads the East.

As a people the Nova Scotians are tenacious of established customs, hospitable, intelligent and thrifty. Their chief product is prominent statesmen and educationists—for Canada and other countries.

The New Brunswicker by virtue of being so closely associated with the Americans on the west and the French-Canadians on the north, does not represent so homogeneous a type as either the Islander or Nova Scotian. For the same reasons he is more cosmopolitan. He has been more in touch with continental movements and with Canada as a whole. Nevertheless, there is a typical New Brunswicker as there is a typical Nova Scotian. In origin, being chiefly of United Empire Loyalist stock, he is of course ultra-British in sentiment, and while being a true New Brunswicker, he claims to be the most ardent Canadian of all. He has seen much of pioneer life, and the subjugation of his fine Province

has qualified him for fields of large endeavour. Physically, in stature, he excels his Maritime brothers, while intellectually and in all other respects he is their equal. He manifests the same ability to excel in the learned professions, and if he has specialised at all, it is in the departments of statesmanship and literature. It has been said that a New Brunswicker may be known by the way he shakes a pepper bottle, a Nova Scotian by the way he says "valley," and an Islander in his handling of a horse. Be this as it may, the foregoing may serve to indicate some characteristics of their Maritime types.

Turning more particularly, now to the contrasting customs, we note a number, chiefly pertaining to the industrial side of life. For instance, while the ox as a beast of burden has been long since abandoned in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, he still holds a very large place as a factor in the farm labor of Nova Scotia. In the former Provinces, an ox-team upon the highway would be regarded as the advance guard of a circus and the centre of curiosity, while in many parts of Nova Scotia, it is one of the most commonplace sights.—F. A. Wightman, in The Canadian Magazine for July.

While we all take pride in the growth and expansion of Campbellton yet we of the "Graphic" take pardonable pride in the growth and expansion of our paper since the fire, so much so that we think our readers will pardon us if we give a short description of our new building and plant.

Two years ago the "Graphic" was common with every Campbellton business was destroyed. One week later the "Graphic" was published in a small four page form and has regularly appeared each week since, until today when we are issuing a twelve page paper.

At first our office was a tent. Later we erected a small temporary building on the site of our present building, and therein was installed a small job printing plant to look after the needs of our towns people. In this temporary building we did business until January of this year, when we removed to our present premises, then only partly completed. Since that time the work of completing the building and installing our newspaper plant has been carried forward, until today everything is practically in order and we think we have one of the most up-to-date printing establishments in the maritime provinces.

THE BUILDING

The building which is two and a half stories, 30 x 48 with an ell 18 x 20 is built of vetrifired clay blocks (terra-cotta) on concrete foundation.

The basement is the entire size of the building, well lighted by ten large windows and has eleven clear feet between floor and ceiling. The ceiling, which is the ground floor of the main building is of reinforced concrete, eight inches thick, thus the basement is absolutely fireproof.

Herein are placed the heavy newspaper press, thus eliminating to a large degree vibration and noise. Also the steam heating plant, and store room for heavy paper are in this basement.

On the ground floor are situated the public office, which is finished in native woods and southern pine. Off of this are the private offices of the Editor and Manager, and to the rear of these, respectively are the newspaper composing room and the

job printing department. These are all finished in native spruce, stained to dark oak. The private offices being divided from the public office by glass partitions extending to the ceiling.

To the rear of the job department in the ell is situated the stock room wherein paper in its "raw" state is kept in stock.

The first floor is fitted up as a nine room flat. This is finished in the colonial style, the spruce being stained to oak. All the floors are of polished hardwood.

In designing the building special attention was paid to lighting the workrooms and for convenience in handling the various kinds of work. Heat is supplied by a large steam boiler.

THE PLANT
The plant installed, while not yet just what is wished, yet it is up-to-date and is being added to as growth requires.

The newspaper press is a fast two revolution Cranston, capable of turning out 1750 papers an hour without pushing it. The folder is the latest pattern Mentzer which will handle papers of various sizes in 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12 pages.

These are run by a four horse-power electric motor.

In the job room everything has been purchased to enable us to turn out high class commercial and general printing. Latest job presses and job type faces are there in abundance and a very high class of work is being turned out from the small visiting card to the full sheet poster, from the envelope to the illustrated fold-r.

Here also is machinery to handle the making of monthly accounts and loose leaf form, card index systems, etc., and although only installed recently, already a large business in these lines is being worked up. Electric motors are used in these departments.

To our friends who should be in town today or any other day we shall be only too happy to show them through the building and explain the process necessary to turn out a readable weekly newspaper.

WHY DO GIRLS LEAVE THE FARM

The following editorial from Canadian Home Journal, which is probably in closer touch than any other magazine with the majority of Canadian women, gives one potent reason for this constant movement of our country girls to the city.

"We wonder when our farmers will open their eyes to the injustice which they have so often shown to their daughters. Again and again we read paragraphs deploring the fact that so many girls are forsaking the farm for work in the city. What is the reason? In the majority of cases, we believe that it lies, not in youthful unrest, not in a longing for city amusements, but in a protest against the paternal policy which denies a proper allowance to the daughters of the household. It is all very well to say that our grandmothers did a great deal more work than their descendants of today and that the farmer's daughter of several generations ago was thankful for a roof over her head and the simplest gown. Our great-grandfathers, also, worked harder than the modern farmer, who would not dream of using the antiquated implements of sixty years ago.

The son of the farm is usually treated with much more consideration than the daughter. In the woman's business capacity dies hard. Ignorance is not to refuse to give women an opportunity to learn the ways of the business world. If a father would take his daughter into his confidence in business matters and encourage her to have her own bank account, with a view to investment, there would be fewer mismanagement of their affairs. A certain widow who has been most successful in looking after her own business, is quoted as saying: 'I owe a great deal to my father, who talked to me in my girlhood about his farm and his investments, giving me advice which I have never forgotten. He believed that every woman should know something of business affairs and be encouraged to have her own account.'

It has often been said that we cannot learn by the advice of others, that it is necessary to make mistakes of one's own before wisdom is practically attained. This is only partly true. We may not hope to escape blunders and many disasters have been averted by the remembrance of wise counsel. If the farmer wishes to keep his daughter at home—and it is an infinitely better place for her than a city office—let him treat her as a business partner and let her have the benefit of his own hard-won experience."

THE RING FINGER

The following extract from an article in "Woman's Journal" in the Canadian Home—
"After all this attention to the detail of wedding etiquette may we just turn for a moment to the domestic side of a little custom? It covers the custom of placing the wedding ring on the third finger.
One explanation is that an old superstition connects the third finger with the heart by an artery. It may be that this is better explained by a old custom in England of setting the wedding ring on the top of the thumb while the clergyman recited, 'In the name of the Father,' then the ring went to the index finger at 'of the son', then to the middle finger at 'of the Holy Ghost', and with the 'Amen', it was placed on the third finger when the blessing was completed."

WONDERS OF HUMAN ELECTRICITY

Explanation of the Ability of Some Persons to Locate Under-ground Streams by a Forked Stick.

Are you a sort of storage jar for electricity. Most folks are apparently. When you rub a rubber comb through your hair, you will hear faint crackling and sparkling as the teeth of the comb pass clear of the hair. In the dark you can sometimes get a real electrical spark like that produced by a laboratory machine.
There are other folks who are able to produce the same thing by rubbing the feet swiftly back and forth on a carpet and then touching their finger tips to another person. If the other person does not know of this possibility the effect is sometimes startling.
Some people have more electricity power than others. They are apparently charged with electrical fluid most of the time. They are able to produce the sparks by rubbing their hands on silk, woolen or other fabrics. When they comb their hair in the dark they can get inch-long sparks of snapping brilliancy.
It is the same thing that enables a rubber comb to pick up and hold little scraps of paper after it has been pulled through the hair two or three times. There will be a faint whispering crackling as the teeth of the comb approach the scraps and a few of them will jump up and cling to the comb. They will continue to do so till the electricity has passed off and left the comb in its usual condition.
Some scientists claim that different people have different kinds of electrical energy stored up in them. Some are positives and some are negatives. It is also asserted that the greater number of people are positively charged and that it is hard to find the human variety of negative electricity.
Have in the test for negative electricity that also seems to explain the power of the "water witch." If you "pick" you have negative electricity at first a green twig or a small limber stick forks into two branches of about equal size.
Trim this limb down to a forked wand about two feet in length. Hold the ends of the fork in either hand with the butt of the limbs upward. Then take a walk across the fields or through a wood. If you are a person of negative electricity the moisture in the green wood will act as a conductor for your particular brand of lightning, and as you pass over an underground stream the point of the forked wand will twist in your hands till the butt will be pulled straight down toward the earth. The point will also show the existence of the underground stream.
If this is true it explains the ability and the accuracy of the "water witch." There are one or two of these men or women in every neighborhood and they are always consulted through a wood. If you are a person of negative electricity the moisture in the green wood will act as a conductor for your particular brand of lightning, and as you pass over an underground stream the point of the forked wand will twist in your hands till the butt will be pulled straight down toward the earth. The point will also show the existence of the underground stream.
According to the theory the positive is charged man or woman has to stick it to make the green twig move when passing over the water or where the earth is dry. Their particular brand of electricity has no affinity for moist sticks.

lunch time. The station buildings are constructed of wood in pleasing design and replete with all modern conveniences. The board room and offices on the upper flat are laid out tastefully and are bright open rooms. The road is under the control of Mr. Thos. Malcolm as general manager, with Mr. E. H. Anderson as manager and Mr. A. A. Andrew Traffic manager. Altogether there are about 150 men employed on the road, including the train crews residing in Campbellton.

There are five religious denominations in town, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist and Anglican.

of the Gaspé peninsula, and the Matapédia valley up as far as St. Flavie. Its ideal location makes it such. It is a divisional point on the Intercolonial Railway system, with its fifteen or twenty daily trains running east and west. It is also the terminal of the International Railway, with a daily passenger and freight service to S. Leonard, making the shortest possible route to the Boston markets by connecting with the Bangor and Aroostook Railway at Van Buren. The International is fast developing a rich and fertile farming country, which in a short time will be of great benefit to the country at large and particularly to Campbellton. Already a number of mills have been established along its route and an impetus to business generally is being felt.

With the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, Campbellton will also have the advantage of

all doing a splendid business.

Some idea of the amount of business done at Campbellton can be gained by comparing the statement of freight and passengers receipts of the Intercolonial as published in the Auditor General's report. Campbellton takes seventh place in the total amount of earnings, the only place showing greater net earnings being the larger cities, Montreal, Halifax, St. John, Sydney, Moncton and Truro.


The lumber shipments have increased very rapidly during the past few years. About the time the town was incorporated the lumber cut on the Restigouche was about twenty million feet, while last year it had reached the one hundred million mark. This year the total will probably amount to considerably over one hundred and fifteen million feet.

Another indication of the importance of Campbellton as a business centre is the fact that there are no less than three banks located here, each doing a rapidly increasing business in fine brick and stone structures. These are the Bank of Nova Scotia, Bank of New Brun-

swick and the Royal Bank of Canada. As a business centre no other town can boast of such splendid facilities and opportunities for catering to the needs of the surrounding country. To the north, south, east and west of us run railway and steamboat lines, carrying freight and expressage and affording the most comfortable means of travel for the business men of the neighboring districts. The fire did much damage to the town but with it all was a blessing in disguise. From the ruins of the old has arisen a new and mighty Campbellton, a better and stronger people, a more virulent society, and a happier community.

The spirit which animated the people in the re-establishing of their homes after the great calamity, still remains, and in the knowledge that Campbellton will always go forward, they are satisfied to work to that end, and make our town one of the most prosperous in the province of New Brunswick.

The Presbyterian and Methodist bodies have erected handsome and commodious structures, the Presbyterian church boasting of one of the finest organs in the province.

Work on the Baptist and Anglican churches is going ahead now, in the meantime worshipping in temporary structures, while the Roman Catholic denomination are making plans for the construction of a handsome church in the near future, they having purchased part of the Patterson property for this purpose.

The new Post Office and Customs House is nearing completion. It will have a four faced clock, striking the hours and half hours, placed in a tower on the front of the building, where it can be seen from nearly all parts of the town.

With regard to Campbellton as a shipping port the following figures for the year 1911 will be of interest.

One hundred and forty coastwise vessels carried imports of 53757 tons and we exported coastwise 31946 tons. In vessels entered from the sea we imported 30459 tons and fifty vessels cleared with lumber equalling in weight 55000 tons. The trade to American ports has been steadily increasing year after year, while the imports to Campbellton as a distributing centre are steadily growing.

On this therefore the second anniversary of the great fire we can point with pride to our splendid buildings, our factories, mills and workshops, the great river that flows past our doors, opening up a great sea trade, and we can say that we have done well and yet can do better.


