The nomination is announced today of Honourable Paul Tourigny, M. L. C. of Victoriaville, as a member of the Board of Control of the Bank for the Savings Department, following the vacancy created by the recent death of Mr. J. A. Richard.

Honourable Mr. Tourigny is a well-known personality in financial and industrial circles. A DENTAL DISCOVERY COMES FROM ONTARIO

Toronto, Jan. 10.—Elimination of the danger of abscesses at the roots of the teeth, which is responsible for a variety of ill ranging from rheumatism to eye trouble, is expected to be the result of research work which has been carried out for five years at the University of Toronto, and which is only now revealed. The new discovery consists of using copper amalgam as a permanent filling for the root canals of the tooth. This has been used before as a filling for teeth, but, until the research work at the University, it was not known to have permanent germicidal effect.

THE JURY SYSTEM

Reference was made in the Speech from the Throne delivered by the late Governor General, the late Governor of the Province, last week that it was the intention of the Quebec Government to amend the law governing the jury system. This amendment should be received cordially, not only by the legal profession, but also by the public at large. Within recent years it has been apparent that the system devised to overcome difficulties of another age, had become enmeshed with abuses resulting from the development of society. There have been arguments in favor of the abolition of the system altogether. These were based upon popular conceptions of what were believed to be misadjudication of justice. Without entering upon a discussion of the merits of that argument it would appear that the wiser course is the one suggested in the Speech that the law can be so amended as to eliminate the abuses that now hamper its effectiveness. It will be much better than scrapping a law that is, after all, not merely part and parcel of the constitution, but represents, within due limits, the legal rights of every man. By extending the classes for the selection of jurymen and the elimination of unfair exemptions, much can be done. The message to be introduced by the government in this respect should command the unqualified respect of all citizens.

THE NEXT MOVE

In last week's issue of the Graphic there appeared an article dealing with the much-discussed interprovincial bridge project. It was stated in that article that a fresh move would shortly be made to bring this long-debated matter to a head and that the next most necessary step was to ascertain the attitude of the Quebec government in regard to this issue.

So far as we know, no definite plans for a fresh campaign on behalf of this undertaking, have been formulated in the past week. We would therefore be appointed to go before the provincial house in Quebec during its present sessions and find out definitely what the Quebec government is prepared to do in regard to this important project.

Were the proposed bridge across the Restigouche not an enterprise of such tremendous potential benefit to the undeveloped Gaspé Peninsula and did it not have so much to recommend it as far as both provinces are concerned, the seeming indifference of the Quebec government might be excused. But in the light of facts as they are known, unnecessary delay and side-stepping should not be tolerated.

It is quite unnecessary to reiterate the advantages that this part of the country would enjoy through the success of the long-debated bridge measure. It is equally unnecessary to enumerate the many feeble and unavailing attempts that have been made on behalf of its promotion. Now is an opportune time to make a fresh start; and it is evidently up to our influential business men to co-operate and take a decisive step in the matter. Success may not be far away but nothing further will be accomplished with co-operative effort. Let us see what can be done within the next week.

PHONE GIRL HEARS DYING WOMAN'S CRY
 New Jersey Operator Summons Police, Who Call a Physician Just in Time to Aid Heart Attack Victim

New York, Jan. 7.—"Listening in" to supervise telephone lines in her care, Miss Jennie Boylan, a supervisor in the Union Hill, N. J., Company, Saturday afternoon heard a woman cry, "I'm dying." The call was from the home of Mrs. Olga Ashe, of 416 Liberty Street, Union Hill. Miss Boylan called Police Headquarters and under instructions flashed a call for help to the patrolman on the beat nearest Mrs. Ashe's home. Patrolman John Bozberger caught the flash and answered the telephone. Getting the address from Miss Boylan he hurried to the house and found Mrs. Ashe unconscious from a heart attack. He called a physician who administered a stimulant and ordered the patient to the North Hudson Hospital, where it was said she probably would recover, but that failure to get help when Mrs. Ashe called would have resulted in her death.
