MISSISSIPPI LEGISLATURE REBUKES APPEAL FOR JUSTICE

(By The Associated Negro Press) Washington-A short time ago the Governor of Mississippi, who belongs to a new generation, made a plea for learger justice for the racial people of his State. This was followed by a delegation of representative colored men appearing before the legislature of the State with a prepared statement setting forth the various items of consideration under the plea for justice. Dr. S. D. Redmand, of Jackson, one of the wealthiest men of the State, read the address.

The attitude of the "great" Mississippi legislature is disclosed in the following set of typical Southern Democratic resolutions which were introduced by Guion, Rice and Collins, and adopted without debate:

"Whereas, on Monday, January 28th, a delegation of Negroes, claiming to be the representative leaders and spokesmen of their race, asked for the privilege of addressing this House, and were accorded that privilege and given a fair court ous hearing, and

"Whereas, a short time thereafter members of the House received through the mail a circular letter from said delegation, in which they asked for certain changes in the laws and Constitution of the State, particof the school funds of the State between the races; a change of the laws pertaining to separate accomodations for the races on the railroad and sleeping cars, and a modification of the suffrage laws, and

Whereas, it is the sense of this House that the happiness, prosperity and safety of all the people in the State have been greatly promoted by the policy and laws of the State of Mississippi with reference to the questions above mentioned and that there is no necessity for a change of law and policy. It is therefore:

"Resolved, by the House of Representatives of the State of Mississippi, that we do now re-affirm our faith and confidence in the Constitution, laws and policies of this State, pertaining to accommodations for the races on railroads and sleeping cars, schools, suffrage and other cognate subjects, which in the opinion of this House guarantees to all our citizens, regardless of race, color, or previous condition of servitude, the full and free

enjoyment of life, liberty, property, and the pursuit of happiness.

"Resolved, Further hat the demands for social equality of this delegation of Negroes and of all other Negroes who may hold similar views, be fairly repelled and denied, and that we condemn all such Negro agitators, and all whites, if there be, who may sympathize with them, as being detrimental to the welfare of Mississippi and to the best interests of both races." Then it is wondered why the South is losing Colored people by the tens of thousands.

Co-Operative Dairying Pays

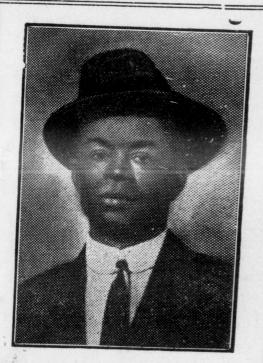

6,000 MILES OF PADDLING

The Hawaiian Islands, the crossroads of the Pacific, are the most isolated inhabited islands in the world. More than 3000 miles from the nearest neighbor, California, writes Gilbert Grosvenor in the National Geographic magazine.

The peoples who occupied these islands for untold centuries before the first white man came, deserve to be called, because of their daring ventures at sea, the Vikings of the Pakific. They went to sea in canoes hollowed out of single logs by tools cunningly made of rock and hard lava. They had no metals. Some of the canoes made on the islands were seventy feet long and could carry fifty or more men. The giant koa tree, from which they were fashioned were cut high up on the mountains, painfully and laboriously, with stone axes, and then, with ropes made of vines, dragged shoreward by hundreds of willing

"It is believed the Polynesian race, to which the Hawassans belong, originated in India. Their voyages across the pathless seas rival those of the Vikings, with no compass to assist them and with only the stars and sun to guide them, they broke through the skyline to journey 2,000 or 3,000 miles in their frail, but unsinkable craft.

COLUMBIA STANDS BY NEGRO STUDENT

(By the Associated Negro Press) New York, April-When white American students of Columbia University rose in protest against Frederick Wells, black American, because of his residence in Furnald Hall, university dormitory, they were informed by Dean Herbert E. Hawkes, that no "color line" would be tolerated at the university. At the same time Wells issued a statement expressing his determination to remain and thirty white students signed a petition, attacking those who objected to the presence of Wells in the dormitory which houses Japanese, Chinese, Hindu and American black and white students.

Columbia university thus deals much more decisively with this phase of race prejudice than did Harvard, which some time ago was the center of much discussion because of the denial of the son of Roscoe Bruce of admittance to one of its dormitories. No Harvard students are known to have stood out for Bruce. A recent bold stand of Columbia was its determination not to recall its invitation to Giovanni Papini, author of "The Life of Christ" to lecture at the university after many persons had objected to Papini because of his alleged radicalism and anti-American-

Burleigh, for 30 years baritone soloist of the church, was so large that it was necessary to call special policemen to make way for traffic in the street. CHRISTIANITY AND THE BRITISH COMMONWEALTH

The great Christian Poet, Dante, believed profoundly in the divine election of the Roman Empire. Rome, he was quite sure, had "a special birth and special progress thought out and ordained by God." He discerned the purpose of the Almighty to be the reconformation of the human creature to Himself. The supreme act of God was the sending forth His Son to earth to effect this harmony. In preparation for this advent there had been two outstanding events; the birth of David, of whose house He was to come, and the birth of Rome which was to prepare the world for His coming. Dante believed that God had guided and controlled the destiny of thee Roman people: "many a time the arm of God was seen to be present" in their history. To those who held that the power of Rome was acquired not by reason or by universal consent, but by force, he would answer that force was not the moving but the instrumental cause.

The British Commonwealth is a wider area than it ever entered the mind of Caesar to conquer-a quarter of the earth's surface. No one man, nor any set of men ever planned it. It is simply a part of the divine plan. It has grown, not of itself, but in the eternal purpose of God. In her ample domain there dwell some of all of the races of mankind.

Does it not appear then, that Pritons have been called to perform the pleasure of the Almighty, as was the Roman Empire of yesteryear?

Assuming that this is true, what this holy election and this sacred duty? Should they assume a spirit of arrogance or should they be imbued with the spirit of meekness and of sacrifice? If Britons are ever inclined to become narrow and to look contempt for any people, whoever they may be, Britons should remember God's warning, through Amos. to Israel: "You only have I known of all the families of the earth; therefore, I will visit upon you all your iniquities." A people who believe they have a mission from God, whose possessions include all the races of the earth should be free from arrogance, contempt, prejudice and narrow-minded-

ness. Of the \$450,000,000 British subjects, about 47,000,000 reside in Great Britain and Ireland. Of the remainder, 18,000,000 are of British European stock. What a great opportunity has this sixty-five millions, to carry on the torch of Christianity to the remaining three hundred and eighty-five millions. The British people are in a position to do either more harm or more good for the cause of Christianity than any other nation of the world to-day. Which shall it be?

THE FUGITIVE'S FAREWELL

The following verses, signed by R. T. Reed, appeared in "The Voice of the Fugitive," at Sandwich, Upper Canada, on January 15th, 1852. At this time the operations of the Fugitive Slave Law were driving many of the Colored free people of the North into Canada and making it much more difficult for a slave to escape from bondage. The verses appear worthy of reprinting and have been supplied to The Dawn of Tomorrow by Prof. Fred. Landon, of the University of Western Ontario:

Farewell to the home of my childhood.

Farewell to the land of my birth; The fountain, the grove and the wildwood-

The loveliest portion of earth; Yes, sweet sunny southland I bid thee farewell,

And go to a country of strangers to dwell.




