

REPULSES COST GERMANS HEAVILY

Attempt To Capture British Trenches Failed, and Dead Were Many.

[Canadian Press.] LONDON, Feb. 2.—9:35 p.m.—A tremendous loss of life was suffered by the German army in attempting to take British entrenchments, according to the report of a British eye-witness of two German attacks between the LaBasses Canal and the Bethune road, January 29. "In the centre," says the report of the eye-witness, "our men, firmly established in the brick fields, gave the Germans a very warm reception, and the latter fell back, leaving fifty dead in front of this point alone.

"To the south of it they temporarily gained possession of a small portion of one o. our trenches, but were immediately counter-attacked with the bayonet, and every man in the trench The same thing happened close to the Bethune road, where the Germans gained another of our trenches, only to be bayonetted to a man. "After the fighting was over, the enemy's dead, to the estimated number of two hundred, lay thick all along our

Our casualties were slight. This attack, like those delivered Givenchy and at Zonnebeke on the 25th, was a costly failure, resulting only in a great waste of life. It was made by some 300 men in the first line, and 300 more in support occupying the trenches vacated by the first line when it moved

The Canadian authorties demand his extradition, and the United States Government will naturally grant the request. He will be taken back to Canada, which has jurisdiction over his crime, and be tried for the offence that he has committed.

No "Political" Excuse. The fact that he calls himself a German officer, and pretends that his criminal exploit was a political act, is no oncern of the United States. He might have gone over to Canada and robbed a bank, or forged a check, or killed a policeman, and called it a political but the United States Government would be unlikely to agree with him.

If one German subject in the United States, having crossed the Canadian oundary and committed a crime, could lawfully demand the protection of the American Government, 200,000 German subjects in the United States could cross the frontier, commit 200,000 crimes against Canada, and pretend that they had been engaged in political exploits not subject to the penal code. Penitentiary Crime.

The time has not yet come when aliens temporarily in the United States have rights and privileges superior to the rights and privileges of American

Blowing up bridges is not commonly interpreted in this country as a political act. Several noted Labor leaders are serving terms in the penitentiary similar offences, and even they did not pretend that dynamite was merely political in its effects. Germans who wish to cross from the United States into Canada and commit crimes of violence will have to take their chances with the Canadian courts. 



Evidence has been taken in California and records produced there to prove the child legitimate.

Petrograd, Feb. 3.—Successes for the Russian armies in the region of Warsaw and in the Carpathians are recounted in an official Russian statement issued here today. Confirmation is given also to the report that German troops have been sent to the Carpathians to assist their Austrian allies. The text of the communication follows:

"The engagements in the region of Miawa have continued favorable to our troops. On the left bank of the Vistula the battle on the roads from Bolimow proceeded on February 1 with considerable intensity. A large number of heavy and light batteries participated energetically in the engagement.

Recaptured Trenches.

"The German attack on the morning of the second, north of Borjimow, was repulsed with great losses for the enemy. A violent combat was begun south, near the village of Goumine, where we lost January 21. The possession of a small farm still is undecided.

"South of the Pilica, near Dounaietz, the enemy increased the intensity of his bombardment, continuing night and day, but attempts of the enemy's troops to make progress were without success.

'In the Carpathians the conflict continued January 31 and February 1. Our forces advanced, fighting, along the broad front at Dukla Pass as far as the lower San, having crossed the principal ridge of the mountain range in the region of Jasilska and Mezo Laboroz, where we took a battery of six cannon, two mortars, a number of rapid-firers, and numerous prisoners. An offensive movement undertaken by the enemy southeast of Uzsok Pass was repulsed.


