#### Drunkard's Children **Get Big Damages**

Chicago, Jan. 12. - Damages in \$17,500 were awarded by a jury yesterday to the children of a drunken father for redress against the saloonkeepers, alleged to have made a drunkard of him. The verdict, establishing a precedent which will result in the institution of many similar suits, was rendered in Judge Richard S. Tuthill's court. The plaintiffs were the five children of John Hedlund, and the defendants, Oscar Geyer, Louis Lundquits and Ernest Thoren, saloonkeepers. The verdict is against them separately and

The man's brain was bemuddled and crazed with drink till he saw double, quadruple, a hundredfold-the planet Jupiter, for instance, with fifty moons, a simple country church with ninety steeples.

No doubt vodka had done its part. He had had to brace up with frequent potations, which, however, for a seasoned Russian, would never have unfitted him for walking a crack from stem to stern of the ship. A curious condition has developed in Detroit which threatens the existence of its new speedway. ## MAYOR'S WARNING MIGHT MISLEAD

#### His Position Regarding Improvements-Opposes Increase of Uncontroliable Debt.

Mayor Judd last night warned the board of works against making too many improvements this year, for fear of running up the tax rate. He referred to the fact that last year local improvements to the amount of about \$160,000 had been made and he apparently considered that his predecessors were to blame for making these improvements.

In this matter the public are likely to be misled. In a nutshell, the improvements were made in accordance with the petitions of the people who were desirous of improving the streets. For example, the people petitioned for pavements, sidewalks, curbs and gutters, etc., and the council granted the prayers of the petitioners. The people pay the entire cost of the pavements, with the exception of the street intersections, the cost of which is borne by the city. The people also pay one-half the cost of all sidewalks, and curbs and gutters laid. That is, the city issues debentures for the cost of the walks, etc., payable in ten years, and then the people pay one half the cost with the interest, in ten

the other half. It is thus seen that last year's council simply made local improvements in people who stood ready to pay their legal share of them. If the council had refused the prayers of the petitions, the improvement of the city would be simply held back. 



be home for a few days. Speaking of the proposed hygienic institute for London, Mr. Beck said that as a cabinet minister he could not say anything as to London's chances of securing the institute. He has, however, arranged for a meeting with the Premier on Wednesday next when the London deputation will go to Toronto to urge the city's claims for the

institute. This deputation will be composed of a number of prominent local phystcians, prominent business men and members of the city council. They will be accompanied by representatives from many places in Western Ontario come this way, as it will be sure to

the medical men in the west. In Toronto the feeling is that London's chances are very bright. In fact, a dispatch received from Sem!-official quarters declares that the institute will be granted this city, in accordance with the promise made by ex-Premier Ross three years ago. The dispatch adds that the building will be in connection with the Western Medical College, and will cost, with its laboratory equipment, about \$75,000. It will be controlled by the Government and will be accessible to all.
