WHAT'S THE USE?

INVOLVING 100 MILLION

Fords, Father and Son, and Couzens Now the Sole Owners.

Detroit, July 11 .- Reorganization of the Ford Motor Company is being completed, whereby Edsel B. Ford, 25-year-old president of the company, becomes with the exception of one other stockholder, the sole partner with his father, Henry Ford, in the corporation. This announcement was made here today by Frank L. Klingensmith, vicepresident and general manager of

the company. Mr. Klingensmith announced that purchase had been arranged of all purchase had been arranged of all the minority stock, excepting a block held by James Couzens, millionaire mayor of Detroit, and former vice-president of the company. Mr. Klingensmith and other officials of the company refused to divulge the amount involved in the purchase. It was estimated in financial circles, however, that it would total close to \$100,000,000. Up to the present Henry Ford has held 58½ per cent of the Ford Motor stock. The minority stock bought in included that of John F. and Horace E. Dodge, heads of the in included that of John F. and Horace E. Dodge, heads of the Dodge Motor Company.

Today's announcement comes as a complete surprise in motor and financial circles, as it had been rumored for some weeks that another large automobile corporation was seeking the minority holdings.

Contract Made For 250,000 Tons of Ship's Plates, To Be Delivered Within Five Ye ars' Time - Dominion Steel Company Gets Big Contract.

Montreal, July 11.-A contract for 250,000 tons of ship's plates, involving five years' work, and the completion of the erection of a monster rolling plant at Sydney, N. S., costing about \$5,000,000, was let today to the Dominion Steel Company by the Federal Government, according to an announcement by Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine. The contract was accepted by the company at 50 cents per hundred pounds lower than the price now

The announcement of the letting of the ships plate contract indicates that Canada is to continue its ship-building program. The order will likely cause the settlement of the troubles of several thousand mill workers at Sydney, and shipworkers in plants in Montreal, who were either thrown out of work or struck new wage demands could not be met by the shipbuilding companies ntil the contract was let

The new price will be \$3.65 per 100 pounds. The original contract was let in 1918, but was not proceeded with when the trmistice was signed. 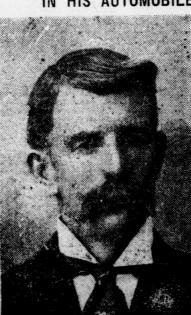

DIRIGIBLE NEAR AZORES NEW YORK IRISH MAKING GOOD TIME, SAYS WIRELESS

Steamer Reports R-34 Flying At a Low Altitude-Now Half Way Across Ocean.

London, July 11.—In the first 24 hours of her return flight across the Atlantic from Mineola, the dirigible R-34 covered 1,300 miles, according to advices received here. The dirigible speeding eastward across the Atlantic at 12:10 o'clock 6:eenwich time today had reached 46 degrees north latitude, 39 degrees 50 minutes west longitude, approximately 1,500 miles from her starting point.

Up to the time of her report at 11:10 o'clock the R-34 had consumed 1,638 gallons of gasoline, leaving her with 3,027 gallons still in her tanks. This was taken to indicate that the dirigible was being aided by the wind.

Washington, July 11.—An approaching packer domination of all important foods in the United States and an international control of meat products with foreign companies seem a certainty, unless fundamental action is taken to prevent it, the federal trade commission declared today in part one of its report to President Wilson on the "extent and growth of power of the packers in meat and other industries.'

Threaten Freedom of Markets.







know all about it, had it doped out this way: The greatest ornament of an illustrious life is modesty and humility, which go a great way in the character even of the most exalted princes.

There are methods of permitting the most free enterprise in this country in which men can amass reasonable profits without piling up millions and watering capital. It is the combine and manipulation of prices that cut so deeply into the prices paid for necessities.



After the soup has been strained and the vegetables rubbed through a sieve the former is returned to the pot. Two tablespoonfuls of flour are next browned in a roasting tin in the oven. The browned flour is moistened with a little cold water, there being afterward added a dessertspoonful of salt and a good shake of pepper. This thickening is stirred into the soup and the squares of rabbit added. Next boil for 10 minutes, when the soup will be ready.

Accompanying the letter for publication is a personal one to the editor. signed with their own names, in which they state that they have tried to make clear that it was not the amount of the remuneration with which they found fault, but the unnecessary hardships imposed in the way of living conditions They add that, while they prefer that their names should not be published, they are quite willing to be interviewed on the subject by letter or telephone by anyone whom the editor considers it wise to trust with their names and

THE LETTER.

London, July 7, 1919. Dear Editor Consumers' League: We have read with much interest the interview with Miss Mc-Crimmon which appeared in your Consumers' League page last Fri-

We are keenly interested in the experiences of other girls who have rendered patriotic service doing farm work, having enlisted ourselves for the purpose last sum-

We know something of hardships encountered, and have no objections to these, so long as they are legitimate hardships. Our experience, however, has given us an idea why it is reported there is difficulty this year in getting girls

to supply the demand for farm help. When we offered our services last year, it was not wit hany idea of making money. We were impelled by patriotic motives to do our part at home, even as our brothers were doing their part to win the war overseas. We wanted to be fighting with and for them, and we were willing to work hard and cheer-

"NO HIRED MAN WOULD

But we did not anticipate living conditions with which no hired man would put up, conditions against which even a pig would be justified

To begin with, when we arrived we found there was no proper head for the camp, which had been running for several weeks. There was neither chaperonage nor protection for the girls in the camp of tents. situated a distance from the house. On our arrival in the evening we were ushered to a tent where departing farmerettes had left old shoes and discarded garments they

didn't consider fit to take away. We must state that this was POSITIVELY NOT a Y. W. C. A. supervised camp, though we were sent there by a government agency. Though it was September and raw and cold, wet weather, there was no floor in our tent, which had been used all summer.

CRIPPLED COTS. Our sleeping accommodation consisted of five-foot canvas cots. crippled ones at that, the canvas stretching a few inches above the

damp ground. We had taken our own blankets but had not been warned to take mattresses and pillows. The first night we had to borrow a candle from the cook, as we did not know we were required to bring our own candles

Our tent was located right next to the cook-house, and the side next the cook-house had been soaked with rain and did not get a chance to dry. We were nauseated by the musty odor when we entered. Immediately back of the tent was a stagnant ditch, intended to carry off the refuse from the cook-house. a stagmant ditch, intended to carry off the refuse from the cook-house. To add to our Joy, we were warned not to lift the damp flap of the tent to dry it, because that was where the snakes came in.

One of the first things that struck us was the poor location of the camp, on a small strip of grass. We stepped right off that into deep clay.

clay. A PLAGUE OF FLIES.

After our first meal we could thoroughly sympathize with Pharaoh in his plague of flies. It was necessary to wage warfare with a whole battalion of flies for every bite of food.

If we had gone to the trenches in France we would have expected such conditions. But we knew enough of farm life to thoroughly understand that hired men would never put up with conditions like that.

never put up with conditions like that.

When it came to pay, we found that our employer, like a number of the profiteers exposed in the recent investigations, was within his rights, according to the law. This does not say, however, that he was not taking advantage of the war patriotism on the part of women and girls eager to defeat the kaiser by saving the fruit crop.

All the profiteers in the war weren't the heads of packing, milling and cold storage companies.

Possibly this experience of ours was exceptional. We concede that probably the trouble in large measure was due to the fact that the camp lacked proper supervising. But we certainly wouldn't consider doing the work we did, for the pay we received, in normal times, unless the conditions were vastly different from those imposed upon us. As we stated before, we were willing to rendler good, hard service, and do so with all our heart and might, but even in war time we didn't enjoy being exploited.

Quite a lot of beans are being shipped from prices are realized for these: Quite a lot of beans are being shipped from this point, but they need rain badly. Early cabbage is also being shipped. Early potatoes are badly in need of rain, and they will be very scarce if rain does not come soon. Tobacco is badly in need of rain. The young plants have been killed and injured to a great extent by the drought and a great extent by the drought, and many farmers have had to replant more than half their crop. Hundreds of acres of land are idle through farmers not being able to work it through the long drought after the wet spell in the spring.

The soil has been plowed up in an extraordinary manner by thousands of poisonous gas bombs, which have tinged the sparse vegetation an unhealthy grey.

When the correspondent visited the locality in its state of hopevisited the locality in its state of less desolation, there were only sturdy optimists left, who led a cave-men's existence among the ruins. 

These include the monarch of the Canadian Rockies, Mount Robson (13,068 feet). There are no fewer than fifty peaks along the Grand Trunk Pacific line with altitudes of eight thousand feet or over. These mountains not only excel in the matter of height, but are seen in their full contour and majesty by reason of their sheer rise from the valley floor. Some of these great peaks are:
