

The Nationalist movement seems to be political rather than religious, it being declared by many not to be pan-Islamic in any way. Whether Bolshevism enters into the situation has not as yet developed, but it may turn in that direction. Mesopotamia has so far held aloof from the Russian Bolsheviki. Turkish newspapers frankly say that the Allies cannot muster sufficient strength to force an unacceptable peace upon the country. They point to Capt. d'Annunzio's defiance of the supreme council of the peace conference, and other instances in which the Allies have been powerless to enforce orders, and say it would be better, in any event, to risk humiliating defeat rather than have the country "turned into a group of Fluropean deanydencie."

PRESENT SESSION HAS BERLIN WORKERS SHOT DOWN BY REACTIONARY TROOPS FORCED TO LEAVE---50 KILLED IN LEIPSIC

German Capital Is Described As "a Barrel of Gunpowder Which May Be Ignited Any Minute" - Labor Classes Show Greatest Opposition To Kappist Soldiers-Revolution Is Imminent.

Paris, March 19.—Hundreds of persons have been killed in the mining districts of Germany in collisions between miners and troops, it is declared in reports from Germany received at, Copenhagen, the Central News correspondent in that city telegraphs.

Telegrams received from the big towns in Germany, the message states, shows that fighting is proceeding in nearly all the thickly-populated areas where soldiers and workers are opposed. The Communists are declared to be masters at Cassel,

London, March 19. — All Germany, with the exception of the southern states, is rebellious, and Berlin is a "barrel of gunpowder which may be ignited at any time," says a Berlin dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, filed at the German capital yesterday. The dispatch describes the withdrawal from Berlin of the Iron division and naval brigades, which marched down Unter Den Linden at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the midst of a pouring rain.





Trees Girdled Owing to the Scarcity of Green Food.

"The tender shoots should be cut from the limbs late in the winter before the tree has started its season's growth. They then should be kept in a cool place until the spring, when the trees again commence to

Will Grow Together.

"They are inserted about an inch apart all around the trunk, for the more scions that are used the quicker they will grow together and so form a new trunk. Three shoots, however, are enough to keep a tree alive. A slanting cut is made at each end of the wound in the uninjured wood, in which the ends of the scions are inserted. The shoots used should be strong, plump scions of the previous season's growth, not necessarily from the same tree, or even the same variety. They should be cut a little longer than the distance between the slanting cuts and the ends should be made wedge ends should be made wedge

"As soon as the scions are all placed around the tree, the wounds, especially about the ends of the scions where inserted in the stock, should be covered with grafting wax. The ends should be bandaged with a piece of sacking around the tree to aid in keeping the scions in place and to exclude the air. The tree should be well headed back."







Encourages Workmen To Get Homes of Their Own.

New Zealand first of all provides for her mothers through the National Pro-vident Fund, which came into operation March 1, 1911. The professed aim of vident Fund, which came into operation March 1, 1911. The professed aim of this is "to aid the family from birth to old age." Anyone living in New Zealand whose income for three years previous has not exceeded £250 a year can join. It is a most extensive and cheap life and accident insurance. There is no medical examination, the applicant merely filling out a form at any postoffice and paying his first weekly payment—18 cents a week for ages 16 to 22, 24 cents a week for ages 16 to 22, 24 cents a week for ages ages 16 to 22, 24 cents a week for ages 22 to 25, 30 cents a week for age 25

After five years on the fund the contributor if absent from work because of sickness receives nearly two dollars a week for every child in his family under 14. (N.B.—Having children is encouraged in every way in New circulating in the blood and poisoning

Besides Mothers' Pensions.

After five years on the fund, if contributor should die a pension of nearly two dollars a week is paid for each child he leaves under 14, and the same to the widow, as long as any child is under 14. (N.B.—This does not prevent the widow also receiving the regular mother's pension from the state.)

At the age of 60 the contributor receives a weekly pension of \$2.50 for life, and this does not prevent him getting the old-age pension in addition.

If the contributor dies without receiving any benefits, or benefits not equal to his contributions, the difference is returned to his relatives.

Now for the direct mothers' pen-Now for the direct mothers' pensions from the state.

Ontario Act.

In Ontario the government of Sir William Hearst was pledged to pass a mothers' allowance act on the following basis: The family must be residents of Ontario for two years. The father must have been a British subject. The father must either be dead, in insane asylum, or hospital for incurables. There must be one, or more children under fouror hospital for incurables. There must be one, or more children under fourteen. The mother and child, or children must own property valued at more than \$2,000 (exclusive of household goods), or \$500 in cash or bonds. The family must continue to reside in the province while receiving the pension; the exact amount of which was left to be arranged later.

The provisions regarding the father's condition, nationality, and residence, are much the same as in our proposed law; but the mother can own property bringing in an income of not more than \$150 a year; also her earnings must not exceed \$500 a year; but she can own in addition to a home—if she lives in it—assessed up to \$1,700. This is the only one of the many ways, in almost all their laws, wherein New Zealand does so encourage her workingmen to get so encourage her workingmen to get homes of their own. And it would be good for our mothers' pension act to let the widow own a small home, if she lived in it; and also we should take her earnings into consideration before deciding what her state pension should be. —Women's Century.

A common price for one of these shawls in the days when they were not a rarity, was £20, and they were worn by women of all classes in Scotland, except the very poor. Women's Gardening Association Is Enrolling Names For Such Work.

The advisability of advocating this industry for women has been talked of before. Some have thought that the work would be too hard, but the Women's Gardening Association has heard the arguments in its favor, and would like to encourage women to take up this work.

Mrs. Stewart Houston of Toronto, who has been working in gardens, greenhouses and gardening schools in England during the war, writes:

greenhouses and gardening schools in England during the war, writes:

"I became very much interested in my gardening work in England, and am hoping to take it up seriously here. I was for two years at a gardening college, and finished up with six months at the King's Conservatories at Frogmore. I feel very strongly that gardening schools are badly needed out here for women. Something quite different from the Guelph institution-private gardening schools such as Essex County, in England, possesses, and from which are turned out excellent gardeners for various branches of the calling. My opinion is that women would do their best work in greenhouses, and that winter gardening—I mean vegetable gardening—would pay excellently well in this country.

Would Speak Here.

"I have made inquiries, and personally inspected greenhouses in various localities, and seen for myself how well men are doing in this line. I am anxious to get people interested in the movement, and if you would like me to come and speak to your society on the subject should be glad to do so. I would like you to have seen the greenhouse I did today—only a small one, but it was growing beautiful lettuces, cress, radishes, parsley, seakale, rhubarb, tomato plants over a foot high, as well as many flowers. Quite an object lesson of what can be produced in a very restricted area. I feel sure there is no end to the possibilities of winter gardening for women in our country."

BRIG-GEN. ROSS FOR VETERANS

Denounces Treatment Returned Men Received From Union Govt.

GLASS OF BEER GONE

Social Life Must Be Substituted—Favors Sunday Baseball.

TORONTO, March 18 .- Soldier and abor representatives took up the debate on the speech from the throne in the Ontario Legislature today, and from both elements came warnings of impending serious unrest if certain conditions were not met. Brig.-Gen. A. E. Ross (Kingston), said that in taking away from the soldier his social

A. E. Ross (Kingston), said that in taking away from the soldier his social glass of beer legislators had left him no other meeting place than the street corner. Mayor M. MacBride (Brantford) declared that serious unrest was being occasioned among returned soldiers and workmen by the vulgar display of wealth on city streets, and urged that public men put themselves on record against it.

Brig.-Gen. Ross was accorded generous applause from the Conservative benches when he arose to deliver his first address. While great things had been expected from the Drury Government he regretted to have to say that the menu prepared for the banquet looked no better than those of former years, and was apparently was to be served in the same old dishes in the same old way.

Grievance of Veterans.

Brig.-Gen. Ross went on to voice the grievance of returned soldiers, many of whom, he said, had come back only to find their positions filled by men younger than they and more able to have represented their country on the firing line. Some returned men, he declared, had even discovered that their war record mitigated against them in peace activities. He had several incidents to quote and ended by pointing out that before Lieut.-Col. Cooper, M.P.P., with honors and four years' service, could secure appointment in the militia there were 950 permanent officers in this country who must first be placed in positions. Of the 950 the speaker was ready to guarantee that eighty per cent of them had during the war been holding down cushy jobs in Ottawa and London.

Glass of Beer Gone.

What had come to take the place of the glass of beer, of which the soldiers had been deprived during their absence. The only place upon which they could meet now was the street corners, "where they get discontent. unrest, dissatisfaction." While he was absolutely, in accord with abolition of the bar something must be done to restore to the men something of social life.

Overseas they had been accustomed to Sunday baseball. "And who will put up the least objections," Brig.-Gen Ross declared, "to any game of baseball, cricket or anything else on a Sunday afternoon?" (Applause).

The speaker regretted the entire absence in the speech from the throne of reference to public health legislation. After declaring that he wasn't one who would speak on the subject with hushed breath, he proceeded to quote startling statistics in regard to Ontario's venereal disease.

Not for a minute did the speaker accept the premier's statement that the U. F. O, wasn't a class movement or that the present Government wasn't a class government. Referring to the absence of eight hour days formed.

a class government. Referring to the absence of eight-hour day reference in the speech, he pictured the labor ship as being "souttled." He was in favor of sane patronage.

His concluding remarks were a criticism of the Drury Government for "debauching" with liquor Ontario's sister province, and a defence of the old political retries. a class government. Referring to the absence of eight-hour day reference old political parties, whom it was popular to defame.

If the legislative bill-of-fare did not contain all the planks of the Labor party's platform, Mr. MacBride reminded his Liberal and Conservative friends that there was good material evidence in that document of recognition being given Labor by the present Government.

He pointed out that Labor could take much more satisfaction from this He pointed out that Labor could take much more satisfaction from this sessional program than at those sessions when they were compelled to take what satisfaction they could out of the promise of "serious consideration" of the then government. Labor realized, he said, it couldn't get all its wants in a day.

He made particular reference to the mothers' pensions legislation heralded in the speech from the throne. "I notice a couple of my friends opposite smiling," he said, "and I presume they are going to take credit for the latelamented Hearst Government for the mothers' pension bill. I want to assure you that when you see that pension bill it will be a much different bill than the one proposed by our friends on the opposite side of the House." The minimum wage board which was to be appointed, he said, would give protection particularly to young working girls and boys.

Mr. MacBride confessed to amusement every time he heard the old political parties sympathizing with the laboring men when discussing temperance legislation. "I want to say for Labor," he declared, "that Labor has made more real progress for the general development of this province and country since the curse of strong drink and the temptation connected therewith was taken away than before."

Against Patronage.

than before."

Against Patronage.

The speaker declared he would vote with both hands and for all he was worth for the abolition of the old spoils system in connection with the patronage system. Labor, he said, was behind hydro even if labor men did not agree with Sir Adam Beck in every particular.

During the five years of war, he said, 112 000 children had died from preventable causes, through undesirable conditions of living, inadequate clothing, inadequate food. "We have no right to call ourselves a Christian nation." he declared, "and we have no right to play our pomp and hypocrisy until we realize this vital fact and commence to grapple with it."



QUEBEC'S QUARANTINE JAPAN FAST RISING IN STEEL INDUSTRY KEPT OUT SMALLPOX

Workers in Incredibly Short Time.

No many decades ago the ruling classes of Japan addressed themselves to the formidable task of appropriating western material civilization, which in a sense has been founded upon iron

The task was approached almost empty handed, with practically nothing in the way of science, traditions, mechanical equipment or industrial experience and with but slender resources of any sort.

Barriers of language and means made acquisition of the necessary learning very difficult. There was little experience in the use of metals for construction and manufactures, wood being the standard material of the nation. Houses and even boats were put together without nails or metals of any sort.

Limited to Swords. Well established competitors abroad could produce at costs far below Japanese enterprisers. Traces of these old handicaps still cling persistently to to the iron industry of the present day, and no proper understanding of the situation can fail to take them into ac-

In spite of this most meagre back-ground from which to make a begin-ning it should be said that from ancient, even mythological times, there has been metal and from working of a

has been metal and fron working of a sort in Japan.

But this was limited to sword making and to works of art under the patronage of the leudal lords. Encased in the mysterious secrecy of the guilds the knowledge and practice of metal working was never widespread.

During the latter half of the past century with the gradual introduction into Japan of ideas from abroad came the first positive attempts to establish the iron industry along modern lines.

Between 1874 and 1883 the then department of public works of the government acquired and operated the old Kamaishi iron mine, but gave up the enterprise after having lost 2,000,000 yen, or \$1,000,000. Subsequently in private hands this mine has become the most important private one in Japan.

War Stimulates Industry. The need of iron and steel in con-ection with the Chino-Japanese war in 1894-95 led finally to another government iron and steel works, which began actual operations in 1901.

Up to this time private enterprise, also stimulated by the war with China. also stimulated by the war with China, had been making some progress, but the end of the century found the total output of steel on the decline and standing below 1,000 metric tons a year, while imports totalled over a quarter of a million tons annually. Pigiron production stood at something over 20,000 metric tons a year.

The opening of the twentieth century found the industry still a negligible factor, but it stood at the door of an expansion which cannot be called other than remarkable in view of the obstacles which had to be overcome.

obstacles which had to be overcome. Although the original plan of the government works had called for an annual steel output of 90,000 tons the country did not once equal this amount until 1907.

until 1907.

Nevertheless the effect of the government's operations, which effectively began in May, 1901, and the stimulus of the Russo-Japanese war may be noted in the rapid and steady increase for the next five years.

From 1901 to the end of 1905 the total yearly output increased 40 fold and yearly output increased 40 fold and thereafter about tripled every five years. In 1900 less than 1 per cent of the demand of the country for steel was satisfied by domestic production; in 1902 about 15 per cent was produced at home; by 1911 this had risen to 30 per cent, and in 1912 to 33 per cent.

The advent of the war made clear as never before the prime importance of iron and steel, and at the same time cave extraordinary stimulus to private enterprise in the form of enormous profits. In 1917 a law was passed for the encouragement of the iron and steel industry.

The new legislation provided that companies producing over 35,000 tons of steel annually should have special privileges for acquiring land for steel millis; the free importation of raw materials, tools and machinery; exemption from taxes and other attractive privileges.

Private enterprise, which had been lagging before the war, was quick to respond. Practically all the firms extended their operations, and new companies were promoted by the score.

Changes From Nation of Wood Epidemic Was Held At Bay by Train Inspection.

MONTREAL, March 17.-How the superior board of health of the Provsuperior board of health of the Province of Quebec held at bay the outbreak of smallpox in Ontario, and prevented it from passing into Quebec is revealed in statistics which were givenyesterday by Dr. E. M. A. Savard, general inspector of the board. In this fight against the disease it was realized that the municipalities which were on the boundary line between the two provinces were incapable of taking the necessary precautions; hence the superior board of health took the matter in hand by establishing a quarantine at the frontier. The first step taken was the frontier. The first step taken was to order the examination of every train coming from Ontario. For this purpose thirty special medical inspectors were appointed, and the statistics which fol-low will convey some idea of the magnitude of the task undertaken

Between January 8 and March 8, 1,501 trains were entered by the inspectors and 89,275 passengers from Ontario were on the trains. Of these, 69,933 travelers had vaccination certificates which were examined and stamped, and 12,549 had vaccination marks, which were verified. There were 6,639 passengers who had neither certificate nor vaccination marks, and who submitted to vaccina-tion being performed. There were, however, 154 recalcitrants who refused blankly to be operated on, and in such cases the inspectors of the board were adamant, the result being that that number was turned back and prevented from crossing into this province.

Proof of Benefit. .

The successful result of this quarantine is seen in the figures, showing to what extent smallpox at that period was existent in this province. The total number of cases under treatment daily 23rd, 61; 25th, 62; 27th, 57; 28th, 56; 29th, 53; February 2nd, 153; 3rd, 150; 5th, 144; 9th, 144; 10th, 143; 11th, 141; 20th, 73; 23rd, 71; 25th, 75; 25th, 76; 25th, 76; 27th, smallpox was reported averaged fifteen during the month of February. Little Difficulty.

Alluding to the work carried out by the inspectors, Dr. Savard said considering the number of trains and the great number of passengers traveling from Ontario every day in this direction the result had been eminently satisfac-tory. Inspection was carried out with the minimum of difficulty, and most of those who raised objections subsequently agreed to be vaccinated rather than be turned back. Such passengers were taken off the trains and quarantined at certain stations, where they had the alternative of being sent back

to their starting point or being vac-cinated by the local doctors.

The quarantine also threw much additional work upon the head offices in Montreal, where Dr. Elzear Pelletier and his staff had many callers and telephone inquiries. In a good many cases the inquirers asked how long the quarantine would last, and decided to postone journeys until it was lifted. people going down to Ontario from this province were subject to the inspection along with those who resided there. The quarantine was raised at midnight on Monday, March 8.

BERLIN, March 18.—(Associated Press.)—The Ebert Government is again in control in Berlin. Vice-Chancellor Schiffer, in whose hands the sudden retirement of Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, placed the administrative ice, are engaged in bringing about order in the city and restoring activi-ties to their normal basis. In this connection, there was an unfortunate accident, wherein the firing of a mine to destroy a barricade at Kottsbuser in Southeastern Berlin, the explosion killed two persons and injured 28.

There were fewer disturbances in Berlin last night than any night since the beginning of the revolution. Several detachments of troops were sent away, but the majority were here this morning. Wilhelmstrasse was crowded with them, all carrying hand-grenades; several squads trundled machine guns and flame throwers. When the Baltic troops clear out, the work of guarding the city will be undertaken by regular government troops garrisoned in Berlin and the security police.

News Long Denied.

During the late hours of the night great excitement prevailed, though many of the population remained indoors. Newsboys with single-sheet editions of the Morgenpost and Vossische Veitung were literally mobbed, so eager was the desire to obtain news which had been so long denied.

Agitators appeared early in the morning and quickly drew crowds. In Wilhelmstrasse an old soldier harangued a group of comrades and civilians with a tirade against foreigners. There was a fresh outbreak of agitation against Jews, many of the street speakers calling upon the people to keep them out of public office.

A strange aeroplane drew thousands of eyes as it dropped leaflets signed "League of Professional Soldiers of Germany," stating that it was opposed to a new government and would recognize only the government to which it had sworn allegiance, and await the call of Noske to reorganize. Food prices have continued to soar, and there has been a scramble of the people generally to lay in as much as they could place their hands on. The markets were besieged and all the stalls soon stripped. Attempts at profiteering evoked bitter resentment. Inability of the poor to pay the high prices demanded for staple foods is bound to cause considerable distress and agitation.

This is a complete reversal of the opinion expressed Tuesday night by the same diplomats who then intimated that the Spartacist activities were more to be feared than the Kapp government.

AMERICANS SEND CALL FOR ASSISTANCE

Coblenz, March 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—Two hundred Americans who have been attending the fair at Leipsic have telegraphed and telephoned Major-Gen. H. T. Allen, commanding the American army of occupation, urgently asking for help to leave Leipsic, where they describe conditions as dangerous to their lives. Gen. Allen is sending a special train to bring the Americans away.

Firing is almost continuous in various parts of Leipsic, and all the light and water services have been cut off, according to the Americans, who are principally buyers from various parts of the United States.

Gen. Allen has directed the German railway commission of the Rhineland provinces to prepare a train, which will be in charge of a detachment of American soldiers. The train will carry sufficient fuel for the journey both ways, and food for several days for the guards and the returning Americans. The latter will probably be brought to Coblenz, but may, if the majority of them desire, be taken to the Swiss frontier. Gen. Allen has received something like half a hundred messages of distress, indicating that the situation has grown considerably worse during the grown considerably worse during the last 48 hours.

PARIS, March 18.—The general situation in Germany has much improved since yesterday, according to advices received by the German peace delegation here today.



REDS TRY TO BREAK OUT OF FORT WAYNE; ONE MAN SHOT IN LEG

Trouble Followed Return To the Jail of Nine Ringleaders.

DETROIT, March 18 .- Two hundred "Reds" confined at the Fort Wayne Military Barracks here attempted to overpower their guards and escape this afternoon, but were checkmated by the arrival of military reinforcements, and after a short struggle in which a num-ber of shots were fired, and one man shot in the leg, the aliens were herded back into confinement, according to Sergeant Mitchell, who was in charge

of the guards.

The attempt to break loose was the direct result of the return to the barracks of nine ringleaders in a hunger strike, who had been placed in another jail. 





QUEBEC HAS WON PLACE AS LEADER **AMONG PROVINCES**

Hon. Walter Mitchell Reviews Development in All

Montreal, March 17.—That the Province of Quebec stands at the head of confederation was the statement made by the Hon, Walter Mitchell, provincial treasurer, in his address before the Montreal Women's Club yesterday afternoon in the Central Y. M. C. A. hall, Drummond street. The speaker produced facts and figures to prove that in point of area, natural resources and financial stability this province surpasses any other in the dominion, and pointed out how this proud position as regards finance and development had been won within the last fifteen years. fifteen years. In a comprehensive review of the

In a comprehensive review of the Government's financial policy from 1905 to 1920, and more particularly an account of his stewardship during the past six years. Mr. Mitchell impressed his hearers with the wealth and importance of their native province, and the care being taken by the Government in administering this wealth. Twenty-five years ago, said the speaker, thousands of the inhabitants of Quebec were deserting Canada for the United States to find employment, and every year the Government reported a large deficit in the public treasury, while today thousands are coming into the province to obtain employment, and last year's surplus of \$95,000 was a fair example of the surplus of revenue above expenditure being declared every year.

Exact ligures showing the sources of revenue were given and the succession tax was declared to be most fair, as it was a rule levied on those who had done little or nothing to amass the fortune taxed, while the fortune itself had been brought together, in most cases, from the manipulation of the natural resources of the province.


