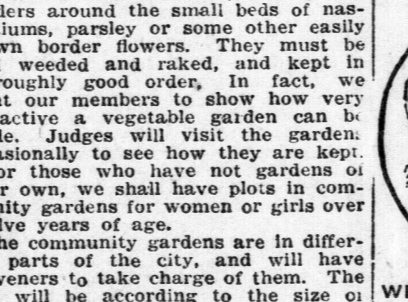

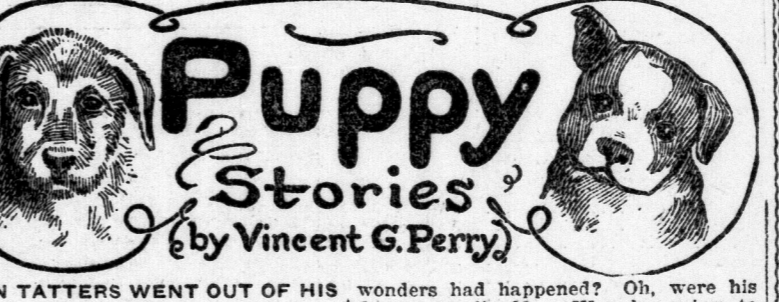

**BRIG-GEN. ROSS
WANTS FAIRNESS
FOR VETERANS**

**Denounces Treatment Re-
turned Men Received From
Union Govt.**

GLASS OF BEER GONE

**Social Life Must Be Substi-
tuted—Favors Sunday
Baseball.**

TORONTO, March 18.—Soldier and
Labor representatives took up the
debate on the speech from the throne in
the Ontario Legislature today, and
from both elements came warnings of
impending serious unrest if certain
conditions were not met. Brig-Gen.
A. E. Ross (Kingston), said that in
taking away from the soldier his social
glass of beer legislators had left him
no other meeting place than the street
corner. Mayor M. M. MacBride (Bram-
ford) declared that serious unrest was
being occasioned among returned sol-
diers and workmen by the vulgar dis-
play of wealth on city streets, and
urged that public men put themselves
on record against it.

Brig-Gen. Ross was accorded
enthusiastic applause from the Conservative
benches when he arose to deliver his
first address. While great things had
been expected from the Drury Govern-
ment he regretted to have to say that
the menu prepared for the banquet
looked no better than those of former
years, and was apparently was
served in the same old dishes in the
same old way.

Glass of Beer Gone.
Brig-Gen. Ross went on to voice the
grievances of returned soldiers, many of
whom, he said, had come back only to
find their positions filled by men who
were not only more able and more
have represented their country on the
firing line. Some returned men, he
declared, had even discovered that their
clients before. Lieut.-Col. Cooper,
M.P.P., with honors and four years'
service, could secure appointment in
the militia there were still permanent
officers in this country who must first
be placed in positions. Of the 500 the
speaker was ready to guarantee that
eighty per cent of them had during the
war been holding down cushy jobs in
Ottawa and London.

What had come to take the place
of the glass of beer, of which the sol-
diers had been deprived during their
absence. The only place upon which
they could meet now was the street
corner, where they get discontent,
unrest, dissatisfaction. While he was
absolutely, in accord with opinion of
the bar something must be done to
restore to the men something of social
life.

Overseas they had been accustomed
to Sunday baseball. "And who will
put up the least objections," Brig-Gen.
Ross declared, "to any game of base-
ball, cricket or anything else on a
Sunday afternoon?" (Applause).

The speaker regretted the entire
absence in the speech from the throne
of reference to public health legisla-
tion. After declaring that he wasn't
one who would speak on the subject
with hushed breath, he proceeded to
quote startling statistics in regard to
Ontario's venereal disease.

Not for a minute did the speaker
accept the premier's statement that
the U. F. O. wasn't a class movement
or that the present Government wasn't
a class government, referring to the
absence of eight-hour day reference
in the speech, he pictured the labor
ship as being "scuttled." He was in
favor of sane patronage.

His concluding remarks were a criti-
cism of the Drury Government for
"debauching" with liquor Ontario's
sister province, and a denunciation of
the old political parties whom it was
popular to denounce.

First Opportunity.
Labor members had their first op-
portunity to applaud when Mayor Mac-
Bride, Bramford, arose to address the
House. In his opening remarks he
paid a tribute to the memory of the
late Allan Studholme, M. P., and
his remarks concerning the pioneer
Labor member were warmly applauded
from Liberal and Conservative
benches.

If the legislative bill-of-fare did not
contain all the planks of the Labor
party's platform, Mr. MacBride re-
minded his Liberal and Conservative
friends that there was good material
evidence in that document of recog-
nition being given Labor by the pre-
sent Government.

Mothers' Pensions.
He pointed out that Labor could
take much more satisfaction from this
seasonal program than at those ses-
sions when they were compelled to
stare with satisfaction they could not
of the promise of "serious considera-
tion" of the then government. Labor
realized, he said, it couldn't get all its
wants in a day.

Mothers' Pensions.
He made particular reference to the
mothers' pensions legislation heralded
in the speech from the throne. "I
notice a couple of my friends opposite
smiling," he said, "and I presume they
are going to take credit for the late-
lamented Hearst Government for the
mothers' pension bill. I want to
assure you that when you see that
pension bill it will be a much different
bill than the one proposed by our
friends on the opposite side of the
House." The minimum wage board
which was to be appointed, he said,
would give protection particularly to
young working girls and boys.

Mr. MacBride confessed to amuse-
ment every time he heard the old
political parties sympathizing with
the laboring men when discussing tem-
perance legislation. "I want to say
for Labor," he declared, "that Labor
has made more real progress for
the general development of this prov-
ince and country since the curse of
strong drink and the temptation con-
nected therewith was taken away
than before."

Against Patronage.
The speaker declared he would vote
with both hands and for all he was
worth for the abolition of the old
spoils system in connection with the
patronage system. Labor, he said,
was behind hand even if labor men
did not agree with Sir Adam Beck
in every particular.

During the five years of war, he
said, 112,000 children had died from
preventable causes through unde-
rstandable conditions of living, in-
adequate clothing, inadequate food. "We
have no right to call ourselves a Christian
nation," he declared, "and we have
no right to play our pious and hypoc-
rasy until we realize this vital fact
and commence to errand with it."

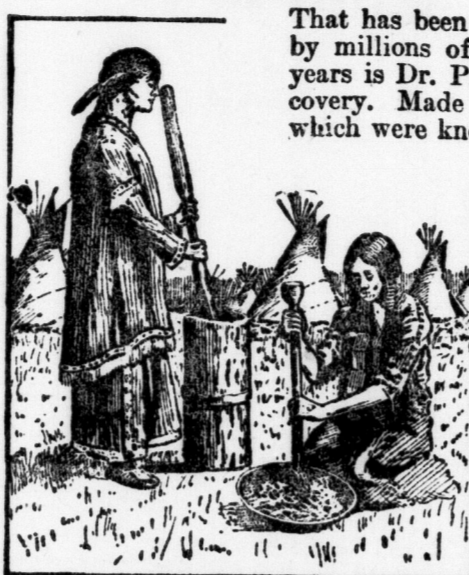
**SUGGEST CONFERENCE

see if an agreement can be reached on
the question of securing authority for
the Dominion Parliament to amend
the British North America act. If
the concurrence of the provinces is
secured it is proposed that an address
shall be presented to the King, re-
questing that the Parliament of the
United Kingdom should confer such
authority on the Dominion Parlia-
ment. At present amendments to the
constitution (the B. N. A. act) can
be made only by the Parliament of
the United Kingdom.

PORT LAMBTON, March 18.—North-
west is known here of Louis Heman,

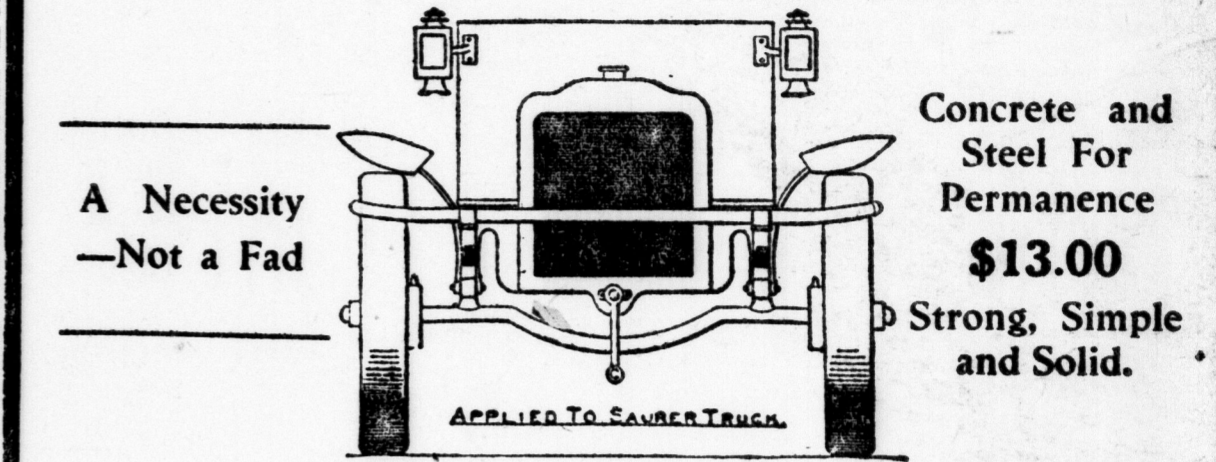

JAPAN FAST RISING IN STEEL INDUSTRY KEPT OUT SMALLPOX

Changes From Nation of Wood Workers in Incredibly Short Time.

No many decades ago the ruling classes of Japan addressed themselves to the formidable task of appropriating western material civilization, which in a sense has been founded upon iron and steel.

The task was approached almost empty handed, with practically nothing in the way of science, traditions, mechanical equipment or industrial experience and with but slender resources of any sort.

Barriers of language and means made acquisition of the necessary learning very difficult. There was little experience in the use of metals for construction and manufactures, wood being the standard material of the nation. Houses and even boats were put together without nails or metals of any sort.

Limited to Swords.

Well established competitors abroad could produce at costs far below Japanese enterprisers. Traces of these old handicaps still cling persistently to the iron industry of the present day, and no proper understanding of the situation can fail to take them into account.

In spite of this most meagre background from which to make a beginning it should be said that from ancient, even mythological times there has been metal and iron working of a sort in Japan.

But this was limited to sword making and to work of an artistic nature, the mysterious secrecy of the guilds, the knowledge and practice of metal working was never widespread.

During the latter half of the present century with the gradual introduction into Japan of ideas from abroad came the first positive attempts to establish the iron industry along modern lines.

Between 1873 and 1883 the then department of public works of the government acquired and operated the old Kamashi iron mine, but gave up the enterprise after having lost 2,996,069 yen, or \$1,996,069.

Private hands, this mine has become the most important private one in Japan.

War Stimulates Industry.

The need of iron and steel in connection with the China-Japanese war in 1904-05 led to another government iron and steel works, which began actual operations in 1907.

Up to this time private enterprise, also stimulated by the war with China, had been making some progress, but the end of the century found the total output of steel on the decline and standing below 1,000 metric tons a year, while imports totalled over a quarter of a million tons annually. Pig iron production stood at something over 20,000 metric tons a year.

The opening of the twentieth century found the industry still a negligible factor, but it stood at the door of an expansion which cannot be called other than remarkable in view of the obstacles which had to be overcome. Although the original plan of the government works had called for an annual steel output of 500,000 metric tons, the country did not once equal this amount until 1907.

Nevertheless the effect of the government's operations, which effectively began in May, 1901, and the stimulus of the Russo-Japanese war may be noted in the rapid and steady increase for the next five years.

From 1901 to the end of 1905 the total yearly output increased every five years, in 1900 less than 1 per cent of the demand of the country for steel was satisfied by domestic production; in 1902 about 15 per cent was produced at home; by 1911 this figure was 25 per cent, and in 1912 to 33 per cent.

At the beginning of the war home production just equaled imports. Within the space of 15 years the country had risen from a position of practically complete dependence on foreign supplies to the production of just one-half of its needs.

Government Takes Lead.

The government's energetic leadership in the industry was prompted by a keen appreciation of the importance of iron and steel, not only in time of war, but for the general industrial development of the country. Until the war boom this second enterprise, like the earlier one, had never been able to make both ends meet.

Not being primarily a business venture, it had to dispose of its products to the other government departments at less than market prices. To it fell also the task of leading the way in all sorts of difficult and untold lines, with profits as a secondary consideration. It also undertook to give assistance to private concerns by lending experts and training technicians for them.

The advent of the war made clear as never before the prime importance of iron and steel, and at the same time gave extraordinary stimulus to private enterprise in the form of enormous profits. In 1917 a law was passed for the encouragement of the iron and steel industry.

The new legislation provided that companies producing over 25,000 tons of steel annually should have special privileges for acquiring land for steel mills; the free importation of raw materials, tools and machinery; exemption from taxes and other attractive privileges.

Private enterprise, which had been flagging before the war, was quick to respond. Practically all the firms expanded their operations, and new companies were promoted by the score.

In fact, the outstanding feature of the period was the rapid rise to prominence of a number of private enterprises, some of which may possibly outstrip the government works in the near future. In March, 1919, the total capital invested in new concerns was estimated to be about 530,000,000 yen, exclusive of investments by the government in its enterprise.

NO MORE SPICE IN KANSAS DIVORCES

Testimony At Trials Now Confined To General Terms.

TOPEKA, March 12.—Divorce court is losing its attraction for the scoundrels of indelicacy, allegations are frequently "framed" by mutual agreement, say court officials, in order to conceal the real cause of matrimonial trouble. In other words, all the "spice" has been taken out of divorce trials.

Nearly all divorces are now granted by mutual consent, and have been tried without contest by either party over the facts. The difference which used to trial generally concern the amount of alimony or some other point not directly involving the reasons for dissolution. The most of such trials offers little on which the public may feed its appetite for sensation.

With agreement between both parties as to the desirability of separation, lawyers are glad to phrase their accusations of misconduct in the most general and gentlest terms. This practice saves clients from the humiliation of exposing the most unhappy details of their lives, the very details for which the public, or a very large class of the public, is most notorious.

Jury cases are now rare. In hearings by the court, both district judges more and more incline to the practice of holding trials in their private offices or at home when crowds are not likely to be in the courtroom.

The great majority of divorce suits—estimated at 85 per cent by officials of the court—are brought by wives. Wives take the initiative in divorce, formerly at least, as men takes the initiative, according to tradition, in matrimony. "The real aggressor is now, as difficult to identify in one case as the other."

Extreme cruelty, neglect of duty and desertion are the most common grounds for action. Once in a while the plaintiff sets forth a detailed account of the conduct giving rise to the charge, but readers more frequently seek shelter both parties from notoriety rather than to hold up the conjugal altar to public scorn.

For years the number of divorce cases in Topeka has been increasing more rapidly in proportion to the population, and in proportion to the number of marriages. The January record, however, does not show any marked increase. For last month, however, the proportion of divorce cases to other suits was less than in preceding months.

THE UPSIDE DOWN ARAB.

An Arab on entering a house removes his shoes, but not his hat. He mounts his horse upon the right side, and his wife milks the cow on the left side. In writing a letter he puts nearly all his compliments on the outside. His head must be wrapped up warm, even in summer, while his feet may well enough go naked in winter.

Every article of merchandise which is liquid or weighty, but he measures wheat, barley and a few other articles. He reads and writes from right to left. He eats scarcely anything for breakfast, about an hour of dinner, but after the work of the day he sits down to a hot meal swimming in oil or in boiling butter.

His wife sits with him, but the females of his house wait till his lordship is done. He takes a doze when traveling, his wife walking behind. He laughs at the idea of walking in the street with his wife or of even vacating his seat for a woman.

He knows no use for chairs, tables, knives, forks or even spoons, unless they are wooden ones. Bedsteads, bureaus and fireplaces may be placed in the same category.

KEEPS THE CATTLE AWAY.

Cattle will not allow young hazel, oak and most other trees and shrubs to survive in a pasture, save the American Forestry Magazine of Washington, but the thorn-apple bushes will flourish because the sharp thorns keep away the browsing cattle.

AFRICAN LION IN MEXICO.

Archaeologists are puzzled by the prehistoric carving of a lion near Vera Cruz. Efforts have been made to trace the origin of this little-known relic of prehistoric America, but have thus far proved futile. The similarity to the African lion rather than the mountain lion of this hemisphere has added to the mystery.

Quebec's Quarantine Epidemic Was Held At Bay by Train Inspection.

MONTREAL, March 17.—How the superior board of health of the Province of Quebec held at bay the outbreak of smallpox in Ontario, and prevented it from passing into Quebec is revealed in statistics which were given yesterday by Dr. E. M. A. Savard, general inspector of the board. In this fight against the disease it was realized that the municipalities which were on the boundary line between the two provinces were incapable of taking the necessary precautions; hence the superior board of health took the matter in hand by establishing a quarantine at the frontier. The first step taken was to order the examination of every train coming from Ontario. For this purpose thirty special medical inspectors were appointed, and the statistics which follow will convey some idea of the magnitude of the task undertaken.

Between January 8 and March 8, 1,601 trains were entered by the inspectors and 33,275 passengers from Ontario were on the trains. Of these, 69,833 travelers had vaccination certificates which were examined and stamped, and 12,549 had vaccination marks, which were verified. There were 4,639 passengers who had neither certificate nor vaccination marks, and who submitted to vaccination being performed. There were, however, 154 recalcitrants who refused blankly to be operated on, and in such cases the inspectors of the board were adamant, the result being that that number was turned back and prevented from crossing into this province.

Proof of Benefit.

The successful result of this quarantine is seen in the figures, showing to what extent smallpox at that period was existent in this province. The total number of cases under treatment daily was as follows: January 21, 79; 22nd, 65; 23rd, 61; 24th, 62; 25th, 57; 26th, 56; 27th, 52; February 2nd, 132; 3rd, 120; 5th, 144; 9th, 144; 10th, 143; 11th, 141; 20th, 73; 23rd, 71; 25th, 73; 25th, 74; March 3th, 62. The total number of municipalities in which the presence of smallpox was reported averaged fifteen during the month of February.

Little Difficulty.

Alluding to the work carried out by the inspectors, Dr. Savard said considering the number of trains and the great number of passengers traveling from Ontario every day in this direction, the result had been eminently satisfactory. Inspection was carried out with the minimum of difficulty, and most of those who raised objections subsequently agreed to be vaccinated rather than be turned back. Such passengers were taken off the trains and quarantined at certain stations, where they had the alternative of being sent back to their starting point or being vaccinated by the local doctors.

The quarantine also threw much additional work upon the head offices in Montreal, where Dr. Eliezer Pelletier and his staff had many callers and telephone inquiries. In a good many cases the inquiries asked how long the quarantine would last, and decided to postpone journeys until it was lifted, for people going down to Ontario from this province were subject to the inspection along with those who resided there. The quarantine was raised at midnight on Monday, March 8.

EBERT GOVERNMENT AGAIN TAKES CONTROL OF BERLIN

Noske and Vice-Chancellor Schiffer Busy Restoring Order, Tearing Down Barricades—Insurgent Baltic Troops, Leaving For Home, Fire Into Crowd Which Jeered Them.

BERLIN, March 18.—(Associated Press.)—The Ebert Government is again in control in Berlin. Vice-Chancellor Schiffer, in whose hands the sudden retirement of Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, temporarily placed the administrative power, and Gustave Noske, minister of defence, are engaged in bringing about order in the city and restoring activities to their normal basis. The full ministry is expected back in Berlin Friday.

Regular troops, loyal to the Ebert regime, are guarding the streets and detachments of them spend the day in tearing down wire entanglements and barricades which the revolutionary soldiers had erected in profusion. In this connection, there was an unfortunate accident, wherein the firing of a mine destroyed a barricade at Kottbusser in Southeastern Berlin, the explosion killed two persons and injured 25.

Troops Took Vengeance. The Baltic troops, leaders of the insurgent bands that marched into Berlin Saturday morning, took vengeance on the people who hoisted and jeered them in Wilhelmstrasse and Unter den Linden. They were lined up for their departure out of the city, and after withstanding the jeers for a time more or less impatiently, they opened fire, wounding several. The

system, but only a change of persons. The independents will not accept this situation.

There were fewer disturbances in Berlin last night than any night since the beginning of the revolution. Several detachments of troops were sent away, but the majority were here this morning. Wilhelmstrasse was crowded with troops carrying hand-grenades; several squads trundled machine guns and flame throwers. When the Baltic troops clear out, the work of guarding the city will be undertaken by regular government troops garrisoned in Berlin and the security police.

SELL BUFFALO HEADS

MONTREAL, March 18.—For the first time in over twenty years, buffalo heads will be on sale Monday next at the opening day of the first Canadian public sale of furs in Montreal. They are offered by the Dominion Government, and represent deaths in Wainwright Park.

Over 500 buyers are expected, and there will be offered for sale on the first day 170,000 mole skins, 22,000 mink, 48,000 ermine and 50 polar bear.

LABOR UNIONS WANT NOSKE OUT

AMSTERDAM, March 18.—The Holland News Bureau gives out a dispatch from Berlin stating that the general committee of the labor unions of the city has demanded the following things of the Ebert government:

The resignation of Gustav Noske, the minister of defence;

No amnesty for the offenders in the recent conspiracy and the punishment of all persons guilty of high treason;

The withdrawal of all troops from Berlin;

The right of the labor unions to take part in the forming of a government.

ARMIES OF ALLIES REMAIN STATIONARY

LONDON, March 18.—The allied commission has warned the burmese in the neutral zone that they will be held responsible for the maintenance of order. Thus far the armies of occupation have not advanced from their original line.

MORE OPTIMISTIC VIEW OF SITUATION

LONDON, March 18.—Diplomatic dispatches from Germany, filed last night, give a more optimistic view of the general situation, notwithstanding that the Spartacist uprising. This is a complete reversal of the opinion expressed Tuesday night by the same diplomats who then intimated that the Spartacist activities were more to be feared than the Kapp government.

It was stated at the foreign office this evening that it could not be expected the Spartacists would cease their agitation immediately. The Kapp government collapsed. Official dispatches indicate, however, that the National Assembly, led by the men who once before put down a Spartacist attempt, takes a strong stand against agitators, the Ebert government may be assured of a sound foundation at least for a time.

AMERICANS SEND CALL FOR ASSISTANCE

Coblenz, March 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—Two hundred Americans who have been attending the fair at Leipzig have telegraphed and telephoned Major-General Allen, commanding the American army of occupation, urging that he send a detachment of troops to their aid. Gen. Allen is sending a special train to bring the Americans away.

Firing is almost continuous in various parts of Leipzig, and all the light and water services have been cut off, according to the Americans, who are principally buyers from various parts of the United States.

Gen. Allen has directed the German railway commission of the Rhine and provinces to prepare a train, which will be in charge of a detachment of American soldiers. The train will carry sufficient fuel for the guards and food for several days for the guards and returning Americans. The latter will probably be brought to Coblenz, but may, if the majority of them desire, be taken to the Swiss frontier.

Gen. Allen has received something like half a hundred messages of distress, indicating that the situation has grown considerably worse during the last 48 hours.

The train probably will start for Leipzig tomorrow. There has been delay in getting a satisfactory train together, owing to the shortage of rolling stock.

SITUATION BETTER

PARIS, March 18.—The general situation in Germany has much improved since yesterday, according to advices received by the German peace delegation here today.

The only serious trouble is confined to the industrial centres, and the Ruhr Valley, where the Spartacists are still preventing the re-establishment of order.

WESTERN MEMBERS WANT HUDSON BAY RAILWAY THIS YEAR

Decide At Meeting To Press For Legislation.

OTTAWA, March 18.—(By Canadian Press.)—Western members of the Commons held a meeting today and decided to press for the completion of the Hudson Bay Railway this year. It was decided to draw up a resolution immediately for the order paper, asking the government to proceed with the matter before Parliament early next week.

Last year the estimate of the cost to complete the road was given as \$1,750,000, but estimates in various quarters this year place the figures at \$4,000,000. It is pointed out, however, that labor conditions last year were very much worse than they are likely to be this summer. There is no opposition at today's meeting.

HAMILTON ARCHITECT MISSING; WARRANT IS ISSUED FOR ARREST

HAMILTON, March 18.—A warrant for the arrest of A. Sande, well-known engineer and architect, has been issued. Sande is missing and Provincial Detective Williams is in charge of his search. Sande was formerly with the staff of engineers at the Hamilton harbor plans. Some time ago he called for tenders on a \$1,000,000 plant for Casapedia, Pulp and Paper Company at Bat De Chaleur, Quebec.

Tenders were submitted on a cost-plus basis and were accompanied by marked checks for \$2,500. It is said Sande deposited some of these marked checks and this was the first irregularity that led to an investigation by the Canadian Association of Building Contractors and Engineers. The warrant was issued in Toronto. Sande's friends still believe he will return and make satisfactory explanation.

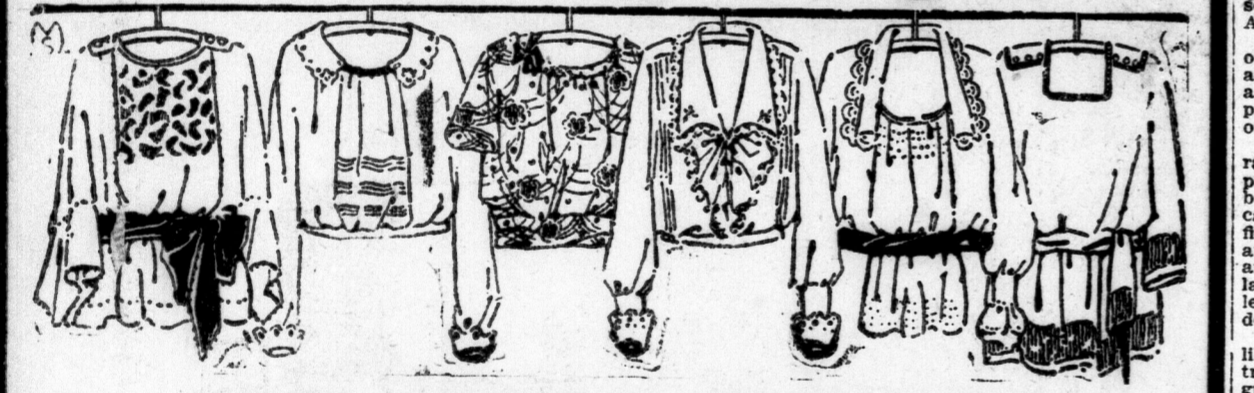

DUTCH GOVERNMENT IS TOO LENIENT TO FORMER EMPEROR

Holland's Socialists Do Not Regard Wilhelm's Pledge As Sufficient.

THE HAGUE, March 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Dutch Government was taken severely to task for what was declared to be its leniency toward the former German Emperor in a debate in the second chamber of Parliament yesterday, when the premier announced a decree limiting Count Hohenzollern's movements and his pledge not to mix in politics.

Deputy Schaper, Socialist, whose questions brought about announcement of the decree, said he was dissatisfied with the premier's answer as a mere slight increase in the guards about the former emperor was not enough and Count Hohenzollern's pledge not sufficient. He said there were plenty of opportunities for the friends of the ex-king to bring him letters and asked why writers to the von Gertneck castle were not searched.

Assurance Obtained. The premier, in answer, referred to his letter to both Houses of Parliament, informing them of the assurances obtained from Count Hohenzollern that he would refrain from all political activity and do nothing which would involve Holland in any international difficulty. He added that similar action with reference to the former crown prince had been considered.

Deputy Von Havenstein, Communist, declared that the Government's policy of silence had strengthened the general belief that the former emperor came to Holland originally with Holland's silent approval. Count Hohenzollern, he said, had been permitted to live the quiet, easy life of a retired country gentleman with a motor car at his disposal in which he could cross the frontier at any time he saw fit.

Maintain Communication. The same also could be said, Deputy von Ravenstein continued, about the former crown prince, who could maintain communication with the reactionary party in Germany. Other persons whom the Government considered undesirable were imprisoned and maltreated in concentration camps, even when provided with good passports the deputy asserted.

Other deputies took a similar stand, some wanting to know how long the Hohenzollerns would be allowed to stay in Holland. The premier said the Government long ago had stated it knew nothing in advance of the former emperor's coming, and not a single person in the Government knew of it. Up to the present, the premier declared, it has not appeared that the former emperor or his son had participated in a single political action.

TORONTO LUNCHEON FOR SIR ADAM BECK

TORONTO, March 18.—Nearly 200 guests sat down at the civic luncheon to Sir Adam Beck at the King Edward Hotel today, honoring him on his return from Britain after his recent illness.

Mayor Church presided, the hydro knight on his right and Premier Drury on his left. Sir Adam held a sort of impromptu reception in the corridor, his right hand being excessively shaken by scores of guests. "No, I am not going to say anything important," he said to the star, "I am here to be entertained. The mayor and controllers can say enough for me," he jested.

FORD SEDAN CARRIES DRIVER 30 FEET DEEP INTO DETROIT RIVER

Submarine Experience Enables Young Man To Make Miraculous Escape.

DETROIT, Mich., March 18.—Driving at a speed estimated at between 20 and 40 miles an hour, a Ford sedan, driven by Travis P. Beal, 25, son of Julius Beal, regent of the University of Michigan, rushed down the steep Woodward avenue hill at 3 o'clock this morning and plunged off the dock into the Detroit River where the water is 30 feet deep.

Beal had not time to jump, in fact, he says, he did not know he was so close to the river, and as the car made its mad leap Beal went with it to the bottom of the river. Every window of the automobile was closed and Beal stood a fine chance of drowning like a rat in a trap, until he recalled his experience as an ensign in the submarine division of the navy.

He struggled hard to force open the windshield, but the water pressure was too great. Using his elbow, he managed to smash a hole through the plate glass, but was badly gashed in the effort. The hole, however, proved too small and he smashed another and then dived through the opening after steadying himself with the steering wheel. Beal reached the surface bleeding and exhausted, but was able to grasp a life preserver thrown from the dock. His escape is regarded as most miraculous. The car is still on the bottom of the river.

SEARCH FOR MISSING WOMAN IS FRUITLESS; RIVER TO BE DRAGGED

Body Believed To Be Held Up by Power Dam At Arkona.

PARKHILL, March 18.—No results have followed the 25-hour search which has been carried on here since yesterday morning, when Miss Lovie was missed from the home of her sister, Mrs. Angus McIntosh. No trace of the woman has been found since her slippers were found in Hungry Hollow on the bank of the Auxable River about half a mile above the Arkona power dam. Searchers have concluded that the woman, in a fit of despondency over the death of a brother a week ago, has thrown herself in the river, and that the body is likely held up by the dam. Flood water is passing over the dam, but it is not thought that it is deep enough to take the body over. Dragging equipment is being fetched from Sarnia and further efforts will be made to recover the body.

James A. Knapton, aged 81, and one of Parkhill's earliest settlers, died at his home here today. He is survived by two sons, John at home, and James of London.

EARLY TOMATO AND CABBAGE PLANTS ARE IN FINE CONDITION

Great Progress Being Made by Vegetable Growers in Ruthven District.

RUTHVEN, March 18.—The growers of this district have started things going with a rush, and hundreds of men and boys are putting in long hours keeping the heat at the right temperature in the many hot houses, where millions of tomato plants and a large force of men are busy at this particular kind of work. The cotton coverings for tobacco beds are being put in shape and in ten days everything in the early vegetable line will be under cotton and glass and growing by leaps and bounds.

Men who have lived here for 50 years cannot remember when the water at the lake was as low as it is this year. The first, second and third bars are entirely high and dry at some points along the shore.

Peter Boussey & Son with their families, who have been renting in Kingsville for some time, sold their property at that place and have bought a fine fruit and vegetable farm between here and Leamington.

Blue birds, robins, meadow larks and blackbirds have arrived here in large numbers and have opened up the season with their spring songs.

Gordon Fox & Sons have the material on the ground for the erection of two large drying kilns for curing their big crops of Warracott leaf tobacco.

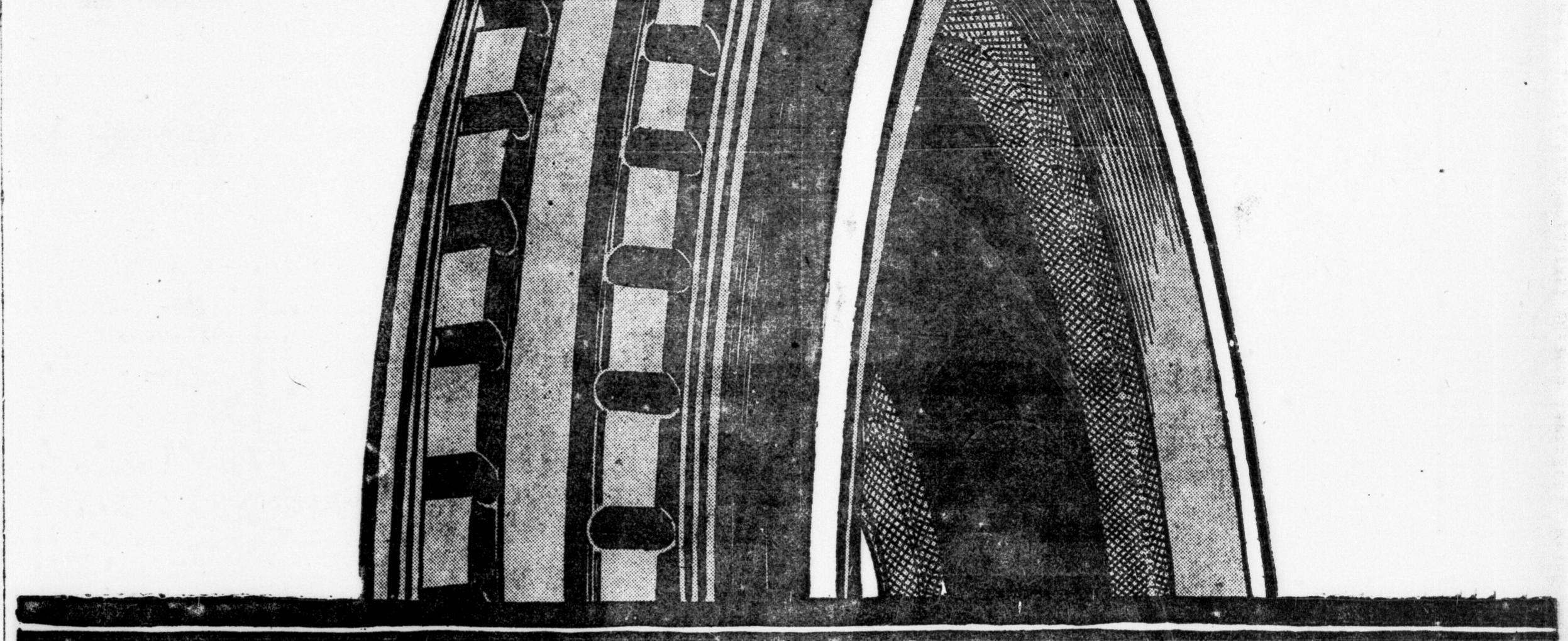
FRENCH COMPANIES ORDER SHIPS HERE
