The EAGLE EYE OF THE FOREST AIRPLANE.

The use of airplanes in forest protective work is bringing to light some valuable features that had not been anticipated. Most forest fires are caused by the carelessness of human beings. If prospectors, hunters, campers, fishermen, and others who go into the woods for business or pleasure could be educated to be always, careful with their camp fires, their matches, and their cigarette stubs over half the load would be lifted from the shoulders of the fire fighters. This is the reason why the fire warning poster is probably the most important single factor in forest protection. And here comes in a little psychology in which the airplane figures. When a man camps at a place where a warning against the careless use of fire is conspicuously posted he is careful to put out his fire, but when he camps at a spot where he seems to be outside of the range of human touch for observation, he is apt to grow careless, and fires are likely to follow in his first week's experience in observation from an airplane, records this fact that men camping in the woods or out from the city for a few, days or a week-end are suddenly and effectively reminded of what they ought to do by the appearance of an airplane high above them, attending strictly to its business of patrolling the forest. This impression is deepened when the men realize that they and their camp have been seen from the airplane. Of this they are certain, when they see a message fluttering down to them through the air. They naturally watch where the paper falls and, if possible, get it. They find it a message reminding them that as citizens of Canada, they should assist the forest—by being careful with fire. As preventing fires is much more economical and effective than fighting fires this feature of airplane patrol is of great importance.

They saw the early phase of the war when the Germans outnumbered us in men and guns and seemed to be winning on many fronts and were inflicting upon us enormous casualties because of the superiority of their artillery and ammunition. It was a shock to the Indian soldiers, who believed in the invincibility the world.

witness of the wonderful loyalty and gallantry of the Indian princes and soldiers on the western front.

The Indian princes poured out their treasures with prodigal magnificence in proof of their devotion to the British Empire and the Indian army in France in the bad early days, poured out its blood at Ypres, Neuve Chapelle, Festubert and on other dreadful fields.

My memories of the spring of 1915 in France go back to the flat fields about the river Lys and the Flemish towns where the Indian troops were billeted.

To the French villagers who have no sense of any color prejudice, these dark, soft-eyed Indian men with gentle manners and chivalrous ways, seemed like fairy book figures, romantic and sympathetic.

Western liberty cannot exist with the caste system nor among races who worship gods and fear devils according to the Hindu faith.

Again their are many races in India filled with religious hatred for each other. Only the rule of a dominant race keeps India safe from continual blood-shed and anarchy. In its history there have been many dominant races, but not until the British came did India get unt

were they not fighting for France and dying for France?

I saw many of them dying and saw their comrades shivering and miserable in water-logged trenches in a Flemish winter.

I thought then, and think now, that in spite of our great need for regular trained soldiers in those early days before our new armies were ready, it was

civil servants who knew the people and trained soldiers in those early days before our new armies were ready, it was a mistake to bring those Indian troops to France.

The climate was against them and their way of fighting did not fit them to stand in ditches under modern gun fire, but apart from that altogether, every native who wrote home or went home helped to lower British prestige in India.
