

#### company laws and practice. RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS

The Government Will Appoint Three Instead of Two.

Ottawa, Aug. 4. - The Minister of Justice Monday gave notice of a resolution fixing the salaries of the commissioners and secretary of the railway commission provided for in the bill now before the House. The resolution only speaks of three commissioners, so that it is evident the Government have determined not to extend the number to five, as suggested by the railway companies. The chief commissioner will get a salary of \$10,-000, and each of the other two commissioners \$8,000 per annum. The secretary's salary will be fixed by the governor-in-council, but is not to exceed \$4,000. The stipends of the other officers, staff and appointees of the board, and the expenses incidental to the carrying out of the provisions of the bill, are subject to the approval of the governor-in-council. The salaries of the commissioners and the secretary will be paid out of unappropriated funds in the hands of the receiver-general, and all other salaries, remunerations and expenses moneys to be provided by Parlia-






