

Politics in the United States.

The first batch of delegates elected to the Democratic convention, which meets the first week in July to choose a candidate for the Presidency, have been instructed to vote for William Randolph Hearst. They were nominated by a county convention in Ohio. The headway which the Hearst boom is making has alarmed conservative Democrats. The conspiracy to capture the nominating convention for Hearst has ramified to every state of the Union, and it is openly charged that money is being poured out for the purpose. A Democratic senator has said that Hearst's political assets are cheek and a check-book. He inherited a great fortune from his father and leaped into notoriety by founding a school of yellow journalism in comparison with which the sensationalism of the American press before the advent of Hearst was insipid and respectable. He has now a string of newspapers in the great cities, of which the New York Journal is the prototype; and through these he is able to reach millions of readers daily. These newspapers pander to the prejudices and lowest instincts of the mob. They play on the old hatred of England and strive to set class against class. Unfortunately the growth of the trusts under the Republican tariff has given Hearst a potent cry, but tariff reformers of the Cleveland stripe, who are the salt of the Democratic party. will not accept the candidature of this demagogue. The New York Post declares that there are dark and loathsome chapters in the personal history of this man. It describes him as a low voluptuary, seeking to sting his jaded senses to a fresh thrill by playing for the highest prize in the gift of his country. It warns him that the light will be turned upon his private life it he persists in his ambition, and it implores the Democracy to cast him off before the party shares his disgrace. This is a terrible indictment and it will convict him in public opinion if he fails to bring his accuser into court.

The demoralization of the Democratic party will be a calamity for the republic. That party contains some of the best intellect of the country and is tyranny of the trusts, and the vices triumph of the Hearst or Bryan factions would drive sane and respectable Democrats into political exile, while there appears to be little hope that the Jacobins of the party will accept a candidate who stands upon a Cleveland platform. The death of Senator Hanna has removed the last shadow from Roosevelt's prospects for the Republican nomination and he will sweep the country, if the Democrats do not reconcile their differences. The conservative elements of his party have regarded him uneasily, but the spectre of Hearst would drive them into Roosevelt's arms. The rough rider is still popular with the masses and could




