



# A Republican Landslide.

The only surprise in the presidential election was the completeness of the Republican victory. No one doubted states, where Parker's candidature west, Nevada, Montana, Idaho and Colorado, which were carried by Bryan, have gone Republican. Democratic hopes were high in New York State. but Roosevelt's plurality exceeds Mc-Kinley's in 1900 by 41,500. Even in New York City, with Tammany in power, Parker's plurality was only 40,000, being 100,000 short of the estimate. The Democrats retain an unshaken hold on

A change of Government is not easily brought about in a season of prosperity. The United States is enjoying trades, notably the cotton trade, are not in a healthy condition, and the wheels of industry are not moving as rapidly as two or three years ago, but the serious depression is localized and crops has helped to tide over the reaction from the boom, and the high price of raw cotton, while prejudicial to the spinning industry, has been a boon to the Southern States.

In this election the Democratic party posed as the party of conservatism. The candidate identified himself absolutely with the gold standard; he preached the virtues of economy; he declared for a reduction of military expenditure and for a grant of independence to the Philippines. He was far from revolutionary on the tariff question, promising nothing more than a reduction of the duties on trustmade products. He appealed to the conservative sentiment of the nation as a champion of "constitutionalism," against personal rule. The President was charged with magnifying his office, usurping the functions of Congress and over-riding the provisions of the constitution. He was held up to reproach as the embodiment of militarism, absolutism, imperialism and other tendencies alien to the spirit and traditions of the republic. 
