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Parliamentary.

House of Assembly. Tuesday, March 26. The House met at 12 o'clock, and went into Committee on bills, and passed the Revenue Bill.

Mr. Campbell presented a petition from Treasurers, asking the Government not to interfere in the case of the prisoner Potts, now in the Penitentiary.

Mr. Hatfield presented a petition from John McIver, an aged school teacher, for a grant of land.

The House adjourned until 3 o'clock. Several bills were read a third time.

Mr. Campbell presented a petition from the Trustees of the Penitentiary, asking the Government to purchase the Penitentiary buildings.
