ENGLAND IN AFGHANISTAN.

Calcutta, Sept. 22.—An officer of the Ameer of Affghanistan at Ali Musjid refused to allow the British mission to Cabut to go through the Khyber Pass and crowned the heights which command the Pass with followers. After three hours interview with the officer, in which he warned him /that his act would be regarded as the act of the Ameer himself, Major Cavanaghi, commanding the advanced escort of the mission, returned to Jamrood and the mission was withdrawn to Peshawur.
