London, March 5—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Amsterdam says: "According to a Frankfort telegram, received here, the German government has sent a wireless despatch to Count Von Bernstorff, former German ambassador to the United States who is at sea returning to Ger-Bernstorft, former Gernah ambassador to the United States who is at sea returning to Ger-many, asking him to explain how the German note with re-gard to brigging Mexico and Japan into war with the United States was divulged.
