Over One Hundred and Fifty of These Vessels Are Now Engaged in Deep Sea Fisheries. HALIFAX N.S., May 16 .- Over

150 vessels from Nova Scotia are now engaged in the deep sea fisheries his season, which means an increase

Over 30,000 people in the provinhousands of others are affected by the circulation of money resultant from the prosecution of the fisheries and among its adjuncts are cold torage plants, ship yards, cooperage hops, boat shops, and general out-

wned in Halifax, but since the first of March 95 vessels have cleared from this port for the Banks.

These vessels are owned mostly a Lunenburg, and have come here or bait, salt, and other supplies. Each boat spends not less than \$1,000 while here.

HALIFAX THE CLEARING HOUSE. The port of Halifax is the Clearing House of the fisheries, and one-half

(\$5,000,000), of the total value of ill fish handled in the province basses through its coffers The figures of 1911 relating to the

Banking fleet, as distinct from that which operates off-shore, shows a total number of vessels engaged, 113. unenburg sends out 104 of these, shelburne Country 3, and Richmond Country 6. Averaging their cost at \$11,000 (initial cost complete, with outfit) there is a total of \$1,463 000 invested in that branch alone. The

increase of 25 vessels to the fleet, which means \$225,000 additional capital invested, four hundred more nen employed, and estimating the everage value of catch to a vessel o be \$10,000 (a safe computation, considering the highliners of last vear stocked \$20,000 and the lowiners \$7,000), there is an estimated ncrease in the value of total fares of 3250,000.



Submarine Outclassed by Hydro-Aeroplane

Weymouth, May 10 .- The King's trip in a submarine, which travelled two miles submerged, was made in company with his son, Prince Albert, who is a student at Dartmouth Naval Cellege, and Winston Churchill.

Referring to the flight which Commander Samson made yesterday with his hydro-aeroplane, when he circled the fleet at a height of a thousand feet and remained in the air for an hour, alighting in broken water. Ho ace Short, inventor of the hydro-aero plane, declares that as a result of that test the aerial machine will change naval warfare completely. Samson was able to see the rocks under the water, and it would therefore be easy to locate a submerged submarine "You may take it." said the inventor "that the aeroplane has knocked out the submarine. The latter's effective ness depends upon its invisibility. Now that is gone. The submarine has

met its match." Commander Samson carried a bomb 300 pounds in weight, and inventor Short expressed confidence in his ability to construct a hydro-aero plane capable of carrying a bom containing a ton of explosive. 

LONDON, May 23. General Booth of the Salvation Army, was operated on to-day for cataract. A bulletin issued following the operation, stated that it was successful, and that the ultimate restoration of eyesight depended only on the recuperative powers of the General

BUDAPESTH, May 23. Another hot fight between the police and strikers occurred near the House of Parliament this morning. Two policemen were killed, and several fatalities occurred among the strikers. The mob wrecked considerable business property and set on fire the

WASHINGTON, May 23. By a vote of 147 to 126, the House of Representatives reaffirmed its decision that no toll should be charged on American vessels engaged in the coastwise trade for passage through the Panama Canal. The provision was bitterly fought and the result was received with cheers.

BERLIN May 23 William Marconi and Isaac, Managing Director of the Marconi Wireless Company, have taken action against the "Welt" Ammontaj" newspaper for libel contained in an article accusing them of exploiting the Titanic catastrophe for the Company's benefit, by holding out news for sale, etc.

LONDON, May 23. The National Executive Committee of the Transport Workers' Confederation has decided upon a general strike commencing to-night, in support of the Thames lightermen in the dispute with their employers, and also to enable the Federation to adjust their own grievances. The original cause of the trouble was a dispute concerning the employment of a non-unionist workman. The man was a foreman named Thomas, a Scotsman, who refused to join the Journeymen's Union. The men refused to work under his orders, and several thousand of them were locked out, upon which the committee ordered several thousand more to strike. It is estimated that a hundred thousand transport workers will be affected by the decision reached. This will bring virtually the whole trade of this part of London to a standstill. The resolution arrived at by the Committee of the Transport Workers' Federation confines the strike for the moment to London. The General Secretary said this morning that it meant the stoppage of work by all London workers, and, if necessary, a national strike later on. Representatives from every port in the Kingdom were present at the meeting and the resolution was unamiously adopted to quit work, owing to the alleged boycotting of members of Trades Unions and the deliberate breaking of agreements by employers. No fewer than 150,000 dockers, lightermen, laburers, and others connected with th docks will be involved in the strike. Any attempt to direct traffic to other ports will be the signal for the disaffection. Work in some of the London docks was paralyzed this morning, and numerous vessels, laden with foodstufs, were unable to discharge


