Naval Engagement sad circumstances is deeply regretin North Sea.

Just before noon a despatch came

in from the British Official Bureau announcing German movements of importance in the North Sea this morn ing, and stating that the town of Scarborough and Hartlepool had been shelled. Scarborough is an important watering-place on the coas of Yorkshire about twenty miles to the north of Flamborough Head. It takes its name from the "Scaur," a bold promontory on which is an old castle and an ancient fortress: below the cliffs is a spa and a fine promenade. The slopes have been converted into ornamental grounds. In the old town is a fishing harbour. Hartlepool is an important commercial port in South Durham, about 50 miles further north than Scarborough. Its industries are mainly iron and steel works and shipbuilding and it is the chief port for the export of coal from the South Durham coal fields. The official statement is cautious and states that British flotillas have been engaged at various points, but that the situation is developing. The use of the word flotillas would seem to indicate that small fleets of torpedo destroyers are the class of British ships which were engaged at the time the official statement was issued. Shortly after receiving this despatch we learned that a private message had been received in the city to the effect that three German cruisers and two German submarines had been sunk off Scarborough. This was all the information to hand at noon.



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
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
