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

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



The Heart's Content

The Daily News this morning offers some adverse criticism to the nev time table of the Heart's Content railway which is to come into force or Monday next. Two schedules were offered to the Government for them to choose one. The Government tried one and will now try the other. The one which has been tried was adopted for trial on the ground that it was nost suitable for a new railway bed. It entailed however the arrival of the train in the city at night, and as the train left the city in the morning, it meant that passengers for the South Side of Trinity Bay who wished to spend two nights here. Strong objection was taken by them to this de-jection was taken by them to this de-jection was taken by them to this de-jection was taken by them to this delay. The new schedule, however, will mean that those who live at points beyond Heart's Content must get up very early to make connec tions with the train and they will arrive late at night and have to face a long night drive in carriages. The further away such passengers reside from Heart's Content the worse it will be for them. The difficulty about long carriage drives at unreasonable hours has arisen from the change in the original project for serving the South Side of Trinity Bay with a rail-way service. Under the contract of 1909, provision was made for this branch line to run from Broad Cove on the Newfoundland Railway to 30c. pair. Grate's Cove. Under the modified contract of 1913, this branch was cut off at Heart's Content, and the Carbonear branch was extended along the aug27,2i north side of Conception Bay through Bay de Verde to Grate's Cove, and the people of the South Side of Trinity Bay who reside at New Perlican, Turk's Cove, Winterton, Hant's Harbour, Lance Cove and other places, were left to make connection by car-riage road with the Heart's Content terminus or the stations along the Bay de Verde branch as suited them best. Up to the present, however, the Bay de Verde Branch has not been opened, and as this connection is not available, they are forced to connect with Heart's Content, and this intensifies the inconveniences of the new The inconvenience to the people who live in Hant's Harbour and neighbourhood will be somewhat lessened when the Bay de Verde branch is opened. There is, however, another course which could be adopted, and that is to double the services and uses both schedules.





The Russian armies are still intact with virtually all their guns, and the prospects of a more plentiful supply of ammunition. For this reason military writers here are of the opin-ion that Grand Duke Nicholas should be able to make a stand. The Austro-German losses must have been very heavy, especially during three weeks which intervened tween the fall of Warsaw.



The Diphtheria Outbreak.

At last night's meeting of the Civic Commission a lengthy report from Dr. Brehm, the Medical Health Officer. on the cause of the recent diphtheria outbreak was read. In the opinion of the Health Officer the outbreak was mainly due to the number of cases that were not reported. Most of the cases were mild, and many persons thought them to be merely sore throats or slight tonsilitis not requiring the services of a doctor. Many of these sore throats, he said, are diphtheric in nature and are the chief means by which the disease is spread An inspection of the milk supply proved that the milk was not the cause of the outbreak. Bad sanitary nditions such as defective drainage are not a direct cause of diphtheria but they probably act to some extendas predisposing causes by undermining the general health and lessening the power of resistance. 



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TO AID EMPIRE.

Melbourne, Australia, July 19. -Correspondence of the Canadian Press, Limited--The recent appeal from the British War Office for more soldiers has been met with such an increase in recruiting that the Australian Government will be able to double the October and November reinforcements, making them 10,263 for each of those months, instead of 5,263, the usual monthly quota. It will also be possible to send to the front in November a complete brigade of infantry, and this offer has been accepted by the Imperial authorities.


Factory Making Munitions of War, Earning from \$4 to \$5 a Week, Working 9 Hours a Day.


