> > DEATH FROM THE SKY.

MOUNDSVILLE, W.Va., July 10. Six persons were killed, and approximately fifty injured at Langin Field, here, late to-day, when a Martin bombing plane crashed into a group of automobiles parked on the ground. An explosion followed setting fire to the machine. The dead were all spectators. A Lieutenant, the pilot and another Lieutenant, who was assistant pilot were rescued by Carl Miller. coach of Bethany College.

LAWLESSNESS IN BELFAST.

BELFAST, July 10. Rioting broke out in Belfast last night, and continuing throughout the day, became so serious this afternoon that military had to be summoned to estore order. At ten o'clock tonight the casualties lists showed that 15 persons had been killed, and nearly one hundred wounded. According to police accounts firing at patrols by Republicans precipatated the outbreak. From then the shooting was almost continuous in Falls districts. As daybreak came on, the tide of battle extended down the Falls Road, until it reached Townshend Street, which then became the centre of sharp rioting, with Unionists for the first time entering the fray. Carrick Hill and Millfield, the areas of the Nationalist strongholds next became affected. The firing here was intense, alternating with screams of crowds as they scurried hurriedly away. As a group of Orangemen marched four deep along Royal Avenue, from service at Ulster Hall this afternoon, there were scenes of excitement, Orangemen shouting defiance as they passed streets, down which bullets were flying. Next police rifles began to come into action, and the crowd on the street corner cheered wildly, when one of the shots brought down a man with a gun. Ballmacarret, the city's eastern suburbs, caught the riot infection and generally the spirit of the truce was the last thing to be observed in Belfast. Late this afternoon armoured cars thundered along the avenue, cheered on Unionists. At North Street the occupants tumbled out and laying flat on the pavement, opened fire. Orangemen from Shanighill Read, which is a coninuation of North Street, lined up with the police and began shooting from that side on Republican forces in Millfield, who found themselves between two fires. Early in the morning a number of rifles were discovered. All over Ulster church parades were held to-day, presumably to the usual twelfth of July demon-



When the men who were discharging the cargo had been dispersed, the strikers gradually drew away from the premises
