

OUR LATE GOVERNOR, SIR C. ALEXANDER HARRIS.

While awaiting the arrival and inauguration of our new Proconsul, Sir William L. Allardyce, let me make a few observations about his retiring predecessor, Sir C. Alexander Harris. The latter, although not a brilliant administrator, has been successful in a number of little troublesome controversies between the Government and the Opposition-Sir Richard Squires and Sir Michael Cashin having frequently appealed to him to settle their disputes-which, if they had been less skilfully handled, might have been no longer little. He has vindicated his reputation for good sense, caution and resolution. He has never "trailed the flag," nor has he ever flaunted it in music hall fashion. He has made us all feel that he was proud of the little country he governed, and resolute and able to defend her interests and to fulfill her obligations. This was no small achievement when it is borne in mind that at least one half of the political cranks and disturbers of the peace here had flattered themselves that Sir Richard's Administration would inaugurate a policy of general stampede.

Ex-Governor Harris has a pleasant art and genial old English humor which makes him fairly popular as a speaker. He does not speak much. never overstays his welcome, and always leaves his audience in a good humor with themselves and with him The mirth which illuminates his speeches never degenerates into mere purposeless hilarity. He uses his jokes to illustrate his arguments, not merely to set the table in a roar. There is also a subacidity about his humor which in a more gloomy mind might degenerate into the saturnine, but which in his case only lends a more pungent flavor to his speech. Of this his speech at the unfurling of the old Newfoundland Fencibles' time-honored flags at the Museum last summer was a notable case in point.

WELSH HARD COAL HOTTER THAN U.S. Less Ash and Much Better Heat, Says Ottawa. GREAT DIFFERENCE

Six Tons of Welsh Gives Same Heat as Seven Tons U.S. Coal.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—That the Welsh Anthracite delivered already in Ottawa has a much lower ash content and a much higher heating value than American anthracite received in this country for the past few years, that it is a true anthracite but breaks easier on handling and produces more fines than Pennsylvania anthracite coal, are the summarized results of an analysis of samples of Welsh coal submitted to John McLeish, director of the mines branch of the Dominion Government for testing. The report of the analysis is signed by R. E. Gilmore, chief engineering chemist, and B. F. Haanel, B.Sc., chief of the division of fuels and fuel testing. An equal quantity of the lump and "fines", or dust, as some Ottawans who have received a delivery of the Welsh anthracite are disposed to call it, were submitted to the director of mines for testing.

From the analysis given and from conversation with an official of the testing branch, it is claimed that the fines have excellent heating properties and should be extremely serviceable for the purpose of

From further tests made it is seen that compared with Pennsylvania anthracite such as Ottawans have been used burning the Welsh anthracite has practically 10 per cent. less ash and about 10 per cent. more fixed carbon.

The British thermal unit is the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of a pound of water one degree. Under this test it is found that the calorific value of the Welsh anthracite is given water one degree. Onder this test is both that the water one the water of the water one as 14,860 as compared with 12,490 for Pennsylvania anthracite "as received," or 15,200 for Welsh as compared with 13,000 for Pennsylvania when dried at 105 degrees Centigrade. According to these tests therefore the Welsh anthracite has from 17 to 19 per cent. more heat producing properties than that from Pennsylvania, so that six tons of Welsh anthracite should produce as much heat as seven of the Pennsylvania coal.

POSES AS BENTFACTOR OF NORTH WEST COAST.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—I am in receipt of a copy of your issue of September 22nd quoting a letter of mine sent the Philadelphia Public Ledger appealing for worn clothing to be sent North to poor but worthy people. I note that nobody knows me in St. John's. I have never been there. I have been for many years on the West Coast and believe that from personal contact and observation, I know more about conditions in out of way places on that coast than any editor knows from a like source of knowledge. I speak for the men who live with their families up the bays and coves where the mail boat does not and cannot go, and they are made up of all degrees of character and worth, just as men are anywhere. Some do not try but wait for outside aid, others do not need aid but want to get "their share," others try hard, will work at anything and are in every way worthy and for that class I have done and shall do again what I can.

Permit me to state briefly what has been done by The Temple Brotherhood of the Grace Baptist Church of this city along lines cited above. Since last fall they have sent to Newfoundland 27 cases of clothing in good usable condition and over 100 pairs of shoes and these have been distributed by clergymen regardless of race, creed, or religion and by the writer I saw this summer a coming need and being urged on by letters received, almost without number some of which were from people wor thy and some not at all worthy, I took the matter up again and propose to carry it on. I was personally taken this sumer by clergymen to places where they told me people were starving and where I could so believe, in winter. I did not think it possible in summer I saw families with dried caplin and herring, no flour, no potatoes but living on fish for days at a time, emaciated, anaemic and nearly naked. People to whom a barrel of flour, a gallon of molasses and a pound of tea is a winter luxury.
