

and the other was a reform in the public printing, by which about \$72,225 were yearly saved to the country. (Cheers.) He then entered into an interesting review of the political history of the Dominion, from the time of the general elections in 1867 till now. He went over one by one the principal measures which the Government had initiated and carried through, and pointed out in what way they were injurious to the country. He adverted to the Local Government, and to the fact that they had faithfully carried out their principles and pledges. He concluded an excellent speech of over an hour, by thanking them for their patient attention, and for the renewed proofs of their continued confidence in him. He would not make many promises, nor should they expect too much from him, but he would promise them this, that in the future, as in the past, he would faithfully support the political principles which he believed to be right, and which, in his opinion, if carried out, would quickly build up the power and influence of the Dominion and give her no mean place among the nations of the earth. He retired amid great applause.

Hon. Mr. Alexander then came forward and made a short and vigorous speech. He said that he considered it to be his duty to come before them to-day and give his views on the great public questions now agitating the country. He explained that he never had been, and never could be, the servile follower of any political leaders. When placed in the responsible position of serving them in Parliament, he had only one ruling principle, and that was to press every possible re-entrenchment upon the Government of the day, and to vote faithfully on all measures that he knew to be in the true interests of this great country. The past history of our Parliament had not tended to increase his faith in partisanship. What faith could the electors of Waterloo have in a Party Press that could delight in extolling the Provincial Railway, upon which our commerce depends—or that did not hesitate to injure the public credit of the country by evil prophecies and the wildest statements—or that even appeared to favor at one moment crushing the mechanics and workmen, when they met peacefully to discuss how they could obtain their supposed equitable rights. Such a press was a curse to a country, and not a blessing. He charged that the Reform party and the Reform press were doing all they could to injure the country. They had not hesitated to adopt such a course in regard to Nova Scotia, a course which might have imperiled the very safety of the Union in that quarter, and yet had Nova Scotia succeeded in leaving the Confederation, New Brunswick would have been certain to have followed, and we should have fallen back into the old slough of despond in trying to work against the Union of Upper and Lower Canada. So in regard to the Red River difficulties, which have been dealt with in so prudent and wise a manner by the Government of the day, and by which statesmanlike policy the blessings of peace have been entirely restored to that portion of the Dominion. If the policy of the Opposition had been attempted, it would be a moral certainty have brought on a civil war with those half-breeds and different Indian races. It is well known since the foul and dastardly murder of Scott, they have been living there, as it were, upon the brink of a volcano, and nothing but the temperate and Christian course pursued by Mr. Archibald, who labored unceasingly to soften down the asperities of both parties. He also defended the course of the Government in regard to the Pacific Railway, and showed what great advantages that road would be not only to the Dominion but to Great Britain. He concluded by informing the electors that he did not intend to go to the poll, and gave notice that he had retired.

Mr. Robt. McLean then spoke for over half an hour, and replied to Mr. Alexander in a very effective manner. He retired in favour of Mr. Young.

The Returning Officer then declared Mr. Young duly elected member for South Waterloo.

Mr. Young briefly thanked the electors for the honour done him, after which three cheers were given for the Queen, three more for the Returning Officer, three more for Mr. Young, and three more for Mr. Geo. Brown. This closed the proceedings.

The returns at the close of the poll in East Toronto are as follows:—St. Lawrence Ward, O'Donohoe, 217; Beatty, 250. St. David's Ward, O'Donohoe, 571; Beatty, 592. Total for O'Donohoe, 788; total for Beatty, 872; majority for Beatty, 84.

Toronto West Election.

The state of the poll at 1 p. m. was, Crawford, 706; McLellan, 451.

North Bruce.

We are happy to say that Mr. Gillies has been returned for North Bruce by a majority of eighteen. The contest was a very keen one. Mr. Sprout was an influential and energetic candidate and a hard man to beat, but the Reformers worked nobly, and have now the satisfaction of beating the Government nominee by what may be considered under the circumstances a fair majority.

Mr. Blake Elected for West Durham by Acclamation.

The nomination of candidates for West Durham took place at Bowmanville on Saturday. The following gentlemen were duly nominated:—

Hon. E. Blake, Col. Cubitt, George Haines, John Milne, S. H. Blake, John McLeod, P. McLeod, M. P. P., Dr. Allison and Richard Osborne. After the nomination had been made the Returning Officer adjourned the meeting to the Town Hall, and each of the candidates addressed the electors in turn. A patient hearing was given to each of the speakers, and on returning to the hustings, all retired except Mr. E. Blake, who was declared duly elected.

ELECTION NEWS.

The nomination of candidates for Cardwell will be held at Mono Mills on the 22nd of August, and the polling on the 29th. Mr. Harris and Mr. Ferguson are the only candidates yet in the field.

It is said that the Custom House and Post Office officials in Montreal have received orders to vote for the Government candidates.

The Hamilton Times says that at the door of one of the churches in the North Riding of Brant cards were distributed last Sabbath, soliciting the vote and influence of the worshippers for the candidates. They evidently are not running the religious ticket in that riding.

The Milton Champion says that the success which has attended the canvass of the Reform candidate in every section of Halton which he has visited has been of a most gratifying description. The public meetings which have been called to enable Mr. White to give a full and open account of his course during the last five years, and to state the principles which will guide him in the future, have been largely attended.

The London Advertiser says:—From all sections of West Middlesex we are in continual receipt of the most encouraging intelligence regarding the canvass of Mr. G. W. Ross, and there seems not the least shadow of a doubt that the constituency which gave the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie a majority of over 300 at the last election will return Mr. Mackenzie's friend and supporter to the Dominion Parliament.

Elections take place to-day in West Toronto, South Brant, North and South Wentworth, and North Huron.

Hincks Sure to be Beaten!

Our latest information is to half-past two o'clock. We have no definite returns, but the operator at Brantford says Pater-son is about 100 ahead of Hincks, and that Sir Francis is sure to be beaten.

The Wentworths.

We have been unable to get any returns of the state of the poll in North or South Wentworth.

An Old Falsehood.

We are not, of course, astonished at Sir John's organ inventing new calumnies against Mr. George Brown, but we confess we are rather astonished at it re-peating the old falsehood that Mr. Brown during the short tenure of office of the Brown-Dorion government in 1858, forced the Bank of Upper Canada to lend him \$75,000. We have given a positive denial to that story at least five times, and challenged the production of proof at a time when our opponents were in full possession of the Bank of Upper Canada, and could have given evidence of the truth of the story if any existed. The books of the Bank are now in the hands of the representatives of the Government and we again challenge these inventors of slanders to show that Mr. Brown borrowed a single dollar from the Bank of Upper Canada while he was in office in 1858. There is not a vestige of foundation for the story.—Globe.

SCOTCH COLONY FOR NEW BRUNSWICK.—A project is on foot to establish a Scottish colony in the County of Victoria, New Brunswick. The effort is being put forth by Captain Brown, of the Anchor line of steamers, and Mr. Stuart, a gentleman interested in Scottish emigration, both of whom, says the Express, paid a visit to Victoria County last week for the purpose of selecting a site for a colony, to be brought out from Scotland next Spring. The place selected is in the parish of Perth, on the eastern side of the St. John, and immediately above the mouth of the Mooniac. Here, a short distance back from the river, it is contemplated to settle fifty families next spring, who will come from Stonehaven, Scotland. Capt. Brown has made highly favorable arrangements with the Anchor line of steamers for the passage of the colonists across the Atlantic.

TELEGRAPHING IN CHINA.—The problem of the telegraphing in the Chinese language, to write which requires some 50,000 different characters, has been solved in this way: A few thousand of the characters most used are cut upon wooden blocks. On the opposite side of each block is its number. Duplicates of such numbered blocks are at each telegraph station. The Chinese merchant selects the blocks which express the thoughts to be transmitted. The operator telegraphs only the numerals designating these blocks, which enable the receiving operator to select similar blocks at his end of the line.

A By-Law to provide for the Election of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, the Repair of the Registry Office in Guelph, and to assist in making certain Roads and Bridges in the said County, and for issuing Debentures to the amount of \$20,000 for these purposes.

WHEREAS it is necessary to provide for the erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, which Riding has been set apart for Registration purposes, and it is also necessary to provide for the repair and improvement of the County Registry Office in the Town of Guelph.

AND WHEREAS for these purposes the sum of five thousand dollars is required. And whereas it is expedient to grant aid by way of a grant of money, payable as hereinafter mentioned, to the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph hereinafter mentioned towards opening and making the new Roads and Bridges hereinafter mentioned in the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph in the said County, and to grant the sums hereinafter mentioned to assist in making and maintaining the Township and County Roads hereinafter mentioned.

AND WHEREAS the Council of the County of Wellington deeming the County at large sufficiently interested in the said works to justify such assistance, but not sufficiently interested to justify the Council in at once assuming the same as County Works, namely:

To the Township of Maryborough towards making the road known as the centre side road in that Township \$600

To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the road between the eighth and ninth concessions in that township 800

To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making the road between the third and fourth concessions in that township 200

To the Township of Pilkington towards making a bridge across the Grand River at the fifth and sixth concessions 400

To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the Minto and Normanby town line \$300, on condition that the County of Grey grant an equal amount. 800

To the Township of Luther towards making bridges over rivers and streams crossing the road known as the side road between lots thirty and thirty-one in that township 600

The Village of Elora towards making the road in that village connecting the County roads 200

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road known as the extension of the Ferguson and Douglas County Road to Waldemar Railway Station 500

To the Township of Arthur towards making the road known as the Centre side road in that township 500

To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making a bridge over the Grand River on the road between the second and third concessions of that township 500

To the Village of Mount Forest towards making the road known as the town line east of Main street, and the bridge over the river Millland 300

To the Town of Guelph towards making a bridge over the river Speed, on Wellington street, by Mr. Gow's mill in Guelph town. 500

To the Village of Orangeville towards making a bridge over the river Credit in that village 200

To the Township of Erin towards making the road from Erin to Erin village 400

To the Village of Arthur, towards making a road between the village of Arthur, township of Arthur and Luther, to Arthur railway station 200

To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the centre side road in Peel from Arthur village to Glenallan 1000

To the Township of Amaranth towards making the road known as the seventh concession line in that township 1000

To the Township of Eramosa towards making the road in that township from Rockwood to the town line of Guelph 200

To the Township of Maryborough towards making a bridge over the Spring Creek on the road known as the Kilgours' road in that township 400

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road between the fourteenth and fifteenth concessions of that township 500

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of East Garafraxa and Erin 200

To the Township of Peel towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough and Arthur 300

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of East Garafraxa and Erin 200

To the Township of Peel towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough from Drayton to Drayton station 100

To the Township of Maryborough towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough at the hill at the fourth concession 100

To the Township of Luther towards making the town line road between the townships of Arthur and Luther 400

And whereas it is necessary to rebuild the bridges at Arthur: at the Four Mile Creek and across the Irvine River on the road assumed by and belonging to the County, known as the Guelph and Mount Forest Road, and the sum of four thousand two hundred dollars is required to rebuild the said bridges.

And whereas for the purposes aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt of twenty thousand dollars to be raised in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas it will require the sum of three thousand and nineteen dollars to be raised annually by special rate for the payment of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars and interest.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said County of Wellington, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and irrespective of any interest in or income from the said offices, and the said County Roads and Bridges, and also irrespective of any interest to arise from any temporary investments of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, is according to the last revised and estimated assessment rolls of the said County of Wellington, \$13,896,298.

And whereas for paying the interest on the said debt, and for the payment of the principal of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars it will require an equal annual special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar to be levied in addition to all other rates.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the Corporation of the County of Wellington is for principal the sum of \$69,649.00, and for interest the sum of \$30,680.82.

And whereas there is no interest in arrears.

And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington hath not in the municipal year contracted any debts of loans over and above the sum required for its ordinary expenditures which, including the sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed twenty thousand dollars.

And whereas a copy of this by-law hath been duly published according to law. Therefore the Corporation of the County of Wellington, in pursuance of the powers in it that behalf vested, and by the Council thereof, enact as follows: That the Warden of the said County for the time being, be, and he is hereby authorized, empowered, and required for the purposes aforesaid, to issue in due form of law the sum of twenty thousand dollars in debentures of the said Corporation of the said County in lieu of not less than one hundred dollars each, payable in twelve years at farthest from the day on which this by-law is appointed to take effect, at the office of the Treasurer of the said County, and that every such debenture shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date of its issue, payable half yearly at its cash office, and shall be signed by the Warden, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being of the said County, and shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of said interest, which debentures the Warden is hereby authorized to negotiate and dispose of.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said debentures and interest, an equal special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar in addition to all other rates be raised, levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said county during the continuance of the said debentures, and the proceeds of the said debentures shall be applied and apportioned to the several purposes hereinbefore mentioned, and in the amounts and proportion aforesaid, and the grants of the said local municipalities to be paid to the Treasurer thereof respectively, to be applied by them strictly to the purposes aforesaid, and an account of such application to be returned by each Reeve to the Council of the said County, at the next December Session of this Council.

No person lending money upon or purchasing said debentures shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, this By-law shall take effect upon, from and after the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

The above is a true copy of a proposed By-law to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of Wellington, at the Court House, in the Town of Guelph, in the said County, on the first day of October, 1872, at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purpose aforesaid.
