New York, March 20.—Foster passed the day quietly. He heard of the final efforts of his Counsel to prevent, on legal technicality, execution from coming off to-day, and his hopes revived. On receiving the intelligence that the effort had proved in vain, he became very deected, and desired that no one wo eak to him except his wife. Rev. Dr. Fyng spent upwards of an hour with Foster this afternoon. He refused to un-lergo the ordeal of parting with his

This evening the final parting hildren. between Foster and his wife took place. Both were deeply afflicted. He kissed her repeatedly, and she clung to him un til overcome with emotion, when she fainted and was carried out.

Foster, the murderer of Avery Putman, was hung at 9.15 a.m., to-day. He passed up from his cell to the prise

yard with a black cap on, and his arms pinioned. He walked firmly to the scafe fold, when Dr. Tyng read a lengthy funeral service. He attempted to place his neral service. He attempted to place his hand upon his ear, but could not reach it. The reading of the death warrant was finished at 9,20, and a moment later the rope was cut. The unhappy man died easy and showed no signs of a violent death. About 200 of a





The great question among the re-presentatives at Ottawa, at present, is, what to do with the large batch (about fifty) of election petitions presented against the return of as many members. There are 200 members, all told, and of that number 50 are disqualified on account of being petitioned against. Seven members of the Government and six members chosen as the General Committee on elections are also disqualified, which

leaves only 130 eligible to be drafted as Special Election Committees, or a sufficient number to try only twenty-six protests, or about half of the entire number entered. The question then arises, what will be done with the ballance of these petitions. It is true that some of the cases may be withdrawn, to ruled out as informal, yet making

all due allowance for these, quite a number of these petitions must of necessity stand over from a want of matereal to form the required number of committees.
