



Phe Parents of Lillian Stewart Return with Her Body from Seattle.

Suicide by Poison Not Unhesitatingly Accepted as the Cause of Death.

John Stewart, of 74 Store street, with his wife and eldest daughter, returned from the Sound by last evening's steamer, bringing with them the body of her who was once the light and life of the home circle, whose death in Seattle, a day or so ago, was referred to, yesterday.

The body, enclosed in a plain, black walnut casket, was viewed by several friends, last evening, as it lay in the little parlor of

last evening, as it lay in the little parlor of the grief-stricken parents' home. No one, to look at the flushed face, circled with a wreath of white tuberoses and hyacinths, would imagine that death, the result of a deadly poison, taken with a stern determination of self-murder, had ended the young life just budding into womanhood. Nor are all the friends of the dead girl convinced of the truth of the suicide theory, so unhesitatingly accepted as fact by the Seattle authorities. There are several things in connection with Lillian's untimely end which mystify them, and it is more than probable that a post mortem examination, not considered necessary in Seattle, will be held today. The funeral has been arranged to take place Sunday morning, from the house on Store street.

The Salaries Question Discussed— President Van Horne's Message—A Satisfactory Outcome Expected.

(From our own Correspondent.)
VANCOUVER, March 19.—The COLONIS sporter has secured the following information from the C.P.R. officials to-night: "I is much regretted that the prospects of an amicable adjustment between the Trainmen amicable adjustment between the Trainmen and Company have been postponed for the present, if not indeficitely. On Wednesday last there was a conference between the General Superintendent and the trainmen, which resulted in a proposition to the effect that, relying upon the assurance of the General Superintendent that the wages on the Pacific division should be equal to those on the Western division, with the alight percentage in addition, which has heretsfore prevailed, the trainmen were willing to wait the settlement of the question of rates with the Western division trainmen and pledged themselves to continue faithful to the company without regard to any combination against it, provided the men who had been discharged were reinstated. A subsequent conference took place on Thursday and Friday, which resulted in some modification of the original terms and in the conditions of settlement being drafted afresh by one of the leading trainmen and

In addition to the above rates the conductors of freight and work trains received \$6 per month bonus, and were also allowed an arbitrary mileage, which gave them a percentage of 5 miles in every 100 miles run on cast division, and 50 per cent. more than actual miles run in the mountain division. The run from Donald to Revelstoke, an actual distance of 79 miles counting as 120 miles, which percentage, your reporter would judge, gave the men on the Pacific Division an advantage in monthly pay over the Eastern division. From the statements shown of the amounts earned by the freight conductors, the following amounts of individual earnings were extracted: general average, \$12 per month for 20 conductors, and \$35 for 28 brakemen. Some individual earnings per month of conductors ranged from \$125 to \$168, per month, and of brakemen, from \$105 to \$117, per month.

Ottawa, March 19.—The following notice to owners and masters of British sealing vessels appears in the Canada Gazette to day: "Notice is hereby given to all persons having claims for compensation for loss or damage by reason of expulsion from or warning out of Behring Sea, under the provisions of the modus vissed between Her Majesty's Government and the United States during the year 1891, that all claims must be lodged at the office of the Collector of Customs at Victoria, B. C., within a month from the date of this netice. Claims not lodged within the time specified will not be considered." The date of the notice is March 28th, so that sealers have fully five weeks in which to make their claims.

A proolamation was issued, to day, put ting into force the act of last ession respecting the inspection of ships. 
