NEW YORK HORSE SHOW.

WHAT A PROMINENT TORONTOIAN THINKS OF THE AMERICANS.

Mr. John Macdonald Was Well Treated at the Metropolis and Highly Delighted With What He Saw Some of the Differences Noted Between Canadian and American Horse Fanatics.

It would appear from an article in the last issue of The Rider and Driver, signed "American," that the Canadians who visited the horse show in New York were accorded a treatment incommensurate with the hospitality proffered to New Yorkers who visited the Toronto Horse Show.

Mr. John Macdonald, who has just returned from the metropolis, when interviewed by The World yesterday, had no complaint to make. He was handsomely treated, he says.

Asked for his impressions, Mr. Macdonald said that the horse show in New York was the first in which his business has allowed him to attend the horse show, and he was of the opinion that in magnitude and public enthusiasm, its success was marvelous.

Mr. Macdonald is also of the opinion that the horse show has affected New York permanently. He was surprised to find that the custom of giving prizes to aged horses and ignoring the younger animals seems to him a new thing.

There is too much speeding and running about in the ring, although the horses are not judged on speed at all. The trotting bred horse, with his heavily armed and heavy harness, has entirely superseded the hackney in popularity at the show.

The gentleman drivers, like Beard and Carman, were the finest whips Mr. Macdonald ever saw in the world.

A peculiar thing he noticed about the coachmen was that instead of sitting with the feet braced against the footboard, as with us, they sat with their feet on the floor of the carriage, so that a sudden dash of the horse would pull them off the box.

An interesting feature was the playing of "God Save the Queen" when the Canadian horse "Hurricane" won.

THEY WORKED ON SUNDAY

AND A CHARGE WAS LAID UNDER THE LORDS' DAY ACT.

It Was Proved. However, that the Work was Necessary and the Case Collapsed—Slocum Goes Back to Illinois—Church Trouble in Carleton Place and Centennial—Hamilton News.

Hamilton, Nov. 20.—Owing to the frequent cave-ins on the T. H. & B. tunnel, Contractor Onderdonk decided to put a force of men to work last Sunday, to shore up the banks properly, and prevent the possibility of another cave-in. Owing to the great amount of earth that had fallen away, several houses along the edge of the excavation were in danger of caving in, and it was to prevent the possibility of this and protect the lives of the men working in the tunnel, about 50 feet down, that work was prosecuted. At the Police Court to-day Chief Smith charged the workmen with pursuing their ordinary occupations, but the case was dismissed, the prosecutor not showing that the men had worked at their ordinary occupation, and that the work was not one of necessity. Chief Smith established a precedent in his conduct of the case, by engaging V. Teetzel, Q.C., who called as a witness James Onderdonk, who has charge of the work, and who was one of the effect that the work was one of necessity. H. Carstairs, Q.C., appeared for the defendants.

Slocum Goes Back. The oft-quoted Slocum case was settled this morning, and Detective Dubois will take the prisoner back to Peoria, Ill., as soon as he gets the necessary papers from Ottawa. The charge upon which Slocum was extradited was that of shooting Peter Hanson in August, 1894, and it was acting as correspondent for The Chicago World that the alleged offense took place. He is also wanted on several other charges, and Slocum alleges that the shooting charge was just brought up to get him back to Peoria. His wife is in Peoria for selling immoral literature. When Judge Slander gave an order this morning for extradition, he informed the prisoner he could not be tried on any other charge in Peoria, and the latter waived his right for 15 days' stay of proceedings.

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TRAVELING MEN PICK

They Want Better Hotel Accommodations

About 20 members of the Commercial Travelers' Association, headed by President C. C. Van Norman, Mayor Strong of London and Messrs Hyman and Hobbs, M.L.A., waited upon Provincial Treasurer Harcourt at the Parliament Buildings yesterday morning, and presented petitions signed by about 500 representative travellers, praying for the appointment of a competent provincial officer whose duty it should be to inspect all houses receiving business from the Government and see that proper sanitary arrangements be carried out. The various speakers pointed out that the hotel keepers possessed valuable franchises by virtue of their licenses and should be made to afford proper accommodation for the travelling public.

A year ago they had waited upon Mr. Harcourt and complained of the unsanitary condition of many of the hotel laboratories and poor ventilation of bed rooms, and other members of the association's 5000 members were constantly travelling and if typhoid or contagious diseases of any kind were contracted they would be a dangerous element in spreading them.

Mr. Harcourt promised his best consideration.
