Alcohol in Hospitals.

The diminution in the use of alcohol in hospitals and institutions of public health has been one of the remarkable features of the last twenty or thirty years. In Great Britain where alcohol is still used much more than in America the diminution has been put at 80 p.c. Alongside of this two facts stand out. While the alcohol bill is only one fifth, the drug bill has remained stationary or diminished slightly, the milk bill has increased three or four fold. 
Public Spirit.

NEW SUMMER DRINKS.

Some Very Cooling and Gratifying Beverages From Foreign Lands. Although the "cups" and "punches" of America have a wide reputation, foreign lands have equally refreshing beverages. England and India excel in the variety of their cooling mixtures, and Persia is the original home of the julep, but in that faraway country mint is never used; roses take its

A beverage from Turkey is called "sanec amour." Take the juice of three lemons and two oranges and the grated rinds of one lemon and one orange. Stick a lemon with cloves and hold over the fire until it is thoroughly roasted, then slice in thin slices, add a handful of fresh rose petals and one large cupful of honey. Pour boiling water over all and let cool gradually. When ready to serve chill in a shaker and serve in lemonade curs.

French egg pique is very refreshing on a hot day when one is too exhausted to eat. Put two tablespoonfuls of fruit sirup, any flavor desired, and one egg in a glass and fill with bottled soda that has been chilled. Mix thoroughly in a shaker until foamy, then pour out, add a dash of phosphate and sprinkle over the top a little grated nutmeg or fresh ground cinnamon as preferred.

English Lemonade. - Pare two oranges and six lemons as thinly as possible, steep them in a quart of hot (not boiling) water for four hours. Boil one and a quarter pounds of granulated sugar in three pints of water. Add to the two liquors the juice of six oranges and a dozen lemons. Stir well, then strain through a jelly bag

EVERLASTING YEAST.

An Excellent Recipe That Has Been In Use For Years.

A special cooking of potatoes for

yeast is never necessary if the water in which potatoes are cooked for a meal is Instead of draining into the sink, strain the proportion of five cupfuls of potato water over one-half cupful of sugar. When cool add a starter of yeast foam, or by keeping in a warm place, such as the top of the warming oven, in two or three days it will ferment without aid, a white foam appearing on the top, when it can be placed in a jar and kept cool.

Use no other liquid for bread. Three and one-half cupfuls will make three loaves of bread. The yeast can be added to from time to time by saving the potato water, adding sugar and when cool putting into the yeast jar. In this way the yeast keeps indefinitely, with no extra work, and is always ready for use. Always save a cupful for a starter. Yeast with the starter can be made at noon and be ready to make bread at night.

An Inexpensive Soup.

Many people think soup is a luxury and cannot be a part of dinner probably more than once a week. Following is a recipe for a soup which, besides being very inexpensive, is very beneficial and will prove a boon to people suffer

ing from loss of appetite:
After lunch put one-half pound of
barley in two quarts of water, add a
little salt and let simmer for two hours About one and one-half hours before dinner slice into the barley and water one good sized raw carrot and one small onion, sliced fine. About one half hour before taking from fire add two teaspoonfuls of worcestershire

This is exceptionally good and well worth a trial. Barley costs 5 cents, car rot 2 cents, onion 2 cents, worcester shire sauce 1 cent, total 10 cents. It will give as much nutriment to the system as 40 cents' worth of meat.

Two New Ideas. If you wish to give your lingerie frock the very latest whim of the fash-ion realm add narrow bands of brown fur. These bands of fur edgins flounces and drapery of the most transparent and filmy net and chiffon dress-es were one of the most marked features of the drag race at Auteuil. BUSY CELL TOILERS.

The Marvelous Work They Constantly Perform in the Blood.

The blood cells are important mem-bers of the cell community and are exceedingly numerous, there being over 75,000,000,000 of the red blood cells alone. These red blood cells move in the blood currents, carrying through the arteries each its little load of oxygen, which it transports to the distant tissues that they may be invigorated and vitalized anew, and, returning, carrying through the veins the debris and waste products of the system to the great crematory of the lungs, where the waste is burned and thrown off from the body.

Like the ships that sail the sea, each cell carries its outgoing cargo and returns with another one. Some of these cells perform the office of special repairers, forcing their way through the walls of the blood vessels and penetrating the tissues in order to perform their special tasks. The police cells are on the constant lookout for germs, bacteria and other microscopic disturbers of the peace of the body. When these tiny policemen discover

vagrant germs or criminal bacteria they rush upon the intruder and, tying him up in a mesh, proceed to deyour him. If the intruder be too large or vigorous a call for assistance is sent out, and the reserve police rush to the assistance of their brothers and overpower the disturber of the peace. SANDWICH TIME.

Here Are Some Delightful Novelties Which Will Appeal to the Palate. With the vacation season at its height the demand of the moment is for trifles such as hors d'oeuvre and

sandwiches. Suppers served from buffets are in order. There are teas, picnics, little festive gatherings of se many different kinds that the cook who has a skilled hand is much in requisition. Here are some delightful sandwich novelties:

Savory Sandwich Butter.—Cream or knead about four ounces of fresh butter and mix it with one teaspoonful of any one of the following ingredients: Finely grated horseradish, chopped parsley, green herb puree, curry paste. anchovy paste or bloater paste. Krona or paprika pepper is also used for mixing with butter and makes a capital sandwich butter. The above will be found decidedly good for buttering thinly cut bread for sandwiches.

Stuffed Eggs a la Russe.-Shell four hard boiled eggs and cut each in half crossways, then carefully remove the yolks and rub through a fine sieve and mix with a little seasoned mayonnaise cream. With this refill the white of eggs. Cover the surface with a good layer of seasoned caviar. Range the halves of stuffed eggs thus prepared neatly on a dish on a bed of small cress or else finely shredded green salad, preferably lettuce. Keep the dish on the ice till required for table.

Princess Sandwiches .- Pound in a mortar till smooth about eight ounces of cooked chicken, free from skin and bones, then add one ounce of butter and mix thoroughly; now add one dessertspoonful double cream, one teaspoonful lemon juice and season with salt and a good pinch of paprika pep-Work the mixture until quite smooth and then put on a plate. Blanch, drain and skin four walnuts or six almonds and cut them into thin slices. Spread the prepared mixture upon thin slices of buttered bread, arrange the sliced walnuts upon the chicken puree. Press the slices together in the usual way, then cut them into desired shapes dish up, garnish with sprigs of water cress or parsley and serve.

Hamburger Sandwiches. - Cut very thinly the required number of slices of smoked German ham sausage. Butter some thinly cut slices of white or brown bread, spread over each with a little German or French mustard and then a layer of thinly sliced gherkin. Lay the slices of sausage between each two thin slices of buttered bread and proceed to trim and finish the sandwiches in the usual way.

The session of 1912-13 of the Dominion Parliament, which will open on the twenty-first of next month, will start out with a record in the matter of divorce cases. The time for giving notice of application for bills of divorce has not yet expired, yet already there are 32 on the list. Of these two or three were left over from last session when 16 bills were passed, which was thought to be an unusually large grist. Sixteen, exactly half the applications so far put in for the approaching session, are made by residents of Toronto. By arrangement, all divorce cases are dealt with in the Senate. A special committee of the upper house hears the evidence in camera, a stenographic report of which is printed and distributed to members of Parliament, as well as to senators, and when a divorce it granted by the Senate, the printed evidence is laid before the Private Bills committee of the Commons which deals with the Senate's bill exactly as with any other private bill that comes before it. It is but rarely however, that the Senate's judgment is upset, in the matter of divorce bill, by the Commons. But all divorce bills are recorded as "carried on division." This, for the reason that members who are Roman Catholics are supposed to vote against divorce as a matter of religious prin-

To Kill Wild Mustard.

Toronto, Oct. 18.-Professor Todd, of the provincial secretary's department, who is superintending the agricultural work at the Guelph and Whitby farms, work at the Guelph and Whitby farms, reports an experiment recently tried to rid the land of wild mustard. A farm comprising one hundred acres was selected near Brockville and was sown in barley and oats. The land was sprayed with a dilute solution of sulphate of copper. After a few weeks had elapsed, an examination was made and Professor Todd reports that every trace of the wild mustard has disappeared. Other sections of the province will be selected next year.



PESTS IN GRAIN BINS.

Must Be Killed Before Storage of Harvest if Damage Is to Be Averted. A few cents' worth of carbon bisulphide will kill the insects hiding in the cracks of your bins waiting for the grains, says G. A. Dean, a bug specialist at the Kansas Agricultural college, work so vigorously that the farmer must either kill them, dispose of his grain or sit still and allow them to damage it. Killing these pests before the grain is stored prevents much damage in the fall and winter, he says.

Dust, dirt, rubbish, refuse grain, flour and meal serve as breeding places for these pests. Fresh grain should not be exposed to attack by being placed with the old which already is infested. Throw this out. Unless the old grain was badly infested with any one of the four or five common injurious insects it may not be necessary to fumigate now, but a thorough cleaning of the floor, walls and ceiling should not be neglected. To avoid infestation in the stack the grain should be thrashed as soon after harvesting as possible. Considerable damage has been done by these insects to stacked wheat and oats in Kansas in the last

four or five years.

One pound of carbon bisulphide when the temperature is about 90 degrees will fumigate 500 cubic feet of space. At 80 degrees 400 cubic feet will be thoroughly treated. The building and bins must be as nearly air tight as possible while fumigating. The enr-bon bisulphide should be placed in shallow pans at the top of the bins or building. Evaporation is rapid, the vapor settling to the bottom of the bin and poisoning the insects. If the grain is not to be used for seed it is well to allow the vapor to remain in it for forty-eight hours. Doors and windows should be opened wide after the fumi-gation and the bins aired thoroughly, one or two hours before entering.

One should be very careful in handling carbon bisulphide, as it is highly inflammable. Electric lights must not be used, since when turning them on or off there always is danger of producing a spark. It is not safe to have heat of any kind in the building when the fumigation is in progress.

"SCALPER" FOR WEEDS.

Homemade Tool That Does Good Work Around Sweet Potatoes, Onions, Etc. "scalper" for weeds is a simple affair and can easily be made by any blacksmith in a short time, and the cost, aside from the handle, need not exceed 20 cents. It is made of an iron rod about twenty-four inches long and three-sixteenths to one-fourth of an inch in diameter. This rod is bent in the form of a triangle and the two ends welded together so as to go in an ordinary hoe handle. Before bending, however, six inches in the center of the rod (afterward the base of the triangle) should be heated and pounded out to make a flattened surface at least one-half inch wide with a slight bevel so that one side will be sufficiently thin to make a reasonably sharp edge.

Measure one-half inch on either side of the flattened surface or blade and bend from these two points so as to form the triangle with the blade as the base. The sides of the triangle are



about five inches long, and this leaves two ends of three and a half inches to be welded together, forming the shank. When inserting in a handle the scalp-er is bent at the shank so as to make slight angle with the handle. The scalper is the lightest and most efficient tool we have for working in sweet potatoes. With it even green hands can do fairly good work with little in jury, as the plant is protected from the two extremes of the blade or cutting edge by the rounded corners made by the unsharpened rod.
