ed by alternate freezing and thawing. which tends to lift them out of the soil and thus injure or break the roots. They may be injured during the cold of Winter by the frost drying out the crown of the plant and the leaves. Heaving of the plants seldom occurs on a well draining soil, but on soils poorly drained the plants are likely to suffer considerably, particularly during the very early Spring after the snow has melted. In /certain situations there may be little loss from cold, as the drying effect of the cold may be lessened because of the natural protection afforded




