ADDRESS ON "EDUCATION" BY MR. F. W. RUSSELL,

-The Church the True Teacher-Why Christian Parent.

We have much pleasure, as in-timated in our last issue, in publishing in full the address of Mr. F. W. Russell before the Catholic Truth Society. 


