WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.-The house to-day defeated the bill introduced by Representative Young of Michigan, giving the Long Sault Development Co. the right to erect dams in the St. Lawrence River near the Long Sault, Barnhart and Sheek Islands, so as to utilize the water power of that stream.

It was asserted in debate chat the so-called "alluminum trust" was back of the bill, and proposed to make an investment of \$40,000,000. The state of New York has granted a charter to the company, and waterfront rights. The only interest of the United States, it was declared, was to preserve naviga-

The opponents of the bill urged that the rights granted by the United States should be limited to 50 years. Amendments being out of order, they voted down the measure in its entirety.





SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may all be made at any agency or certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.




