Montreal, Jan. 11.—(Special)—Col. U. D. Davidson, head of the Canadian Northern land department, who is here, announces that the country opened up by that railway from Winnipeg to Edmonton equals in extent the combined areas of Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota.

When asked if corn would ever grow in Manitoba and the Canadian west, Davidson said it would be hazardous to say no. The corn belt, he declares, has moved north 40 miles in thirty years, and the corn is now grown most successfully in Fargo, North Dakota, the belt is still on the move.

He estimates that 1906 will be a record year for wheat as immigration is concerned, and he expects that 15,000 Americans will enter the Canadian west this year.

Wm. Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern, confirmed the report today that a company's system would be constructed through the north of Lake Superior uniting the Canadian Northern with the other provinces with Port Arthur. The importance of the declaration made by Mackenzie is that this is the first time an announcement has been officially made.

"The efforts of the company," he said, "are not being directed towards developing a large sum of money, and when this development is more advanced, the connecting link will be attended to. There is a railway line running along the north of Lake Superior being built."

TO CONQUER EAST AND WEST CONNOISSEURS PREFER

1000 MEN, THEN VICTORY! SO SAYS THE TYPOTHETAE

Declare Outlook Bright and Ultimate Success Certain—Union Confident. To.

New York, Jan. 11.—The Typothetae of the City of New York authorized the statement this morning that with the outlook is brighter than at any stage since the strike began.

The Typothetae issued a statement to-night, saying that a canvass of the members of the organization was made to-day, which showed that every firm and the two large independent printing establishments were working adequate forces and suffering no inconvenience.

The Typothetae claim that more than 400 non-union printers are now at work, which is nearly one-half of the total number of compositors affected. Individual firms of the Typothetae have day called meetings of their boards of directors and voted to continue the fight.

BY MEANS OF FORGED ORDER GOT BOGUS CERTIFICATES

Detectives Stumbled on Clue Months Ago Which Proved Valuable Later On.

New York, Jan. 11.—Announcement was made to-day by detectives engaged upon the case that the mystery surrounding the original counterfeit Norfolk and Western Railway stock certificates recently placed upon the market had been cleared up.

There is no denying up of the system of the counterfeit certificates. A proof of the certificates and an alleged forged order for stock certificates addressed to the Hamilton Bank Note Company and to be signed by the president of the Norfolk and Western Railway was found by the detectives in a Wall-street office.

Not set time was given the railway to explain its position, the understanding was that the certificates should be paid. Thus, if there is no response within 24 hours, it would be a matter of time to institute contempt of court proceedings.

It is likely that the company will have the certificates paid before the high court or court of appeal.
