MYSTERY IN ORIGIN OF FIRE THAT RAZED M'GILL ENGINEERING BUILDING

The Structure Erected, Equipped and Endowed by Sir W. E. Macdonald Destroyed With a Loss of \$600,000.

FIRE-DOORS CHECK FLAMES

Blaze Suddenly Breaks Out on Third Floor and Rapidly Spreads to All Parts Before Arrival of Department.

Montreal, April 5.—(Special).—The Macdonald Engineering Building, McGill University, erected, equipped and endowed by Sir William C. Macdonald, was totally destroyed by fire at an early hour this morning.

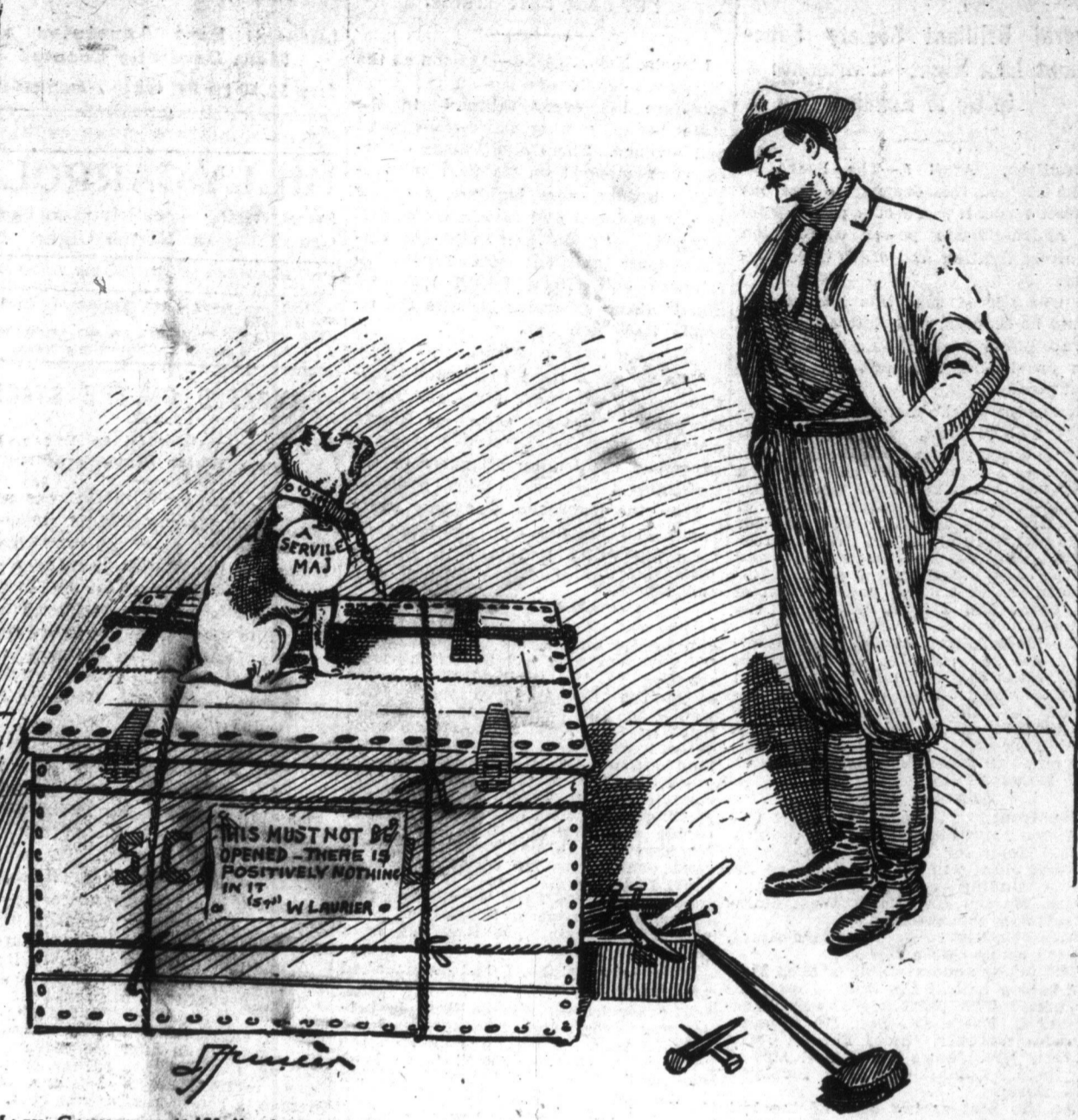

SCORE KILLED IN THREE STATES BY TORNADO

Parts of Four Towns Laid Waste With a Loss of Half a Million Dollars and Three Hundred Miles Wind-Swept.

TRAIN ROLLED OVER AND OVER

One Hundred Buildings Wrecked in One Town, Asylum Razed and Section of House Wedged Into a Passenger Coach.

NEW ORLEANS, April 5.—A score of persons were killed to-day by a tornado, which swept for 800 miles across portions of Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama.

Parts of four towns were devastated, with damage exceeding \$500,000. The wind caused loss of property, crops and telegraph wires.

The tornado began at Alexandria, Ala., soon after 1 o'clock this morning, killing four persons there, probably fatally injuring three, and seriously injuring 13 others.

At Bayou Sara, La., at least half a dozen others were killed, it is reported. One person was fatally hurt at Jackson.

The tornado next appeared at Carson, Miss., where great damage to property was done, and disappeared about noon near Selma, La., where the inhabitants saw whirling clouds rise into the air as they crossed the river. A negro, it is reported, was killed near Selma.

Empty Train Rolled Over Alexandria, a town of about 16,000 inhabitants, had a fearful experience. When the tornado struck the place the electric lights went out, the cracking of falling buildings could be heard above the noise of the wind, and vivid lightning flashes showed such sights as an empty iron mountain passenger train rolling over and over.

Immediately after the wind spent its violence a heavy hailstorm added to the general discomfort. The main portion of Alexandria escaped the worst of the tornado, which cut a path thru the northern part of the town, a residence quarter. About a score of homes were demolished, 50 were damaged, and altogether about 170 buildings were wrecked, including several business houses.

The iron mountain train rolled over a small section of a house into an empty passenger coach, wedging the two almost inextricably together. Trees and Cabins Cut Down. In the woods about the town the tornado cut down trees and small cabins in a narrow line about nine miles long.

Several houses were blown down at Plaquemine, and injuries to persons are reported. The hail did much damage to crops. At daylight Alexandria began clearing debris. The damage is estimated at \$200,000.

At Jackson, La., the insane asylum was wrecked, with a loss of about \$200,000. Three female inmates and many other persons were injured. Mrs. Seach Lee's residence was blown down, and her daughter, Mary, was seriously injured.

Two negroes were killed on a near-by plantation, while reports from the surrounding country indicate that there was probably more loss of life among negroes, whose slimy cabins tumbled on the heads of the occupants.

Steamer Hit by Tornado At Bayou Sara several passengers on the steamer Betsy Ann had a thrilling escape. The vessel was badly damaged. While timbers from the steamer and from the shore flew thru the air, the crew got all the passengers safely ashore. The first mate had an arm broken, and almost all the rest of the crew suffered painful bruises. At Carson, Miss., the Mississippi Central Railroad depot was blown down, also a church, a schoolhouse, two business buildings and several cabins. Here the tornado's path was only 200 yards wide. From Carson the storm crossed the state line into Alabama, where it began to lose much of its destructive power. Peculiar weather conditions prevailed all day thruout Southern Louisiana and Mississippi. Rains were followed by clear skies, and gusts of wind were incessant. Details are arriving slowly, and many wires are down.

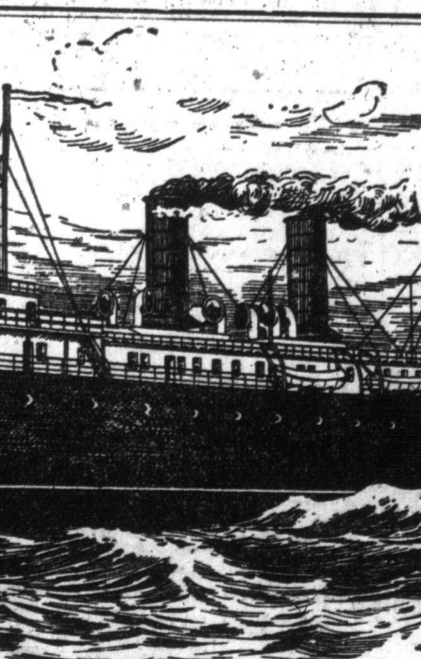

London, April 6.—The question of taxing cats is to be brought before the notice of parliament next session. The anti-cat society, responsible for the introduction of the bill, points out that cats are not only a nuisance, but most destructive, and should be taxed. A dog sleeps peacefully at night, in his own domain, it is stated, whereas a cat goes over walls and fences, and plays havoc in private gardens all night. It also sets up caterwauling, which acts on the nerves of thousands and keeps thousands from sleep. Cats scratch up seeds and seedlings, the society says, makes beds of ornamental grasses and other plants, and make themselves objectionable in many other ways.

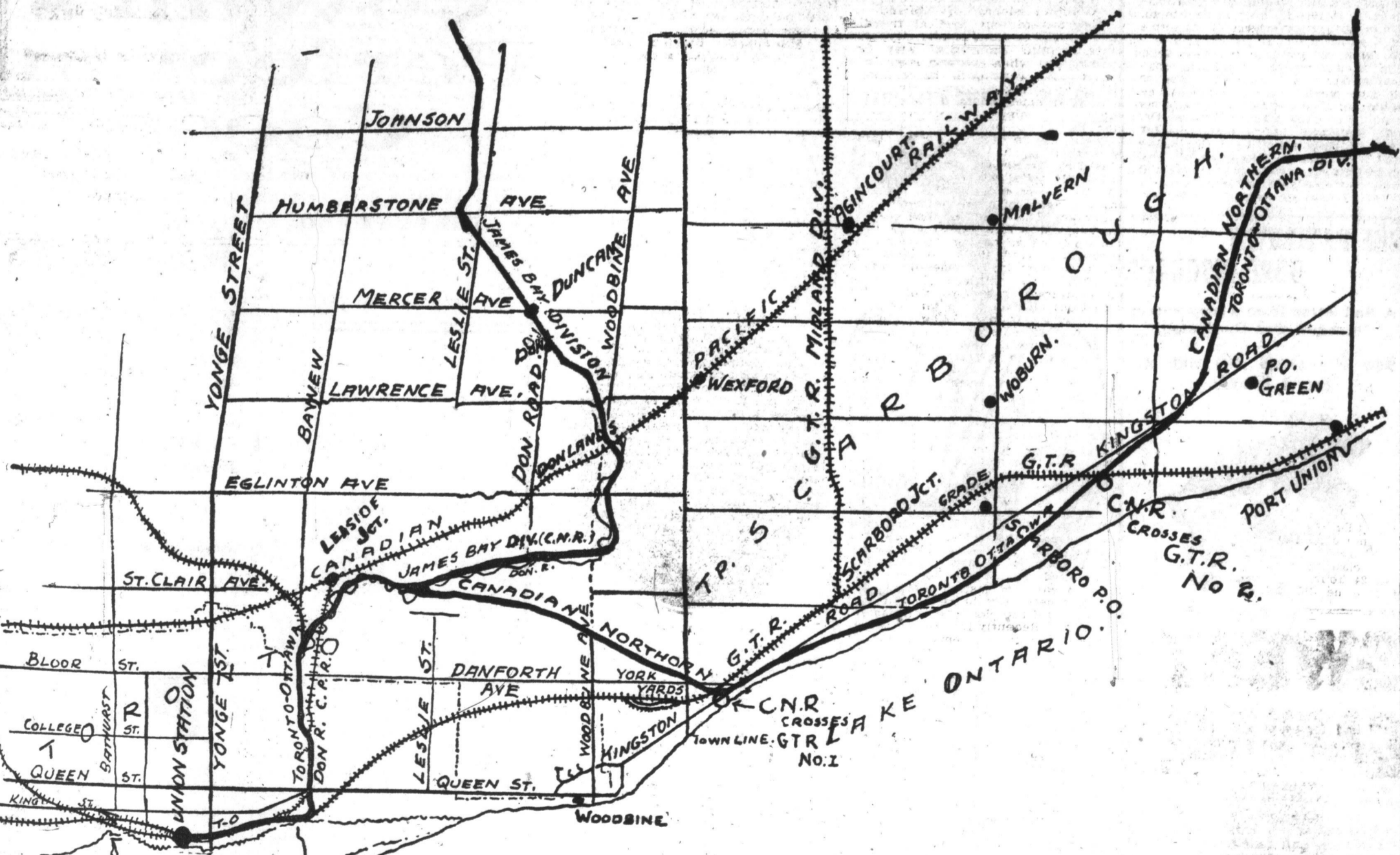

It will be noticed that the Canadian Northern on this plan leaves the Union Station and goes along the Esplanade to the Don River and then up the valley of the Don for a distance of about twelve miles from the Union Station to the Kingston-road, crossing the Grand Trunk line. WOMEN HAVE SMALL BRAINS.

German Doctor Examines 70,000 Cases and Reveals an Economy of Nature.

Probably no one has made as exhaustive a study of the comparative sizes of men's and women's brains as Dr. Doose of Berlin, who has taken the facial and skull measurements of 70,000 persons, including 45,000 school boys and girls. In his observations were included Germans, Ewedes, Danes, Dutch, Bohemians and Swiss. He has written a report of his deductions for a German popular health publication, in which he gives the advantage to men and boys from every point of view. Boys have bigger brain capacity than girls, he says, in a degree which cannot be accounted for on the general ground of better physical development. In fact, he confirms conclusions reached by other students that, from the ninth year to the close of school age, girls on the average are better nourished and developed than boys. The brains of well grown girls, however, remain inferior in size to those of physically backward boys. In the full-grown woman the skull and the brain all remain on a childish plane of development.

He thinks the difference in the sexes is due to the fact that the principal duty of woman is motherhood, and nature cannot afford to waste on her either physical or mental powers which are not essential to that function.

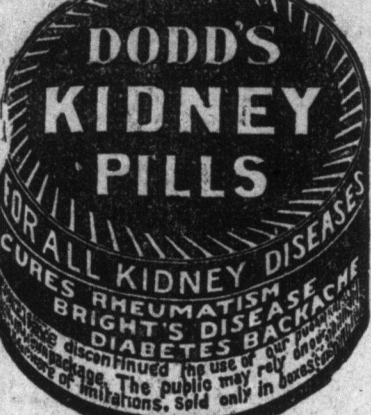

TOO BUSY BUILDING LINES NO MONEY TO MOVE CARS

Hon. Senator Scott Announces That Govt. is Urging Railways to Provide Motive Power.

Ottawa, April 5.—(Special.)—In the senate to-day Senator Perley complained that railways were so busy extending their lines thru the west that they had no time or capital to obtain motive power.

The result was farmers could not get their grain to market. They had to borrow money and pay interest to the banks.

Hon. Mr. Scott said the government had brought pressure on the railways to provide adequate motive power. Sir Thomas Shaughnessy wrote that in Canada and the United States locomotive works were loaded up with orders, and any number could not be immediately obtained.

Senator Jones thought there was not much comfort in this. He had been advised that some cars of goods shipped to the west from his factory in Toronto had not yet reached North Bay. Railroads favored competing points.

Ontario's Protest. On the Hamilton radial bill being offered for third reading, Senator Lougheed, Senator Shillivan and Sir Mackenzie Bowell called attention to the fact that the premier of Ontario had objected to this bill as an interference with the rights of Ontario to control electric lines.

A senate bill to amend the Civil Service Act was taken up in committee, and Hon. Mr. Scott explained that it was intended to do away with the necessity for a man to pass a civil service examination to qualify as a railway mail clerk.

ALGOMA CENTRAL RAILWAY BENEFIT TO NEW ONTARIO

Company Offers to Give Up Land Grant for Guarantee of \$25,000 a Mile.

The people of Sault Ste. Marie and New Ontario are interested in the proposal of the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway to give up its land grant of 7400 acres to the mile in return for a government guarantee of \$25,000 a mile to assist in the further construction of the railway.

The main line of the Algoma Central and Hudson Bay Railway runs north and west from Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, to the point of junction with the Michipicoten branch of said railway at Michipicoten Harbor, a distance of about 170 miles, thence north to the main line of Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, a distance of over 100 miles.

No Other Line. No railways running north and south have as yet been constructed in the northern part of the Province of Ontario. The government road known as the Temiscamingue and Northern Ontario Railway and no railway facilities of any kind whatever have been provided for the immense tract of country lying between Sudbury and Port Arthur, a distance of 200 miles, with the exception of the main line and Sault Ste. Marie branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway and a short line at Bruce Mines.

The first and most important work in the opening up of the territory named is the construction of those portions of the Algoma Central Railway above mentioned, as this railway traverses one of the richest mineral sections in the whole territory, crosses many important streams and rivers, down which will naturally come immense quantities of timber and other products of all kinds, and will pierce the very heart of the great clay belt, the lands of which are said to be equal to the best in older Ontario, and the timber of which is practically unlimited.

The harbor of Michipicoten is the only harbor advantageously situated for the terminus of a railway affording access to the territory indicated. It is nearer by 150 miles or thereabouts to the heart of this territory than Sault Ste. Marie, with which this territory will be connected by this railway, and many hundreds of miles nearer the clay belt than any other available harbor, and no other means of communication from Southern Ontario with the heart of the great clay belt could compete with the direct connection from the ports of Collingwood, Owen Sound, Southampton, Goderich, Kincardine, Sarnia, Windsor and other lake ports and Michipicoten Harbor, a distance of about 100 miles, to a short rail haul of about 165 miles to the Grand Trunk Pacific.

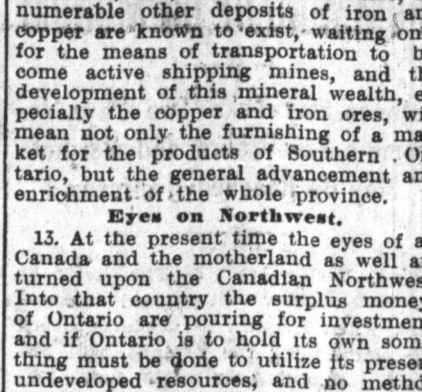

The agreement between the Tilelayers' Local Union and their employers expires June 1 and it is intimated the workmen will make a demand for an increase in wages.

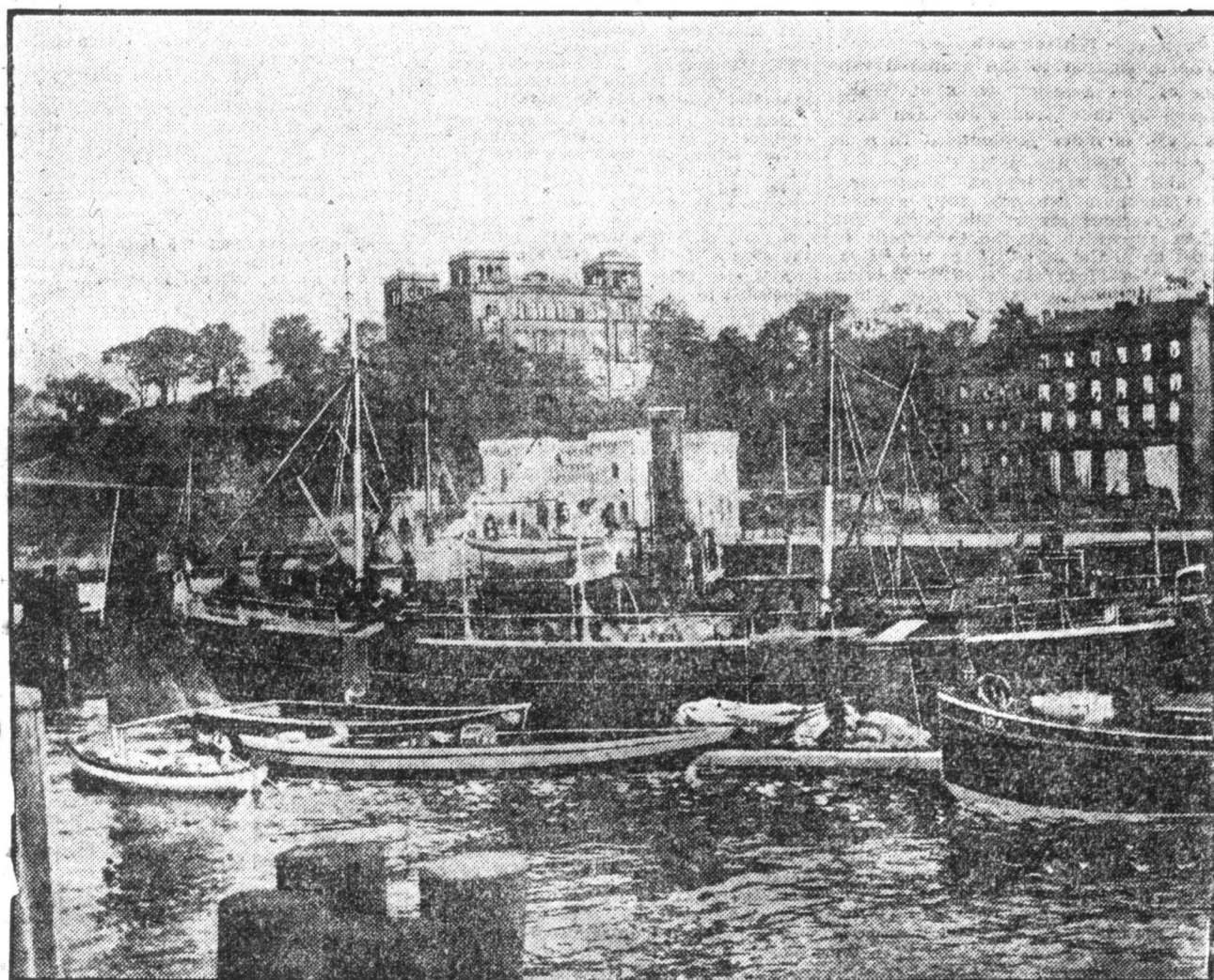

DELMAS WILL BEGIN HIS SUMMING UP ON MONDAY

Defence May Take Two Days, Jerome a Few Hours and Verdict May Be Reached Thursday.

New York, April 5.—The trial of Harry K. Thaw will proceed on Monday, when Dolphim M. Delmas, leading counsel for the defence, will begin his summing up to the jury.

District Attorney Jerome decided late to-day not to appeal to the appellate division of the court of appeals for the writ prohibition or mandamus to halt the trial.

Mr. Jerome may argue briefly on Monday morning against the confirmation of the report of the lunacy commission, which declared Thaw to be sane, but he is aware that Justice Fitzgerald's disposition is to confirm the report.

The district attorney has many witnesses still under subpoena, but it is said he will press the trial forward to an early verdict of what is regarded as more likely, a disagreement of the jury.

Immediately after yesterday's adjournment, Mr. Jerome set about seeking precedents upon which to base his appeal to the higher court. He was in his office again early to-day, and then went to the appellate division building.

Instead of applying for a stay of trial he sought counsel among his judicial friends, and it is said to have been upon their advice that he re-considered his determination to press the matter.

It was stipulated some weeks ago that each side should have one day for summing up, and the other the night, however, that Mr. Delmas may speak for two entire days.

District Attorney Jerome has said that his summing up will not require more than three or four hours. He will ask the jury to convict Thaw of murder in the first degree, and it is thought that a verdict will be reached on Thursday.

Discovery of an Ancient Cave.

Much interest has been aroused by the discovery of a cave on the side of a hill at Kingsland, near Boyle. Some young men were early to-day, and accidentally opened the cavern, which was about 5 ft deep and from 20 to 30 feet in length. There were about a dozen large stone slabs covering the mouth, and on each side of them were some inscriptions and carving emblems of historic battles in the time of Cromwell. The stones were covered with moss, earth and shrubs, and the place had thus escaped observation.

On exploring the cave a stone coffin was found containing a skeleton over six feet in length dressed in rusty armor. From the remains of rich military trappings adhering to it, the bones are supposed to be those of a knight, or chieftain of high rank, who met his death in battle near by, and was taken into this retreat by his followers.

### HUNTERS GET TWO DEER EMPLOYEES MAY HAVE GUNS

Several Divisions in Committee on Dr. Reaume's New Fish and Game Bill.

A routine session of the legislature yesterday resulted in the advance of a number of bills thru the committee stage, and a number of others were given a second reading. The work of the day was done on the Fish and Game Bill of the government, which was up in committee, but not finished with. It was at first intended to have a night session and finish it, but by 6:30 this resolution was abandoned and the hour adjourned.

The opposition twice brought up the case of the Tadenac Club. The second time was over the clause dealing with the leasing of fish and game rights. It was argued that if the government did not intend to lease such rights there was no need to insert a clause giving the power.

Premier Whitney had already stated that nothing would be done till Hon. Frank Cochrane returned from Ottawa. He declared, however, that the government was not wedded to any clause of the bill, and that they had never announced any policy on the matter, and did not intend to make any political capital out of the bill. The committee then rose and will sit again.

**Municipal Act Amendment.**  
A bill to amend the Municipal Act was introduced by Hon. W. J. Hanna. The bill embodies the suggestions of the municipal committee after consideration of various amending bills submitted this session.

Clause 22 of the bill proposes to remedy the section 506 of the present act, against which so many protests have been made. The committee was almost evenly divided on the proposed remedy, the unanimous as to the need of some relief.

Judges were divided as to what condition of things constituted liability under the statute. The proposed section would interpret to some degree the original intention of the act, but was open to the freest discussion, and the final form would be fixed in committee of the house. Liability for damages for injury received on defective highways may depend under the bill on "express notice" having been given the municipality of the defective condition. The matter said Mr. Hanna, required the closest attention of the house.

Section 84, concerning boundary roads, amended on two previous occasions, is again amended by clause 29.

**Assessment of Mineral Lands.**  
A bill to amend the Assessment Act was also introduced by the provincial secretary. The chief feature of this is the change in assessing mineral lands (which have hitherto been assessed on income. This has not been collectible owing to the residence elsewhere of the owners. The lands will continue to be assessed at agricultural values, but the income will be assessed where the property lies and there collectible.

In committee on the "game, fur-bearing animals and fisheries of Ontario" bill, Hon. Mr. Graham enquired what was being done about the Tadenac Club application.

Premier Whitney said the matter would remain on the minister's list of lands returned. Neither the public nor his hon. friend now have any fear about it. The previous government had given \$900,000 to the club. They now wanted an extension on each side on lands lying under water.

Hon. Mr. Graham remarked that he understood it was not the policy of the government to do that sort of thing, and Mr. Whitney assented.

In a careful discussion of the clauses, it was suggested that oarsmen or guides employed by hunters should come under the act, and be required to take out licenses. British subjects only are permitted to ordinary privileges, but exception will be made for two classes of residents.

**Not for Uncle Samuel.**  
Premier Whitney remarked that in similar circumstances the United States never agreed to the terms in which they did not get the best end of the bargain. It was not possible, he thought, to legislate on any subject, without bearing in mind some one else's interests. D. Sutherland wanted five years' protection for quail.

If the number of deer hunters was the poor man's gun. Rich men could take half-a-dozen guns and fire away while there was anything in sight. The automatic gun raised considerable argument. Hon. Dr. Reaume said he had never heard a word in favor of it, and that the government was not to be taken in by the claims of the hunters. R. R. Gamey declared that professional sportsmen thought they owned the country. If anything in which they had a right, the number to be killed should be limited. If they were not allowed to use anything that science produced, the principle would take them back to the bow-and-arrow, which would be safer for the game.

W. R. Smyth condemned the automatic shot-gun. The automatic rifle was all right.
