PRETORIA LIVES FOR BY THE BRITISH

But Lord Roberts is Silent as to His Movements Since Johannesburg Was Handed Over and Occupied.

Great War Council of Boer Generals Held at Pretoria, and Hope Has Not Yet Been Given Up—Krugger Skipped With All the Gold.

London, June 5.—(3.40 a.m.)—Of official intelligence regarding what is transpiring in Pretoria, there is little or nothing...

British Inquest Pretoria. An undated News Agency message from Pretoria, via Lorenzo Marquez, June 4, says:

"Pretoria is now invested by the British. No resistance will be offered. The city will be surrendered by the burghomaster as soon as a formal demand is made."

Determined to Defend Pretoria. The latest to arrive at Lorenzo Marquez brings events at the capital down to a late hour Friday night. At that time, according to these sources of information, the military leaders had quite recovered from the panic and had determined to defend the town.

War Council Held. One message, which is dated June 1, says: "Pretoria is full of strange burghers, but most of the commandoes are larger out of a great war council of generals has just concluded its deliberations. The decision is to the military officers and not to the burghers."

Another despatch from Lorenzo Marquez by messenger, and dated at Pretoria, Friday, at midnight, says: "The war council assumes the powers of the government. Its members declare that the capital may still be successfully defended."

"One commander declared: 'With the help of the Boer, the hour will still come when Great Britain will acknowledge the independence of the two republics. A tremendous change will come over the situation.'"

Krugger Took All the Gold. "President Kruger is somewhere to the eastward, but it is constant wire communication with his military staff. There is, however, a deep feeling of anger against him at what is now called his unnecessary flight because he and the officials took all the gold and left their subordinates empty."

British Movement in Progress. From Lorenzo Marquez comes a despatch dated June 4, saying: "It is known that some great British movement is now in progress."

No Danger of Being Surrounded. The news from the minor theatres of hostilities is less cryptic. The Boer operations to break Lord Roberts' communications have been successfully baffled, and the communications are in no danger of being surrounded at Ficksburg, Senekal, Hebron and Lindley. Gen. Ruddle, instead of throwing himself on the mercy of the Boers that are entrenched at Senekal, moved towards Ficksburg and established communications with Gen. Brabant, the Boers marched parallel with Ruddle, intending to seize a strong position on the Ficksburg road, but Gen. Ruddle got there first. The 1500 Boers who were in this movement are now reported to be going elsewhere.

It Was a Hard Fight. The correspondents with Gen. Ruddle continue to point out the hardness of the fight of last Tuesday, but they believe that it will be the last real resistance. Col. Lloyd was three times wounded. Drummer Hayes, while aiding Col. Lloyd, was hit in the hand, which was resting near the colonel's head.

Was Thrown a Shell or Two. Gen. Buller's gun threw a shell or two towards the Boer positions in front of him occasionally. Gen. Baden-Powell is still at Mafeking. Gen. Hunter's column is marching unopposed into the Transvaal, beyond Lichtenburg. Beyond Lichtenburg the Boers are assembling to oppose Gen. Hunter. Col. Mahon effected a junction with Hunter Thursday at Marlboro.

MR. COTTON GOT A SMASHING FROM MEN ON HIS OWN SIDE

Said Cotton Was Responsible for the Reduction of Wages—Eberts Was in the Game, He Said—Billy McInnes Defends His Father—Squall Struck Martin.

Vancouver, B.C., June 4.—(Special).—Mr. Cotton got an awful smashing from men supposed to be on his side, or at least with him against the Martin-Bryden combination at Nanaimo, and Eberts, the victors in the small mining town near Nanaimo, Saturday night, called by Bryden, manager for Dunsmuir. Bryden said that he had heard that Martin refused all cheese-paring during the Semlin Cabinet regime. He was opposed to Martin, but it was wrong to blame him for these things. When road wages were reduced, Bryden went to Cotton and urged restoration of the old rates. Mr. Cotton informed him that 22 a day was quite enough for men working on the roads. Eberts declared he was utterly opposed to Martin, but did not think it fair to blame him for the blunders and crimes of the Semlin Ministry. Cotton was solely responsible for the reduction in wages. Eberts agreed a decided surprise on the meeting by saying he was a member of the Mining Committee when the eight-hour law was brought up. Ralph Smith, the labor champion, also on the committee, opposed the measure, saying the time was not ripe to introduce such a law. The measure then dropped, but was smuggled in later, just before adjournment, and two-thirds of the members knowing it was there.

Billy McInnes to the Rescue. Billy McInnes then took the floor in defence of his father. He declared his father's position was not the least affected by Martin's election or defeat. He would go further, and tell them that, for the past two years, his father repeatedly informed the Ottawa authorities that he was ready to retire, and anxious to do so. BROUGHT A GOLD BRICK. A Value of \$1480 Secured in Twenty-Two Days in Camp McKinney—Total Clean-Up \$4780. Greenwood, B.C., June 4.—(Special).—Superintendent Graham of the Waterloo mine arrived to-day from Camp McKinney, bringing with him a gold brick weighing 10.5 ounces, the result of 22 days' mill run for May. The gold is valued at \$1480. The total clean-up to date amounts to \$4780. The superintendent reports that work has been started sinking the new main shaft, and also recent finding of an ore face in the east drift, which widened out to 30 inches.

Chicago, June 4.—When extradition proceedings were begun before Commissioner Foster to-day, the Canadian Government against Fred Lee Rice, Frank Rutledge and Thomas Jones, charged with robbing banks in Toronto, a new complaint took the place of the original. This was presented by Alfred Cuddy, Toronto detective, who claimed to recognize Rutledge as a former convict. The case was continued until June 14.

Twins to Be Cut Apart. New York, June 4.—A special from Rio Janeiro to the Herald says that surgeons have operated a second time on Rosalina and Maria, who were joined together at the waist. The operation was successful, and the twins would have separate lives.

L., and John Sullivan, a clever featherweight of this city, fought six of the liveliest kind of rounds last night, and Sullivan surprised every one by the straight fight he put up. The local man had slightly the better of Dixon in inducing the balance of the fight, but Calahan fought from the beginning to the end. He had no trouble in landing on Dixon, and he was completely destroyed, and only managed to land his fists about three times during the six rounds. About 4000 people were at the fight.

Telephone Men on Strike. Men Got in Town to Take the Place of the Rochester Bell Employees. Rochester, June 4.—Forty men were brought here by the Bell Telephone Company to take the places of the men who up to a few days ago had been working for that company as linemen. The new men were picked up in Lockport, Gasport and Sanborn. The strikers, who were on hand when the men arrived, tried to persuade them to return home, with the result that 25 men refused to go to work. The strikers think they will be able to join the strikers' force to-morrow.

Hotel Destroyed by Fire. Baltimore, Md., June 4.—Mount Holly Inn, a new hotel, which was rapidly approaching completion, at Walkers, a suburb of Baltimore, was completely destroyed by fire early this morning, entailing a loss of \$85,000. It was insured by E. M. Noel, the builder, for \$60,000. The hotel will be rebuilt.

More Canadians Killed. Despatch Fighting Goes on in the Philippines—Some Insurgents Surrendered. Manila, June 4.—Yesterday Gen. Funston, with 25 men, engaged 50 of the enemy 25 miles east of San Miguel de Mayumo. Capt. George J. Coffey of the 22nd Regt. and one private were killed. The enemy's loss is not reported. Twenty-five armed insurgents have surrendered at Galice, Island of Tausog.

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BANK OF MONTREAL IS DOING A VERY PROSPEROUS BUSINESS

Increase in Circulation During the Past Year, and Also an Increase in Deposits—General Manager Clouston Says Canada Should Be Well Satisfied With Business.

Montreal, June 4.—(Special).—The annual meeting of the Bank of Montreal took place to-day, Hon. George Drummond, vice-president, occupying the chair. The general manager said: "In the statement submitted to you to-day the principal changes which have taken place during the past year are: The liabilities column shows an increase of \$700,000, and an increase of \$4,500,000 in deposit-bearing interest, while on the other side there is a decrease of \$3,500,000 in the reserve held in Great Britain and an increase of \$10,000,000 in loans. A considerable percentage of the latter increase represents a legitimate demand from commercial customers for advances, arising from the more active and expanding conditions of trade. The remainder is employed in special operations of a temporary character, and will probably be closed out in the next few months."

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ELECTIONS TO BE HELD IN SEPTEMBER

Commission, Composed of Chancellor Boyd, Judge Falconbridge and Judge MacTavish, Get Orders to Begin to Dig Without Delay.

Ottawa, June 4.—(Special).—The Royal Commission has been appointed to enquire into election corruption. The three judges are those named by The World last week. The scope of the commission is almost unlimited, and 1896 does not end their purview; it is left to their judgment. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in making the announcement this afternoon, read the following order-in-council, and the commission was forthwith issued: "On a memorandum, dated June 2, 1900, from the Minister of Justice, submitting that, whereas allegations have been made that, during and for several years prior and subsequent to the general election of 1896, for the election of members to the House of Commons of Canada, frauds were committed by returning officers, or other parties, in several of the electoral districts, either while the votes were being polled or thereafter, by the spoiling of the ballots marked by the electors, or by the fraudulent substitution of other ballots for those so marked, or by other frauds committed in respect to the ballots, at any time before and up to the return of the writ, and it being most desirable that all such alleged frauds should be investigated, and the recurrence thereof, if any, prevented, to the end that the return may show the actual vote of the electors who voted in each electoral district: "And whereas it is desirable to appoint a commission, with full power to make enquiries, investigation, reports and recommendations, as hereinafter set forth: "The Commissioners Named. "Therefore, the Minister recommends that the Commission be appointed as follows: Chancellor Boyd, Judge Falconbridge and Judge MacTavish, Get Orders to Begin to Dig Without Delay.
