

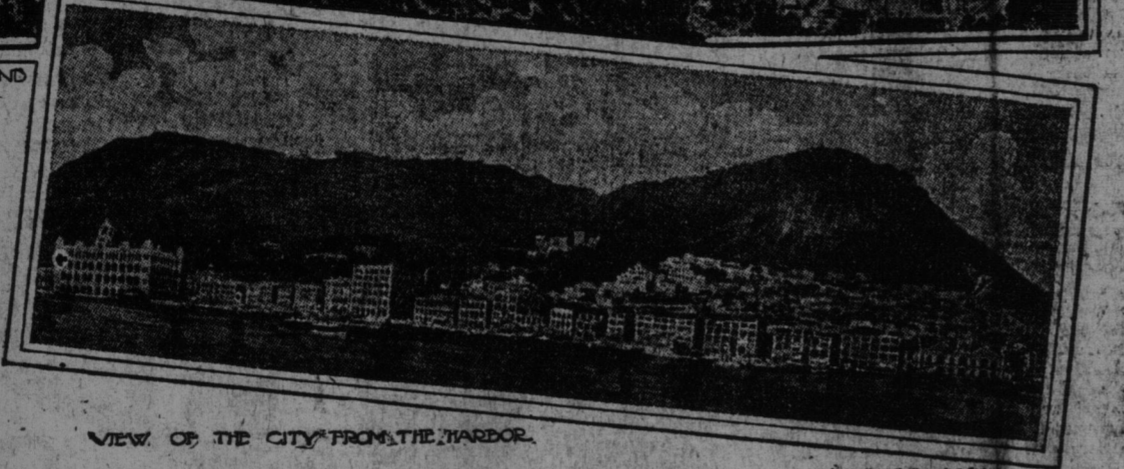

TYPHOON IN PHILIPPINES

MANILA, Sept. 22.—A typhoon is reported in the Philippines south of Manila, winds are down. No report has been received on the damage in the provinces. In Cavite the arsenal and shipping were damaged. The gunboat Araya is ashore. It is thought the damage is not serious.

HONG KONG, Sept. 22.—The steamer Chanting from Canton sighted the body of Bishop Heers, the American bishop who was drowned in the recent typhoon of Castle Peak bay. The steamer's doctor has been dispatched to recover the body.

RIIS CAN'T AGREE WITH ROOSEVELT

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—The Times today says: Jacob A. Riis and President Roosevelt are old friends and they have worked together for many years in the interest of reform, but the simplified spelling book, endorsed by Mr. Roosevelt, has been too much for Mr. Riis. President Roosevelt may approve the new method, but Mr. Riis has to disagree with him for once.

Mr. Riis has just returned to his home in Richmond Hill after several months spent in Nova Scotia. He did not read the newspapers while away, and when he returned home was surprised at the liberties which some of them were taking with the English language. At first Mr. Riis refused to say what he thought of the movement, but when he was induced to read the list of words to be reformed he could not refrain from expressing his disapproval.

LIVED THIRTEEN DAYS ON BLUBBER

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 22.—The steamer Sharp's Dollar, which carried supplies to the Whiting fleet in the Arctic, reached Seattle last night. Thirty-one men from the wrecked whaler Alexander and fifteen men from the other ships of the fleet, were brought down on the vessel. She also brought whalebone valued at \$300,000 from the different ships.

The Dollar met the fleet at Point Barrow and delivered the stocks and food stuffs. The entire fleet, with the exception of the whaler Jenneta, is to return this season unless they are caught by the ice, which was reported to be fast closing in when the Dollar left. The men who returned on the Dollar tell stories of terrible sufferings, principally from the lack of food on the different vessels.

DEPARTMENT OF TRADE AND COMMERCE HAS NOT HEARD FROM THE ALLANS

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 22 (Special).—The department of trade and commerce has not yet received any information as to the story about the C. P. R. steamers going to St. John only during the winter months and the Allan turbine steamers to Halifax only.

OLD CRIBWORK SLID OUT AND WILL DELAY SINKING OF NEW CRIB

The condition of Union street grows more serious each day. Last night the old cribwork at the head of Rodney wharf and just at the north-westerly corner of the No. 1 crib site, slid out about two feet across and it is now believed to be approaching on the wharf site. Members of the board of works and others interested talked the matter over this morning, and it has been decided to remove the old cribwork. The dredge Beaver will probably be put at the work at once, so as to delay the sinking of the new wharf as little as possible.

POLICE COURT Case Against Disorderly Boys Was Postponed as Complainant Was Unable to Appear.

There were two good reasons for the further postponement of the case of John R. Cunningham, of Charles street, against Arthur Burke and a number of other lads whom he accuses of throwing stones at his house, using abusive language and shouting and in other ways annoying him.

DOUBLE FATALITY Two Men While Driving Were Struck by Nicolet Express—Both Were Killed.

NICOLET, Que., Sept. 22 (Special).—A double fatality occurred last night at the I. C. R. crossing, when Dr. Lapierre and Arthur Houde were driving across the track and their team was struck by the Nicolet express. Lapierre, who belonged to Daveluyville, was instantly killed, and Houde, who resided at St. Celestin, died yesterday at his parents' residence. The coroner's jury declared the railway employees were not to blame, as all the signals of the approach of the train had been given.

BIG BLAZE IN OIL WAREHOUSE Canadian Oil Company's Warehouse in Toronto Entirely Destroyed by Fire This Morning.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 22 (Special).—The big warehouse of the Canadian Oil Co. of Strachan avenue was entirely destroyed by fire at three o'clock this morning. Before the brigade arrived the flames had entirely enveloped the building, which was about 100 feet long by 50 wide and contained a large stock of oil. Manager Hamilton estimated the loss at \$50,000.

ACCIDENT ON SYDNEY LINE

I. C. R. Fast Express Derailed Near Iona—Engineer and Fireman Badly Hurt.

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 22 (Special).—The fast express from Halifax to Sydney was derailed last night at Iona, about thirty miles from Sydney, and the engineer, Andrew McLeod, was terribly scalded. The fireman was also badly injured. Three cars went off and the engine careened over an embankment. The track is torn and twisted for quite a distance. This is the third accident in which the express has figured in three months, but last night, has been the worst. The passengers escaped unhurt, but with a bad shaking up.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Gibraltar telegraph that steamer Citta di Milano (Ital), from New York for Naples and Genoa, arrived there today with the crew of bark Umbro, to I. (Ital), Olvira, from Genoa July 18 for St. John, N. B., which vessel had been abandoned at sea.

DR. LAPONI ILL

ROME, Sept. 22.—A consultation has been held over Dr. Lapponi, physician to the pope. The physician favored an operation, but this was opposed by Dr. Rossi and other surgeons, who considered the patient too weak for the ordeal, in spite of the fact that he was strong.

Once for the working man and the common people the dominant color was grey or dull brown; now comes a time when the colors are many and brilliant. Each day life is a perpetual feast, spread with rich viands. Our fathers dwell in tents, sit bread and butter on their benches; their children, in red-tiled houses, and those servants named inventors, authors, reformers, educators, are making the house to be a palace. The knowledge of the good fortune that has overwhelmed all of one's fellows leads a new note of happiness to the work of all men who are knit in with their fellows.

LIFE WIDENING IN ITS INDIVIDUAL ASPECTS.

We return from a look abroad to our own country with a new sense of the increasing richness of the life of the common people. Men are ceasing to be specialists as farmers or carpenters or engineers. The man is now something more than a modified merchant. As never before the occupations are making strong men. Work is becoming a kind of college. The new tools are pushing back the horizon for the common people. The spinner has ceased to be a mere accident of his loom. The ignorant man can now handle the cotton fields and steel finger pick the cotton from the boll.

The boy has been awakened by necessity, and the new era is working a similar transformation upon the immigrants that have just come to our shores. Once the ignorant man, he is now a man of his own profession. One youth moved in a deep rut, worn by the feet of physicians; another walked in a path worn by theologians; neither knew anything outside of his own profession. Life's way was then a narrow way. Peasants were walled about with ignorance. Gone now is the ignorant man, the man of his own profession. The average man is becoming a strong man first, and incidentally he follows a plough and runs an engine, or sells goods.

This summer I have travelled many thousands of miles, lectured in many states, visited many cities, and have not seen a single drunken man. I have not met one workman, one farmer, one citizen in work or factory or shop who was not standing on tiptoe with expectation, who was not an optimist to his finger tips. The few pessimists I met were out of touch with life, were retired dreamers, living with their thoughts away from the world.

LIFE WIDENING IN ITS POLITICAL ASPECTS.

One returns from the summer travel with the conviction that life is growing wider and richer in its political aspects. A universal springtime seems to be moving over the earth. The very upheavals are now becoming signs of growth. Revolution itself is but the red-hot ploughshare turning up the soil and burying the seed of old evils.

Wider and richer still the industrial movement. Less than a century ago the London Times published 500 copies every morning. The English people would buy no larger edition. All England plumed itself on the journalistic achievement of the Times. But this morning's New York newspaper makes the old London Times ridiculous.

The myriad uses of electricity make Benjamin Franklin's idea of lightning seem childlike. The modern factory and loom make the old New England farmhouse, the spinning wheel and shoe, with the cruel winters, the fourteen hours of poorly paid toil, the scant food, the narrow life, the isolation and dreadful loneliness seem almost unbearable, even in thought. Penelope, weaving a palace, makes up a beautiful event—in a poem. In actual life the girls who leaved about the spinning wheel in the English seventy years ago lived life indescribably narrow, sad and starved. It is this that explains the insanity in the New England of a hundred years ago. How dreadful the sentence in John Todd's biography, that nearly every large family, soon or late, had one member that was mad!

Industrially never was life so broad, so rich, so happy. Once John Stuart Mill expressed a fear lest the art of music be reached because there were only eight notes in the scale. Since then Wagner and Liszt and Brahms have shown us that there is no limit to the art of music. Our modern life is reaching the limit of food and culture would be reached. But now we know that what has once looked upon as a new Eden of a gate that opens into a new world of happiness, comfort, wealth, prosperity and universal good fortune for the common people.

GET INCREASED PAY Moncton, N.B., Sept. 21.—The minister of railways spent today in the I. C. R. offices taking up the question of pay to the junior clerks. A number of increases have been granted to the stenographers and they range from \$5 to \$15. It is stated that the junior machinists in the shops are also to get increases at once. T. C. Burpee's salary as engineer of maintenance has been increased to the amount paid W. B. McKenzie. Four district superintendents are also to get increases of \$30 each per annum.

Financial and Commercial WALL STREET CONTINUES TO BE RATHER CAUTIOUS

The Monetary Situation is Exerting an Influence—Will Secretary Shaw Come to the Rescue?—Great Demand for Cash.

(New York Journal of Commerce, Thursday.) Monetary conditions since more are exerting their influence upon stock market transactions, causing realization sales by the speculators who have recently been strenuously endeavoring to force up prices. The dampening effect of 7 per cent. ultra money for this is the real critical element of the situation, markedly dispersed rumors of debs, consequently restricting the enthusiasm of the speculative following to a minimum.

THE CONSUMPTION OF IRON IS STILL ENORMOUS

Great Activity—Buying on a Very Large Scale—Prices Advancing—Large Tonnage in Finished Material—Some Large Deals.

DOMINION STEEL PROFITS (Montreal Star.) According to the official statement, the net earnings of the Dominion Steel Co. for the month of August were \$197,000, while the surplus for the month, clear of all fixed charges and sinking funds, was well over \$100,000.

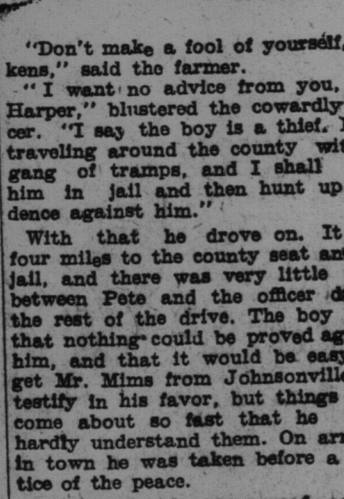

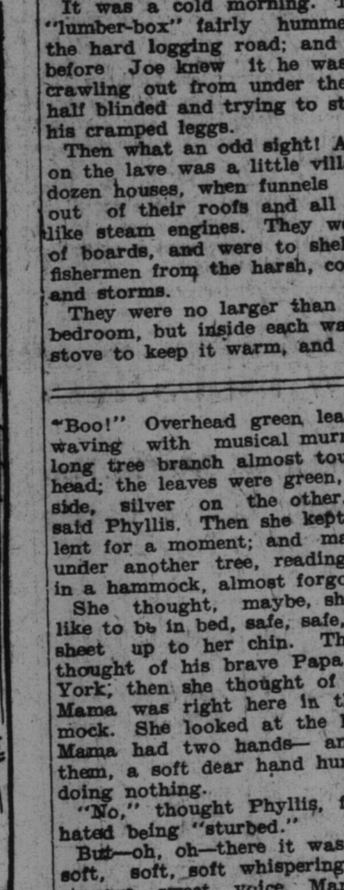

THREE MILLIONS MORE IN SUBSIDIES TO SATISFY DEMANDS OF PROVINCES

(Ottawa Free Press). The premiers of all the provinces will be in Ottawa on the 8th of October...

At the Quebec conference the provincial delegates pointed out in their resolution that at the time of Confederation it was impossible to foresee the development of the Dominion and to fix in an unalterable way the distribution of the revenue...

The subsidies allowed to the several provinces divide themselves into four classes: 1. For the expense of government and legislature; 2. Grant equal to 80 cents per head of population; 3. Special grants; 4. Interest on debt allowance.

In the case of Ontario and Quebec the grant of 80 cents per head does not include the interest on the public debt...

METHODIST CONFERENCE

Montreal, Sept. 21—An alarming report was presented to the delegates of the Methodist conference today by the church's insurance expert, Geo. Wegensch, of Waterloo, who stated that the superannuation fund was insolvent with a deficit of more than \$2,000,000.

"The total liabilities is approximately \$2,317,000 and this amount should now be on hand, invested to earn at least three per cent. The amount actually invested is, I believe, but \$270,000, so that there is a deficit of more than \$2,000,000.

"This disparity between income and expenditure is caused, the committee believes, by premature expatriation and the question is asked 'Why do our ministers retire before they are worn out?'
