

Feeble-mindedness is responsible in no small degree for the acuteness of such problems as alcoholism, pauperism, unemployment and public school inefficiency. In connection with the latter it is important to note that the Toronto public and separate schools are loaded with two thousand defectives. These feeble-minded children in school atteniance not only hamper educational efsciency, but are responsible for the
