Wy It is So Important for Mothers-in-Law to Give Their Married Children a Little Privacy-Will a Man Hesitate to Marry Into a Family of Girls? - How Much Money Should a Young Couple Marry On?

DEAR MISS DIX-Will you please write something about mothers-inlaw from the angle of the mother-in-law who is perpetually under-foot, and who never seems to realize that a husband and wife who love each other want à little privacy, to be alone together sometimes and to have no outsider in

their home? My mother-in-law is a very good woman, quiet, not interfering, but for ten years I have had virtually no relief from her society, and at

times I get desperate. I am never in the house alone with my hus-I am never in the house alone with my hus-band, never had a meal alone with him; never take a ride, or go to a place of amusement that we do not have to take her along. She has daughters, but she will not visit them, or, if she does, stays only a few days and then she is back. My husband tries to plan trips for her, but she A DESPERATE DAUGHTER-IN-LAW.

> There is no phase of the dependent relative problem that is quite so difficult to solve as this.

It is what makes us dread so much to take our in-laws into our homes, for well we know that once we get him or her there, there will be no relief for us. We will have an old man or an old woman of the sea on our backs from which only

No matter how fond we are of an outsider, no matter how hard they try to make themselves pleasant and agreeable, they are outsiders, and break up the solidarity of the home, and every family would like to have its home to itselef if it could. There are things that husbands and wives would like to say to each other, confidences they would like to exchange, endearments they would like to show each other, which they cannot do with a third party present.

No married couple wants always to drag an older person around with them. They would like to go off by themselves sometimes.

So even the most dutiful sons and daughters get fed up on their mothers' society and long for an occasional relief from it, even when they are good and affectionate children, and glad and thankful to be able to make mother's last days because and comfortable. make mother's last days happy and comfortable

And it is strange that mother, who has also probably been through the same experience in her day, does not realize this and give her children a rest by dividing her time up among them or going off on visits; or, if finances permit, spending the summer or



W. W. Alward Delivers Address Before Engineering Institute Branch

That Saint John contains some splendid examples of different forms of architecture in various buildings throughout the city was the informathroughout the city was the informa-tion given last evening at a meeting of the Engineering Institute of Canada. The Court House, lately reconstructed with its vista overlooking King square where an opportunity was afforded for showing up the architectural features of the building, was especially men-tioned as being a splendid example of architecture.

architecture.

Other buildings receiving favorable mention were Stone church, the old Hatheway property, now the Knights of Columbus Hall, also the coat-of-arms over Saint John's City Hall.

A. W. Alward, A. R. I. B. A., of the architectural firm of Alward and Cillies this city, gave an address on the architectural firm of Alward and Gillies, this city, gave an address on "The Architectural Design of Buildings" to the members of the local branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada in the New Brunswick Telephone Company building, Chipman Hill. A. R. Crookshank, M. E. I. C., presided as chairman.

### HISTORICAL SKETCH

The first section of the address dealt with a historical sketch of the different forms of ancient architecture. The first forms of ancient architecture. The first known forms of architecture existed on the banks of the Nile, followed by the Chaldean types, but architecture received greatest attention and made its greatest progress during the early Greek civilization. The various features of the Parthenon of Athens were described as an example of the splendescribed as an example of the splen-did style of architecture developed by the Grecians. It was shown the Greeks were familiar with tricks to overcome the effects of optical illusions so that the effects of optical illusions so that the completed structure was not only structurally sound but was also pleas-ing to the eye. Following the Grecian period, the speaker mentioned the Graeco-Roman era of architecture prev-alent in Great Britain at the beginning of the last century. Following this was the mid-Victorian style of 50 years ago which produced many poor forms of architecture, due t the attempt at excess decoration and generally contemptuously termed "the jig-saw" period.

The present types of industrial buildings was touched on and it was shown that a plain office building with every detail properly proportioned to bear its share of load was architecturally correct on account of its simplicity of outline.

# GOES INTO DETAIL

In detail, the speaker mentioned the term "architect" was first applied term "architect" was first applied about 500 years ago and previous to this the craftsman were known as a master builder. Of local interest was the mention of the work of a Saint John builder known of as Cunningham, and also claimed by some as going under other names, who did some fine work on various buildings in Saint John about 100 years ago. It was avident from the splendid work done that this man must have had associated with him several good workmen ciated with him several good workmen as stone masons. To an architect it was a pleasure to see the numbers of well-designed colonial doorways on various houses in West Saint John which showed a good taste in earlier building

The question of perspective drawings was dealt with at some length and the advantage of showing a building as it would appear when constructed in its relation to surrounding buildings.







# Heroic Effort To Save Young Brother Ends In A Double Drowning On Gaspe Coast

The International Paper Co., through its three Rivers mill, will add about 100,000 tons to the increase in the production of newsprint in Canada during the year 1926. Early in the year four new machines were installed at Three Rivers, bringing the capacity of this mill up to 700 tons daily. The actual production of newsprint by the company at Three Rivers and in the United States mills in 1925 was 353,880 tons, an average of between 1,100 and 1,200 tons daily. The estimated output for the entire year 1926, from figures of actual production up to Sept. 30, is 452,357 tons or an average of over 1,500 tons daily. This will be, it is understood, the largest newsprint production the company has ever recorded, the daily output when the United States mills were running full and before the Three Rivers plant was constructed, standing under 1,200 tons daily. For some years the total output of the company in paper was about 1,800 tons daily but a third or more of this was other kinds of paper.

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
